## NW-II Pilot Now In Vietnam

Major Arnold Richardson, stationed with the 309th Air Command Squadron at Phan Rang Airbase, Vietnam, says Americans know more about what's going on over there than they do!

Richardson, who arrived in Vietnam December 26th, says about all they hear over the radio is Rock-n-roll and the only way he knows if the war is still active is to watch the fighter squadrons (who fly about 6 hours a day.)

Phan Rang Airbase, the Spearman Major says, is one of the more choice bases in Vietnam. It is the future home of the 7th Air Force so they're going all out... a golf course is being built and all kinds of nice quarters. Bob Hope and his troupe stayed in these quarters which delayed Arnold's housing for awhile. But he says no complaints were offered since Hope was the greatest thing to happen in Vietnam.

Maj. Richardson said he is to be on the flight line at 6:30 a.m. He flies a C-123 transport plane, which reminds him of the B-24 bomber he flew in World War II. Arnold said (as an after thought) they had stuck on a couple of jet engines and the plane performs better when he shuts down the two piston engines and flies via jet alone.

It's an ideal plane for the type of flying they do in Vietnam. He says, believe it or not, the flying itself is interesting and fun. The rules and regulations go by the board and as long as you're not caught, you're some free. "The only thing that bothers me is the way we treat these airplanes—guess I'll get used to it—it's what they were designed for," he says.

Haven't been here long enough to say whether the whole fiasco is good or bad but the whole situation is really queer. We had 60 RVN soldiers yesterday and had to give the airplane a complete, minute, inspection after they deplaned in case one of them was a VC who had left a hand grenade behind set to go off after we were airborne. You find yourself looking at all the Viet-

names and wondering is he (or she) or ain't he (or she.) I know this probably isn't right but after all...

Arnold lives on the base at Phan Rang, on the coast. The surrounding area is not secure and a 6:30 p.m. curfew is orders.

Arnold said he was flying every other day. His transport plane carries two pilots, engineer and a loadmaster; sometimes a navigator if they are making an aerial drop or flying over water. A typical day starts at 0530 when the crews for the day attend a briefing: weather, enemy actions, etc. Take-off is either 0630 or 0700. "We have a frag-order telling us where all we're going that day but it is subject to change. We probably go to 5 or 6 different places during the day and no two loads are the same—

mostly people, vegetables, VC prisoners, wounded, even livestock. We log from 5 to 7 hours flying time. I got off yesterday and ranged from the Mekong Delta to the Central Highlands. We really see the country—from up high of course. The only guns we carry are our personal revol-

vers and some M-16 rifles—and hope we never have to use them."

There are four C-123 squadrons in Vietnam, three of them at Phan Rang. His 309th squadron takes care of the Third Army Corps which is in the Mekong Delta.

Maj. Richardson, 45, has been serving in the US Air Force since 1942. Arnold learned to fly a plane while a young man in Spearman high school back in the late 1930s, so he made Uncle Sam a real good bomber pilot during WW II. Following his WW II service, he took a few years leave of absence, so to speak, and tried to be a Commercial Airline Pilot for American & Continental. But this didn't prove to be very interesting to him so he quit and worked for a while in Sheet's Drug Company in Spearman. But he was soon back in active service, . . . and was about to end his army "career" just before someone decided men his age were badly needed in Vietnam.

His mother, Mrs. Gladys Richardson, and sister, Mrs. Tom Etter of Spearman, hear often from him and the above information was obtained from his interesting letters. Before his arrival in Vietnam, he was assigned to Port Newark, N.J. where his wife, Betty and three of their children still live, and will until school is out. They have two other sons who are attending Texas Tech, Lubbock.

Mrs. Richardson is the daughter of Angus McKay of Hot Springs, S.D. Her mother is Mrs. Bess Davis who resides at Santa Maria, Calif.

## Sgt. Beeson Writes About North Korean Invaders



Sgt. Jimmy Beeson, son of Mr. and Mrs. Bud Beeson mailed the following letter Jan. 24th to his parents. We feel that the letter is very news-worthy, and gives our readers a first hand view of the situation in Korea.

Dear Mom and Dad: How are you doing tonight? Wish I could say things over here are the same as they always have been, but things have been popping around here.

We are out on the gun right now, on a red alert. This all means that while we are on the alert, that no one can leave. We are supposed to have a round, if they need one, in the air within 2 minutes after we are called upon.

Am sending you a clipping out of a paper. This deals with why we are like we are now. All of these agents were supposed to have come across the sector about a thousand meters away from the compound where we are now. The guys out on the line haven't been taking things serious, but their ideas have changed real quick.

Intelligence thought the surviving agents would try and come back through where they came in. Right now every available man is up on the front. All compounds have tripled guards, over base camp, which usually has only 18 guards, had 49 last night. Usually these guards only carry 5 rounds of ammo, last night each man had from 40 to 80 rounds a piece.

Out here on the gun, I placed 2 men on guard per shift. They are carrying 40 rounds with 2 hand grenades within easy reach. Usually each man has to put his weapon in the arms room, but I had each of these draw theirs out, clean it and leave it by their beds.

We ain't playing games now. This is all for real, and I sure ain't taking any chances. There has been firing all around us. I don't know if the people have seen anything or they're just shooting at anything that moves.

So far tonight, US soldiers have killed 6 invaders and captured 3. And they had brought 6 under fires. That's why we were on alert. The invaders were moving toward our sector.

I got your letter from the 19th tonight. I was getting worried but was real glad to hear that everyone is alright.

You asked about the men in the accident. I haven't heard a word. I guess they are getting along as good as expected. I know they are keeping one guy doped up so he don't find out that he lost both legs and an arm.

Well mom, I guess I had better close for tonight. Take care of yourself and Uncle Bud for me and remember I love and miss you both very much.

Spearman's Jynxing Lynx outlasted a fine Phillips Blackhawks team 47-46, in a thriller at Lynx gym Tuesday night. Playing before a record crowd, with standing room only, the big Lynx team refused to quit, even when the odds were against them. The pressure was on once again, with 18 seconds left to play, and the Lynx holding a 1 point lead. Phillips received 2 free throws, and missed them both, believe it or not, and Joe Hutchison grabbed the rebound after the second shot, but was fouled. Coach Allen Simpson called a time out to let his team rest for a minute, and when play was resumed, Joe stepped to the free-throw

line and made both of the shots, to give Spearman a 3 point lead. With only 8 seconds left Phillips scored to make it 47-46. Mike Hendrick threw the ball into Joe Hutchison, who threw it to Carol Day as the buzzer sounded. This was the 8th district win against no losses for the Lynx this season. Mike Hendrick was the high point man for Spearman with 14 points, Carol Day had 13, Charles Shieldknight had 5, Mike Davis 9, Joe Hutchison 2 and Gary Faries 4 points. Big Tony Hester played an outstanding game on defense. Gary Faries made the two points to give Spearman their 1 point lead, just before Joe's free shots. In fact, this was

the biggest team effort of the year for the Lynx.

This was a most important game for both Spearman and Phillips. The 1400 fans present, wish to thank both of these fine teams, and their coaches for such a great sporting event. The Spearman Lions Club members, who passed out programs at the game, most certainly are to be thanked. ## Pipeline Awards To Farmers Filed

Hutchinson County Judge Norman Coffee said this week five farmers are to receive awards totaling \$22,884, unless an appeal is made to the county court later.

The awards were made to farmers whose land will be crossed by a proposed Mid-America pipeline which will run from a fertilizer plant under construction at Borger northeastward to Iowa. The fertilizer plant is being built by Hill Chemicals, Inc. of Dallas.

A three-man board considered the imminent domain dispute between the pipeline company and several Hutchinson county farmers. Those receiving awards were: Phil Jenkins, \$9,650; Mrs. Bertha Jenkins \$1,630; Virginia Baker, \$5,300; Ora Sanders \$500; Nolan Holt, \$5,804.

No announcement was made whether the five would accept the awards or appeal.

Farmers maintained the proposed pipeline would disrupt irrigation activities on their lands. Hearings began early Monday and ended Tuesday evening.

Several Hansford County farmers, whose land this same pipeline will cross, have filed similar disputes against the Company. Hearings are being held in Hansford County Monday and Tuesday.

A special three man commission appointed to hear imminent domain disputes between the above named company and 13 Hansford county farmers and land owners met Monday and Tuesday of this week. Awards totaling \$94,663.00. were filed.

County Judge Johnnie C. Lee said four disputes were settled out of court. Awards made to farmers whose land will be crossed by the pipeline were based on land damages per rod as follows: H.H. Crooks, \$17,869.00; Chunn Estate \$15,958.00; Carl M. Archer \$1,504.00; H.H. Crooks, Jr.; \$7,869.00; R.L. Porter Estate \$10,776.00; Billy Boatwright \$5,500.00; Ken-

neth Evans \$14,589.00; Peyton Gibner, Verna Lee Schnell, \$5,368.00; A.L. Buzzard Estate \$11,565.00; Walter Abell, \$1,115.00; Bill K. Jackson, \$900.00; Thelma A. Jackson & Est. \$10,700.00; R.V. Converse, \$950.00.

Judge Lee said the awards will be made unless an appeal is made. Six more disputes will be heard February 15.

## Mid-Winter Conference Of Panhandle School Leaders Held Here Saturday 27th

Approximately 104 members of the Panhandle School Leaders Association met in the Spearman High School, Saturday, Jan. 27 for their mid-winter conference.

Sam Thompson, high school principal from Dumas, spoke to the general assembly on the subject of the non-graded school. He reminded those present that quality schools are making efforts to meet the needs of all students. "It is imperative that each child be given an opportunity to receive education that will allow him to progress at his own rate," he said.

At the close of the general assembly the delegates recessed to sectional meetings for the various divisions of school administration represented.

These consisted of superintendents, secondary principals, elementary principals, counselors, and business managers and tax collectors/assessors.

The superintendents' section had as a special guest, Dr. H.E. Phillips, director of the Accreditation Division of the Texas Education Agency.

Dr. Phillips reviewed the new revised standards for Texas schools in the coming year. The Accreditation Division of the Texas Education Agency seeks to keep Texas schools moving forward in the field of current educational innovations. In order for a school district to meet state requirements it must meet accreditation standards recommended by the State Accreditation Division to the State Board of Education and accepted by that Board. Each year the superintendents of Texas schools must submit a report to this division on progress made in their district during the year and if there were areas where improvements needed to be made; proof that steps had been taken to correct them.

There are many areas the Accreditation Division be-

lieves need to be improved and these improvements will be listed in the new bulletin published by that division before the end of the 1967-68 school year. Some of them were explained to the superintendents and after Dr. Phillips finished his explanation, the superintendents were invited to ask questions or make remarks of interest on the subject.

Among the changes were these: A program by the school to assist parents of preschool children in preparing them for school.

An effort to reach and have a program for the under-educated—the out-of-school youth. Dr. Phillips named among this group those students who had graduated without a clear-cut objective and the drop-outs.

Attention to be given to the students with special learning problems and also with special learning abilities.

Dr. Phillips offered suggestions as to how these improvements might be made along with long range changes we might look for on the educational scene across the nation as well as in Texas.

The visiting PSLA members were served lunch by the High School Cafeteria staff under the leadership of Mrs. Jean Higgins, lunchroom coordinator for the Spearman Public Schools.

### Dates Set For 1968 Commodity Program Signup

Signup dates for farmers in Hansford County who wish to take part in the 1968 feed grain, wheat and cotton programs have been announced by Elzey Vanderburg, Chairman, Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation of Hansford County Committee. All commodity program signups will be held during the same period—February 5 through March 15. Signup applications indicate the farmer's program intentions, including the extent of his participation in the programs. Under both the feed grain and cotton programs for 1968,

farmers may earn diversion and price-support payments as well as qualify for price-support loans on their corn and grain sorghum crops; feed grain diversion payments will be available to all program participants in 1968. The wheat program provides price-support loans and marketing certificates to bring returns up to full parity on the part of the wheat crop allocated for domestic use; no diversion payment is available for wheat.

While the signup period for 1968 commodity programs will extend through 6 weeks, the Chairman urged that farmers who wish to take part in the programs file their applications as soon as they decide on 1968 production plans. "Time has a habit of getting away from us sometimes before we know it, so it's a good idea not to delay in filing program intentions," he said.

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
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

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
