

MORE PROTEIN IN DIET IS NEEDED

The American people are not eating enough of the protein foods which are so essential for good nutrition, Prof. Chester M. Jones of the Harvard medical school, told the annual session of the American Dietetic association the other day, reports the Kansas City Star Science Service.

The reason, he said, lies in the tremendous economic changes which during the past half century have radically altered the people's food habits. Our pioneer ancestors, he cited, obtained more than a liberal supply of proteins from the large amount of fish and game which was theirs for the taking. Later when the population was rural rather than urban, farm animals supplied milk, cheese and meat for home and village consumption. But with the development of our cities, the prices of these products have increased with a resulting deficiency of protein foods in the average diet, he said.

That such a trend is dangerous is shown by the serious consequences which result from the interference with the absorption of protein characterizing several diseases. To offset these diseases such foods as meat, liver and milk must be emphasized in the diet.

While it is not necessary to stress these foods in the average diet, he said, their presence on the menu must be regular.

Lockjaw Germ Present in

Day's Common Situations

Day's Common Situations
The dust of your desk, the soil under your feet and the machine you run all carry the lockjaw germ, known as tetanus bacillus. This statement is made by Dr. Herbert L. Herschensohn in Hygeia, the Health Magazine.
However, unlike most other germs the tetanus bacillus does not multiply to any great extent in the human body. When it finds its way into a wound it stays in that vicinity. The poison which it liberates, though, travels so swiftly on the current of the blood stream throughout the system that its progress cannot possibly be halted by amputation.

itation. Moreover, it is a peculair fact that if there are no other types of germs in the wound, tetanus is not likely to develop; whereas if there are, it will certainly work havoc. If the ordinary germs are killed by appropriate medical treatment of the wound the possibility of lockjaw is thereby considerably de-creased.

Oddly enough, despite the universal distribution of tetanus bacilli
there are relatively few cases of
lockjaw when compared to the number of accidents. This is due, in
part, to the injection of tetanus antitoxin, which is routinely practiced
by physicians everywhere in the
country when treating wounds which
have the appearance of favoring
tetanus infection.

Most of the cases of this disease
occur in the tropics. It is so common in this region that cases of lockjaw in the new-born and the mother
are frequently observed. In the
infant the infection takes place in
the navel.

Heating Device Sterilizes Soil Inexpensive sterilization of dirt is possible with electrical equipment consisting of four heating units with consisting of four heating units with mountings. The florist or specialty grower builds these units into a wooden vat or container. Dirt to be cleaned of plant enemies, such as weed seeds, insect life and fungi, is placed in the container and the electricity turned on. A thermostat maintains automatically temperatures of 160 to 180 degrees Fahrenheit, raising the temperature of the soil sufficiently to destroy the plant enemies. — Popular Mechanics Magazine.

CANBERRA IS NOW MAKING PROGRESS

Visitors to Australia usually are surprised to find the seat of the federal government so far removed from the centers of trade and in-dustry. For it is in the midst of a wilderness 200 miles from the

of a wilderness 200 miles from the
nearest large city and off the main
railroad that Canberra, Australia's
American-designed capital, stands,
writes a Canberra, Australia, correspondent in the New York Times.
Founded in 1927 and therefore accounted the youngest capital in the
world, Canberra owes its selection
as the government seat to jealousy
between the two leading cities, Sydney and Melbourne. Shortly after
the formation of the commonwealth
in 1901 there was a great dispute
between the cities as to which
should be the headquarters of the
government; it was decided that
neither should have the honor.
Instead, it was decreed that territory should be set aside in the
mother state, new South Wales,
at least 100 miles from Sydney, for
a new capital city. Canberra was
chosen and there Australia set to
work to build what it hopes will be
one of the most beautiful cities in
the world.
Now a handsome city is slowly
rising on land that formerly was
pasture for sheep. Miles of paved
sidewalks and roads have been laid
down and there are parks, gardens,

Form University Display A gold-plated bronze statue of a bearded man of 3,500 years ago and rare jewelry from the Biblical city of Megoddo are on display at the Oriental Institute of the University of Chicago, notes a United Press correspondent.

An expedition uncovered three "layers" of the famous city, bringing the detailed record of Megiddo to 1500 B. C.

Unmatched by previous discoveries the gold-covered figurine is approximately 12 inches in height. The statue, experts say, unquestionably is of North Syrian origin, because of racial features, conventional representation of beard and mustache and flat profile.

The jewelry was found in the grave of a wealthy woman who was buried under a house, apparently during the siege of Megiddo by Thutmose III, Egyptian Pharaoh in 1479 B. C. It includes a gold band, which the wdman wore across her forehead, enormous gold and paste earrings, two gold-ring hair ornaments and two silver finger rings.

Previously the Megiddo expedition uncovered the ruins of stables in which Solomon kept his blooded horses and an ancient water system dating to pre-Hebraic Canaanite kings.

Cool Days Best for Hog-Killing

Choose Temperature of 28 to 40 Degrees, Advises an Expert.

an Expert.

By R. E. Nance, Professor of Animal Hubbandry, North Carolina State College.

The best time for killing hogs on a farm is a cool, dry afternoon, not the coldest day in mid-winter.

On a bitter cold day the job is too disagreeable and there is danger of the meat freezing on the outside before the animal heat escapes from around the bone. Ideal butchering weather is in a temperature of 28 to 40 degrees Fahrenheit.

Keep hogs off feed for 24 hours before slaughtering, but give them plenty of fresh water. After they have been killed, scald them in water heated to a temperature of 150 degrees.

If you don't have a thermometer,

water heated to a temperature of 150 degrees.

If you don't have a thermometer, dip your finger into the water. If it burns badly the first time, it is too hot. If you can dip your finger in and out more than three times in rapid succession, the water is too cold.

A barrel may be used to scald one or two hogs, but where more than two are to be dressed, a vat is much more satisfactory. A small table should be provided, in either case, for picking and scraping the hogs. It should be 12 to 18 inches high and three or four feet wide.

After hogs are scalded and

high and three or four feet wide.

After hogs are scalded and scraped, the carcasses should be split down the center of the backbone and the leaf fat loosened from the lower end of the ribs. Hang them in the smoke house to chill over night, but be sure the meat does not freeze.

The next morning, after all animal heat has dissipated, make the various cuts as neat and smooth as possible. Trim each piece closely, as ragged edges and too much fat lower the value of the cured product and also provide a hiding place for meat insects.

Grease Heel Found With

Poorly Cared-For Horses Grease heel is most often found with horses which have thick, coarse legs and are kept in dirty, damp, dark stables, or made to wade frequently in muddy, stagnant ords. In a few cases the trouble

damp, dark stables, or made it was defrequently in muddy, stagnary ponds. In a few cases the trouble appears with horses not kept under such conditions.

For treatment it is necessary to clip all the hair from the infected areas and wash the leg with soap and water containing washing sods or bicarbonate of soda. After the leg has been dried, it should be soaked in a strong solution of an astringent antiseptic, such as 3 ounces each of copper sulphate, alum and zinc sulphate to each gallon of water. The infected patches should be thoroughly soaked with the solution. Thereafter the leg should be dressed daily with the solution made up at one-half the strength as given. In most instances it is best to remove all wart-like structures found on the diseased spots.—Indiana Farmer's Guide.




