Connally Defends Farm **Bounties Before Senate**

WASHINGTON, D. C .- Agri-WASHINGTON, D. C.—Agricultural subsidies were vigorously defended on the floor of the United States Senate by Tom Connally, Senator from Texas, in answer to charges made by Senator Taft of Ohio that the Senate increase for the farmer were unnecessary.

Senator Connally pointed out, "It has only been since the pre-




