 water and dieth for thirst.
 Isaiah 50:2.

The current issue of the Eco-
 nomic Outlook points out that
 the U. S. is on the edge of an-
 other serious depression and give
 the unemployment figures for
 January 1940 at 11,936,000 and
 further states among other things
 that corporation profits were
 never better than for the last 3
 months of 1939, a higher to-
 tal than in any quarter previ-
 ously reported including 1928 and
 1929. 62 corporations the out-
 look says, got \$265,000,000 in
 profits, which was 16 million
 more than 1937, and 20 million
 more than 1929.

Sumner Welles' report to
 FDR has not been made public,

 Americas agreed on one formu-
 lala we could enjoy such a
 bountiful banquet that parties
 would be de trop.

H. R. Cromwell, U. S. Minis-
 ter to Canada, who made a
 speech a few days ago that
 tilted the political lid on the
 Washington kettle, allowing a
 lot of previously confined steam
 to escape; has probably kicked

the lid off completely this time
 in his address to the Old Boy's
 Association of the U. of Toron-
 to, in which he warned of the
 danger of propaganda against
 democracy and urged education
 in democratic ideals to circum-
 vent those who would divest
 men of every human freedom,
 diverting their fears and suspi-
 cions with words of false se-
 curity.

is not justified and disapproves the change.

If on any farm the number of tenants in 1940 is less than the average number on the farm during the years 1937 to 1939, inclusive and such reduction would increase the payments that would otherwise be made to the landlord, such payments to the landlord shall not be greater than the amount that would otherwise be made, if the county committee certifies that the reduction is not justified and disapproves the reduction.

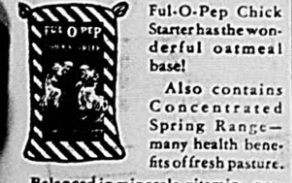

Weed out defective, diseased or undesirable kinds of trees from your farm woodlot. Cut fuel or post needs, when possible, from crooked or poorly formed trees. Keep stumps low, so that sprouts will come out near the ground.
