

The right way to wash wool is to use warm, soft water and neutral soap. Squeeze the suds thru the cloth, don't rub it—and rinse the cloth, don't rub it—and rinse in water the same temperature as first used. Dry wool in a warm place, but not in the sunlight. Wool garments should be pressed while they are still a bit damp with a medium hot iron. A pressing cloth should be used, too.

Washable rayons require heavy lukewarm suds of neutral soaps. the specialist says. These should not be rubbed and they should be handled with particular care while they are wet. It's also important to rinse rayons in water the same temperature as that in which they were washed. With hote people planting gardens of course, there will be a somewhat greater demand for seed; but seed shortages will not be a limiting factor in food production.

It's true that there are short

It's true that there are short supplies of some varieties. That's usuall the case. But, also as usual, there are adequate supplies of other adapted varieties that may be substituted for them.

Such seed shortages as there are, are most evident in beets, carrots, onions, and spinach. Also some varieties of beans, early peas and cucumbers for slicing. Cauliflower seed, for one, is more plentiful than usual because of heavy production in 1941.


