the first time in the history of Hansford county a man was sentenced to DIE!
Mrs. J. Brown, killer of Mrs. Frances Murphy, March 1941, was apprehended by special police April 25, 1941. A police term of district was called for June 10, 1941. He was found guilty by jury of God-fearing, law-abiding Hansford county citizens on 14th. The verdict of this appeal was appealed to the Court of Criminal Appeals and on Feb. 19, 1942, this high court of appeal upheld the verdict of the District Court.
Brown was returned to Spearman to hear sentence spoken by Judge Jack Allen, who was the judge in June. Judge Allen, before the hour of sunrise, warden of the State Prison, Hansville, shall cause a current of electricity of sufficient intensity to cause death, and may have mercy on your soul."
Brown made no statement.

There are a few of the Ladies coat sweaters that are not completed. Those persons who are knitting these sweaters should make every effort to finish them soon.
We would like to remind the knitters of our county that we still have plenty of yarn for the sleeveless sweaters for our Armed Forces. We feel sure that anyone who knits, would be only too glad to make one of these for our soldier boys—call at the Red Cross Sewing Room at the City Hall on Tuesday of each week, or call Mrs. Lyon at her residence in Spearman.
We would like to mention at this time some of our women who we feel deserve special mention on account of their outstanding work. On this quota of garments Mrs. Autra Ward and Mrs. O. V. Walker of Gruver. Mrs. Ward making 18 pair of little boys trousers, Mrs. Walker 13 pair. Mrs. B. F. Ooley of Spearman made 15 pair of trousers and 6 shirts, and is now knitting her second sleeveless sweater. Mrs. C. E. Campbell made 12 pair of trousers. Mrs. Bert Briley 6 pair of trousers and 3 shirts.
The sewing room at Gruver under the able management of Mrs. Shrader has contributed very materially to the completion of our present quota.

Several farmers of Hansford county think they can harvest volunteer wheat—please read the following:
"Newspaper accounts state that volunteer wheat can be left for harvest provided a number of provisions are met. This is to report that to date no definite ruling has been received concerning this matter, except that volunteer wheat can be cut for hay before it reaches maturity", said County Agent Joe Hatton.
AAA committeemen think that volunteer wheat can be harvested provided it is stored on the farm (cannot be sold) and provided the producer has not over seeded his 1942 wheat allotment and stays within compliance in 1943.

Hatton stated "We are trying to get definite information on the status of volunteer, and as soon as it is obtained every producer will be notified, and a meeting called to explain the program," he concluded.

For the first time volunteer wheat may be substituted for seeded wheat that has been destroyed, providing it was destroyed by worms, wind, hail, floods, or insects, and providing it is in a large enough block that it can be measured without too much expense.

Application for substitution of volunteer for sown wheat must be made prior to May 15. Application can be made at the county office.

The County AAA office announced that because of war work it will remain open 6 full days a week.

WHEAT FARMERS TO VOTE IN REFERENDUM FRIDAY, MAY FIRST

Two Years Supply Of Wheat Now In Sight

The issue of marketing quotas on wheat will be voted on again May 2nd. As was the case last year, marketing quotas must carry by two-thirds majority.
If quotas fail to carry there will not be a loan on wheat this year!

The 1942-43 supply is estimated at 1,428 million bushels. The 1942 crop is estimated at 631 million bushels of winter wheat plus 162 million bushels of spring wheat. To put it in round figures we have approximately two years of supply of wheat.

Victory means plenty, but not waste and any increase in wheat will be just that much waste.
Unless the farmers of this section vote 100 percent for wheat quotas they face a financial crisis. "Think quotas, talk quotas and Vote quotas, May 2."

Windbreak Trees:

Trees for windbreaks are available from the Shelterbelt Nursery at Childress for cost of transportation. Thursday, April 9th will be the last day for putting in your request for trees. They will be distributed Saturday afternoon at the court house. Bring burlap or straw to cover the trees so the roots won't dry when you come after them. Trees not called for by 5 p. m. Saturday will not be held for the requester, but will be disposed of to anyone wanting them. Place your requests with Joe Hatton or Marjorie Brown.

Check Pressure Cookers

Pressure Cooker gauges should be checked before each canning season and after any hard jar. This check is especially important now that many people will wipe the dust of years off of their canning equipment and start processing food again. Petcocks and safety valves should be cleaned each time food has been cooked or open containers exhausted in the cooker. To clean unscrew, take apart and wash in boiling water. Exercise care to see that parts are not scarred. Use a toothpick or needle to check the openings in the bottom of the cover. Dry carefully and put back together before storing. The home demonstration council has a maximum thermometer to check cookers. Call by the home demonstration agents office for information on checking your pressure cooker.

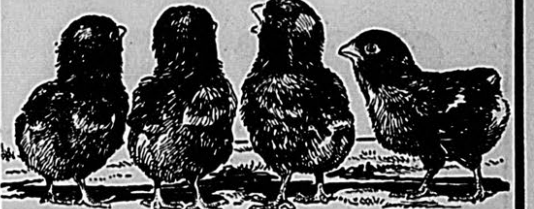
