HOSKINS, LINN WIN ONLY COUNTY RACES
O'Daniel Beats Allred Two Votes In County Will Have Run Off August 22nd
Only 633 qualified voters of Hansford county expressed their desire on who would run their government in the Democratic Primary held in ten voting boxes of the county, July 25th. This number is considerably less than the usual vote of nearly 1,000 registered in previous elections.
"There's gonna be a run off," Senator W. Lee O'Daniel, facing his first run off since he began his political career, will contest former governor James V. Allred for the Democratic nomination of Junior United States Senator. The election bureau gave the former Kansas citizen nearly 49 percent of the total votes cast Saturday, July 25th.
O'Daniel carried this county by two votes, 281-279. Dan Moody received 49 votes with Floyd E. Ryan a poor fourth with 6.
Representative Eugene Worley of Shamrock ran away from Lynn Miller of Pampa 575 to 32. Worley was re-elected by one of the biggest majorities ever given a candidate.
Coke R. Stevenson won his first race for governor handsily from a poor field of candidates.
John Lee Smith of Throckmorton county and Harold Beck face a run off for Lieut. Governor.
George Sheppard was re-elected Comptroller of Public Accounts.
Jesse James and W. Gregory face a possible run off for State Treasurer. James was the Hansford county favorite.
L. A. Wood was re-elected as Supt. of Public Instruction.
Ernest O. Thompson of Amarillo ran a successful race for re-election defeating another Amarillo man Eaker Salsbury and Lester Boone.
J. E. McDonald was re-elected as Com. of Agriculture. He defeated W. N. Hill Cory.
Pierce Brooks and Beuford H. Jester will contest each other for the office of Railroad Com., formerly occupied by Jerry Sadler.
Judge Harry N. Graves easily defeated Walter Strength for Justice of Court Criminal Appeals.
Amarillo and Lubbock will tangle in the race for Justice Court of Civil Appeals since E. L. Pitts of Lubbock and E. C. Nelson of Amarillo face a run off in that race.
W. L. McConnell was re-elected District Attorney without opposition. Richard Craig, without opposition will serve a second term as representative.
County officers re-elected with out opposition were: A. F. Barkley, county judge; T. D. Sansing, county attorney; May Jones, county treasurer; and H. L. Wilbanks, sheriff.
Fred Hoskins defeated John Bishop in a spirited race for County and District clerk.
Fred Linn will serve a second term as commissioner of precinct 1 by virtue of his beating C. W. King.
G. E. Oakes was re-elected as justice of the peace precinct 1 July 25th.
R. L. McClellan won a write in contest to succeed himself as County Demo Chairman.
Commissioners Ogle, Holt and Olson were returned to office without opposition.
The August runoff will probably be held Aug. 22.

HANSFORD COUNTY PRODUCED MORE CERTIFIED WHEAT THAN REST OF TEXAS
Hansford county is the champion of Texas in the production of certified and high quality wheat for 1942, marking the 5th consecutive year this record has been maintained, according to Joe M. Hatton, county agricultural agent of the Texas A. & M. College Extension Service.
This year, as was true also in 1938, 1939, and 1940, Hansford county produced more certified wheat than the rest of the State combined.
Figures from the State Dept. of Agriculture show that for 1942 Hansford county had 1855 acres of certified Tenmarq and 55 acres of certified Turkey Red wheat, for a total of 1,910 acres. This is compared to a total of only 1,539 acres of all varieties certified for the balance of Texas.
The yield on the 1,910 acres was exceptionally good, with seed producers reporting that their grain made from 30 to 44 bushels per acre, with an average production of about 35 bushels.
The certified growers are now ready to make sales on anything from a few bushels to carload lots.
The growers, and the acreage certified are as follows:
A R Bort, tenmarq, 75 acres; R C Chase and son, tenmarq, 145 acres, turkey, 35 acres; Wm F. C. Etling, tenmarq, 390 acres; Wm. F. D. Etling, tenmarq, 30 acres, turkey, 20 acres; O. C. Holt, tenmarq, 30 acres; Emil Knutson, tenmarq, 600 acres; R. L. McClellan, tenmarq, 80 acres; F. R. Wallin and James B. Langston, tenmarq, 200 acres; F. R. Wallin and Morris Smith, tenmarq, 255 acres.
R. L. McClellan Jr., is now stationed at the Naval Training Station, San Diego, Calif.
Billy Brandt recently enlisted in the Navy. He was sworn into service in Dallas last week.

FREEZE ASPHALT FOR REPAIRING ALL HIGHWAYS
Midnight, July 22, all asphalt stock piles were frozen except for war effort purposes. This was the message received by O. C. Watson, state highway maintenance foreman of Perryton.
This means that no more asphalt will be available for making needed repairs on hard surfaced highways. It also means that every person should exercise extreme care in the use of the highways and knocking holes in the pavement or damaging the surface in any manner. Farmers should be especially careful about pulling farm equipment on asphalt highways.

LAND BANK WILL CONTINUE LOW INTEREST RATES
Farmers and ranchmen of this territory served by the Hansford and Stinnett National Farm Loan Associations will save approximately \$57,240.00 during the next two years through continued low interest rates on Federal Land Bank and Land Bank Commissioner loans, P. A. Lyon, secretary-treasurer of the two associations reported Wednesday.
The saving, Mr. Lyon explained, results from legislation recently passed by Congress which continues through June 30, 1944 the 3 1-2 percent interest rate on long term Federal Land Bank and Land Bank Commissioner loans.
The Hansford and Stinnett National Farm Loan Associations have approximately \$2,000,000 in the aggregate of loans outstanding.

S. H. HIGGS, PIONEER OF COUNTY, BURIED FRIDAY AT 3 P. M.
Another Hansford county pioneer has passed on to the great beyond.
Samuel Henry Higgs, well known farmer and cattleman, father of Paul B. Higgs, passed away at his home in Plainview, Thursday, July 23rd. He was 79 years old.
Mr. Higgs had been a resident of Hansford county since 1905, until he retired a few years ago and moved to Plainview.

He will be buried in the Old Hansford Cemetery.

William Lee Barkley was born Nov. 8, 1870 in Socora, Territory of New Mexico. He moved to Hansford county early in 1907.

TWO MEN WANTED FOR NAVY ENLISTMENT BY AUGUST 20TH
During the months of August and September, the Navy Recruiting Service is staging the largest concerted drive to secure men since he war began. And Hansford county has been asked to do its bit.
Preach Loftin, has been chosen chairman of Hansford county for the purpose of this drive.
Hansford county has been assigned a quota of 2 men for the month of August, based on the percentile population of the county as compared with the Panhandle district.

BURNING STUBBLE MAY CAUSE LOSS OF GOVERNMENT CHECKS TO FARMERS
Burning wheat stubble may subject the soil to serious wind erosion and result in loss of AAA payments, county agent Hatton stated today.
Reports have reached the AAA committee that stubble burning is being practised extensively in some areas. AAA regulations provide that if a farmer permits his land to become a serious wind or water erosion hazard, the county committee may withhold payments on the farm. Burning stubble lays the land open for wind erosion damage.
"Dry weather this winter might result in serious wind erosion damage on fields which have been burned over," Hatton explained.
Good harvest conditions this year resulted in a normal stubble which can be plowed under.

READ CAR-PART REGULATIONS ON PAGE FOUR
No distributor of automobile or motor vehicle parts and replacement is permitted to sell parts or replacements to a consumer unless such consumer delivers to such distributor, concurrently with the purchase, a used part of similar kind and size for each replacement part delivered to such consumer. No new replacement part shall be sold or delivered to a consumer to replace a part which the distributor can recondition by use of available reconditioning facilities.
—So reads OPM order L 158.
In other words—if you need a spark plug, etc., you must have the old one ready to turn in at the time of purchase. It's unlawful for the distributor to let you have the part and for you to bring in the old part later.
This order does not apply to plows, combines, binders, tractors etc., however you must have exchange valves for tractors.
As we understand this regulation it applies even to gaskets. To play safe you had better bring the old part along just in case it does apply.
This order is effective on every mechanic in the United States. Every filling station that sells so much as one spark plug.
Please cooperate with distributors of Spearman by having the old part ready to turn in. After all, it's not there ruling or idea.

Fort Worth—Texas OPA Director, Mark McGee, warned today truck lines, bus lines, delivery trucks and drivers of private passenger cars that all speeders are to be deprived of their eligibility for new or recapped tires.

H. J. R. No. 1—
A Joint Resolution
Proposing an amendment to Article 3 of the Constitution of the State of Texas by adding a new section to be known as Section 49-a, requiring all bills passed by the Legislature on and after January 1, 1945, appropriating money for any purpose, to be sent to the Comptroller of Public Accounts for his approval, and fixing the duties of the Comptroller with reference thereto; authorizing the Legislature to provide for the issuance, sale, and retirement of serial bonds, equal in principal to the total outstanding, valid, and approved obligations owing by the General Revenue Fund on September 1, 1943; providing for the submission of this amendment to the voters of this State; prescribing the form of ballot; providing for the proclamation and publication thereof; and providing for the necessary appropriation to defray necessary expenses for the submission of this amendment.
Be It Resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas:
Section 1. That Article 3 of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto, immediately after Section 49, a section to be known as Section 49-a, to read as follows:
"Section 49-a. It shall be the duty of the Comptroller of Public Accounts in advance of each Regular Session of the Legislature to prepare and submit to the Governor and to the Legislature upon its convening a statement under oath showing fully the financial condition of the State Treasury, at the close of the last fiscal period and an estimate of the probable receipts and disbursements for the then current fiscal year. There shall also be contained in said statement an itemized estimate of the anticipated revenue based on the laws then in effect that will be received by and for the State from all sources showing the fund accounts to be credited during the succeeding biennium and said statement shall contain such other information as may be required by law. Supplemental statements shall be submitted at any Special Session of the Legislature and at such other times as may be necessary to show probable changes.
"From and after January 1, 1945, save in the case of emergency and imperative public necessity and with a four-fifths vote of the total membership of each House, no appropriation in excess of the cash and anticipated revenue of the funds from which such appropriation is to be made shall be valid. From and after January 1, 1945, no bill containing an appropriation shall be considered as passed or be sent to the Governor for consideration until and unless the Comptroller of Public Accounts endorses his certificate thereon showing that the amount appropriated is within the amount estimated to be available in the affected funds. When the Comptroller finds an appropriation bill exceeds the estimated revenue he shall endorse such finding thereon and return to the House in which same originated. Such information shall be immediately made known to both the House of Representatives and the Senate and the necessary steps shall be taken to bring such appropriation to within the revenue, either by providing additional revenue or reducing the appropriation.
"For the purpose of financing the outstanding obligations of the General Revenue Fund of the State and placing its current accounts on a cash basis the Legislature of the State of Texas is hereby authorized to provide for the issuance, sale, and retirement of serial bonds, equal in principal to the total outstanding, valid, and approved obligations owing by said fund on September 1, 1943, provided such bonds shall not draw interest in excess of two (2) percent per annum and shall mature within twenty (20) years from date."
Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of the State of Texas, at the next general election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1942, being November 3, 1942, at which election all voters favoring said proposed amendment shall write or have printed on their ballots, the words:
"Against the Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas, requiring appropriation bills passed by the Legislature to be presented to and certified by the Comptroller of Public Accounts as to available funds for payment thereof, limiting appropriations to the total of such available funds, providing for issuance of bonds to pay off State obligations outstanding September 1, 1943, and fixing the duties of the Legislature and Comptroller of Public Accounts with reference thereto."
Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have same published as required by the Constitution for amendments thereto.
Sec. 4. The sum of Five Thousand Dollars (\$5,000) or so much hereof as may be necessary, is hereby appropriated out of any funds in the Treasury of the State of Texas, not otherwise appropriated, to pay the expenses of such publication and election. First pub. 7-30-42.

S. J. R. No. 21—
A Joint Resolution
Proposing an amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas authorizing the Legislature to appropriate Seventy-Five Thousand (\$75,000) Dollars or so much thereof as may be necessary to pay claims incurred by John Tarleton Agricultural College for the construction of a building on the campus of such college pursuant to deficiency authorization by the Governor of Texas on August 31, 1937.
Be It Resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas:
Section 1. That the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding a new section as follows:
"The Legislature is authorized to appropriate so much money as may be necessary not to exceed Seventy-five Thousand (\$75,000) Dollars, to pay claims incurred by John Tarleton Agricultural College for the construction of a building on the campus of such college pursuant to deficiency authorization by the Governor of Texas on August 31, 1937.
Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at the next general election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, A. D. 1942, at which all ballots shall have printed thereon: "For the constitutional amendment authorizing the Legislature to pay for building constructed for John Tarleton Agricultural College;" and
"Against the constitutional amendment authorizing the Legislature to pay for building constructed for John Tarleton Agricultural College."
Each voter shall scratch out one of said clauses on the ballot, leaving the one expressing his vote on the proposed amendment.
Sec. 3. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State. The expenses of publication and election for such amendment shall be paid out of proper appropriation made by law. First pub. 7-30-42.

H. J. R. No. 22—
A Joint Resolution
Proposing an Amendment to Article 3 of the Constitution of the State of Texas authorizing the lending of Two Million Dollars (\$2,000,000) of the Permanent School Fund for the construction of a State office building; providing for repayment to the Permanent School Fund; providing for the submission of this Amendment to the voters of this State; and providing for the necessary proclamation and expense of publication.
Be It Resolved By The Legislature of the State of Texas:
Section 1. That Article 3 of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto a new section to be known as Section 49-b, which shall read as follows:
"Section 49-b. The Legislature may provide by law for the issuance of not more than Two Million Dollars (\$2,000,000) in bonds or obligations of the State of Texas to the Permanent School Fund for the construction in the City of Austin of a State office building or buildings and the State Board of Education is hereby directed to invest not more than Two Million Dollars (\$2,000,000) of the Permanent School Fund therein. Such bonds shall be executed on behalf of the State of Texas by the Governor and Comptroller, and shall bear a rate of interest

From said Fund the Treasurer shall pay the interest on said bonds as it comes due, to the credit of the Available School Fund; and shall pay off said bonds as they become due and deposit the amounts so paid to the credit of the Permanent School Fund. The power hereby granted to issue bonds is expressly limited to the amount stated and to five (5) years from and after the adoption of this grant by the people."
Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to the qualified voters of the State of Texas at an election to be held on the third day of November, 1942, at which election all voters favoring such proposed Amendment shall write or have printed on their ballots the words:
"Against the Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas authorizing the investment of not more than Two Million Dollars (\$2,000,000) of the Permanent School Fund in bonds of the State of Texas to be issued for the construction of a State office building or buildings and providing for the repayment of the said sum of money to the Permanent School Fund."
Those voters opposing said Amendment shall write or have printed on their ballots the words:
"Against the Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas authorizing the investment of not more than Two Million Dollars (\$2,000,000) of the Permanent School Fund in bonds of the State of Texas to be issued for the construction of a State office building or buildings and providing for the repayment of the said sum of money to the Permanent School Fund."
Sec. 3. The Governor of the State is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and existing laws of the State.
Sec. 4. The sum of Eight Thousand Dollars (\$8,000), or so much thereof as may be necessary, is hereby appropriated out of any funds in the Treasury of the State not otherwise appropriated to pay the expenses of said publication and election. First pub. 7-30-42.

A Joint Resolution
Proposing an amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas by amending Section 33 of Article 16, of the Constitution of Texas so as to permit the accounting officers of this State to draw and pay warrants for salaries to officers of the United States Army or Navy who are assigned to duties in State Institutions of higher education.
Be it resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas:
Section 1. That Section 33 of Article 16, of the Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended so as to read as follows:
"Section 33. The accounting officers of this State shall neither draw nor pay a warrant upon the Treasury in favor of any person, for salary or compensation as agent, officer or appointee, who holds at the same time any other office or position of honor, trust or profit, under this State or the United States, except as prescribed in this Constitution. Provided that this restriction as to the drawing and paying of warrants upon the Treasury shall not apply to officers of the National Guard of Texas, the National Guard Reserve, the Officers Reserve Corps of the United States, nor to enlisted men of the National Guard, the National Guard Reserve, and the Organized Reserves of the United States, nor to retired officers of the United States Army, Navy, and Marine Corps, and retired enlisted men of the United States Army, Navy, and Marine Corps, nor to officers of the United States Army or Navy who are assigned to duties in State Institutions of higher education."
Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held throughout the

State on the third day of November, 1942, at which all ballots shall have printed thereon:
"Against the Constitutional Amendment permitting the accounting officers of this State to draw and pay warrants for salaries to officers of the United States Army or Navy who are assigned to duties in State Institutions of higher education."
Each voter shall scratch out one of said clauses on the ballot, leaving the one expressing his vote on the proposed amendment.
Sec. 3. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State, and the sum of Five Thousand Dollars (\$5,000) or so much thereof as may be necessary, is hereby appropriated from any funds in the State Treasury, not otherwise appropriated to defray the expenses of printing said proclamation and of holding said election.

H. J. R. No. 24—
A Joint Resolution
Proposing an Amendment to Article V of the Constitution of Texas by providing that the Legislature shall have the power by local or general law, in counties having a population in excess of two hundred thousand (200,000) inhabitants to create other courts having exclusive jurisdiction or concurrent jurisdiction with the county court in civil, criminal or probate matters.
If it appears from the returns of said election that a majority of the votes cast is in favor of the Amendment, the same shall become part of the Constitution of the State of Texas.
Sec. 3. The Governor of the State is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for said election and to have it published as required by the Constitution and existing laws of this State.
Sec. 4. The sum of Ten Thousand Dollars (\$10,000) or so much thereof as may be necessary is hereby appropriated out of the State Treasury not otherwise appropriated to pay the expenses of said publication and election.

BY ORDER OF THE WAR PRODUCTION BOARD:

No distributor of automobile or motor vehicle parts and replacements is permitted to sell parts or replacements to a consumer unless such consumer delivers to such distributor, concurrently with the purchase, a USED PART of similar kind and size for each replacement part delivered to such consumer. No new replacement part shall be sold or delivered to a consumer to replace a part which the Distributor Can RECONDITION by use of available facilities.

VIOLATIONS OF THIS REGULATION IS A CRIME:

Any person who wilfully Violates any provision of this order, or who, in connection with this order, wilfully conceals a material fact, or furnishes false information to any department or agency of the United States, is guilty of a crime, and upon conviction, may be prohibited from making or obtaining further deliveries of, or from processing or using, materials under priority control and may be deprived of priorities assistance.

YOUR COOPERATION IS DESIRED:

Your automobile and motor vehicle replacement firms ask your cooperation in abiding by this new regulation. This is not a suggestion to be voluntarily complied with. It is an order of the United States Government placed in effect to help bring Victory—If there is anything you do not understand about it, ask any of the concerns listed below.

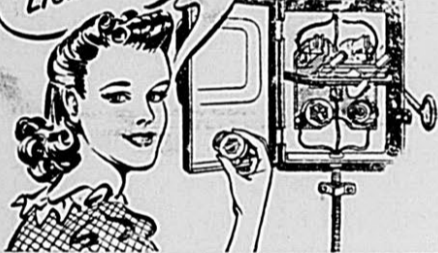

LEARN TO REPIAGE "BLOWN" FUSES

IT'S EASY AS REPLACING A LIGHT BULB



Many folks always have replaced their own fuses. Those who haven't can be a big help in saving rubber and automotive equipment by doing it themselves from now on. It's easy . . . and not only do you eliminate the wear and tear of extra trips by our service trucks; you also help yourself by restoring service immediately without waiting for the serviceman . . . who may be delayed these busy wartime days

Here's How To Do It:

If Lights Go Out, check with your neighbors to see if their service is also off. If not, look for a blown fuse, as the cause of the trouble is probably in your own home.

Pull Cord: From Outlets. If you're not sure what caused the fuse to blow, disconnect all appliance and extension cords.

Turn Off Main Switch. Stand on a dry surface. Set main switch at "OFF" position, so no electricity will flow through fuses. Main switch is usually on fuse box, but may be separate from same.

Remove Blown Fuse. Replace blown fuse with a new fuse of same size . . . generally 15 amperes for household circuits.

Turn On Main Switch. If new fuse blows again and you cannot locate the trouble call an electrician or serviceman.

Examine All Cords. Before reconnecting appliance or extension cords, look for breaks in insulation or loose connections that may have caused "short" and blown fuse. Repair or replace same to prevent a repetition of the trouble.

Never Use Substitutes. Never replace a blown fuse with a penny or with a fuse of too high an amperage. It's dangerous. Always keep a few extra fuses of right size on hand.

HOW TO TELL A "BLOWN" FUSE



Notice metal link under window of fuse. It is designed to carry a measured amount of current. When a circuit is overloaded or "shorted," the link melts or "blows out," and the current stops. The melted link and scorched spot under window indicate a blown fuse

WHY FUSES "BLOW"



Fuse "blow outs" are usually due to wornout, damaged or loosely-connected appliance cords, or to circuits overloaded with too many appliances and lights. Without fuses, your house wiring might be damaged. They are electric "safety valves."
