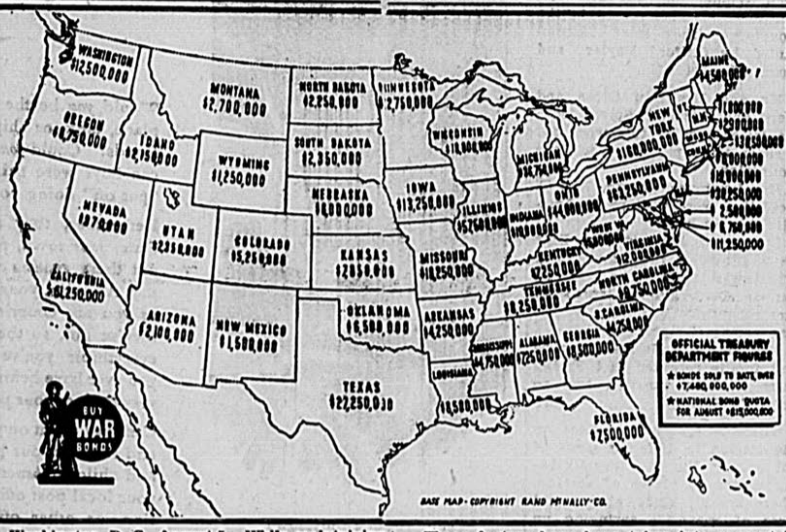

Official U. S. Treasury War Bond Quotas for August



Washington, D. C., August 5.—While maintaining a tentative annual level of twelve billion dollars as its goal, the Treasury Department today fixed the August quota for the sale of War Bonds at \$815,000,000 as shown by the accompanying map by states. In lowering the quota from a billion dollars in July to \$815,000,000 in August, the Treasury has given recognition to certain factors which may be expected to result in variations in sales over the 12-month period, such as the seasonal character of farm income. These factors have been taken into account in determining each state's share for the national quota for August and will be given consideration in fixing quotas for subsequent months. In addition to the state quotas as set out in the map there is a federal payroll allotment quota of \$9,750,000 and territorial quotas as follows: Alaska, \$760,000; Canal Zone, \$213,000; Hawaii, \$4,800,000; Puerto Rico, \$440,000, and the Virgin Islands, \$17,000.

Stores Will Observe New Closing Time

COMMODITY LISTS MUST BE FILED BY AUGUST 10TH
All retail merchants in Hansford county were reminded today by R. E. Meek, of the Hansford War Price and Rationing Board that they must file with the local board by Aug. 10 a list showing cost of living articles and their ceiling prices which the merchant has added to his stock since July 1. The filing of such lists by the tenth of each month is made mandatory by price regulation 1. Meek pointed out. He also called attention to the fact that many retail merchants still have not filed the initial listing of cost-of-living articles and their ceiling prices, which should have been in the hands of Hansford county board not later than July 1st. We have been notified that the state office is now making a survey to determine how many merchants have not filed their ceiling prices. Violators will be dealt with by OPA officials. Sugar stamp No. 6 and 7 are good until Aug. 22.

BE CAREFUL WHAT YOU WRITE JOHNNY DOUGHBOY

Washington—Be careful what you write to the fighting men of Uncle Sam's armed forces. This is the advice of hundreds of American Red Cross workers who come into contact daily with the troubles and personal problems of American service men both at home and abroad. Too many times, they warn, the folks at home pour forth petty family problems in letters to their boys who are away in camp or fighting at the front. The result in many cases is the demoralization of a brave soldier. The loving mother, sweetheart, uncle or aunt unwittingly may be aiding the enemy. So the next time you write Johnny Doughboy be cheerful, and if you cannot be cheerful, be factual, the Red Cross warns. A demoralizing letter, whether intentional or not, can be as damaging to Uncle Sam's armed forces as an enemy bullet. Farm Security Loans Now Available

Authority to immediately resume receiving applications from low-income and needy farm families in Hansford county for loans with which to carry on their farm and home operations was received here by Arthur R. Turner, rural rehabilitation supervisor for the Farm Security Administration. The information that loan funds for the FSA's supervised lending program for the current fiscal year are immediately available was received from Jesse B. Gilmer, regional director, with headquarters at Amarillo, Texas. The Farm Security lending program, it was learned, will continue its policy of making small Food for Freedom loans to farm owners, tenants and part-time farmers. These loans are designed to assist families to produce food for home consumption. Production of food for sale will continue to be of secondary importance. Food for Freedom loans are limited to \$500 for each family. Borrowers may use the funds for the purchase of dairy animals, feed, seed small farming and gardening implements, canning supplies, repairs for livestock and poultry housing facilities, food storage space, medical and dental care and so forth. DOVE SEASON OPENS SEPT. FIRST

Open season for Mourning Doves in this and adjoining counties starts Sept. 1 to Oct. 12, inclusive. Bag limit 10 a day. Not more than one day's kill in possession. May be hunted from 7 a. m. to sunset. Doves may be taken only with a shotgun. No repeating or auto-loading guns that is capable of holding more than 3 shells. Ducks, Geese and Coo Nov. 2 to Jan. 10 both days inclusive. Sunrise to sunset. 10 a day for ducks. Possession 20 not more than six singly or in the aggregate of redheads and buffheads nor more than 1 wood duck. Geese, 2 a day. Possession is limited to two days' legal kill. Ducks, geese and coot may be possessed for only 30 days after the close of the season. No person over 16 may hunt with out a Federal stamp.

OFFICERS WILL CHECK FEDERAL STAMP VIOLATORS

Reports reaching the office of collector or internal revenue indicate that most persons subject to the \$5.00 automobile tax which was due July 1, 1942, have already purchased the required stamp but that in some sections many automobile owners have failed to purchase this stamp. Aug. 1, a concerted drive was started by deputy collectors in every section to arrest tax evaders. Such evaders will be subject to a \$25.00 fine and 30 days in jail in addition to payment of the tax. Car stamps ARE NOT on sale at any post-office now. If you have not been using your car, and start using it now, the stamp will be issued by the internal revenue tax office.

FARMERS MAY EARN 74 CENTS PER ACRE FOLLING AAA PLAN

Checking the land to determine the extent of soil building practices carried out under this year's AAA program will begin within a few days, according to County Agent, Joe Hatton. The 1942 Agricultural Conservation payment, which will average about 74 cents per acre for the county is dependent on soil building practices. In other words if Hansford farmers practice all soil building practices they will earn about \$136,000.00. Hansford county is operating under the Special Conservation Program, and it is necessary that some soil building work be done on each acre of the land if full payment is to be received. This means that all summer fallowed land must be dammed or contour furrowed. Wheat stubble and row crop stubble qualify as cover crops for payment.

EDITORIAL

ALLRED FOR SENATOR

The Reporter will support James V. Allred for United States senator in the runoff. (Following is an editorial by Dave Warren, publisher of the Panhandle (Texas) Herald):

The Herald will support Allred for U. S. senator. The editor of this publication barely knows Allred. As attorney general and governor, The Herald never asked or received any favor from Jimmy Allred.

The same has been true of W. Lee O'Daniel. This paper never asked him for any favor as governor or as senator. Thus, this publication is under no personal obligation to either candidate.

During the past four years O'Daniel has unmercifully poured it on the press. He has assaulted the good name of the press and accused it of crookedness. Naturally, this publication cannot support a man who denounces the business in which we earn our living. When you accuse the press generally of underhand methods, it is like saying "all men are liars".

But there are several reasons why we must go down the line for Allred. One reason is that we favor a United States senator who is willing to work with President Roosevelt and the senate in Washington, as well as with the many governmental bureaus.

It is no credit for Panhandle people to be told never to visit the office of Senator O'Daniel if you want prompt action on some public project. If a senator can't work with President Roosevelt and his fellow senators, he just isn't worth his \$10,000 a year salary.

Senator Connally, our senior senator, is now an old man. He needs help from a senator, who can get some work done and who is worthy some day of being known as the "senior senator from Texas." O'Daniel is a lone wolf; he accused President Roosevelt of running away from him when the Chief Executive was on the high seas in August, 1941, in a meeting with Prime Minister Winston Churchill.

Our junior senator has declared the war is not an issue in this campaign; that Roosevelt needs no help; that the chief executive seems plenty capable of running it without the senators from Texas. He has said these things in the face of the fact that a United States senator will have a vote on the peace treaty.

Carson county people should analyze the records of the two senators closely. Personal preferences and dislikes should be cast aside as much as possible. One's vote should be cast on the basis of which candidate can do the best for Texas and the nation. If this attitude is taken, there can be little doubt that Jimmy Allred is the man who should be nominated for United States senator Aug. 22.

The man who is nominated Aug. 22 will serve for a six year term. Texans must go to the polls and vote for a man who is willing to back our President in winning the war; it's time to forget hillbilly music. Allred's opponent has been greatly honored by Texans; far greater than his accomplishments either as governor or as senator warrant.

Allred resigned a life-time job as federal judge to make this race. President Roosevelt has already nominated Allred's successor. So there is nothing to the charge that Allred had planned to return to a federal judgeship. He has been sincere in this race; he is making it to give Texas a worthy United States senator—and we believe that the people are going to show their appreciation by nominating him Aug. 22 in the runoff.

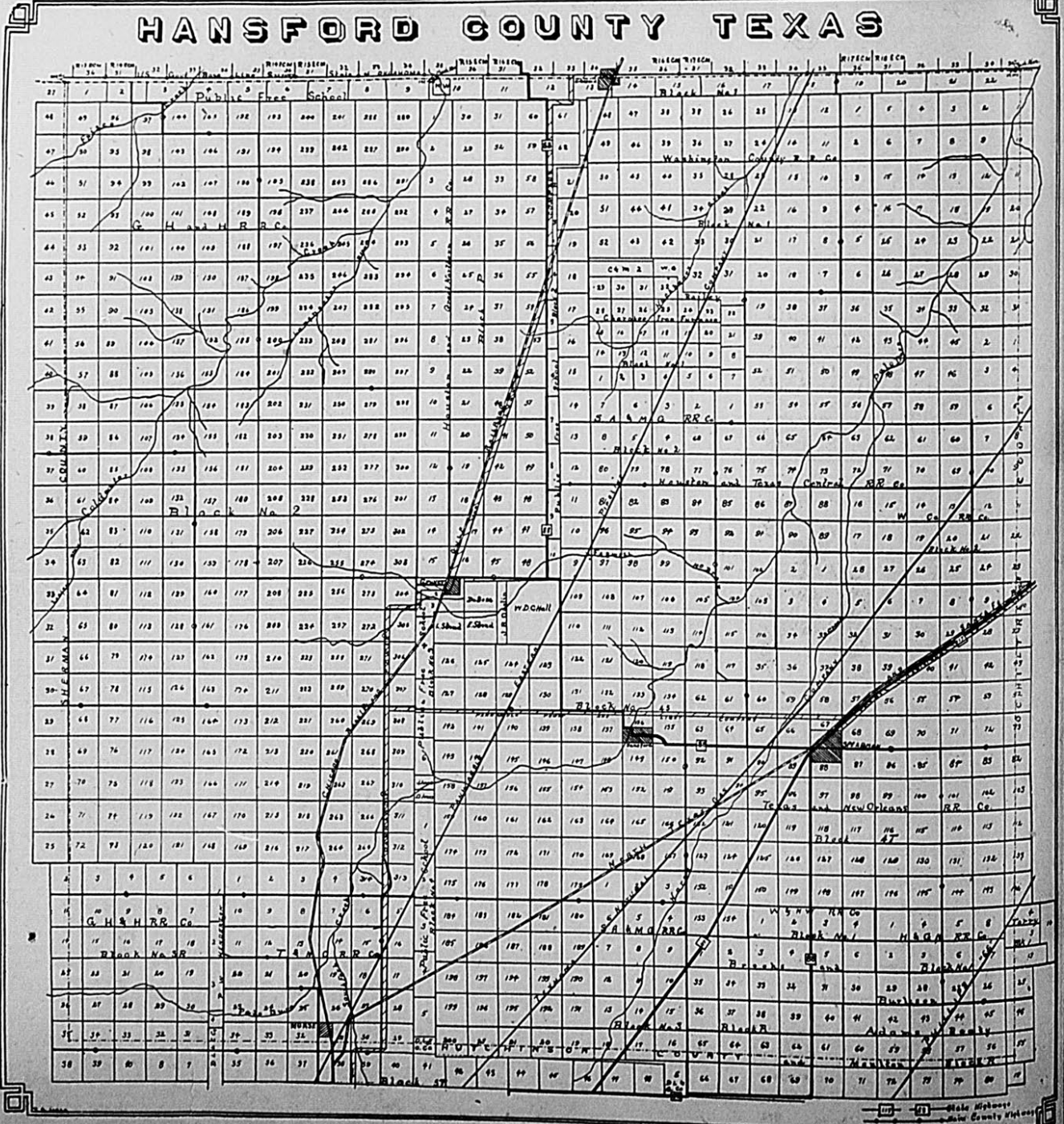

A Joint Resolution

Proposing an amendment to Article 3 of the Constitution of the State of Texas by adding a new section to be known as Section 49-a, requiring all bills passed by the Legislature on and after January 1, 1945, appropriating money for any purpose, to be sent to the Comptroller of Public Accounts for his approval, and fixing the duties of the Comptroller with reference thereto; authorizing the Legislature to provide for the issuance, sale, and retirement of serial bonds, equal in principal to the total outstanding, valid, and approved obligations owing by the General Revenue Fund on September 1, 1943; providing for the submission of this amendment to the voters of this State; prescribing the form of ballot; providing for the proclamation and publication thereof; and providing for the necessary appropriation to defray necessary expenses for the submission of this amendment.

Be It Resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas:

Section 1. That Article 3 of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto, immediately after Section 49, a section to be known as Section 49a, to read as follows:

Section 49a. It shall be the duty of the Comptroller of Public Accounts in advance of each Regular Session of the Legislature to prepare and submit to the Governor and to the Legislature upon its convening a statement under oath showing fully the financial condition of the State Treasury,

at the close of the last fiscal period and an estimate of the probable receipts and disbursements for the then current fiscal year. There shall also be contained in said statement an itemized estimate of the anticipated revenue based on the laws then in effect that will be received by and for the State from all sources showing the fund accounts to be credited during the succeeding biennium and said statement shall contain such other information as may be required by law. Supplemental statements shall be submitted at any Special Session of the Legislature and at such other times as may be necessary to show probable changes.

From and after January 1, 1945, save in the case of emergency and imperative public necessity and with a four-fifths vote of the total membership of each House, no appropriation in excess of the cash and anticipated revenue of the funds from which such appropriation is to be made shall be valid. From and after January 1, 1945, no bill containing an appropriation shall be considered as passed or be sent to the Governor for consideration until and unless the Comptroller of Public Accounts endorses his certificate thereon showing that the amount appropriated is within the amount estimated to be available in the affected funds. When the Comptroller finds an appropriation bill exceeds the estimated revenue he shall endorse such finding thereon and return to the House in which same originated. Such information shall be immediately made known to both the House of Representatives and the Senate and the necessary steps shall be taken to bring such appropriation to within the revenue, either by providing additional revenue or reducing the appropriation.

"For the purpose of financing the outstanding obligations of the General Revenue Fund of the State and placing its current accounts on a cash basis the Legislature of the State of Texas is hereby authorized to provide for the issuance, sale, and retirement of serial bonds, equal in principal to the total outstanding, valid, and approved obligations owing by said fund on September 1, 1943, provided such bonds shall not draw interest in excess of two (2) percent per annum and shall mature within twenty (20) years from date."

Section 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of the State of Texas, at the next general election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1942, being November 3, 1942, at which election all voters favoring said proposed amendment shall write or have printed on their ballots, the words:

"For the Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas, requiring appropriation bills passed by the Legislature to be presented to and certified by the Comptroller of Public Accounts as to available funds for payment thereof, limiting appropriations to the total of such available funds, providing for issuance of bonds to pay off State obligations outstanding September 1, 1943, and fixing the duties of the Legislature & Comptroller of Public Accounts with

reference thereto."

Those opposing said proposed Amendment shall write or have printed on their ballots, the words:

"Against the Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas, requiring appropriation bills passed by the Legislature to be presented to and certified by the Comptroller of Public Accounts as to available funds, providing for issuance of bonds to pay off State obligations outstanding September 1, 1943, and fixing the duties of the Legislature and Comptroller of Public Accounts with reference thereto."

Section 3. The Governor of the State of Texas is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have same published as required by the Constitution for amendments thereto.

Section 4. The sum of Five Thousand Dollars (\$5,000) or so much thereof as may be necessary, is hereby appropriated out of any funds in the Treasury of the State of Texas, not otherwise appropriated, to pay the expenses of this publication and election. First pub. 7-30-42.

S. J. R. No. 21—

A Joint Resolution

Proposing an amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas authorizing the Legislature to appropriate Seventy-Five Thousand (\$75,000) Dollars or so much thereof as may be necessary to pay claims incurred by John Tarleton Agricultural College for the construction of a building on the campus of such college pursuant to deficiency authorization by the Governor of Texas on August 31, 1937.

Be It Resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas: Section 1. That the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding a new section as follows:

"The Legislature is authorized to appropriate so much money as may be necessary not to exceed Seventy-five Thousand (\$75,000) Dollars, to pay claims incurred by John Tarleton Agricultural College for the construction of a building on the campus of such college pursuant to deficiency authorization by the Governor of Texas on August 31st, 1937.

Section 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at the next general election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, A. D. 1942, at which all ballots shall have printed thereon: "For the constitutional amendment authorizing the Legislature to pay for building constructed for John Tarleton Agricultural College;" and

"Against the constitutional amendment authorizing the Legislature to pay for building constructed for John Tarleton Agricultural College."

Each voter shall scratch out one of said clauses on the ballot, leaving the one expressing his vote on the proposed amendment.

Section 3. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and existing laws of this State. The expenses of publication and election for such amendment shall be paid out of proper appropriation made by law. First pub. 7-30-42.

H. J. R. NO. 23—

A Joint Resolution

Proposing an Amendment to Article 3 of the Constitution of the State of Texas authorizing the lending of Two Million Dollars (\$2,000,000) of the Permanent School Fund for the construction of a State office building; providing for repayment to the Permanent School Fund; providing for the submission of this Amendment to the voters of this State; and providing for the necessary proclamation and expense of publication.

Be It Resolved By The Legislature of the State of Texas: Section 1. That Article 3 of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto a new section" to be known as Section 49-b, which shall read as follows:

"Section 49-b. The Legislature may provide by law for the issuance of not more than Two Million Dollars (\$2,000,000) in bonds or obligations of the State of Texas to the Permanent School Fund for the construction in the City of Austin of a State office building or buildings and the State Board of Education is hereby directed to invest not more than Two Million Dollars (\$2,000,000) of the Permanent School Fund therein. Such bonds shall be executed on behalf of the State of Texas by the Governor and Comptroller, and shall bear a rate of interest

not to exceed three (3) percent per annum, payable annually; they shall be of such denomination as may be prescribed by law and shall be payable in not to exceed twenty-five (25) equal installments beginning one (1) year from date of issuance; and the State Treasurer is hereby authorized and directed to set aside into a special fund annually at the beginning of each fiscal year until all of said bonds shall have been paid off and discharged, a sufficient amount of the first moneys coming into the Treasury for the use and benefit of the General Revenue Fund not otherwise heretofore obligated to the payment of bonds and interests, a sufficient amount to pay the interest becoming due and the bonds maturing during such fiscal year; From said Fund the Treasurer shall pay the interest on said bonds as it comes due, to the credit of the Available School Fund; and shall pay off said bonds as they become due and deposit the amounts so paid to the credit of the Permanent School Fund. The power hereby granted to issue bonds is expressly limited to the amount stated and to five (5) years from and after the adoption of this grant by the people."

Section 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to the qualified voters of the State of Texas at an election to be held on the third day of November, 1942, at which election all voters favoring such proposed Amendment shall write or have printed on their ballots the words:

"For the Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas authorizing the investment of not more than Two Million Dollars (\$2,000,000) of the Permanent School Fund in bonds of the State of Texas to be issued for the construction of a State office building or buildings and providing for the repayment of the said sum of money to the Permanent School Fund."

Those voters opposing said Amendment shall write or have printed on their ballots the words:

"Against the Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas authorizing the investment of not more than Two Million Dollars (\$2,000,000) of the Permanent School Fund in bonds of the State of Texas to be issued for the construction of a State office building or buildings and providing for the repayment of the said sum of money to the Permanent School Fund."

Section 3. The Governor of the State is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and existing laws of the State.

Section 4. The sum of Eight Thousand Dollars (\$8,000), or so much thereof as may be necessary, is hereby appropriated out of any funds in the Treasury of the State not otherwise appropriated to pay the expenses of said publication and election. First pub. 7-30-42.

S. J. R. No. 20

A Joint Resolution

Proposing an amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas by amending Section 33 of Article 16, of the Constitution of Texas so as to permit the accounting officers of this State to draw and pay warrants for salaries to officers of the United States Army or Navy who are assigned to duties in State Institutions of higher education.

Be It resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas: Section 1. That Section 33 of Article 16, of the Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended so as to read as follows:

"Section 33. The accounting officers of this State shall neither draw nor pay a warrant upon the Treasury in favor of any person, for salary or compensation as agent, officer or appointee, who holds at the same time any other office or position of honor, trust or profit, under this State or the United States, except as prescribed in this Constitution. Provided that this restriction as to the drawing and paying of warrants upon the Treasury shall not apply to officers of the National Guard of Texas, the National Guard Reserve, the Officers Reserve Corps of the United States, nor to enlisted men of the National Guard, the National Guard Reserve, and the Organized Reserves of the United States, nor to retired officers of the United States Army, Navy, and Marine Corps, and retired warrant officers and retired enlisted men of the United States Army, Navy, and Marine Corps, nor to officers of the United States Army or Navy who are assigned to duties in State Institutions of higher education."

Section 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held throughout the

First Published July 30, 1942.

A Joint Resolution

Proposing an Amendment to Article V of the Constitution of Texas by providing that the Legislature shall have the power by local or general law, in counties having a population in excess of two hundred thousand (200,000) inhabitants to create other courts having exclusive jurisdiction or concurrent jurisdiction with the county court in civil, criminal or probate matters; fixing the time for an election therefor; prescribing the form of ballot; providing for a proclamation of such election and the advertisement thereof; and making an appropriation therefor.

Be it resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas: Section 1. Article V of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto a new section to be known as Section 22-a and reading as follows:

"Section 22-a. The Legislature shall have the power, by local or general law (without the necessity of advertising any such local law), in counties having a population in excess of two hundred thousand (200,000) inhabitants according to the then last federal census, to create other courts having either exclusive jurisdiction or concurrent jurisdiction with the county court in civil, criminal or probate matters."

The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to the qualified voters of the State of Texas at a special election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1942, at which time all voters favoring such proposed Amendment shall have written or printed on their ballots the following:

MAKING MILK

The blood circulation of a dairy cow is a primary factor in the milk she gives. Recent experimental work, says G. G. Gibson, assistant dairyman of the Texas A and M College Extension Service, shows that 400 gallons of blood passes through the udder for every gallon of milk a cow produces. Multiply this by the day's yield and the immense amount of work a cow's heart does to fill her share of the nation's milk bottles is apparent.

Always milk at the same time night and morning and do nothing to stimulate milk let-down any considerable time in advance of milking. Otherwise the hormone which has been secreted in the blood streams will be dissipated and the edge gone from the cow's ability to force down her milk.
