HUNTERS ASKED TO HUNT

Hansford County \$13,000 Short

The following letter is self explanatory:

J. R. Collard, Chairman
Hansford County War Bond Committee:

Tabulations of sales of series F and G War Savings Bonds received from the issuing agents of your county disclose that for the quarter monthly ending Aug. 8th your county sold \$37500 worth, and the period ending August 8th \$443.00 making the total for the first fifteen days August \$1,218.75.

The quota for your county for month of August was \$15,000 and the above sales for first 15 days of this month indicate a very discouraging figure as compared to the amount needed to meet the August quota which has been substantially exceeded from the amount assigned for the month of July.

Unless there is a sharp revival War Bond purchases through remainder of this month we are going to fall short of our quota and this must not happen. Be sure that you, as county chairman, do not want your county to go on record before the Treasury Department as having failed to do its part on hundred percent in this war program. This is ours as well as the armed forces of our country, and if we forsake our post of duty, our cause is lost.

In making this urgent appeal to you to secure renewed support from your committees and agents the war bond sales of your county up to, and above, the quota assigned for this month, insist upon the issuing agents reporting all sales promptly to the office.

No. 24 Says

T. R. Shirley received a very interesting letter from Joe D. Womble. Joe said among other things that he was now stationed at Camp Edwards, Mass. located on Cape Cod. "We are about six miles from the northern end of the Cape and we are surrounded by the Atlantic Ocean." Joe says he has seen some pretty country and says the farms and farms houses are just like the ones you see in pictures. He says that he is about 60 miles from Boston and 250 miles from New York City. He ended by saying that soldiers realize that the older men are doing everything they can at home and that it is everybody's war, young and old. He added "all we are asking is to be sent over seas as soon as possible."

I met with the Ration Board Saturday, not to get anything, just to see what goes on. I'm glad I'm not connected in any way with rationing. They had about 40 applications nearly all of them good eligible and only 5 or 6 tire certificates available. They do not receive one penny salary. O. V. Walker, the west county member, has to wear out his own tires to attend these meetings. The rules they must follow are very plain. When there is doubt they have their very efficient secretary, Mrs J. E. Gunn write state headquarters. They do not think that all of their rules apply to this country, but there is nothing for them to do but follow the rules.

I think the most unjust rule is the one barring town-farmers from tires. A big percent of all land farmed in this county is farmed by town-farmers. A big majority of all cattle fed in the county are owned by town-cattlemen. They should be eligible for passenger car tires.

Better pay your City Taxes now. Sept. 1st is absolutely the deadline for payment without penalty and interest. I understand that several people still owe delinquent water accounts. The City has been very lenient with these people, but the day reckoning is coming. Pay now before it's too late.



How to Repair Cord Frayed Next to Plug



Unscrew wire from the plug. Snip off the frayed part of the wire. Re-insert wire in plug.

How to Repair Cord Frayed in the Middle



Clean away the frayed insulation. Tape up wires separately. Then together. Don't use adhesive tape. It cracks very quickly.

Right and Wrong Way to Insert Wire in Plug



Wrong way: Wire not drawn around prongs. Right way: Wire drawn around prongs. When cord is yanked or kicked, the pressure is put on the prongs.

Caution: Disconnect cord before attempting repairs to any part of it.
