Draft Board To Call Married Men In Dec.

Mileage Rationing Program

The effective date of rationing including commercial vehicles will be 12:01 a. m. Dec. 1, 1942. Coupons will be required and Order 5C coupons effective on this date.

Dealer registration will take place Dec. 1 and 2 instead of Nov. 23 and 24.

Dates on Idle Tire Purchase Plan and Tire Inspection Program remain as before. The effective date of new Tire Rationing Regulations will be Dec. 1. The advancement of the effective date of the Mileage Rationing Regulations serves to give a bonus to basic A coupon book holders since the coupons covering the period from Nov. 20 thru Nov. 30 are not to be torn from their books.

In granting "T" rations boards will reduce by 20 percent the gallonage allowed by the ODT for 40 days from Nov. 22 thru Dec. 31. We are preparing a reduction table for your use in connection with the tailoring of "T" books.

"T" rations to be effective Dec. 1, may be granted by boards to holders of certificates of war necessity. The delay in rationing until Dec. 1 should allow practically every commercial vehicle to be covered by a certificate.

Those who have applied for, but not received, certificates of War necessity by Nov. 30, and have not been denied such certificates by the ODT shall be granted temporary transportation rations under Sec. 1394.7808. This section reference will be available to you in the Mileage Rationing Regulations or in the form of an amendment thereto, which will be in your hands with in the next few days. This provision will avoid any use of emergency receipts by commercial vehicle operators who have not secured their certificates of war necessity.

Ration News

Military and Naval personnel on furlough for at least 7 days may receive a Sugar Purchase Certificate for 1-2 pound of sugar for each week of furlough. He must apply to the local board and present his leave papers in order to receive the sugar.

Coffee hoarding is out.—Everyone will have to declare coffee on hand. First ration period from Nov. 29 to Jan. 3, 1943. To all non-holders of sugar ration books, apply to your local rationing board immediately.

All coffee sales will be frozen during the week of NOV. 22-28 to allow retailers to stock shelves to have sufficient coffee on hand when rationing begins.

Cafes, etc.—Restaurants, hotels and other institutions in community must register for coffee between Nov. 23-25 at your local rationing board. First allotment period, Nov. 22-Jan. 31. Allotment to institutions will be your "coffee base" (amount of real coffee used during Sept. and Oct. 1942) minus real coffee on hand mid-night, Nov. 21.

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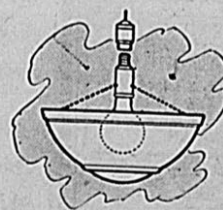
