A farmer may dispose of the meat he kills in any manner he wishes, but he cannot sell it unless he did soo in 1941. If he did sell in 1941, and has records of the sales, he is permitted to sell 100 per cent of that poundage in 1943.

## Craig To Lose Two Counties By Sadler Bill

Perhaps the hardest working new member of the house of representatives is the well known showman, Harley Sadler. This bill would give West Texas seven and Southwest Texas six new representatives for a tosix new representatives for a total of thirteen new members from these areas. The original bill would have given Potter County one representative exclusively and would also have placed the county in a floterial district with the result that ordinarily Potter County would have had two representatives. Harley is amending his bill which will change this situation as to Potter County, and will place Carson and Armstrong counties in Representative Favor's district along with the counties of Gray and Wheeler.

Denley and Collingsworth counties will be cut off from Favor's present district and placed with Hall, Childress, and Motley counties for a new district. Representative Richard Craig of 12th district will lose Dallam and Hartley counties which will be placed in counties which will be placed in a new district with Deaf Smtih, Parmer, Castro, Randall, and Oldham.

The constitution commands the legislature to re-district but the trouble is East Texas vs. West Texas. However, at the last session of the legislature the house bill passed the house and there is a strong possibility that this is the year for the house re-districting bill to become effective.





## Senate Attitude Most Uncertain In Post-War Aims

national police force—already the subject of congressional contro-versy—was formally introduced today by Senator Ball (R-Minn)

as the only practical means of "controlling the plague of war." Speaking for himself and three other sponsors, Ball told the sen-ate that attempts to maintain

ate that attempts to maintain peace through balance of power diplomacy, imperialism, pacts and treaties "all have failed."

Earlier, Senator Taft (R-Ohio) told reporters the step would "precipitate bitterness we might better avoid at this time by confining ourselves to expressions of broad principles," while Senator Wheeler (D-Mont), announced he would oppose it "with all the fight I have in me."

Ball argued that a collective secuity system, backed by force, would be the least costly method "in both lives and wealth" for individual mations "to assure security as a security a

dividual nations "to assure secur-

The resolution sets forth what Ball termed the "minimum essen-tials" for co-operation now and in

tials" for co-operation now and in the post-war era among the Uni-ted Nations.

Uncertainty as to the post-war policies of Russia, China and Great Britain, he declared, "stems directly from the fact that no one knows yet what the attitude of the United States senae, whose consent is essen-tial under the constitution, will be,"

Ball and his associates were encouraged by a statement from Senator Connally (D-Tex) that he favors establishment of an agency, backed by military force, to settle international disputes and "pre-vent aggression and conquest." Cennally, chairman of the for-eign relations committee, made it

clear that he wasn't committed to dividual nations "to assure security and peace for themselves."

Other sponsors of the resolution are Senators Hatch (D-NM), Hill (D-Ala), and Burton (R-Ohio), but Ball told the senate they were "merely the spokesmen for a considerably larger group of senators to be international body."
