International Sunday School Lesson

By Dr. J. E. Nunn

General Topic:—Abraham A Man of Faith.
Scripture Lesson:—Gen. 12:1-9: 13:14-18.

1. Gen. 12:1. Now Jehovah said unto Abram, Get thee out of the country, and from thy kindred and from thy father's house unto the land that I will show thee:

2. And I will make of thee a great nation and I will bless thee and make thy name great and be thou a blessing.

3. And I will bless them that bless thee and him that curseth thee I will curse and in thee shall all the families of the earth be blessed.

4. So Abram went, as Jehovah had spoken unto him; and Lot went with him and Abram was 75 years old when he departed out of Haran.

5. And Abram took Sari his wife and Lot his brother's son and all their substance that they had gathered and the souls that they had gotten in Haran; and they went forth to go into the land of Canaan; and into the land of Canaan they came.

6. And Abram passed through the land unto the place of Shechem unto the oak of Moreh. And the Canaanite was then in the land.

7. And Jehovah appeared unto Abram and said unto thy seed will I give this land and there builded he an altar unto Jehovah who appeared unto him.

8. And he removed from thence unto the mountain on the east of Bethel and pitched his tent having Bethel on the west, and Ai on the east; and there he builded an altar unto Jehovah and called upon the name of Jehovah.

9. And Abram journeyed, going on still toward the South. Gen. 13:14 And Jehovah said unto Abram after that Lot was parted from him Lift up now ne eyes and look from the place wher thou art, northward and thward and eastward and westward:

10. For all the land which thou seest to thee will I give it and to seed for ever.

11. And I will make thy seed as the dust of the earth so that if a man can number the dust of the earth then may thy seed also be numbered.

12. Arise walk through the land in the length of it and in the breadth of it for unto thee will I give it.

13. And Abram moved his tent and came and dwelt by the oaks of Mamre which are in Hebron and builded there an altar unto Jehovah.

Golden Text: By faith Abraham when he was called obeyed to go out unto a place which he was to receive for an inheritance. Hebrews 11:8.

Introduction
"Faith is one of the most important subjects that can engage our thought. All through the Bible it occupies a central place. Drop out and nothing remains that is essential to religion as Christ

taught it. Abraham believed God. That is he committed himself, without reserve, to God as he knew him. But since the coming of Christ and the revelation of God in Christ we Christians have a nobler object of faith than Abraham could have. "That in this early day there arose a man spiritually sensitive enough to trust him with undaunted courage, marks off Abraham as one of the mighty heroes of the human race a challenge and an inspiration to us all."

Abraham, A Man Of Faith
With Abraham the history of the Hebrew race begins. The great monotheistic religions of the world, Judaism, Christianity and Mohammedanism claim Abraham for their father. The apostle Paul speaks of him as "the father of us all" (Rom. 4:16). "Of no other human person are believers said to be children except Abraham; all Christians are his seed" (Gal. 3:29). Through Abraham's life of faith and his response to God's call, light breaks through the darkness of the patriarchal world, and in him the mighty river of God's redeeming grace bursts forth to flow down through the ages till Jesus Christ the son of Abraham is born in whom all promises to the friend of God have been and will be fulfilled.

"I Will Make Of Thee A Great Nation." Gen. 11:2.
The Jews have been a great nation numerically and are greater today than probably ever before. They have been great in commercial life they have been greater in arts and sciences but they have been supremely great in their spiritual influence in giving us the Holy Scriptures and the Son of God. And I will bless thee, and make thy name great and be thou a blessing. Abraham was blessed in being the father of the Hebrew people in the privilege of walking with God in receiving mighty promises from God, in being the father of the faithful throughout all the ages he has been honored by Jew and Gentile by Christians and Mohammedans. His place in Christian truth may be judged by the fact that he is mentioned more than seventy times in the New Testament.


The Faith Of Abraham
It cost Abraham much to re-

spond to God's call. The heroic faith of Abraham is shown by two trials in what he was called from and in what he was called to. Here is what he was called from Get thee out of thy country and from thy kindred and from thy father's house. Breaking home ties is one of life's hardest experiences. Every missionary must do just this when he responds to God's call to leave home and country to give his life to an alien people. We know how desperate was the

homesickness of our soldiers overseas during the World War. Abraham's faith had hard trial also in accepting what he was called to. He must have suffered great disappointment when he arrived in Canaan. There was no welcome rather the opposite. He erected his first altar to God amid a hostile people who were to resist him on every hand. Added to all this there soon came a famine which compelled him to flee to Egypt for a time. God does not promise a life of ease as a reward of faith. Apparently God multiplied hardships upon his servant; and it is against this that his faith shines out as the rainbow against the stormcloud.

Abraham and Lot
To grow rich is not to be delivered from trouble, rather, it is generally the beginning of new problems and difficulties. When Abraham's flocks and herds multiplied the area which he and his nephew Lot occupied in southern Canaan became too crowded for comfort, and adequate pasture became increasingly difficult to find. The result was a strife between the herdsmen of Abraham's cattle and the herdsmen of Lot's cattle. Abraham showed himself the more generous of the two for he told Lot to take any part of the land which his eyes should behold and he himself would depart in the opposite direction. Lot accepted and looking down into

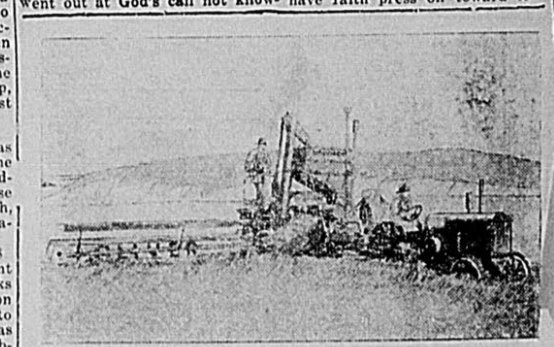

made a dugout in the side of a bank and built a corral of cottonwood logs for their horses. This camp was the hub of the Cator buffalo hunting for the next 3 years, during which time Jim Cator alone killed more than 10,000 buffaloes. In the spring of 1874 when the Adobe Walls trading post was established the two brothers became frequent visitors to the walls.

Jim Cator had left a sweetheart in England—Miss Edith Land, the daughter of a well-to-do Hull physician whom he promised to return for. Time passed and on account of severe winters which killed the cattle and other financial troubles it was finally decided in 1887 to have Miss Land come to America and meet him in Dodge City. Accompanied by her brother, Arthur Land, she made the trip by train from New York.

What a contrast this young woman fresh from a sheltered home in England must have found in Dodge City, self-styled "cowboy capital of the world" and advertised as the "Wickedest City in America."

Their first trip together as man and wife was to Granada on the Kansas and Colorado line where Mr. Cator had business. Then to the new home on the Palo Duro which had been so carefully prepared for her. It was a long 3 days ride in a spring wagon crossing both the Arkansas and Cimarron Rivers either in deep sand or fording—there were no bridges. No Man's Land lay between here they would be compelled to camp for at least one night. But there was no fear in this young bride's heart—home was ahead and with Jim near all would be well.

To her perfect surprise she found a large stone house constructed throughout with the best that could be obtained. Pictures of loved ones left in England were soon hung on the walls, furniture was re-arranged and soon a woman's touch made itself felt. Was she homesome? Not at all. An accomplished horsewoman she spent hours each day in the saddle riding the range which by now was well stocked with cattle. A postoffice Zulu had been established and fresh magazines and newspapers came each mail day.

In 1889 Hansford county was organized and Jim Cator was elected as county judge. Only 30 votes were cast in the county. Hansford was the county seat. More settlers came in and located along the Palo Duro. This meant celebrations on the Fourth of July and Christmas.

It was a dance in Old Hansford in 1894 that the writer first met the Cator family. It was Christmas Eve and musicians from Independence, Kansas had been brought down for the occasion. Everyone came in wagons or buckboards. The children were brought along and when tired and sleepy to bed in one of the small rooms of the court house where a dance was held.

At midnight lunch was served. Barbecued beef, lightbread, pickles, cakes and pie with coffee made in big black kettles was served from one long table. The square dance, the waltz and the scottish were the favorite dances.

In the Cator home were found all of the modern comforts not usually found in ranch homes. In the winter a plentiful supply of ice was cut from the creek near by and stored for the summer. Thus the favorite drink (ice tea) of the English people was always on hand during the hot days. The smokehouse held meat for the family the year around. Mrs. Cator was a wonderful cook.

How well I remember her home baked lightbread and she tells me she still bakes her own bread.

The creek was alive with catfish, perch and bass. Turkeys, geese and other domestic fowl were raised and grew with very little care. Today since coming to a new country and into an altogether different environment, Mrs. Cator is surrounded by her three children—Mrs. Edith Smith, Mrs. Gib and James H. Cator Jr. in the same house she entered a bride fifty years ago. Adding her goodby as she prepared for the return trip with her

son and daughter-in-law and Mr. and Mrs. L. R. Gaeersteller, neighbors who had driven into Amarillo with them, we asked the question: Do you look back on your experience on the frontier as hardships to be shunned and forgotten? Promptly the answer came, "Gladly would I live it all over again. Those were my happiest days."

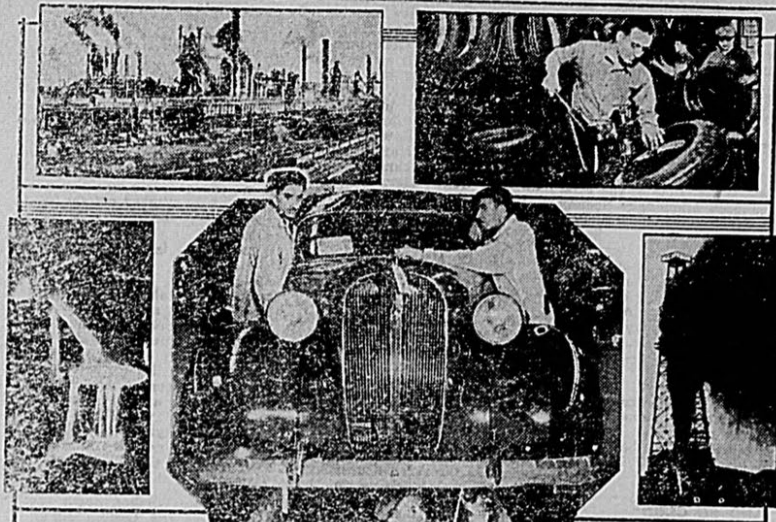
