



## \$302,244 Of War Bonds Purchased

### Assessments For Hansford Are Approved

County Roll Reaches \$4,880,260; Taxes Will Be \$39,041.97

Hansford county tax roll of \$4,880,260 and a state roll of \$4,537,480 were approved by the commissioners court Monday.

The county tax roll for a rate of 80 cents will bring in a total of \$39,041.97. The state rate of 47 cents will bring in taxes of \$21,326.53.

The Spearman Independent District road tax will be \$2,400.26; district school tax \$13,372.45; state poll, \$868.50.

The total tax roll calls for \$76,411.21.

Tax Collector H. L. Wilbanks' roll shows there are 533,610.54 acres of land in the county with a valuation of \$2,628,340.

City property valuations are \$371,593 and personal property valuations, \$933,889.

In the county are 59 miles of railway valued as follows: Road bed, \$354,000; rolling stock, \$14,270; intangibles, \$72,450.

Telephone and telegraph assessments were \$7,350 and pipelines \$495,860.

### Commissioners Say Court House Roof Must Be Repaired

Hansford county commissioners Monday inspected the paint job at the court house. Workers have just completed the sheriff's office and are working in the treasurer's office and other parts of the court house this week.

The commissioners crawled on the roof and decided that some patching was necessary. When heavy rains fall, moisture reaches the ceiling in the district court room. It was decided that it would be best to repair the roof before the painters begin work in that part of the building.

One pig out of each litter will go to seven more boys.

### Ray C. Wheatley, Pioneer Banker, Passes Suddenly

Ray C. Wheatley, 67, died at his home early Monday morning in Amarillo. He had been ill with a heart affliction. He was a pioneer banker, having been president of the Amarillo Bank & Trust Co. before it was sold to the First National Bank. He was known to many Hansford county residents.

Funeral services were held Tuesday afternoon and burial was in Llano Cemetery. He had lived in Amarillo 54 years. His brother, John Wheatley, died a few weeks ago of an automobile accident injuries.

He had made frequent visits over the Panhandle as a director of various Santa Fe lines.

Mr. Wheatley is survived by his wife, Mrs. Margaret Wheatley; a daughter, Mrs. F. M. Bralley, Amarillo; two grandchildren, William Andrew Bralley, 12 years old, and Mary Margaret Bralley, nine years old; a sister, Mrs. Lum Humphreys, Amarillo, and a brother, Rex Wheatley, Artesia N. M. Other relatives include Charles A. Fisk, a brother-in-law; Terry Thompson, a cousin; Ray DeBoice, Amarillo, and Rainey DeBoice, Memphis, nephews; Mrs. Ned Campbell, Paint Rock, Texas, a cousin.

Interment was in Llano Cemetery.

### Three Killed In Car Wreck Near Stinnett

Three men, two of them from Chickasha, Okla., and one from Lipscomb, were killed and five persons were injured, none seriously, when the car in which they were riding overturned seven miles north of Stinnett about 5 o'clock Sunday afternoon.

The accident was about a quarter of a mile northeast of the overpass over the Rock Island Railway. Several Spearman persons saw the damaged car and some of the passengers removed to ambulances.

Killed in the accident were Andrew Stockton and James H. Van, both of Chickasha, and Frank McKenzie of Lipscomb. The injured were Mr. and Mrs. Cline Oates, Mrs. Louis Standish, Frank McKenzie and Calvin C. Johnson.

They were taken to a Berger hospital in dazed conditions and it was not until yesterday that they were able to reveal what happened. Officers said the injured told them the car, driven by Stockton, had just met a car and trailer and that after passing the vehicle Stockton lost control of the car which overturned several times. The car was demolished. The injured suffered, cuts, bruises and shock but are not believed seriously injured.

The dead and injured were enroute to Berger from Perryton. They were employed by the Flour Construction Company, constructing a pipeline west of Perryton.

The injured, with the exception of Johnson who said his home was at Jumbo, Okla., gave their addresses as Perryton.

### County Needing About \$200,000 More Of Sales

Hansford Can Go Over Top By Sept. 30, Says Chairman

The Third War Loan campaign for \$501,500 took a decided turn for the better last week with bond sales of \$240,000.

Sales at the close of business Saturday were \$302,244.75 with \$199,255.25 to be sold by Sept. 30 to reach the quota.

D. D. Moore, war finance chairman for the county, was optimistic about Hansford county reaching the quota if the people will buy bonds this week at about the rate they did last week.

Moore said that bond sales Monday and Tuesday were good, but that most of the large purchases had been made. It is going to take a lot of bonds sales by many purchasers to put the county over the top.

This is regarded as the biggest effort for Hansford county in World War II.

Friends Help Quota

Many orders have been received from people outside the county. They own property in the county. Others are in this trade territory and feel that they owe their bond purchases to Hansford county. Orders have been received as far away as California.

Gruver Lumber Co., Foxworth-Galbraith Lumber Co., Community Public Service Co. have placed orders for their branches in the county. The White House Lumber Co. also plans to make an allotment to this county this week.

An order of \$3,700 was received from Jackson Bros. Hardware Co. of Guymon, Okla.

Big Sales Made

The \$10,000 war bond drive mentioned in last week's Reporter seems to be going over the top. Eleven names are mentioned in a box on this page of the Reporter.

The Southwestern Life Insurance Co. of Dallas has allotted \$10,000 to Hansford County. It is doubtful right now whether the county can get credit for this sale, but Chairman Moore said he was taking it until ordered otherwise.

"Buy bonds in honor of the boys on the Salerno beach," said Moore. "We understand that three boys at least from Hansford are in the big Italian push and we can do nothing more than to back them up."

Believed In Italy

These boys are C. D. Haines, son of Mrs. Bert Briley; Gunder Stavlo, son of Mrs. Betsy Stavlo, and Glenn Hiller, who formerly worked for John Stewart.

"I would have liked to have seen every firm in Spearman have carried an advertisement every week boosting Third War Loan Bond sales," said D. W. Hart, manager of the Perryton Equity Exchange. "If we cannot back the boys right now while they are on the attack, it looks like we never will do it. I want Hansford county to go over the top in this drive."

Most of the committees have gone to work for the campaign and some have turned in complete reports. Many have done an excellent job and Moore believes that every one will see his or her list before the campaign ends Sept. 30.

W. A. Ellsworth said his wheat is coming up rather spotted. He is hoping to take a vacation shortly to see his brother in New Mexico.

### Hansford County Rancher In Service Buys \$10,000 Bond

Many words of commendation were being spoken in Spearman Tuesday for J. D. Amend, who lives west of Gruver, and who has purchased \$10,000 of Third War Loan Bonds, although he has been in military service about a year.

Amend had several hundred head of cattle when he was inducted into service. He is in the Coast Artillery on the Pacific Coast.

His friend, Hayden Hart, has helped take care of his stock during the time he was gone.

"Many persons with far more available money than Amend has done less in the purchase of War Bonds," it was said here. "In addition, Amend has given his time in the service of our Nation."

Wartime Lighting Suggestions

HOW TO GET MORE LIGHT FROM YOUR PRESENT EQUIPMENT



Use Shades with Light Linings to Reflect More Light

If your lamp shades are not white or very light-colored on the inside you're losing a lot of valuable light. Dark colors soak up light like a sponge—in some cases as much as 30% to 50% is lost. Clean your lamp shades regularly, or if they're too dark or discolored with age, replace them with clean, light-lined shades that reflect light instead of absorbing it. You'll find you'll get a lot more light from the same bulbs.

HOW TO CLEAN LAMP SHADES

Parchment paper shades should be dusted with a clean cloth. Silk shades with fancy trimming such as appliqued ornaments, and shades of shrinkable material should be dry cleaned. Plain silk or rayon shades can often (but not always) be washed successfully provided they are stitched and not glued. To wash, first remove all surface dirt with soft brush, then hold by wire frame at top and dip up and down repeatedly in lukewarm suds made from mild soap flakes. Rinse through three or four lukewarm rinses using same up and down dipping motion. Dry very fast, hanging in shade outdoors in warm, breezy weather, or suspending over radiator or stove, using fan to accelerate drying, in inclement weather.

# Rationing Calendar

Rationing calendar for September 24 to October 1.

War Ration Book I Sugar: Stamp 14 expires November 1. Nos. 15 and 16, for canning, good for five pounds each through October 31. Shoes: Stamp No. 18 valid for one pair of shoes through October 31.

War Ration Book II Blue Stamps: (Canned fruit, canned vegetables, fruit juices, soup, frozen food, catsup, etc.) U, V, & W now valid, expire October 20. Red Stamps: (Meat, canned meat, butter, margarine, lard, cheese, canned fish, fats, oil, canned milk.) X, Y, & Z valid through October 2.

War Ration Book III: Brown Stamps "A" became valid for meats on September 12. "B" stamps became valid Sept. 19. "A" & "B" expire October 2. "C" becomes good on Sept. 26 and expires on October 30.

Gasoline: Gasoline coupons must be endorsed on the front immediately upon receipt. No. 8 "A" coupons become valid on September 22 for 3 gals., expire on Nov. 21. "B" and "C" good for 3 gals. each. "D" good for 1 1/2 gals. each. "E" good for 1 gal. each. "R" & "TT" good for 5 gals. each. B, C, E, & R issued for 3 months with any coupons left over valid for further use.

Tire Inspection: "A" book holders must have second official inspection by Sept. 30; "B" book holders, third inspection by Oct. 31; "C" book holders, fourth inspection by Nov. 30; "T" book holders, second inspection within 6 months of last date of inspection or every 5,000 miles, whichever comes first. Speedometer reading should be written in on record.

### Canning Sugar Applicants

Because of the great work load of the local rationing office at the present time in issuing truck gasoline, the board is asking that applicants for canning sugar please do not make application for sugar until after Oct. 1, unless you do need it at present and have something on hand to can, or expect to get something right away. If you do need the sugar, you may mail or bring in your application, with your sugar books and it will be issued as soon as possible, but your patience and co-operation in this matter will certainly be appreciated.

You can get your canning sugar as there is no set date for you to apply. You will be notified in plenty of time.

The regulations do not allow the staff to start issuing truck gasoline until Sept. 15. This only gives the three office helpers fifteen days to issue gasoline to every truck operator in Hansford County, for the third quarter beginning Oct. 1.

### Truck Gasoline Rations

Truck gasoline ration books are now being processed and mailed by the local war price and rationing board. If the office files contain a complete record of the truck users amounts the books will be mailed to the unit operators. If

Please mail your T books to this address and DO NOT bring them to the rationing office. All other ration books should be returned to the rationing office that issued them.
