4-H Club Gilt Show Will Be Friday

Hansford Bond Quota Exceeded By 30 Per Cent

\$672,540.75 Of Sales Reported Saturday Night

Average Of \$244 Per Inhabitant Reached As Final Total Is Given

Hansford county citizens are rejoicing again over exceeding the Third War Loan Bond quota by 30 per cent.

Sales in this county totaled \$672,540.75 up to Saturday night to a quota of \$501,500.

Purchases in the county were \$244 per inhabitant, based on the 1940 census of 2,753. The national quota was \$115 per inhabitant, showing that patriotic citizens more than doubled the national average.

Late purchases included \$10,000 allotted by the Santa Fe Railway Co. to Hansford county.

Gruver post office sales were \$19,950. Morse post office sold \$23,750 and the Spearman post office \$10,987.50.

The First State Bank of Spearman sold the remainder of the bonds with the exception of \$24,000 that was allotted the county by various corporations.

The county had a quota of \$61,500, or \$180 per person, the highest in the Panhandle of Texas. D. D. Moore, war finance chairman and in charge of bond sales, expressed his appreciation for the support of the citizens and the workers on the war finance committee.

Most of the counties in the Panhandle went over the top, according to incomplete reports received. Ochiltree, Moore, Hutchinson, Gray, Carson and Potter counties were among those going over the top.

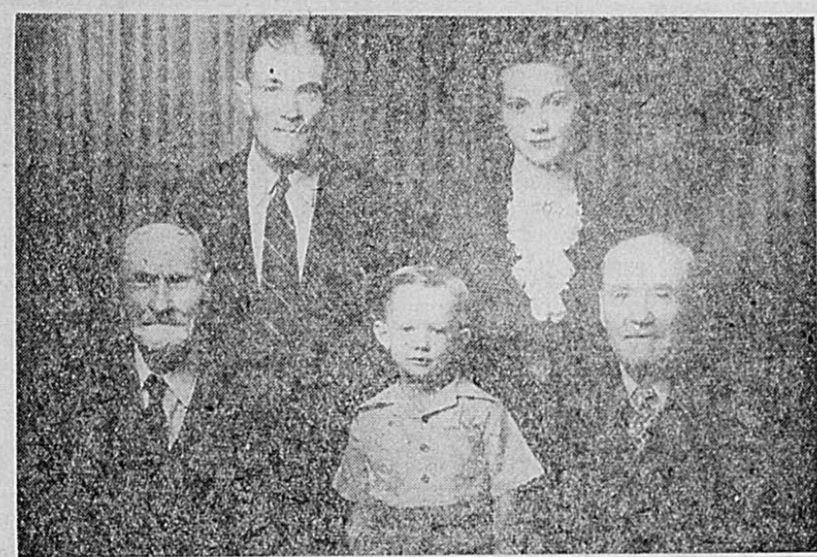

United War Chest Quota Of \$2,150 Will Be Sought Oct. 25 To Nov. 5

All Land Bank Interest Cut To 4 Per Cent

P. A. Lyon, secretary-treasurer of the Spearman National Farm Loan Association, has received information that the board of directors of the Federal Land Bank of Houston has authorized the lowering of the interest rate to 4 percent on all federal land bank loans, made through national farm loan associations that now bear interest rate at above 4 percent per annum, effective July 1, 1944.

This reduction in the contract rate of interest will affect about 80 percent of the land bank borrowers in this area, according to Lyon. Prior to 1935, he said, loans were closed at 4 1/4 to 6 percent, depending upon the cost of money in the bond markets at that time. All land bank loans have been made at a contract rate of 4 percent since March 1935.

"The action of the board of directors of the bank in effect guarantees that the rate will not go higher than 4 percent for the life of the loan," Lyon said. "This voluntary reduction of the contract rate of interest is made possible by the successful operation of the land bank system of cooperative credit which is designed to make available necessary farm credit at low rates and on long terms."

With a successful Third War Loan Bond campaign behind us, Hansford county will begin another war activity Oct. 25 when a drive will be waged for approximately \$2,150 for the United War Chest of Texas, a unit of the National War Fund.

During the recent campaign, Hansford county citizens have not been asked to give anything. They have been urged to invest in the best security in the world, war bond of the United States government.

This money will be used to make the boys in service happier and to assist them in every way possible. More than 50 percent of the money will be devoted to the United Service Organizations with which most persons are familiar.

Other funds will be used for the relief of Allied nations. The national quota is \$125,000,000, so it is evident that our part will be small but important.

Begin studying now what you can give in this great war program. And don't be stingy with your conscience.

If many persons will give 1 per cent of the quota, \$21.50, the campaign will go over in a big way in a hurry. However, there are many prosperous persons who can give several per cent and they should not hesitate.

Wartime Lighting Suggestions

HOW TO GET MORE LIGHT FROM YOUR PRESENT EQUIPMENT



Place Lamps to Utilize Light Output Most Efficiently

The amount of useful light you get from a lamp decreases rapidly as the lamp is moved away from the area to be lighted. Conversely, the useful light increases greatly as the light source is moved toward the working area. In the above example, merely by moving the end table lamp eight inches from the far to the near side of the table, the amount of useful light for reading or sewing was more than doubled. Remember this important point and always place chairs close to lamps. You'll not only get more light for your money, but you'll prevent needless eyestrain.

OTHER WAYS TO CONSERVE LIGHT

1. Remove and clean lamp bulbs and lamp bowls regularly. Dry thoroughly before using again.
2. Keep shade linings light. Clean or brush regularly. Repaint or reline dark-colored paper or parchment shades.
3. Sit close enough to the lamp to get all the help it can give your eyes.
4. Avoid direct glare from lamp bulbs by using shades deep enough and wide enough.
5. Arrange furniture so one lamp can serve two people. But be sure lamp is not too far away from either person.
6. Turn off lamps not in use. Lamp bulbs use critical materials... Make them last longer.

Army And Navy Tests Will Be Given Nov. 9

The second qualifying test for the army specialized training program and the navy college program V-12 which will be given throughout the country on Tuesday, November 9, will be administered at the Spearman High school, Supt. L. H. Bond, announced today. A pamphlet of general information which contains an admission-identification form may be obtained at the school building. This form properly filled out will admit to the test students between the ages of 17 and 21 inclusive who are recent high school graduates or who will be graduated by March 1, 1944. Intent to take the test should be made known immediately to Principal R. E. Darnell in order that the necessary test supplies may be ordered.

The same examination will be taken by both army and navy candidates. The examination is designed to test the aptitude and general knowledge required for the program of college training and all qualified students are urged to take the test. At the time of the test each candidate will be given a choice of service preference, but taking the test does not obligate the candidate to enlist in the service.

The army specialized training program and the navy college program enable students to continue academic training at government expense following induction into the armed services. Successful completion of the prescribed courses, may following further officer training, lead to a commission in the army or the navy.

Those selected for the army will after further screening and basic military training, be sent to college. Students chosen for the navy program, after selection by the office of naval officer procurement, will be detailed directly to college. Students who attend college under either of the programs will be under military discipline on active duty in uniform with pay. All expenses, including tuition, food, housing, books, and uniforms will be paid by the army or the navy.
