# Ran Wilde, Name Band To Play In Spearman Fri.

Perhaps the biggest name in dance music that ever visited Spearman to present entertainment for this area will be at the Memorial Building Friday evening November 5, for the dance, jointly sponsored by the Hansford YFW and the Spearman Chamber of Commerce.

The dance music will begin at 8:30 P. M. and continue to 1:30 a. m. It is expected that most of the crowd attending the football game will have ample time to enjoy plenty of dancing, and there is a possibility that those who plan to take in both enjoyable events will be in time for the 1st dance, as the football ground adjoins the memorial building where the dance will be staged.

One of the largest crowds of visitors ever attending a dance in Spearman is expected Friday night. Advance ticket sales indicate a capacity crowd for the evening, and the music of this nationally known orchestra is expected to attract dance loving people from many adjoining towns. The dance has been advertised in some 20 adjoining communities, and many advance sales have been made in other cities.

Any profit derived from the dance will go towards completing the Memorial building.

Young Camilla, with the twinkle in her eye and the magic touch on the Steinway, was taken fresh from the graduating class of the University of Washington in Seattle, and incorporated by Ran Wilde into his organization four years ago. The voice, piano styling and orchestral background work of Camilla quickly became a popular feature with the crew, and Ran offered two life-time jobs to the young miss - as the girl who marries the boss and the girl who supplies her feminine charm and talents for the band. Both options were exercised at once, and both unions have been happy ones.

Camilla Lane was born in Cairo Illinois 25 years ago, but was raised and schooled in the north-west metropolis of Seattle. While attending the University of Washington, Camilla lent her talents to the local musical comedies and even a dabble in light opera occasionally. Her first piano lessons were taken while a young girl of seven, and she has since mastered the keyboard to such a degree that she can sight read at an incredible speed, and can play anything written on first sight.

### Lions Sponsor Street Markers For Spearman

Work begins this week on the program of numbering houses and placing 100 street markers at street intersections of Spearman. This program promoted by the Lions Club of Spearman, in cooperation with the Spearman C. of C will begin with the sale of house numbers to the more than 400 homes and business houses in Spearman. The house numbers will cost each home and each business house in Spearman a minimum of \$3.00 each. While this sum is more than cost of the house numbers the sum is required in order to buy and place 100 street markers at intersections in the city.

Roy Jones has been assigned Kenneth street from the court house to the Railroad. Jimmie Hicks has been assigned Haney street from the court house South to South third street. Perrin Lyon has been assigned Haney Street from third avenue South to 5th street and Curtis Jones has been assigned Haney street from fifth street to the Southern boundary of the city. Hansford county joined the nation in the sweeping Democratic victory that placed the party in control of all branches of the government, as result of the general election Tuesday November 2. While complete figures are not available at press time, it appears that Truman and Barkley will go into office with 304 electoral votes. The Legislature will have a working majority of Democrats of more than 40 members. It appears that the Senate will have a majority of at least 6 members. The Democrats will organize both houses and of course appoint key men for key positions.

AMENDMENTS: No. 1 For 431, Against 168; No. 2 for, 476, and Against 132; No. 3 for, 479 again 97; No 4 for 451, Against 94; No. 5, For 528, against 75; No. 6, For 447, against 119; No. 7 For 445, against 120; No. 8 For 277, and against 277.

The Sanford Brothers of Perryton were host to the regular monthly meeting of the Top-o-Texas Medical Society. The Sanford Brothers are known in Perryton and surrounding territory as Dr. Roy and Dr. Hershel. The monthly meeting is held in some special town selected from a some county area covered by the Top-o-Texas medical society. The meeting started as a regular banquet served in the dining room of the Sanford Hospital of Perryton. A delicious meal was served, consisting of turkey, dressing, candied yams, asparagus, cranberry sauce and hot rolls with cheese and apple pie for dessert. Floral arrangement were white mums used on each table. This meeting is held each month and is devoted to scientific study. The Sanford Brothers saw to it that everyone present was highly comfortable by serving cigars and ice cold coca cola.

The medical society consolidated some months ago in order to be able to bring outstanding speakers and medical men to this area for scientific study. Dr. Mayce started the meeting by presenting two case studies in "Pediatrics". TEXAS - OKLAHOMANS FACE LAND LOSS

Approximately 50 Texans and Oklahoma residents will on Nov. 14th lose their opportunity to acquire title to 9,000 acres of land in a 156 mile long, 500 foot wide strip along the Texas - Oklahoma border, unless they file application with the Bureau of Land Management for purchase of their holdings on or before that date. It was pointed out today by acting Secretary of the Interior C. Girard Davidson. The unusual situation confronting the border residents resulted from action taken in the last Congress to clear away land ownership difficulties which grew out of a 169 year-old controversy over the boundary line between the two states. In order that this error might be corrected and the claimants obtain perfect title to the property, Congress on Nov. 14 1947, enacted a law authorizing the purchase of the disputed area at \$1.25 per acre by persons

whose occupancy dated back at least 16 years, and granted a year from the passage of the Act in which to file applications for purchase.

Tornadoes Are Explained

Tornadoes are like lightning—they hardly ever strike twice in the same place. H. L. Jacobson, veteran forecaster for the U. S. weather bureau in Chicago, says tornadoes usually are caused by opposing air currents during a severe thunderstorm—cold air moving downward and warm air upward. The weather man says the same principle applies to the water spouts sometimes seen in large bodies of water. The water rises through the vacuum in the center of the whirling air currents. Jacobson says no accurate wind measurements ever have been made near the center of a tornado. He explained that there are more tornadoes in the spring because there is more moisture in the air and more thunderstorms.

Swiss Government Modeled After U. S. Constitution

Switzerland, the mountain republic, observes throughout 1948 the centennial of her constitution. Consolidation of the 22 Swiss cantons (states) as a united nation was achieved through the Constitution of 1848, which was modeled to a considerable degree after the Constitution of the United States. Principal difference between the Swiss and U. S. governments is in the organization of executive power. The Swiss president, elected from the seven-man federal council, serves only one year.

The right of presidential veto is replaced in Switzerland by the legislative referendum or popular vote. Swiss people vote directly for or against many important laws. Switzerland's success in maintaining strict neutrality for more than a half century and remaining solidly secure through two world wars is due largely to her citizen army. On a per capita basis the Swiss under universal military training have the largest army in the world. A force of 250,000 could be mobilized overnight; 500,000 in 48 hours. Historians look upon Switzerland today as a political miracle. Half the size of Maine, and with a population less than half of New York City, Switzerland has a people of four different languages and diverse religious beliefs. Although landlocked, Switzerland has built up an amazing mechanism of banking and international trade. The Swiss franc is the only currency in the world comparable to the U. S. dollar in stability.

Medal Honors Unesco

A medal commemorating the founding of Unesco has been produced by the French government. The medal is available in bronze and silver. Executed by the French engraver, M. Georges Lay, the medal was selected by Dr. Julian Huxley, director general, from among several designs presented. The face displays Peace on Earth, symbolized by a feminine figure in relief holding a laurel branch against the globe which is encircled by the initials of Unesco. The reverse of the medal depicts a trilogy of allegorical figures symbolizing the aims of Unesco in the fields of education, science and culture. This side also displays the date of the constitutive conference of Unesco, held in London in November, 1945.

Berlin, Bone of Contention

A jumble of twisted steel and shattered masonry at the end of World War II, the streets of Germany's once proud capital have been largely cleared by piling up the wreckage. Damaged houses have been repaired and some new ones built of salvaged bricks. Long before it was established in 1871, as the national capital of the united German empire, Berlin served as a governmental seat, first of Brandenburg, then of Prussia. As headquarters for the powerful Prussian kings, it expanded spectacularly. By 1850 nearly half a million people lived in this crowded, lively metropolis of palaces and parks. The American section of Berlin, including Tempelhof airfield, extends south and southwestward.

## Comments Of The County Agent



On the average, prices paid for Texas farm products will go down a little in 1949; prices farmers pay for things they buy will probably be a little higher than they were this year.

It all adds up to an expected 1949 net income on Texas farms and ranches of some 5 to 10 percent below that of 1948, but still greatly above any prewar year.

That's a two-sentence summary of the 1949 farm prospects as seen by Tyrus R. Timm, extension economist and professor at Texas A and M college, who returned last week from the National Agricultural Outlook Conference in Washington, D. C.

As to farm commodities, livestock and livestock products seem to hold the most favorable price position. The most speculative situation is indicated for fruits and vegetables. No sharp decline generally is expected, but certain individual commodities in this grouping may experience serious "short-run" seasonal declines. In between, these two groups of commodities is the outlook for cotton and grain, with cotton holding a more favorable spot.

Meanwhile he expects prices of automobiles, farm equipment to be as high or perhaps even higher than in 1948. Some economists, he says, think a general increase of 5-8 percent may be expected.

You may pay a little less for radios, some items of household equipment and textiles.

The outlook interpretations are based on present supply and demand situations and requirements of existing government programs, Timm points out. Drastic changes from normal weather conditions, or a major overhauling of the government programs, could change the picture completely.

Texas flax production increased from a ten-year average yield of 287 thousand bushels to 863 thousand bushels last year and 960 thousand bushels this year. Last year's flax acreage was 91 thousand, and this year it came to 160 thousand acres.

Milk production in Texas ranges from a high of 143 percent of average in early summer to a low of 62 percent by early winter. These extremes are costing the producer as well as the manufacturer.

After ten years of the average of farm product prices becoming successively higher, it is hard to realize that this same index the next ten years could be successively lower. This possibility is worth thinking about.

This year, with sugar plentiful and prices down, the flow of other sweetenings such as syrup, molasses and honey to market has slackened very noticeably.

A pound of pecans contains 3,336 calories. A pound of beef steak contains 1,635, and a pound of turkey has only 1,060. But who would trade a pound of pecans for a big, thick, juicy steak that weighs a pound?

**FROZEN FOODS**  
If you're going to use frozen foods, there are several points to keep in mind, in order to get the best frozen food meals on the table.

Here are some tips on preparing frozen vegetables: no vegetables, except corn on the cob, should be completely thawed before cooking.

Use the least amount of water needed to cook the vegetables uniformly. And don't overcook frozen vegetables; they require only one half to two thirds the cooking time of the corresponding fresh vegetables.

As for frozen meats, you may cook them while frozen or after

they are thawed. Increase the cooking time of unthawed meat 15 to 20 minutes per pound, but you can cook completely thawed meat exactly as if it were fresh.

Poultry that you plan to roast should be thawed thoroughly and cooked like fresh birds. Thaw poultry rapidly, keeping the birds covered to prevent drying, and then cook them immediately. It is not necessary to thaw broilers completely, but allow extra cooking time for them.

Frozen fruits can be cooked just as they come out of the freezer, thawed just enough so that they will spread.

Don't throw the celery tops away. They can be saved and ture use in soups, stews, creamed vegetables, dressing or vegetable loaf.

### BINDWEED CONTROL

Mr. F. T. Winters, representative of Pacific Coast Borax Co., makers of Borasuc, which is a chemical now being used to kill noxious weeds, will be here Tuesday morning at 9:00 o'clock to put out a demonstration and explain the use of this product, according to Zack Jagers, county agent.

Borasuc appears to be equally as effective as salt. Mr. Jagers says, while at the same time it will kill the land for only two or three years, at a cost of about one third that of salt, and one eighth as much volume to handle. These advantages make Borasuc a desirable weed killer when compared with other chemicals.

The county agent invites every one interested in killing bindweed to attend this discussion in his office at 9:00 A. M. next Tuesday. Following the discussion, Mr. Winters will show us how to apply Borasuc to the weeds by treating a small area on the county road just east of Spearman.

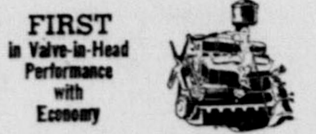

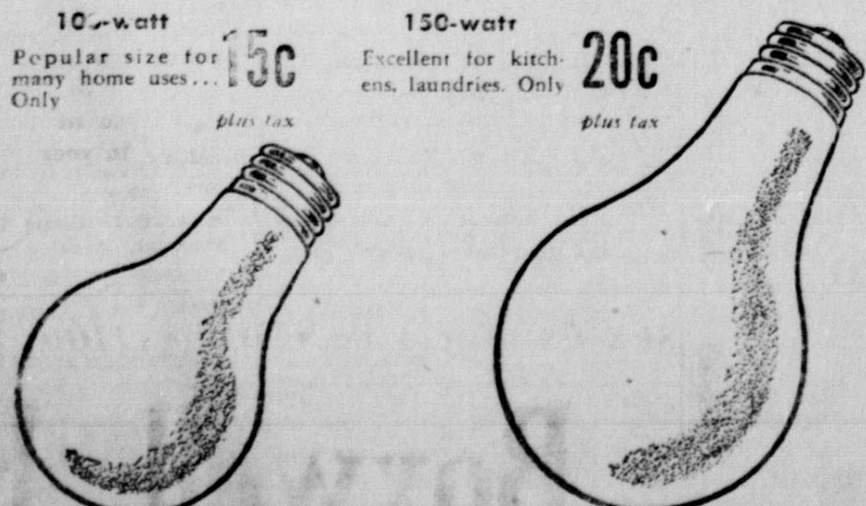

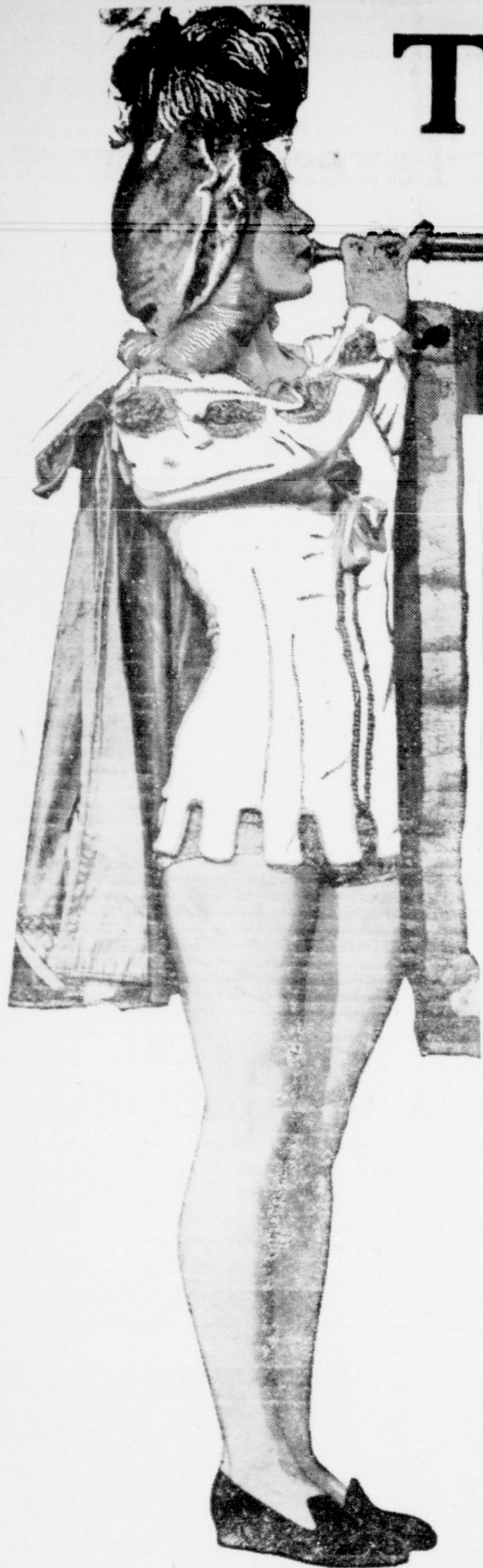

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My Impressions Of The Texas State Fair

Where have you been? This was a common question asked by many on my return to the county about a week ago. I've been to the State Fair, was my reply. But I can't stop there. I know the State Fair, which proved to be the best in history. It is one of the impossible to relate all would be know about the Fair, you should know about the Fair, but I'd like to mention some of the high lights of the Trip. 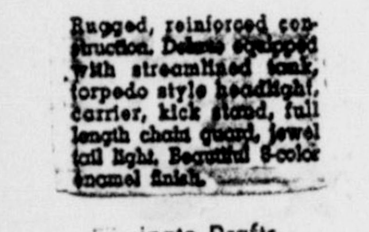
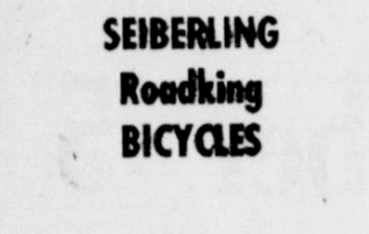
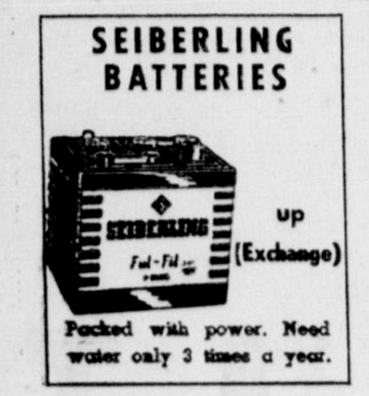

When preparing cabbage for cooking, cut the cabbage into sections rather than shredding it before dropping it into boiling water. This way there isn't as much vitamin and mineral loss. At the present time, 43 states have artificial dairy breeding associations in operation.



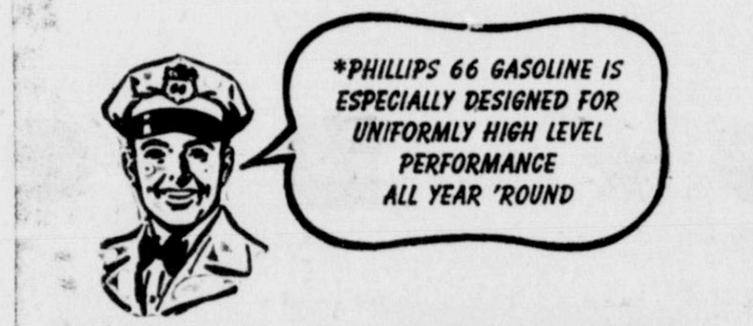

## Judge Oakes Wins \$25.00 At Texas State Fair

Judge Oakes, who virtually ran the successful Hansford County Fair booth, at the state fair in Dallas, returned the latter part of last week, and reported that the Hansford County display was one of the most successful in Dallas.

This writer attended the Fair one day last week, and will vouch for Judge Oakes, as he was on the job from Sun up to Sun down. Always there was a large crowd on hand to watch the Hansford exhibit.

Judge Oakes fared very well at the fair, and as a matter of fact, he brought home \$25.00 worth of prize money.

It seems that one of the county exhibits was giving a prize on how much money, a certain sample of cotton would bring. If the sample were taken from an acre of cotton, each stalk planted 6 inches apart in 12 inch rows. Well, Judge looked the stalk of cotton over (sample stalk), called up the market and found out how much they were paying for cotton seed, and the cotton. He set out his pencil and figured out how many stalks to the acre, and just missed the exact figure by \$1.85.

Hansford county can be mighty proud of Judge Oakes, as he proved that these Panhandle people can figure out anything from cotton to cabbage.

Mr. Oakes, who has been assisting with the fair exhibit for the past three years believes that Hansford county has received very valuable publicity as result of the exhibit. He states that he gave away the biggest part of 7000 sample cellophane sacks of wheat during the fair, and he believes that most of the people who received samples will plant the wheat and watch it grow. Judge explained to one and all that they could plant the wheat in boxes of dirt and keep it watered and exposed to sunlight and they would harvest a crop of wheat.

A lot of credit for the favorable publicity is due W. E. McClellan and Howard Brillhart, both officials of the fair association. These two men worked harder than anyone else in moving the exhibit to Dallas, and planning details of the programs for the year. County Agent Zack Jagers was another of the Hansford citizens who spent a lot of time and planning to help make the fair exhibit the outstanding success that it proved to be in the past. Richard Holton and Rutledge Jones aided by carrying the exhibit to the fair grounds and helping Judge Oakes and Zack Jagers, and Pat Ryan, install the mechanics of the exhibit and start the first day of the fair program.

On Hansford county day, Hansford people appeared on two radio programs at the fair, advertising to the world that we have a wonderful country here, and that we have room for some more fine citizens in this county. Miss Bobbie Jean Lackey, Hansford County Rodeo Queen and her parents were honored guests at the Hansford Fair Association on Hansford County Day. Miss Lackey was dressed in appropriate Western regalia, for her visit to the fair.

Several other county citizens who attended the fair on Hansford County day were guests of the fair for a dinner on Hansford county day.

Mr. Douglas says these winners were first determined on county or school district level on basis of growing condition of wheat, appearance of wheat sample on the records the boys kept on their wheat projects. From here state contests were held to determine the state winners. These state contests were based upon appearance of grain, and milling and baking percentages.

One of the awards for the top four winners in each division was a trip to Fort Worth all expenses paid. Hansford County had two winners. Pat Bannister won 2nd place in the FFA division and Billy Turner fourth place in the 4H division. These two boys and their sponsors, Mr. Jagers, 4H, and Mr. Douglas FFA were invited to attend the trip to Fort Worth. However, Mr. Jagers, County Agent, and Pat Bannister were unable to attend.

A total of 22 boys and sponsors attended the trip which officially began Friday morning by a three hours visit in Burruss Feed Mill Terminal and Laboratory. The group was taken through step by step as the wheat was processed into flour. From here the group was invited to a luncheon given for them by the Millers of Dallas and Fort Worth. The afternoon was spent visiting the Swift-Armour Packing House.

Saturday morning, Layne Beatty interviewed the wheat winners at 6:30 over KCKO. From there the group was extended an invitation by Mrs. Baird to visit her Bakery where the processing of flour into bread was observed. Later that morning, Mr. Soder in charge of the group took every one through the Fort Worth Grain Inspection Departments where grain samples were checked for grade and purity.

Saturday afternoon the group visited Universal Mills, whose officials showed them through their mills and laboratory. Later that afternoon, Eagle Mountain Lake was a resting place until the Baylor-T. C. U. football game which concluded an interesting and educational trip for everyone.

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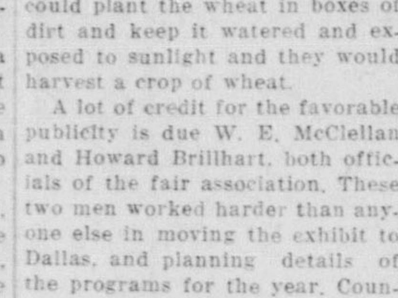
