Morse Girls Win County Championship From Spearman Boy Scout Finance Drive Will Open February 16th

One Day Program Planned For Next Wednesday 16th.

R. Y. Jones, Finance chairman of the annual Boy Scouts Drive to be staged next Wednesday February 16th, announces a "Kick off" breakfast to be held at the Club. The drive this year will be similar to the one made in one day last year, and four competing teams of ladies from the Baptist church, the Methodist church, the Lutheran church, and the Presbyterian church, according to Mr. Jones he anticipates a team from the Lion club team from the V. F. W. and a team of ladies from the Baptist and Methodist church.

Mr. Jones stated that there was a set quota for the fund, but in the past experience it is estimated that we will need in excess of \$1500.00 to take care of the Adobe District expense and other features planned for the coming year.

The Boy Scout Troop Committee in Spearman has been reorganized and plans made for a two year program of activities, with a prospect of achieving a very brilliant progress goal.

At the reorganization meeting members outlined proposed progress as follows:

1. Scoutmaster well trained and instant scoutmasters for every member of the troop. This means that adult leaders will attend the basic school during 1949-1950.

2. At least two meetings with parents of scout members to be held each year one of which will be a social meeting, perhaps a banquet, at which time scouts will have the opportunity to report their progress.

3. Regular patrol meeting at least 2 times each month during 1949 and 3 times each month during 1950.

4. Attendance goal for 1949 at least 70 per cent, and attendance goal for 1950 75 per cent of membership.

5. A minimum of 15 days of camping for 1949 and a minimum of 20 days of hiking and camping during 1950.

6. An effort to enlist at least 60 per cent of the membership of the troop for the summer camp to be held in May of this year and at least 75 per cent of the membership to attend the summer camp 1950.

7. The local Scout troop will participate in at least 3 world wide activities (such as polio aid) in 1949, and if possible take part in 5 such activities in 1950.

8. It is the intention of the Troop Committee members to buy their uniforms so that at least 50 per cent of the membership will be properly uniformed by the end of 1949 and at least 60 per cent will be properly uniformed by the end of 1950. (A uniform cannot be given his uniform must earn funds to purchase uniform.)

9. It is the purpose of the Troop Committee to advance 90 per cent membership at least one in Scouting during 1949, and 95 per cent of the membership 1950.

OUR APOLOGIES TO "HELLO GIRLS"

It appears that the large story reported in last week's paper relative to the Telephone situation in Spearman drew a bit of fire from the girls who work hard to make our telephone service as good as possible. The country editor wants to make it plain that the article was not intended to criticize any Telephone employee, or for that matter to lambast the Telephone Company, since we realize they are the victim of circumstances. The truth is that the board in Spearman set up for 400 subscribers will not accommodate more than two operators at the time. This makes it virtually a necessity for two operators to handle the work ordinarily delegated to four operators, or the load of 100 subscribers per operator. We realize that the Telephone Co. would like to change this situation and give a better service if it was not for the commitments to change over the system to a dial automatic control board in the future. We realize that there is no prospect for prompt service at peak load hours under present conditions. We also believe that the operators are doing all they can to improve service in Spearman.

Our information is that the company leased this block for a six-months lease at \$315,000, one third cash and the remaining two thirds in production. Spearmanites Boost Hansford County In Radio Program Sunday

A half hundred Spearmanites were guests of Radio Station KEYE at Perryton Sunday afternoon for musical and information program, which began at 5:00 P. M.

The broadcast was a feature of the official opening of the Mutual All State Station, which entertained nine towns and featured their programs over the station Saturday and Sunday. The towns included in the two day opening programs were Follett, LaVern, Oklahoma; Hardesty, Oklahoma; Booker, Darronett, Higgins, Bal-ko Spearman and Perryton.

Certainly the management of the station deserve praise for the excellent treatment they gave their friends at the opening party. Souvenirs were given to all the visitors and coffee, punch and cake were served those attending Saturday and Sunday. The large studio lounge room was crowded to standing capacity at all times during the two days broadcast.

The Perryton station first broadcast November 19th, and joined the Mutual Broadcasting System December 31st.

The station is owned by the Great Plains Broadcasting Company, a partnership composed of Carl Ellis, president of the Ochiltree County Herald; and F. B. Sumpter, Insurance man of Perryton. The station has a leased news ticker featuring AP news releases.

In the Sunday program the excellent High School Mixed Chorus was featured with Fred Godfrey, director. The program opened with a musical number from the Chorus, followed by a greeting from Bill McClellan in behalf of the Civic clubs in Spearman. Mr. McClellan traced the activities of the Lion club in Spearman since its organization, and briefly outlined the work of the Chamber of Commerce in recent years.

Lee followed on the program Sunday. R. L. McClellan, erstwhile mayor and city commissioner in Spearman virtually since the city was incorporated, followed with a talk on city organization, Spearman's history, utilities and plans for the future, which included an announcement to the teen-age youngsters in the chorus that they would positively have a new swimming pool in Spearman this summer.

Following this number the chorus gave another musical selection and this was followed by a talk from County Agent Zack Jaggers, featuring the agricultural extension work in Hansford county since the county first employed a county agent.

National Guard Unit Organized At Perryton

Company F, 142 Infantry, Texas National Guard is to be organized from personnel among men age 17 to 35 in Hansford, Ochiltree, Lipscomb and Hemphill counties. The National Guard unit will be activated for training soon after a four county meeting to be held at Perryton, Texas this Thursday evening (Today) February 10.

According to information available there have already been 31 members signed up for the National Guard unit at Perryton, and it is hoped that 150 members can be enlisted into the organization Thursday (tonight). The meeting will be held at the V. F. W. hall in Perryton, and parents of 17 year old boys and older are urged to attend with the boys, so as to get all the information available. It is definitely stated that any 17 year old boy who enlists in the National Guard unit will be exempt from the draft. Requirements of enlistment include one night's training per week, for which all enlisted men will receive a minimum of \$2.00 per night for taking the training. The travel from Spearman and perhaps Gruver will be arranged to be made via schools and there will be no charge to those taking the National Guard training. The training will be held at night, and will not interfere with school or work.

The Morse Girls won the county championship from Spearman at Stinnett on Wednesday night, topping the Lynxettes 30 to 19 to capture the undisputed girls County.

More than 300 people crowded into the poor seating afforded by the Stinnett gym. 1000 people would have liked to see the final game. Many of the fans were forced to stand in the hall and get occasional glimpses at the score board. This taught the officials and coaches a lesson about Panhandle fans. The schools not only lost money, but they lost a real chance to give girls basketball a big boost when they afforded only seating capacity for only one-third of the fans that wanted to see the game.

Monday night Morse defeated Spearman 35 to 33. Tuesday night Spearman defeated Morse 36 to 26. In the final play-off Wednesday night the Morse girls lead for the full 32 minutes of play, going into the fourth quarter with the score Morse 17, Spearman 15.

For the Morse girls it was the best thing that ever happened. There will be no school for them this Thursday. Coach Ellison is so happy he wanted to kiss all of the girls last night after the game. All of Morse is happy. Nothing like this ever happened to the little community before, and we take our hats off to the fans of the town as well as the team. Every last one of Morse' citizens were at the game last night.

Fred Godfrey, director of Music of the Spearman High School presented the musical numbers on the program, including a violin number "Danny Boy" he played himself, "Desert Song", and Piano solo by Martha Cayton, "Dance of the Deacons". Miss Cayton was the accompanist for all musical numbers.

W. B. Weathered, speaker for the banquet, introduced the new and old members of the board of directors of the Chamber of Commerce. In installing the new members to their new duties, Weathered gave them a lot of advice, and urged they continue to work for their civic organization.

Weathered spoke on the subject "It's fun to live in America". His speech outlined the many advantages of free enterprise over other systems of economic life. Weathered urged more respect and loyalty to the officials who serve the people from the officials of civic organization up to the President of the nation.

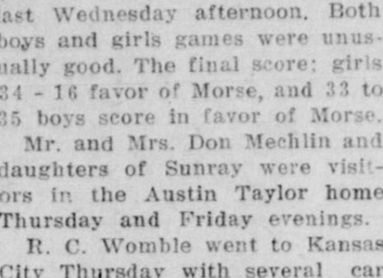

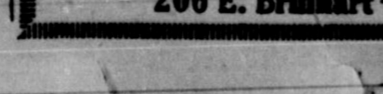

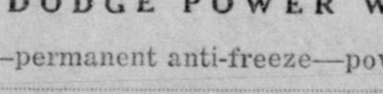

WINTER FANS "Many families do not realize that portable electric fans can be used in the winter as well as the summer." Usually at the end of summer, fans are put away until the next warm season. But actually they can be put to use in several ways during the winter months.

For instance, a house that is properly insulated is usually evenly heated, cooler at the bottom than near the ceiling. A fan placed near the heater or heating unit, aimed at an adjacent wall and the ceiling and set at a low speed, will circulate the warm air around the room.

Another winter use for an electric fan is for drying clothes in the winter. Winter weather sometimes makes it difficult to dry clothing in the house. "Set a fan at the end of the line of clothes," it will speed the drying process.

Or use it to dry coats and shoes soaked by rain or snow. Portable electric fans can be used at any season of the year to get off cooking odors from the kitchen. "If your home does not have a large ventilating fan in the kitchen or window, you may face a problem window towards a slightly open window and allow it to run. The odors will go out the window."

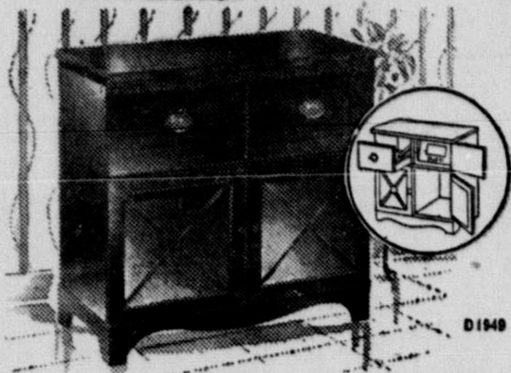

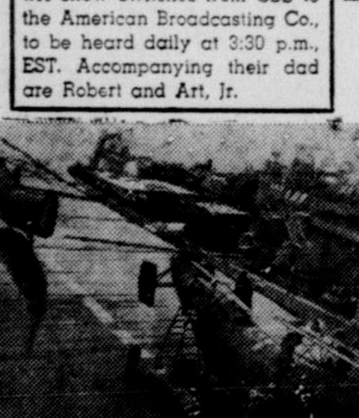

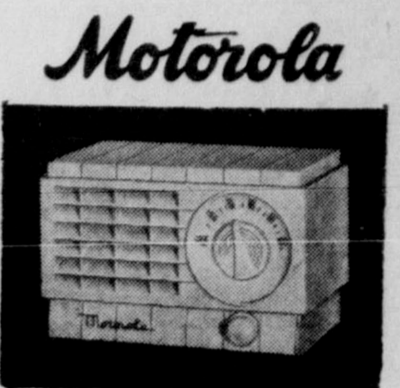
