American Legion Has 1st Meeting In Memorial Bldg.

Near a half a hundred members of the Hansford county American Legion were present for the regular meeting of the organization held in their new Memorial building Monday evening of this week.

Commander Dr. Jones announced the committees to cooperate with the Gruver Chamber of Commerce in staging the annual Spring Festival to be held in Gruver in May. Commander Jones stated he did not know the exact date for the Festival but thought it would be held May 13th and 14th. Committees appointed included Rodeo, Dance, special events and parade.

The Legion completed arrangements to purchase a new convertible Plymouth car from Roy Chase, at cost price, and the car will be given away as a feature of the annual spring festival in Gruver. The Legion members praised Mr. Chase for his ability and willingness to secure the convertible at cost price basis, and expressed appreciation of his loyalty for Gruver and the Legion.

Dr. Jones announced that the arrangements had been completed for purchase of a Plaque to be installed on the cornerstone of the new Legion building. The plaque will include the names of all war heroes of Hansford County who lost their lives in the recent war. The plaque will be installed at a public meeting, perhaps on Memorial Day if arrangements can be completed.

Commander Jones announced the building committee would turn the building over to the VETERANS, not necessarily the Legion, in the near future. He also announced that 50 chairs had been ordered and were expected to arrive in Gruver Friday of this week, and members of any veterans organization using the hall will not have to sit on the floor in the near future.

Jones announced plans for a public dedication of the Memorial building to be held at an early date. He anticipates several high officials of the Legion to take part in the Dedication program, and it is understood that VFW officials will also be invited to take part in the dedication ceremonies.

Former Hansford Pioneer Dies In California

Word was received by Dr. J. C. Jones this week, of the death of Clayton McGee, Mr. McGee died at his home in Pacific Grove, California Friday April 1. He was 90 years of age at the time of his death. Funeral services were held Monday April 3 at his home in California.

Independent!

The Public Schools of Spearman which for the past few years have been called Rural Schools, are now Independent.

Through action of the Hansford County Board, and the State Legislature, Mr. Max Boyer has put the necessary machinery into action to make the change back to an Independent system.

The original idea of changing to a Rural School was to allow 7 neighboring districts to join Spearman.

The laws will only allow five districts to join an Independent District. As it turned out, only 5 districts joined; the other two voted by a very small margin, not to join.

Advantages of an Independent District are many, and are familiar to most everyone. An Independent District may enrich its program beyond the requirements set up. The State Department. It deals with the State Department in many things, directly, rather than through the county Superintendent. The Independent district assesses and collects its taxes. Gets its books direct from the State department, and there are many other advantages.

Prison Terms

Robert M. Malone of California and Ray Humphrey of Missouri, both indicted this week and tried in District court, received terms of 3 years each on pleas of "guilty" and were tried before District Judge Jack Allen Monday of this week. Two more indictments were returned by the grand jury, but arrests have not been made, and the names cannot be made public. The indictments are on forgery and passing of hot checks returns. The grand jury recessed at noon Monday after making the four indictments.

In the case of Robert M. Malone, pleas of guilty were entered on indictment of passing a forged check bearing the signature of Fred Holt, and cashed for the amount of \$45.00 at Roscoe Sparks Cafe. The second indictment covered a similar check for an amount of \$187.00 cashed at Hays Barber Shop. Both checks were cashed in 1946.

In the case of Ray Humphreys, a forged check for \$21.00 was cashed at White House Lumber Co., using the signature of Chester Barnes. The punishment assessed on each indictment was 3 years, however the sentence was to run concurrent in the case of Malone.

Judge Allen stated that this was a second conviction for forgery in the case of Humphreys, and he said he was not inclined to be lenient when convictions were recorded for second offense.

Busy Week At District Court

The wheels of Justice which are alleged to grind slowly, were evidently placed in high gear by District Judge Jack Allen at the Spring term of court the past week. Judge Allen reports 20 cases disposed of, including 3 criminal cases. Other cases included a divorce, tax cases, title cases and foreclosure cases.

Judge Allen was able to save the county near \$200.00 in being able to cancel the petit jury service for the term of court.

Attorneys in attendance at the court included Attorneys Howard, Humphreys, Sanders and Wyatt of Amarillo; Tatum of Dalhart; Galloway and Fisher of Berger; Boyer and McConnell of Perryton and Judge Sansing of this city.

Mr. Rosson hit the market with two car loads of steers right in his own feed lot, and without shrinkage getting a premium price of 24 cent per pound for the steers just before a three cent a pound break. Vernie said that two of his two shipments of steers brought a total of \$1008.00. That's a heap of money for beef, but there was a lot of beef in these steers. . . . The weighed 2200 pounds and 2140 pounds. The entire two cars load shipments, which were purchased by the packers out of Amarillo, right here in Spearman, averaged 1950 pounds per steer.

Heard also stated that 350 car loads of wheat had been shipped via Santa Fe from Spearman since Jan. 1st. Heard said the Santa Fe usually handled about 1800 cars of wheat annually out of Spearman.
