Shrine Club To Meet In Gruver Friday May 29



Blue Sox Win

Blue Sox Win over Wheeler

The Spearman Blue Sox opened their season by easing out over Wheeler 5 to 3 last Sunday April 24, in an exhibition game.

The Blue Sox took the field in the first inning with Ralph Rogers on the mound who held the Wheeler squad to one run; while the Blue Sox came to town and succeeded to lay out two well placed hits which in turn lead to two runs for the home boys during the first inning.

The second third, and fourth innings were the old filmeur one two there and that retired the side for the Wheeler Boys while the Blue Sox made the well known veteran Baseball pitcher, Junior Martin previously with the Clovis Pioneers, and other Professional ball clubs throughout the tri-state area; Work to retire the Blue Sox, with out them scoring.

During the fifth inning the Wheeler squad again went scoreless under the powerful hurling of Ralph Rogers, while the Blue Sox scored another run, to bring the total up to 3 to 1 standing.

While in the sixth Wheeler fell under the power of the Blue Sox who performed a double play, and a pop fly to the short stop; which again retired the side scoreless. But Spearman's hitting power came up and drove in two runs to put the Blue Sox further ahead in the race to the tune of 5 to 1.

In the seventh inning the Wheeler squad threatened with the bases loaded, and none away, but after a ground ball to the pitcher which the Blue Sox forced the front man at home plate; and the dependable pitching of Ralph Rogers who struck out the next two men to retire the side with no runs across the plate. But after a strenuous inning in the field the Blue Sox were unable to succeed to score another run.

In the eighth inning the Wheeler lads seced to have struck a luck streak and drove in two runs which brought the score up to 5 to 3. While the Blue Sox came up with the old one two three, and that retires the side.

The ninth inning only four men faced Rogers and the faithful Blue Sox infield retired the side, with the Blue Sox clenching the game to the tune of 5 to 3.

The Blue Sox have built a new field northwest of town in the air strip; here they have built un a nice large backstop, and also a wing fence. They also have plans to construct some sort of bleachers in which the fans may

sit. This field has been built by volunteer labor of the ball club; of which they are very proud.

The Spearman Blue Sox have entered the North Plains Athletic Association Baseball League in which they will compete with, Perryton, Stratford, Sunray, Dalhart, Texhoma, Cactus, Boise City, Greenville N.M., and Tucumcari N. M. The Blue Sox have only Sunday afternoon games in the League.


We have a new geophysical company the UNITED that wants five apartments and 13 bedrooms at this time.



STATE NEWS

AUSTIN, Texas, April -- The House finally passed the first of the Gilmer-Aikin Bills, Senate Bill 115, last Wednesday. After several strategic movements by opponents of the Bill to defeat its passage on the floor, the bill passed by a vote of 85 to 30.

S. B. 115, the second of the floor of the House for debate. As yet, no final action has been taken on it. This bill is a guarantee that each school child in Texas receives nine full months of schooling each year. It also sets up a minimum teachers salary of \$2,400 a year. It sets educational standards, such as the number of pupils per teacher, and it proposes a new and different plan of financing, based on an economic index, which would delegate the amount that local districts would pay in relation to other districts, and how much the state would pay.

After a two way filibuster, in the Senate against the minimum Standards Bill, a compromise was entered into, whereby an amendment was placed on the minimum Standards Bill permitting some exemptions to taking the basic science examination and the passage of the Chiropractic Licensing Act. The House has previously passed both of these bills, but in different form from the Senate Bills.

The House passed H. B. 417 amending the State Unemployment Compensation Act which provides for a maximum of \$20 a week unemployment compensation payments and also decreased the cost to the employers.

A resolution calling for a committee to study the surface water rights in the state was referred to the Committee on Conservation and Reclamation.

The House passed House Joint Resolution 11 proposing the amendment to the constitution speaking the provision requiring the payment of a poll tax to vote.

School Lunches Studied

Right Off Plate in School

What children actually eat—not just the menu for the day—determines the real nutritive value of their school lunch. This viewpoint was prompted by nutritionists of the U. S. department of agriculture to make a study of school lunches right off the plate in two Maryland schools.

Twenty-eight lunches served at two seasons were the basis of this study by Dr. Milicent Hathaway and Dr. Frieda Meyer of the bureau of human nutrition and home economics. They are now analyzing chemically those meals served to children in the third to sixth grade, and have thus far checked on three important vitamins.

Judging from the meals analyzed, vitamin C is low in many school lunches, except on days when orange juice is served. Including fresh fruit juice in the noon meal a simple and effective way of assuring that the school child will get sufficient vitamin C, the nutritionists advise.

The B vitamin, thiamine, is probably the nutrient most often low in school lunches, they observe. Only one of the 28 lunches provided one-third of the day's needs of this vitamin as recommended for 12-year-olds by the national research council. Ten lunches provided enough thiamine for eight-year old children. Peanut butter, dried beans, split pea soup and similar foods are good sources of this vitamin.

The lunches provided amply for a B vitamin riboflavin. Milk is added with giving important aid in this respect. The nutritionists comment that it is well for school lunches to supply liberal amounts of riboflavin since many youngsters got little milk at home.

Bat Signals
Human ears cannot hear the incessant clamor of the bat as he flits about overhead because the bat's signaling voice lies in the wave band of about 50,000 cycles or vibrations per second. Human ears can detect sound only in the band from 20 to 20,000 cycles.

Editorial

Tires - If they are worn smooth they will skid more easily. If irregular wear spots show on some tires, it is an indication of improper wheel alignment. It is well in any case to have wheel alignment inspected in a regular service department.

Steering - If there is more than an inch or so of play in the steering wheel, or if the front wheels are slow to react to a turn of the steering wheel, this feature should be inspected and brought to standard.

Glass - Check windshield and all windows for discoloration which sometimes is found in old cars. If your vision in any direction is restricted by faulty glass it should be replaced for protection of passengers and other cars. Never drive with a dirty windshield.

Lights - Make certain that both headlights burn on both upper and lower beams, and that tail and stop lights are working. Stand in front of the car with headlights on the lower beam and be certain that they do not blind approaching motorists. Keep headlights and tail light lenses clean at all times.

Examination of wheel alignment - Lights can ease reference between the highway. Preliminary examination of potential danger can be made by self. Chevrolet equipped to make inspection of those that the owner need attention. The various points have a bearing on how to ascertain if they are functioning.

Headlights - You can push the wheel one inch and should be inspected. Pull the car when stopping they are degraded and brought to standard.

AMARILLO, April 16 (AP) -- Texas wheat farmers - looking at wheat promises to be one of the highest yields in history - have "lost" their crop only once this year.

The crop is usually lost at least three times before it is safely in the elevator. High Plains farmers made gloomy predictions of a loss through blowing early in the spring. They are past that hurdle now. Growers below the Caprock and in the lower wheat belt, from Dallas northward, now fear they are losing their crop to destructive little insects, leaf hoppers.

But behind the pessimism is an official harvest estimate of more than 99,000,000 bushels of wheat. That's big money in anybody's league and lots of biscuits, pies and cakes for the dinner table.

Wheat for a bumper crop will need more moisture. Thousands of acres could be destroyed by hail. Millions of bushels may lie

on the ground for lack of storage. Greenbugs may eat the crop before it begins to ripen. A late freeze could nip the rank growth off at the ground.

But the grainmen point out all these things and say if . . . none of them occur . . . we'll have a record crop.

Carl Hill, a grower near Bushland which is just west of here, said "The crop looks so good it must belong to someone else."

J. E. Davis, elevator and whole sale grain operator here said, "In my opinion, the weather for the next 29 days will make the difference between bumper yields and good acreage yields."

"With pretty good rainfall very soon, we would have a real good chance for a bumper yield per acre, but if it stays dry until the first of May, it will bring our prospects down to about average yields per acre."

Hood Wills, county agent in Ochiltree county, which produced more wheat last year than any other in Texas, said, "Most

people are of the opinion conditions are as good as they have ever been at this time of the year with good moisture and cool weather we should have a record crop.

In adjoining Hansford County, another big wheat yielder, County Agent Zack Jagers quotes R. L. McClellan, grainman and grower, Best prospects for a big harvest we've had in many a year."

Carl Miller who manages wheat farms in Dallam, Randall, Armstrong, Deaf Smith, Bally, Hockley and Lamb Counties, all wheat producers, said, "It looks better than I've seen in 15 years."

He continued, "Nothing but hail can keep us from harvesting a big wheat crop."

Walter Grist, county agent at Canadian in Hemphill County, said, "The prospects are brighter than ever before in my 28 years on the Plains."

Frank Wendt, county agent at Vernon in Wilbarger County, on the rolling plains below the Caprock, said cryptically, "Looking good. Sufficient moisture for

time being. No insect damage." Calvin Holcomb, County Agent at Tulla in Swisher County, said, "Conditions are outstanding."

E. A. Miller, state extension agronomist reported, "We understand wheat prospects on the High Plains, south of the Caprock most of the wheat is late, due to the prolonged fall drought."

"Lowering" High Ceilings - When a room seems too high ceiled, carry ceiling color downward to the tops of the windows. 
