That Freight Derailed Near Darrouzett

FOLLETT, May 25 (Special).—An east-bound Santa Fe freight train, loaded with wheat, was derailed at 7:15 o'clock Monday night about a quarter of a mile west of the elevator at Darrouzett.

No one was injured.

The nine cars which piled up carried an estimated \$35,000 worth of wheat. Not all the nine were cracked open by the force of the impact but a railroad crew is opening the cars today as salvaging operations go forward.

Cause of the derailment has not been determined, said Trainmaster C. B. Kurtz of Waynoka. Other Santa Fe officials who have been at the scene directing the cleanup are Master Mechanic J. G. Smith of Amarillo and W. K. Ludden, road foreman of engines.

The track probably will not be cleared before tomorrow or the next day and the regular motor car service between Shattuck and Spearman has been interrupted. Until service over the line is resumed, mail from Shattuck destined for Follett, Darrouzett, Booker, Texhoma, Spearman and Perryton is being delivered by truck.

Blue Sox Fall



From advance reports from the department of Labor we feel sure that there will be ample harvest crews this year to take care of the situation, despite the fact that many who attempted to make the round's last year went broke, and are out of the picture this year.

About the news in the oil field we have received is confidential information that the Collard well will be drilled to granite or 12,000 feet depth. Of course this is not official information, but we believe you can depend on it. The idea is that the picture at the Collard well would be settled by the time we harvest our wheat crop is now out. It may be several months before the well is a producer or abandoned. It takes a lot of time to make any hole after you get past the 8,000 foot depth. This explains why people thought the well would soon wind up. It is generally understood that the well was contracted for an 8,000 foot depth. It is generally known that the drillers have past that depth. The explanation is that contractors will hardly ever take a contract for more than 8,000 feet, and after this depth the well is taken over by the company paying for the drilling on basis of cost plus basis.

Whether or not the bonds of said Road District No. 3 of Hansford County, Texas, shall be issued under Article III, Section 52 of the Constitution, in an amount not to exceed \$275,000.00, bearing interest at a rate not to exceed four and one-half (4 1/2) per cent per annum, payable semi-annually, and maturing at such time as may be fixed by the Commissioners' Court, serially or otherwise, if not to exceed thirty (30) years from the date thereof, for the purpose of the construction and operation of macadamized, gravel or paved roads and turnpikes or in aid thereof throughout Road District No. 3 of Hansford County, Texas; and whether or not ad valorem taxes shall be levied annually on all taxable property in Road District No. 3 sufficient to pay the annual interest on said bonds and provide a sinking fund sufficient to pay the bonds at their maturity.

WHEREAS, heretofore on the 11th day of April, 1949, the Commissioners' Court passed an order fixing a time and place for a hearing on said petition, to-wit: May 3, 1949, and directed the County clerk to issue a notice of such time and place of hearing to inform all persons concerned of their rights to appear at such hearing and to contend or protest the ordering of such election; and

WHEREAS, the County clerk has heretofore duly executed said notice by posting true copies of said order of hearing in three public places within said Road District No. 3, and another copy thereof at the Courthouse door of said County for ten days prior to the date fixed for the hearing; and said notice has also been published in a newspaper of general circulation in said Road District No. 3, namely, "The Spearman Reporter", one time, on the 14th day of April, 1949, which was at least five days prior to the date fixed for said hearing; and

WHEREAS, this Court, having met at the time and place set for the hearing of said petition, proceeded to hear such petition and all matters in respect to the proposed bond election, to hear the contention for and protests against the calling of such an election, and it is found by the Court that said petition is signed by more than fifty legally qualified electors who own taxable property in Road District No. 3 of Hansford County, and who have duly rendered the same for taxation, and that the notice

required by law to be given of said hearing has been given; and WHEREAS, pursuant to the hearing held on said date and from the evidence submitted at said hearing, the Court has determined that the proposed improvements would be for the benefit of all taxable property situated in said Road District No. 3, and that it is desirable and necessary to issue the bonds of said Road District No. 3 in the amount of Two Hundred Seventy Five Thousand (\$275,000.00) Dollars to contract said improvements, and that said election should be ordered; and

WHEREAS, the Commissioners' Court further finds that the amount of said proposed bond issue, together with all outstanding bonds of the same nature heretofore issued on the faith and credit of Road District No. 3 of Hansford County, will not exceed one-fourth of the assessed valuation of the real property of said District; and

WHEREAS, said Road District No. 3 of Hansford County, Texas, was heretofore created by order of the Commissioners' Court, duly entered on the 19th day of April, 1948, which order is of record in the minutes of the Commissioners' Court;

THEREFORE, BE IT ORDERED BY THE COMMISSIONERS' COURT OF HANSFORD COUNTY, TEXAS:

1. That an election be held in said Hansford County Road District No. 3, on the 11th day of June, 1949, which is not less than thirty days from the date of this order, to determine:

Whether or not the bonds of said Road District No. 3 of Hansford County, Texas, shall be issued under Article III, Section 52 of the Constitution, in an amount not to exceed \$275,000.00, bearing interest at a rate not to exceed four and one-half (4 1/2) per cent per annum, payable semi-annually, and maturing at such time as may be fixed by the Commissioners' Court, serially or otherwise, if not to exceed thirty (30) years from the date thereof, for the purpose of the construction and operation of macadamized, gravel or paved roads and turnpikes or in aid thereof throughout Road District No. 3 of Hansford County, Texas; and whether or not ad valorem taxes shall be levied annually on all taxable property in Road District No. 3 sufficient to pay the annual interest on said bonds and provide a sinking fund sufficient to pay the bonds at their maturity.

2. That said election shall be held under the provisions of Chapter 3, Title 22 of the Revised Civil Statutes of Texas of 1925, as amended, including the provisions of Chapter 16, Acts of the First Called Session of the Thirty Ninth Legislature, and only legally qualified electors of this state and of this County who own taxable property in the District and who have duly rendered the same for taxation, shall be qualified to vote.

3. The ballots for said election shall have written or printed thereon the following:

FOR THE ISSUANCE OF ROAD BONDS AND THE LEVYING OF THE TAX IN PAYMENT THEREOF AGAINST THE ISSUANCE OF ROAD BONDS AND THE LEVYING OF THE TAX IN PAYMENT THEREOF

Each voter shall mark out with black ink or black pencil one of the expressions, thus leaving the other as indicating his vote on the proposition.

The said election shall be held at the following places within Road District No. 3 of Hansford County, Texas, and the following named persons are hereby appointed as officers of said election:

- J. C. HARRIS, Presiding Judge.
- L. E. MORRISON, Judge.
- At the Schoolhouse, Oslo, Texas, within Road District No. 3 of Hansford County, Texas, with the following officers: GORDON STEDJE, Presiding Judge, J. IVAN POWELL, Judge.

5. The manner of holding said election shall be governed by the General Laws of this state regulating general elections when not in conflict with the provisions of Chapter 16, Acts of the First Called Session of the 39th Legislature, hereinabove cited.

6. Notice of said election shall be given by publication of a copy of this order in a newspaper having general circulation in Hansford County Road District No. 3 for three successive weeks before the date of said election. And in addition thereto, there shall be posted copies of this order at three public places in said District, and one at the courthouse door of the County for three consecutive weeks prior to said election.

7. The County Clerk is hereby ordered and directed to post said notices and to cause same to be published as hereinabove directed. Further orders by this Court are reserved until the returns of said election executed by the duly authorized election officers, are received by this Court.

8. The metes and bounds of Road District No. 3 of Hansford County, Texas, are as follows: Beginning at the S. E. corner of Block P. H and G. N. R. R. Co., original Grantee, said point also being the S. W. corner of Commissioners' Precinct No. 2;

Thence North along the West boundary line of Commissioners' Precinct No. 2 of Hansford County to the N. E. corner of Section 60;

Thence West along the North boundary of Section 60, said line also being the South line of Section 12, Block 1, Public Free School lands to the S. W. corner of said Section 12;

Thence North along the West boundary line of said Section 12 to the North line of Hansford County;

Thence West along said north line of Hansford County to the N. W. corner of Hansford County;


Thence South along the West line of Hansford County to the S. W. corner of Section 63, Block 2, G. H. and H. R. R. Co., original Grantee;

Thence East along the South lines of Sections 63, 62, 111, 130,

Editorial

Additional Don't name it. . . . The country editor is this week cashing in on the training and "raising" of his two children. Saturday at 11:30 a. m. Mrs. Country editor suggested we take her sister back home and spend a couple of days fishing at the Lake Texhoma Fishing Rodeo. Course the folk nearly twisted my left arm out of the socket to get me to leave the hard work of publishing a newspaper and making out first of the month bills. . . .

Down about Vernon, the complaints had begun their work, and roads and highways were full of combines starting harvest season. Grain looked a little green, but some of the combines seemed to be getting a good harvest near Vernon. The grain in Hansford county looks just a little greener and a little taller to this writer than anywhere else. . . .

Wood's Resistance to Decay Wood is composed of about 60 per cent cellulose, 28 per cent lignin, and minor quantities of other materials. Cellulose forms the framework of the cell wall. Lignin contributes the cementing material that binds the cells together and is mixed with cellulose in the cell wall. The color, odor, and natural resistance to decay come from materials other than cellulose or lignin.

Chick Sanitation Before baby chicks are started, it is highly advisable to scour the brooder houses with lye or other suitable disinfectants. One pound of lye in six gallons of hot water is satisfactory for this purpose. If it is possible, the brooder house should be moved to new ground some distance from the laying house.

Clean Milk Preparation of milk and cream should be completed before they are used. Clean water is recommended as a means of reducing bacterial counts and preventing sediment contamination. Flooded covers placed over the cans will also help in keeping sediment out of the milk or cream.

Farm Wealth More than three million farms—well over half the nation's total—now gross less than \$1,500 a year. Per capita income of persons on farms amounted to a little over \$63, as compared with \$1,569 for non-farm persons.

Crotalaria Crotalaria is resistant to root-knot nematode, and this resistance is one of its big advantages as an oil-building crop. When grown in rotation with crops that are not resistant, crotalaria cuts down the nematode population and thereby reduces damage to the succeeding crop.

First Tea Party First Revolutionary tea party in America was held in Edenton, N. C., on October 25, 1774, when ladies of the town, sipping a brew of asphery leaves, pledged not to buy any tea bearing the odious tax stamp.
