

By BASCOM GILES Commissioner of the General Land Office

nature made the Veteran's Land bill into formal law. The bill was sponsored in the upper House by Senator John Bell of Cuero and in the lower House by Representative Reuben Senterfitt of San Saba.

The legislation grew out of a constitution of the Board.

The maximum purchase by each veteran shall not exceed \$7,500 to be financed by the State.

Veterans disabled by combat service connected disability have 90 days preference right to number of the Board.

The 51st Legislature, promptly and without a single negative vote in either House carried out the mandate of the people, making it possible for Texas Veterans of World War II to own a farm or ranch home of their own choosing by making a small down payment with the balance financed by the State at a low interest rate.

All money received during the six remaining years of operation shall be used to pay interest on bonds and to purchase additional land for re-sale to veteran. The purchaser shall not transfer or sell lands purchased for a period of 3 years from the date of purchase. The veteran will not be permitted to make more than one purchase. The veteran is not required to reside upon the property.

Because the honeybee is so in maculately clean, Rocky mountain blizzard-area farmers may stand to lose thousands of dollars this

This possibility is advanced Dr. George M. List, head of the department of entomology at Colorado A&M college. He points out the bee loss could mean a greater economic factor than the financial blitz the blizzards wreaked on the

Several factors can cause extensive death-loss of honeybees during cold weather, Dr. List points out. One is due to the natural clean. liness of the bee. Honeybees elimi drifts over the hive and the bees are unable to make these cleansing

The long period of_cold weather also means a heavier drain on the stored honey which is used as food If the beekeeper took more than his share of honey from the hive last fall, or anticipated a normal winter, his bees may starve because of a lack of honey. Bees are inactive during cold periods and if unable to fly to eliminate wastes during a lengthy low temperature period, death will result. Extreme cold causes the bees to

cluster in a compact mass to keep warm. If this cold occurs over an extended period the insects cannot move around sufficiently in the hive to feed on the honey, even # t is available.



sponsible for the new product, said it is the result of a three-year search for an effective insulating material that will fill large areas, yet weigh "next to nothing."

The foam is made by heating a molasses-like synthetic resin at about 350 degrees Fahrenheit until it expands to 100 times its original volume, then solidifies. Thousands of gas bubbles entrapped in the foam "buoy" it up and give the plastic its lightness.

Foamed into pre-fabricated metal wall sections, a two-inch thick layer weighing only 300 pounds would be enough to insulate a complete six-room house, Sterling said. Resistant to fire, moisture, fun-

gus growth and insects, the foam is low enough in cost to be practical for many applications and uses, the scientist said. Not only do imprisoned air bub-

bles give the new plastic great lightness, but they also provide it with its excellent insulating qualiies. So-called "dead air" is one of the best insulators known among commonly available materials,

Cover That Cough



"Cover that cough, smother sneeze" is not only good advice for people in public places. It has practical meaning in the cowbarn, too. Danger that coughing cattle may spread respiratory infections to their stablemates is highlighted in a research report from the American Veterinary Medical associa-

The report describes an unusual case of tuberculosis of the eye in a heifer. A tuberculosis cow with a bad cough, stanchioned next to the heifer, is believed to have spread the disease.

AVMA points out that this case occurred in England, where bovine tuberculosis is widespread. Although tuberculosis has been reduced to a minimum in United States herds, coughers and sneezers are nevertheless a menace because they may spread all kinds of respiratory infections. Isolation of any animal showing respiratory symptoms is urged, therefore, to protect the rest of the herd.

Field Mice Destructive To Melon Crops, Seed

Untold damage is done each yea to cucumber, cantaloupe and water melon fields by mice destroying the seed which are planted and al so the plants which are up and bearing fruit. H. A. Bowers, Clemson college crop specialist, says.

Bowers explained that the meadow mouse destroys the seed after they are planted, and the pine mouse cuts off the plants at the

To Boil Carrots

Use almost no water for boiling carrots-about one inch in the bottom of a pan with a tight fitting cover. Add one-half teaspoon salt for each pound of carrots, or onehalf teaspoon salt to each cup of water. Drop carrots into the boiling, salted water. Cover and boil gently-10 to 20 minutes for the cut pieces and 15 to 20 minutes for the whole carrots.
