

The Delphinium Flower Club met August 1 in the home of Mrs. P. A. Lyon with Mrs. Vester Hill, president, presiding. Members answered roll call with their individual hints for preservation of wild flowers. Mrs. Walter Wilmet's Red Radiance Rose won the Blue Bottle Spedman Vase and Mrs. P. A. Lyon's unusual arrangement of Golden Glow, multi-colored Zinnias and purple Phlox won the Beacon Vase.

Members adjourned in a body to Womble Park for an inspection tour. Thoughtful citizens have now placed in the park two trash barrels, a large step-on fountain installed on a concrete block and an all-weather picnic table with a bench attached to each side. It is hoped that the public will enjoy these added conveniences.

Wild flower identification and preservation were the topics for the days lesson. Mrs. Zack Jagers operated the slide projector assisted by Mrs. R. B. Archer, Jr. Mrs. Frank Allen, narrator, traced the genus of each plant, giving the physical characteristics of each before the slides started. "Wild Flowers of Texas" by Erfa Whitehouse is the work from which the material was taken. "The Gardener's Pronouncing Dictionary" compiled by Better Homes and Gardens was passed among the members so that each could examine the illustrations for tips of leaves, base of leaves, form of inflorescence. The lecture accompanying the slides was prepared by the Better Homes and Gardens Club of Phillips. As the slides progressed, Mrs. Allen described each wild flower, gave its habitat and uses to mankind. Of the thousands of known species, Mrs. Allen had only time for the following: Sage, Gallardia, Purple Horse-mint, White Horse-mint, Bergamont, Wild Phlox, Wine Cup, or poppy mallow, Sensitive Briar, Larkspur, Loco Weed, Purple Milkwort, Lupine, Skullcap, Bear Tongue, Gentain, Sunflower, Evening Primrose, Day Primrose, Wild Verbena, Mountain Daisy,

Yucca, Purple Thistle, Sawleaf Plains Paper Flower, White Milk-wort, Butter and Eggs, Puccoon, Dagger Flower, Broomweed, Blazing Star, Spiny-leaved Aster, Daisy, Snow on the Mountain, Bee Flower, Star Flower, Black Samson, Assorted Cacti, Firecracker Cactus, Cholla and Prickly Pear. Mrs. Allen asked assistance from the club by giving their own list of known wild flowers of the Plains area for future study. The Flower clubs of Spearman are indeed grateful to the Phillips Better Homes and Garden Club for the use of their wild flower slides and lecture material.



Canning Red Raspberries

When canning red raspberries, wash them carefully so they aren't crushed. Drain. Pack into glass jars, alternating berries and boiling red sirup until containers are filled. Prepare red sirup from over-ripe or soft berries. Heat them slowly to boiling point using one half cup water to one cup berries. Extract juice by straining berries through sieve or cheesecloth. To each cup of juice add one half cup sugar. Bring slowly to boiling point. Process jars 20 minutes in a boiling water bath.

DDT for Arctic Mosquitoes

Sprinkling DDT on snow and ice in Arctic areas is a newly discovered way of killing the first mosquitoes that hatch in the spring, entomologists of the U. S. department of agriculture report. As little as a tenth of a pound to the acre does the work, and airplane distribution of the DDT over broad areas makes for economy in the cost of treatment. Federal entomologists are continuing their wartime research for protection of military forces in Alaska from the teeming hordes of insects that are a torturous feature of the short arctic summer. Cooperating with the U. S. army in Alaska and with Canadian scientists, they have been experimenting in the vicinity of Churchill, on the west shore of Hudson Bay in northern Manitoba.

Good Clean Pasture Helps Poultry Men

Home Grown Feeds Cut Operating Cost

Good clean pasture and plenty of home grown feeds for your pullet crop pays dividends in more eggs, lower production costs and bigger poultry profits. The use of range shelters, range feeders and barrel waterers makes such a program easily possible.

Missouri university tests show that pullets on well-fertilized alfalfa pasture consumed 17 per cent less feed than birds on bare range. The pasture-fed pullets needed less feed for each pound of gain. Birds on clean pasture were healthier

and more energetic. Mortality rate was lower and there were fewer culls. Out of 100 pullets at four weeks of age, 94 of the alfalfa-ranged birds later went into the laying house, compared to 70 of those raised on bare ground. Purdue university tests showed that ladino clover with corn and small grains provided a complete ration for laying flocks.

Getting good pasture and a cheap and plentiful supply of grain is a matter of putting farm soil in shape to produce bigger yields per acre. For this you need a rotation in which deep-rooted legumes and grasses are keystone. You need to build up the organic matter supply via plowed-under legumes, crop residues and manure. You need to feed the soil a good ration of plant nutrients, so it, in turn, can feed the crops. In such a program, fertilizer is an important member of the soil-building team.

At current prices, eggs will buy nearly twice as much fertilizer as 10 years ago. It takes only 90 dozen eggs to buy a ton of 3-12-12 fertilizer today, whereas it took 170 dozen back in 1939.

ANSTIN—Colonel Homer Garrison, Jr. of the Texas Department of Public Safety, announced today a temporary relaxation in the policy of renewing drivers licenses. Pointing out that the action is being taken because of inadequate personnel to handle the procedure in the normal manner, Colonel Garrison stated that the temporary measure, which becomes effective immediately, will preclude excuses on the part of motorists for not having obtained a renewal of their licenses.

This should come as good news to a half million Texans since the records indicate that 3 1/2 million current licenses are on file. Estimates show that of the one million drivers who do not hold presently valid drivers licenses about half have had one at some time but have failed to renew them. The other half million have either moved from the state, ceased driving or died since the records were compiled or have never possessed a license to drive.

Under the new program, Colonel Garrison outlines the following steps for obtaining a renewal of expired licenses. First: if you have a license that was issued since January 1, 1944, you may secure a renewal of same by mail from the department of public safety, without examination. Second: if you have a license issued prior to January 1, 1944, you may renew the old license by presenting the license to a driver's license examiner in your locality and executing an original application. License in the latter case will also be issued with examination.


for renewals who had allowed their licenses to expire were required to stand a re-examination. Now under the temporary set-up, you may re-instate your permit to drive without taking the test, regardless of how long it has been since it expired, provided it is not now suspended or revoked.

Owners of the 55,000 horses and mules on Maryland farms have been urged to "check intake valves, remove carbon from the cylinders, and adjust the carburetor."

Those terms aren't as mixed as one might think. Joseph M. Vial, extension animal husbandman, explained that a horse's mouth and teeth may be compared to intake valves on a tractor. The teeth need to be floated (just as the intake valve needs to be properly seated) if they are to meet evenly and let the horse chew his feed properly.

Just as tractors are troubled with carbon in the cylinders, horses may have trouble with internal parasites. These may be removed by any competent veterinarian and the horse will be a better worker during the coming summer.

The carburetor on the tractor adjusts fuel supply to the work load. For horses, this is accomplished by getting them in proper condition before the heavy work load comes. Vial recommends this be done by "feeding the horse a handful of oil meal with his grain at this time of year to keep him in good condition and by giving him as many jobs to do as possible; such as spreading manure or hauling logs."

Other recommendations include: "Keep water in his cooling system, keep his tires in good condition by having him properly shod and see that his harness fits."

Farm Record Keepers Told of "Short Cut"

"It's easier to keep up than to catch up," advises Clara Leopold, extension home management specialist at the University of Nebraska, to the home and farm account record keeper. Another hint, she says, is to keep a pencil attached to the account records.

According to Mrs. Leopold, a certain time each day should be set aside to jot down the daily transactions.

across from a half completed, gray stone hotel. Mrs. J. H. Buchanan, Helen Fisher, and others from Spearman have reported the Monte Vista to be the ideal place for loafing since they have a very beautiful lounge and eating place. The Starr Drug, the only one in Red River comes next and is directly opposite the Riverside camp where we stayed.

The Starr drug has decorated Indian designed cowhide tables and stools (quite out of this world) and a front door so highly designed, Indian style, that you can see it a mile away, and just all kinds of Indian moccasins, totem poles, jugs, pictures, leather and suede purses, jewelry, Indian headdresses, cowboy suits, Indian shirts, bows and arrows and a lovely collection of native rocks.

The Silver Spruce Tavern is next to Fishers, and the Buckhorn coffee shop comes in there somewhere as well as Campbell's Deer Lodge, Sesta Lodge, and the Pioneer Lodge, all camps that complete the rest of Red River. Three is also a small telephone and telegraph office owned by the McCaskells, two ladies who are, incidentally also very lovely people.

A lodge called "El Sombrero" is one of the show places of the whole pass to see. The El Sombrero, is like many of the other lodges and buildings of the town and is completely walled and ceilinged with light, wide, polished pine boards. Low rafters, a center fireplace, and a large show window give the place an air of charm and spaciousness. There are also ranch style, round, low game and coffee tables, white pine tables and chairs for dining, low studio couches, a chaise

lounge, Navaho rugs, dried corn bunches and gourds hanging in the corners, and a few rare old pieces of Indian pottery and silver.

Against this gracious background is an exhibit of oil paintings, mostly all of Red River, by the noted painter, Charles Reynolds, from New York, we believe. The paintings are as beautiful and colorful as the actual scenes in and around Red River. If not more so. The most beautiful ones, a subject which Mr. Reynolds calls in, are the autumn scenes depicting the gorgeous, exotic colors of the trees and mountainsides in their flaming and golden shades. One called simply "The Aspen" shows exactly the mellow gold of the autumnal aspen against the background of purples and blues of the mountains and skies. We think we found the mountain bridge which Mr. Reynolds painted and he values the painting at over \$150.00. It is just a small bridge extending into the pines and sunlight and shadows, and there are many like it up past Questa on the trail to Lake Caberesto. One other painting, valued at \$25.00 was a watercolor of Red River in the Spring. There were also some very good studies in Indians and monasteries.

The other artist of Red River, Mr. C. A. Becker, is a young man from New York who specializes in very beautiful personal portraits. His portraits are exhibited in the Community hall of Red River and are considered outstanding, consisting of pastel and charcoal of children, Indians and tourists.

Mr. Becker's studio is in the community building and only two mornings and \$25.00 are required for very flattering and lovely life-sized faces. The artist painted a very good likeness of an Indian, using a real life model at one of the community gatherings. Mr. Becker is a very genial, pleasant person of medium height, blue eyes and brown hair, and his watercolor and pastel classes are eagerly attended.

There is a combination general store and Post Office simply called "Red River" in which you can buy anything from a jug of coal oil to a jar of snuff, and find plenty of time for loafing too. The only other houses, all one story logs, are cafe's, saloons and camp cottages.

The community building located Southwesterly between two camps of Red River, is the center of interest of the town and is easily discerned by its rustic, inviting verandas, town bell, large show windows, embellished with logs, and crowds of friendly people. There is comfortable outdoor fireplace, and a native rock indoor

fireplace. There is plenty of room on the outside for the campfire circles which they have on Sunday evenings. The building is low and rambling and friendly and it needs a new roof, according to the former owner and organizer of the community home, Miss Wilene Foster of Red River.

This is only a worms-eye view of this warm and cheerful building which is the entertainment and recreation center of activities for miles around. The main activity here being square dancing. One might say "occupation" instead of activity, for the mountaineers, tourists, Indians and children all go for it. Square dancing there quite adequately takes the place of movies, gambling, magazine reading, loafing and other civilized activities, and fills in a big gap of association, enjoyment and mutual entertainment.

Mr. and Mrs. Harry Trygg of Tucson, Arizona, are really the complete organizers of the whole town, and deserve all the credit for making other people happy in Red River. The Tryggs having charge of all the church, government and work of the town are good, wholesome, wonderful people, and are liked instantaneously on sight. Mr. Trygg, tall, lithe, with very personification of grace, has twinkling blue eyes and a very soothing resonant voice. Mrs. Trygg, a beautiful blond is also tall and slender, with quick wit and keen personality. Both are very talented and versatile dancers and have many friends and admirers all over the country.

Harry Trygg, being a football coach from Colorado, knows just how to deal with cowhands from Texas and Oklahoma, and he makes dancing a pleasure for everyone, the prairie gals and the mountain gals, too. It takes some one pretty smooth to make old timers, dance hall bench home-steaders and different teen agers to mix together and dance with enjoyment—but Mr. Trygg has an appeal that just can't be resisted.

Among the favorites are "Red River Valley Mixer" and "take a little peek", "black hawk waltz, the glow worm, the Texas star, ten pretty girls, cotton eyed Joe, virginia reel, put your little foot, birdin the ceel, crow in the center, six to the middle and jig a little" the later being very much a favorite, and usually accompanied with stamps, yells, and applause.

The square dancing occurs each week day afternoon from one thru five p. m. and it begins at night at 7:30 p. m. and lasts until 9:30 p. m.

Most all the Texans and Oklahomans spend half their time up at the community hall gabbing and comparing their likes and dislikes, so I recon it's a good thing

that most of them are for Texas and Oklahoma so they can enjoy each other.

In addition to square dancing Mr. and Mrs. Trygg provide supervised recreation for picnics, hikes, bridge and many other indoor activities.

It is quite interesting to get in on some of the conversation at the community hall, for all the people are happy, carefree, interested and animated. There is no social problem, no business affairs, no heated battles to fight; everyone is gay, relaxed and interested only in entertainment. Perhaps this also accounts for the popularity of Red River as a resort. Much of the information one learns is worthwhile as well as amusing. For example: Receipts for soap and uncooked candy, Tarzan, Johnny Lint, bowling, painting, mines, digging up pine trees, shooting the moon, camping out, stealing watermelons, and everything else that people think of to talk about when they have time.

One other part of the town which must not be left out is Howe's Snack Bar across from the Deer Lodge and next to the stables. Mr. and Mrs. Howe are very genial young people, and with their daughter, make a happy threesome at the dances, church and around town. Mrs. Howe gave the writer some interesting information about Red River in the winter. She says only 40 people remain there throughout the winter months, and since they are cut off from the rest of the world by snow and ice and mountains, they visit and work quite a bit among themselves. The mail does come though when the snow plow can get through, and for school and church, entertainment, shows and the like, most local alumni go to Taos.

There are some very beautiful drives in and around Red River. At the foot of the pass there is a one-way road winding off South-east between mountains to the "Tall Pines camp" and the "Aspen camp. Very good fishing is possible in these upland streams and with salmon eggs or flies (the Gene Richardson specials) anyone may have pretty good luck.

Brook and stream native trout are plentiful and a few rainbow are also available, since these streams are fed by the glaciers from the mountains they are all cold and good for trout. This ride I am trying to tell about, extends 15 or 18 miles up in the mountains and ends in a wilderness too high for car to travel.

Of course no one could talk of Red River and not mention the pass which is as steep as anything in Colorado any old day. To put in the words of Old Timer uncle

George Oldham who tells about the pass in the old days: "Well, sir, when I first came to Red River in 1895, we drove to a little settlement which was located up the Red River canyon about five miles from here; however we took a road leading from the top of the pass to get there. This little settlement was called Franklin Park. Rube Littleton of Raton was driving the team. He had a mountain spring wagon which was heavily loaded with freight, and his first stop was Franklin Park. These wagons were constructed to haul a ton or more, and yet they weren't bad riding either, with springs in front as well as in back and sides. I was riding in luxury. There was quite a little settlement there, with several dwellings and stores, even a dance hall. They told me a crowd assembled each Saturday night when all the crowd from E. town rode over to attend. We spent a little time here and again drove to the top of the pass and down the road to Red River.

Now, when I speak of the road, I mean the old road. In the winter-time and early spring, especially, it was always wise to cut a tree and chain it to the wagon. This helped to hold the wagon back on the steep grades, and in places the grade was 2 per cent. The snow was melting and running over the road in many places and it was the month of April. Some parts of the road were all icy, and the canyon seemed to be worse by the mine called the Ragged Pants Dick. It was also very narrow and steep, and became treacherous. In fact I was told that the had to let their wagons down by ropes over this place. We made it without any trouble.

When we got to the bottom, which is now Young's ranch, we unchained our tree and left it with dozens of others. The trees were piled up for a hundred yards or more. So you see the old road was a hair raising trip; this might also be interesting to you folk. The only car that ever tried to go over the old road was an old Studebaker. A team was behind ready to pull if necessary, but the car climbed the steep grades on its own power. The driver was Mr. Sperry of Raton who at that time owned the garage.

Our new road was built by the forest service in 1916. Right after its construction a story appeared in the Popular Mechanics magazine, stating that the Red River pass was considered the most wonderful road-engineering feat of its time.

There are seven laps of road, and in some places one car cannot pass another car. The pass is over 10,000 feet high dropping to around 8,900 feet in the village.

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Window in Cow's Stomach Brings Award for Research

An Ohio veterinarian who built a window in a cow's stomach has received the 1938 Borden award for outstanding dairy cattle disease research that has brought great benefit to mankind. He is Dr. A. F. Schalk, chairman of the department of preventive veterinary medicine at Ohio State University, Columbus.

It was Schalk who, while serving as a veterinary professor in North Dakota, originated a highly successful surgical technique for building a "window" in the bovine paunch, so that he could watch the feed arrive in the stomach, learn how it was handled there and find out how cattle digest different kinds of feeds and convert them into meat and milk for man.

He made his research findings available to other scientists, showed them how to perform the operation, and had a movie made for use in veterinary college instruction, regarding the digestive processes seen through the gastric fistula, as his window is called.

The award, which was cited on an engraved scroll and accompanied by a check for \$1,000, also gave recognition to Schalk's part in the discovery that consuming damaged sweet clover hay produces a hemorrhagic, often fatal cattle disease and that transfusions of specially processed blood bring out a "spectacular recovery." A chemical in the damaged hay, dicoumarin, which causes the bleeding now is being used widely in human and animal surgery to prevent fatal blood clots.

Many Industrial Mishaps Caused by Poor Vision

Preventable eye accidents in American industry cost twenty million dollars in 1948.

Eye accidents occur at the rate of two a minute throughout the working day, and 98 per cent of them could be prevented by adherence to well-established safety rules according to the American Optometric association. Accident compensation claims and time loss are the major elements of the twenty million dollar cost. The association further stated that inefficient vision has been found to be responsible for one-fourth of all accidents in industry.

The elements of good vision for a job were cited as follows:

- Near acuity—ability to focus and see well with both eyes and each eye separately at a distance of about 15 inches. This is the distance at which most factory and office work is done.
- Distant acuity—the same as above for a distance of twenty feet or more. This is necessary to adapt yourself to the environment around you.
- Adequate field of vision—ability to see both sides and up and down, while focusing on a small target. This saves unnecessary eye and head movements and protects your safety.
- Depth perception—ability to judge space relationships. This is important for accuracy in almost any job and essential to safety around dangerous machinery.
- Binocular co-ordination—ability to make the two eyes work well together like a good team of horses. Without this, vision is likely to be inaccurate.

New Grandson

Benjamin Franklin's Income

Following his retirement from active business, Franklin received about 500 pounds a year for 18 years from his partnership with Hall. The office of postmaster of Philadelphia brought him a small salary and he received something a year from his invested savings and 300 pounds as deputy postmaster - general for America. In line with the latter office, he received amounts varying from 100 to 500 pounds a year for office as colonial agent for several states. At the close of his office as deputy postmaster-general, all these agencies and salaries attached to them came to an end. When he returned from England in 1775, he was appointed postmaster-general of the United States at 1,000 pounds a year. For his public services in France he received 500 pounds a year and expenses, the amount being increased to 2,500 pounds a year when his rank was advanced to that of minister.

U.S. Finds Older Workers Offer More to Industry

How does industry's experience with workers 45 and over compare with the younger age groups? The bureau of labor statistics has some interesting answers as a result of a detailed study of the work records of 17,800 employees working in 109 manufacturing plants at a great variety of occupations.

The survey found that workers in the older age group experienced fewer injuries per million man hours worked than those between 20 and 44. Furthermore, workers over 45 were steadier on the job and less likely to be absent as frequently as younger workers. The highest absentee rate was found among teenage employees.

In addition to offering more highly developed skills and more mature judgment, the older worker tends to be more settled in his work and social habits.

The only disadvantage of older workers, it was found, was that once injured their disabilities last longer, reflecting lower recuperative powers. Injured workers between 45 and 59 lost from 16 to 19 days per disability as against 6 1/2 to 9 days for the 20-39 group.

THE HIRED MAN

Check Stored Feeds Often As Precaution Against Mold

Livestock feeders should check their stored feeds frequently, to guard against the danger of poisonous molds.

Certain molds, forming on grain, silage and hay, cause serious and sometimes fatal diseases of all species of livestock.

"Moldy corn can cause a disease very similar to sleeping sickness in horses and a serious genital disease in swine," the American Foundation for Animal Health points out. "One type of fungus can cause limpjaw in cattle. Moldy clover hay may be responsible for sweet-clover disease, which causes the blood of cattle to lose its clotting ability. Ergot poisoning may be a serious problem. One type of pneumonia in poultry and calves is caused by a grain fungus. Several skin diseases of animals are due to fungi."

Naturally, the main precaution is to avoid using moldy feed. If mold poisoning is suspected in livestock, then a veterinary diagnosis should be obtained at once. Symptoms may be similar to those of some contagious infection, and proper treatment will depend on the true cause of trouble.

Handling and Shipping Ore Is Large-Scale Operation

Iron ore is the life blood of the steel industry. Transportation facilities are the arteries through which it flows.

From the mines and pits of the Lake Superior district 32 million gross tons of ore were shipped to blast furnaces plants during the 1938 shipping season. Because the upper lake ports are frozen about four months of the year huge stockpiles must be kept at lower lake ports and the furnaces.

Handling and shipping ore is one of the most complex of all the large scale operations, for the ore from many mines must be gathered and blended into grades which will give best results in smelting.

At open pit mines, such as those on the Mesabi range in Minnesota, the ore is dug with power shovels, and loaded on trucks to be discharged into ore cars for the trip to Duluth, Superior or Two Harbors. There the ore is stored in huge bins to be loaded into ore carriers. Ships of special design carry it to lower lake ports, such as Cleveland, Chicago, Buffalo, Detroit or Ashtabula.

So-Wannee River

Among traditions is one that the river so celebrated in song took its name from So-Wannee, an Indian princess who ruled there that lived in the Oketokee swamp and along the rivers flowing from it. More plausible perhaps is the explanation that the Negroes shunned the Spanish name, San Juanee, meaning little St. John's River of eastern Florida. A local Florida movement, well supported at times, would have divided the state in two at the Suwannee river. Gainesville, east of the river, seat of the state university and college of agriculture, would have become capital of an all-peninsular Florida. Tallahassee would have been capital of a separate state to the west. Nothing has come of the agitation, however.

Human Brucellosis

About 70 per cent of the human Brucellosis disease cases come from swine, and most of the rest from cattle and goats.

Storage of Boxes

When storing or discarding boxes and boards, remove or bend down protruding nails.

Gleit Cure

Vent gleit in chickens is easily recognized by the unpleasant odor of a cheesy-like infection around the vent. Affected birds should be removed from the flock but they are often rejected for market purposes. Such birds may be treated with iodiform. A yellow powder available at most drug stores. The application of a pinch of the iodiform every two or three days may completely cure the infection in a short time, depending upon the severity of the case.


