



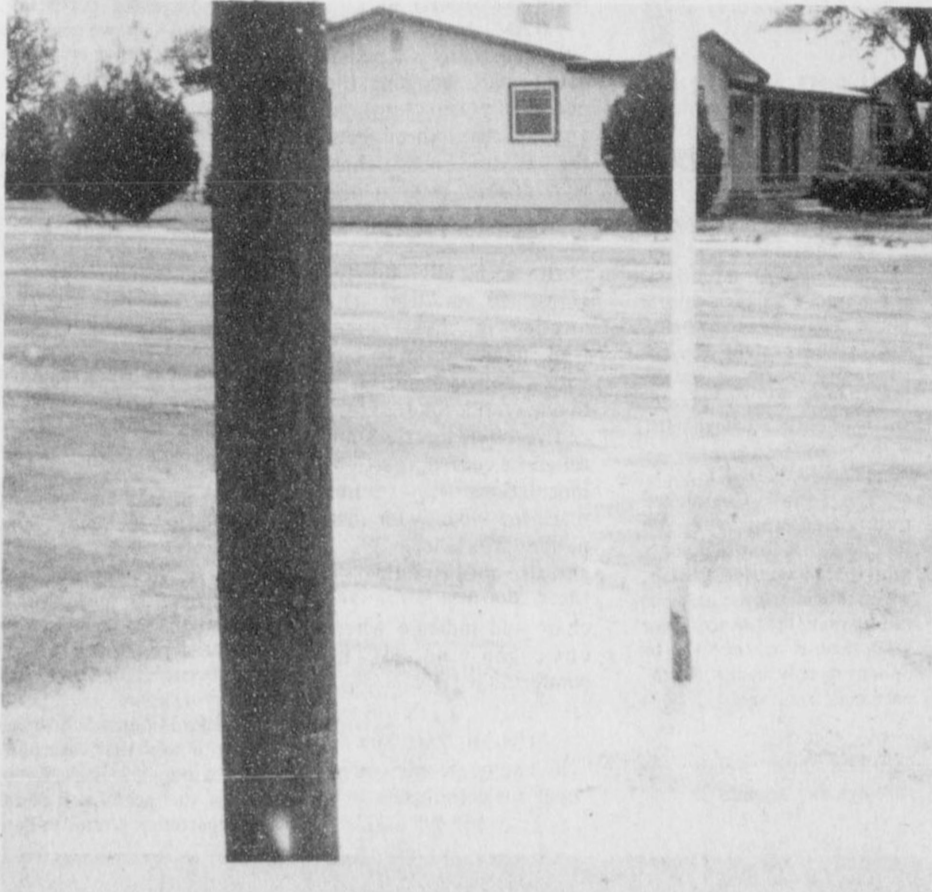

Union Church Marks 60th Anniversary

The Spearman Union Church is observing its sixtieth anniversary Sunday.

The history of the church provides one of the most interesting chapters in the history of Spearman and Hansford County. The present pastor of the church, Steve Rogers and his wife, Debi, invite area residents to review this history via these paragraphs, then join this inspired congregation, Sunday, in observance of the work that has been done in the vineyard that is Spearman and Hansford County to date regardless of church affiliation.

The Spearman Union Church was organized Jan. 13, 1921, as a place for people of all faiths to worship.

Before that, in 1919, Full Gospel ministers began coming to the Texas and Oklahoma Panhandles.

The first were the Morton Sisters.

After the revival, Sunday School was organized. The first business meeting was held, at which time the first board members were elected to start the plans for a building.

They were L.M. Womble, E.A. Greever, J.M. Glover, H.E. Barber and John L. Hays.

At this time, funds were raised and building began Jan. 29, 1921. D.E. Dillow & Sons were hired to build the church. The building was completed May 12, and was ready for a revival scheduled for May 13 with the Morton Sisters and Dr. C.P. Nelson of Detroit, Mich., who arrived May 19 for 10 days.

Crowds were estimated at 1,000 at nightly services. They were from six to seven states.

Mrs. E.A. Greever was in charge of the services until the early 1930's when Susie Dacus began as a co-worker. The women of the church had a Thursday prayer meeting and a workday in Mrs. Dacus' home. They quilted approximately 150 quilts for the needs. She also distributed food and clothing, as they were brought in, to the needy of the town.

In 1939 Paul Bailey became the first pastor of the church. Others since then were Sidney Rees - 1942.

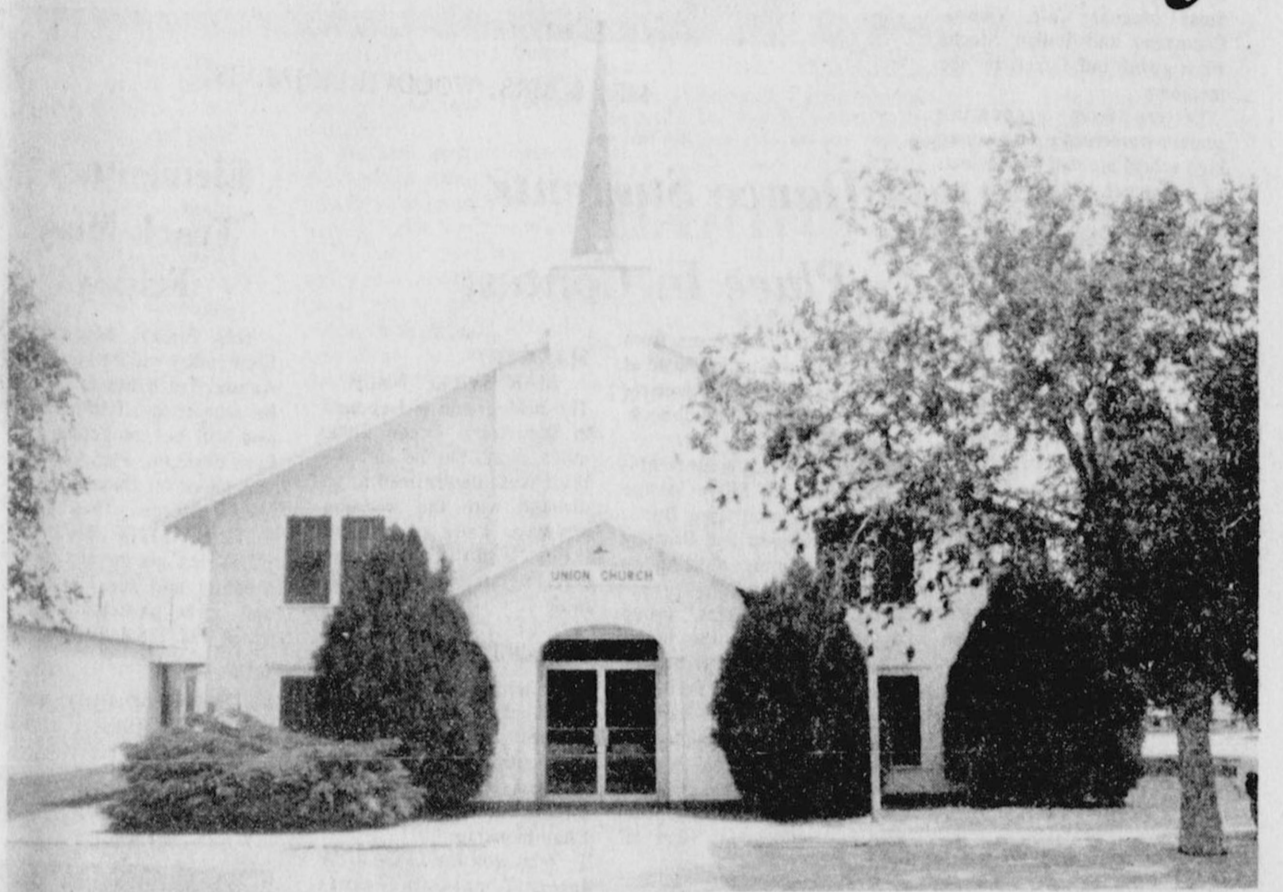
He appointed the first board of directors to take care of operations of the church. The board consisted of Knox Pipkin, Sam Faus, Ralph Fullbright, Will Ella Martin and Belle Crawford.

John Modrick came to pastor in 1944.

During his work a house was purchased and moved to the present location and remodeled for a parsonage.

Leonard Turner came in 1946 and left in early 1947.

Neola Moore came in May to fill in until the church could get

a pastor. She left in the spring of 1948.

Vera Scott came for a few weeks to fill in until a new pastor could be secured.

Albert Durham came in the fall of 1948.

The front of the church was changed and classrooms and restrooms were added. The Durhams left in the early 1950's.

C.R. Dale and family came in the spring of 1950 until the spring of 1953.

Sister Dale helped organize a Women's Missionary program. This is when the annual Thanksgiving dinner was first initiated to raise funds for missionary work. The money from the first dinner was used to purchase an organ for the parish work in Guatemala, Central America.

The ladies decided to continue with the dinners over the years; thus the traditional Union Church Thanksgiving Dinner began. All the ladies look forward to these and really enjoy serving them...As in the

beginning, all the proceeds go towards missionary work.

In July, 1953, Calvin Springer and wife, Doris, came and spent six years as pastor. They left August 21, 1959.

Then, Hap Watkins and family came as pastor. The church bought a new parsonage and had it moved in, selling the old one.

They left in 1960.

Next, Albert Durham and Ava came back as pastor. The annex was added to the church. They left in late 1962 to minister in Alaska.

January, 1963, George Bollinger and family came as pastor. June, 1968, Jerry Crawford came to fill in for three months until the church could get a new pastor.

In August, 1968, Gail Ott and family came. They left for Seattle, Wash. the last of July 1970.

Ray Christenson and family came Aug. 23, 1970. They left the last of June, 1973.

In July, that same year, Archie Burress and family. Plans were made in the early

part of 1976 to build an annex to provide more class rooms and a new kitchen. Work began in June. Besides eight new classrooms and a beautiful large kitchen, there are two fellowship and meeting areas, a family room, three restrooms and much storage space.

There is now adequate space for the Thanksgiving Dinner which was celebrated the 30th year this past November.

Archie Burress put in his

resignation and left July 1, 1980.

Pastor Steve Rogers and Debi moved to Spearman to continue this work Aug. 2, 1980.

We thank God for the rich heritage of this church and God's faithfulness down through the years. We pray that we will continue to be a positive influence in this community for many, many more years to come, is the prayer of pastor and congregation.

Grace Lyon Services Held

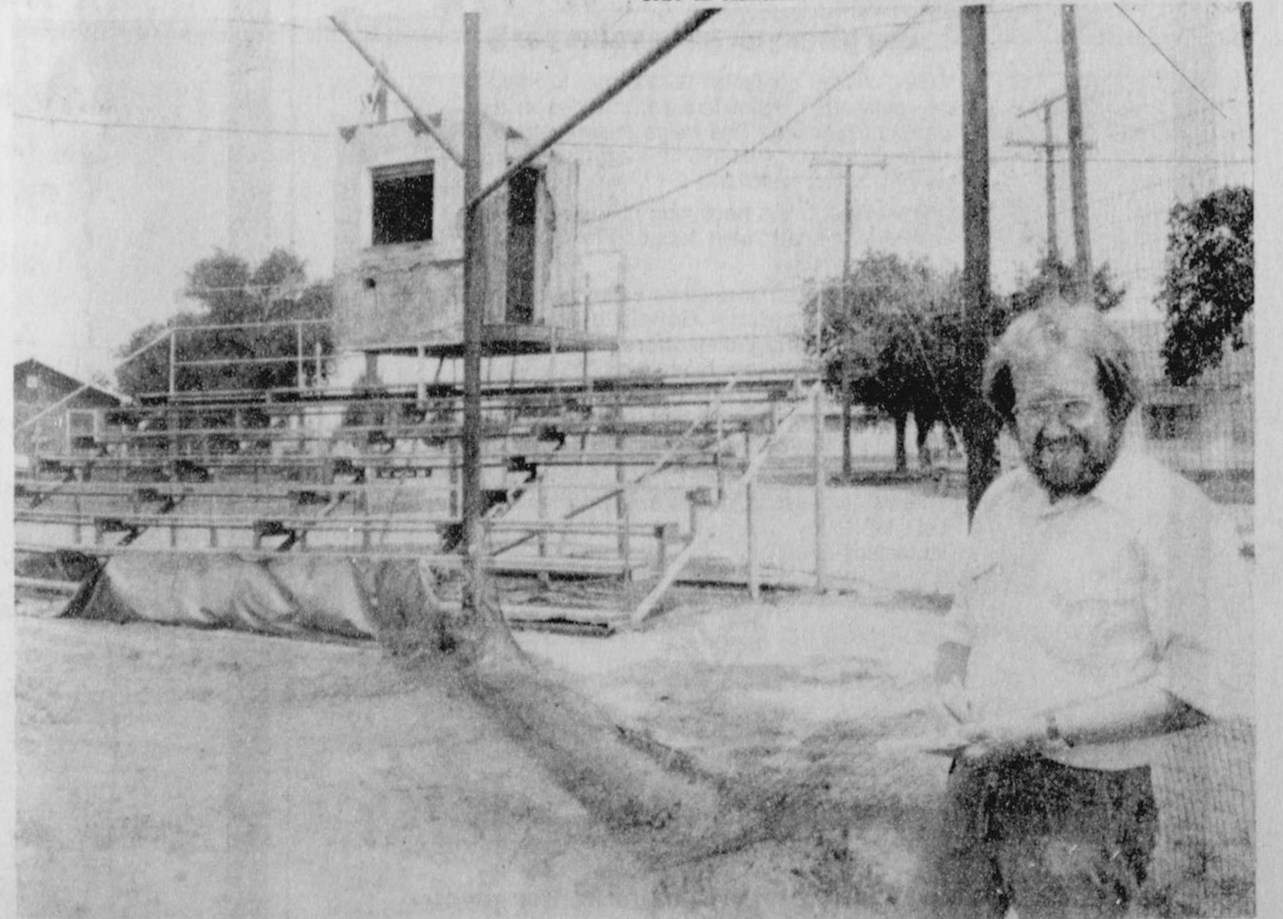
Memorial services for Mrs. Grace Lyon, 82, a pioneer resident of Hansford County, were held at 2 p.m. in First United Methodist Church with the Rev. Frank Oglesby, pastor, and the Rev. Don Wirsdorfer, pastor of First Christian Church, officiating. Burial was in Hansford Cemetery by Boxwell Brothers Funeral Directors of Spearman.

Mrs. Lyon was born in Stephens County and moved to Hansford County in 1902. She married P.A. Lyon in 1920 in Hansford. He died in

1973. She was a member of First United Methodist Church, Twentieth Century Club, Order of the Eastern Star, United Methodist Women and the Arts and Crafts Guild.

She served on the Hansford County Library Board, the Historical Commission and the board of the Station Master Museum in Spearman.

Survivors include a son, P.A. Lyon, Jr. of Spearman, three grandchildren and seven great-grandchildren.

Ceremonies Set To Add Major Cornelius' Name

At 1 p.m., May 30 -- the traditional Memorial Day -- dedication ceremonies will be conducted to add the name of Major Samuel B. Cornelius to the honor roll of area men lost in all the major conflicts in which the United States has engaged beginning with World War I.

At this time all those names inscribed on the memorial stone on the courthouse lawn will be honored once again for the sacrifice they made for the way of life we enjoy.

Major Cornelius, a graduate of Spearman High School and Texas Technological University, received his jet aircraft training at Reese Air Force Base, Golsboro, N.C. where he was attached to 336th Tactical Fighter Wing, Fourth Tactical Squadron flying F-4 Phantom jets.

From this station, Major Cornelius made three tours of duty as commander in Vietnam conflict. On his last tour of duty in Vietnam, he was flying as a forward air controller -- a low level, slow speed decoy work to attract ground fire to identify targets for attack -- when he was lost somewhere in Cambodia, June 15, 1973, at the age of 30.

He is still listed as "missing in action" and in 1978 while in MIA status he was promoted to the rank of major.

He was also honored June 30, 1980, in a ceremony at Arlington National Cemetery. This was attended by the Cornelius and Lusby families of Spearman. Some 60 friends and former Air Force buddies were also present for this occasion.

His wife and two children live in Virginia.

Other names on the Hansford County stone to be joined by that of Major Cornelius, include:

Sullivan R. Spivey, World War I;

C.P. Archer, P.D. Brockus, Charles Castleman, Mikeal Dougherty, Caylor Davis, Clarence Gill, Walter Hart, Felix Pierce, J.A. Russell, Jesse Ralston, Harlon Roper, Leroy Sheets, Gunder Stavlo, Ira Tomlinson, T.J. Utley and Adlee

Wright, World War II.

Many served in the Korean action but there were no casualties among the troops from this area. All returned safely.

There were four casualties in the Viet Nam conflict: Lynn Buzzard, Thomas Gibner, Billy Thomas and Bobby Williams.

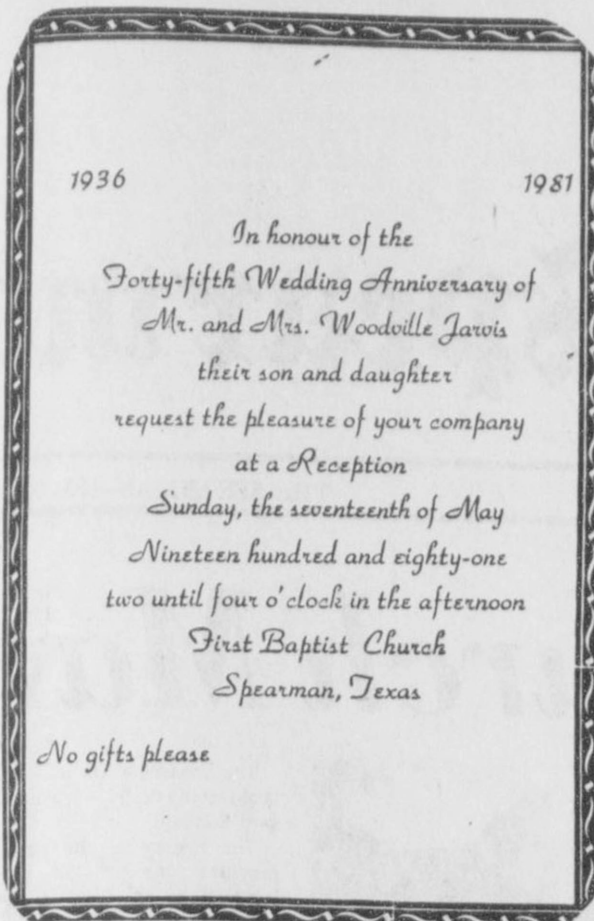

On Pollen

Eight or nine million Americans suffer each spring, summer and fall because of pollen in the air. Hay fever is the common offender, but some suffer asthma or respiratory troubles; at the peak pollen season many become seriously ill.

What might prove helpful to many is a pollen count chart, showing the average pollen level at various cities throughout the country. Such a chart is available free at the offices of many allergy doctors.

It may be advisable for some to change the location of their home. One moving from a city with a pollen count of 50 to one with a count of four or five often finds instant relief. Of course, there are inoculations with serums made individually for each patient after allergy tests, and also antihistamines. If these do not work, the chart will indicate where one can go--to be comfortable.

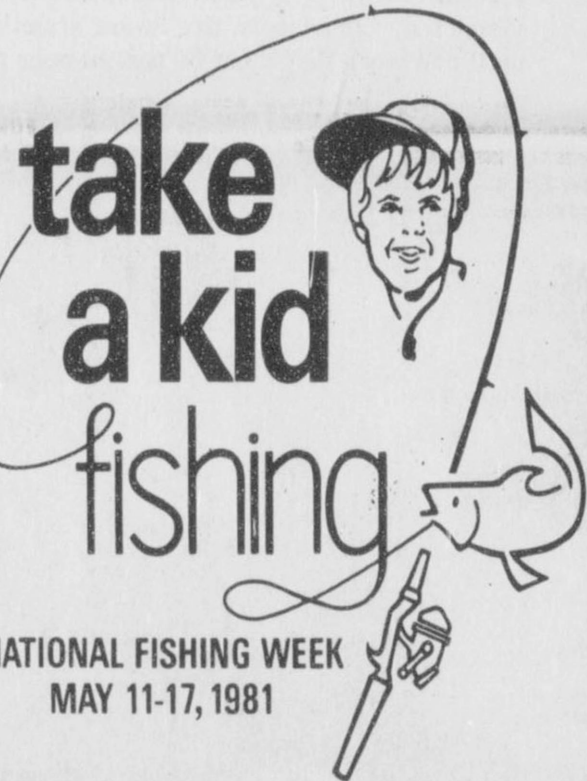

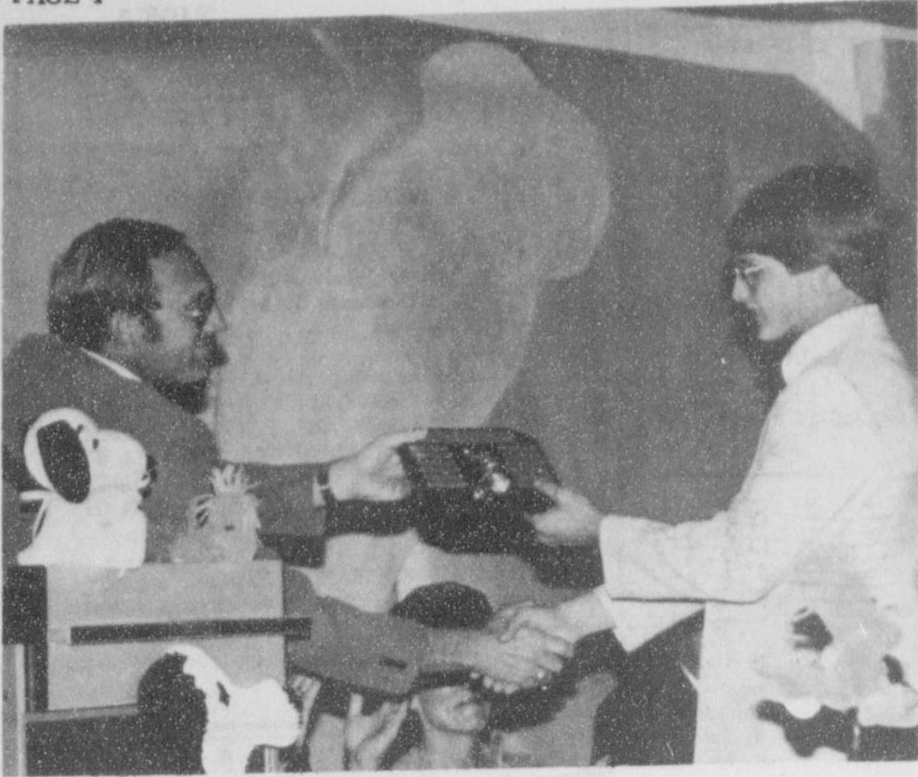

The How and Why of Transplanting

While it's best to seed some vegetables directly in the home garden, others do best if transplanted.

In this area of Texas tomatoes, peppers and eggplant should always be set out in the garden as transplants. The reason for this is the weather. These vegetables are somewhat fickle when it comes to ideal environmental conditions for setting fruit. Bloom and fruit set must occur before temperatures get too high. Setting out transplants after danger of all frost allows these plants to bloom during ideal conditions and to set a bountiful harvest during optimum weather.

You can also transplant such so-called "cool season" crops such as cabbage, cauliflower, broccoli, lettuce and onions. This allows them to mature under ideal conditions and also saves growing time in the garden. Using transplants can lessen the garden growing time by several months or more. However, setting out transplants of crops such as okra, squash, cucumbers and melons offers no real advantage and is usually not a recommended practice.

What about the "how" of transplanting? Handle transplants like eggs! Make every effort to avoid undue stress to young plants. Be sure plants do not suffer from lack of moisture, wind damage or excessive heat prior to and immediately after transplanting.

Most plants that are available locally will be growing in plantable containers such as peat pots or peat cubes. If possible, plan to transplant during late afternoon or at least on a cloudy day. I personally think it's a good idea to set your transplants in a bucket or pan of water for several minutes prior to planting so the root system is thoroughly wet.

Determine the proper spacing for the crop and dig a hole 4 inches wide and 4 to 6 inches deep. Put about a cupful of water directly in the hole and allow it to soak in. Set the transplant in the center of the hole and fill in with soil. Make certain the peat container is completely beneath the soil level as it may act like a wick and rapidly dry out the rootball, thus killing the plant.

Depth of planting is important and often beginners make the mistake of setting plants too deep in the soil. Set most transplants only slightly deeper than they were originally growing. If tomato plants are tall and "leggy", plant them as shown in the accompanying drawing. If plant roots are set too deep below the soil level, especially in heavy soils, they will be slow to grow and the plant will have to produce roots along the stem near the surface. The original roots may, or may not, grow eventually. Either way, the advantages of transplanting are lost and harvest may be delayed greatly.

When filling the hole with soil at planting, leaving a slight depression around the plant to hold additional water from spot watering or from rainfall. Also protect young plants for a week or so from high wind and excessive heat. This can be done easily by placing a shingle, board, milk carton or some similar protection on the windy or sunny side of the plant. A can placed around the transplant when it is set in the garden will also prevent damage from pesky cutworms.

So much for the art of transplanting. Next I'll go into greater detail on how to grow tomatoes like you've never grown them before.

Public TV, Radio

The Reagan Administration approach to budget-cutting and spending cuts deserves the support of the taxpayer and Congress, in the national interest. After saying that, it's also fair to say that cuts in government support for public television and public radio are not in the national interest.

These two programs are miniscule. In Washington, where billions are tossed around rather lightly, federal support for public TV and radio is limited to the millions, \$21 million for radio and several times that for TV.

This outlay is very much in the educational and cultural interest of the people of the country. On many nights, the only really worthwhile programming on television is found on the Public Broadcasting Service. If England, with its conservative government, still cherishes its BBC, which is far more dominant there than PBS here, that is an indication of the value conservatives there attach to a public service broadcasting system.

Public radio reaches an audience of which many cannot receive public television. It, like public TV, offers programs the commercial networks would never offer. Like public TV again, public radio is designed to be a service for the benefit of the people, not for the profit of stockholders and sponsors, a goal which sometimes is harmful to the public interest.

Some misguided conservatives argue that public TV and radio are the road to excessive socialism. And it is true that news and analytical programming have sometimes tended to be leftwing in recent years—since the vast majority of working newsmen are liberals.

But, unlike England, where public TV dominates, and commercial TV was allowed to compete only in recent years, the U.S. turned over the nation's airwaves almost totally to private interests after World War II.

The nation has enjoyed a modest public broadcasting service in recent years and the federal expenditure is relatively very small. Commercial TV is not threatened and is immensely profitable. Congress, therefore, should reject the proposal to cut this vitally important public-service outlay.

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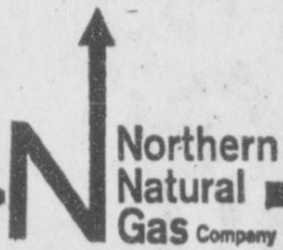

Good News about Nursing Homes

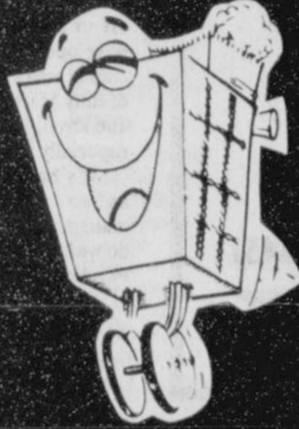

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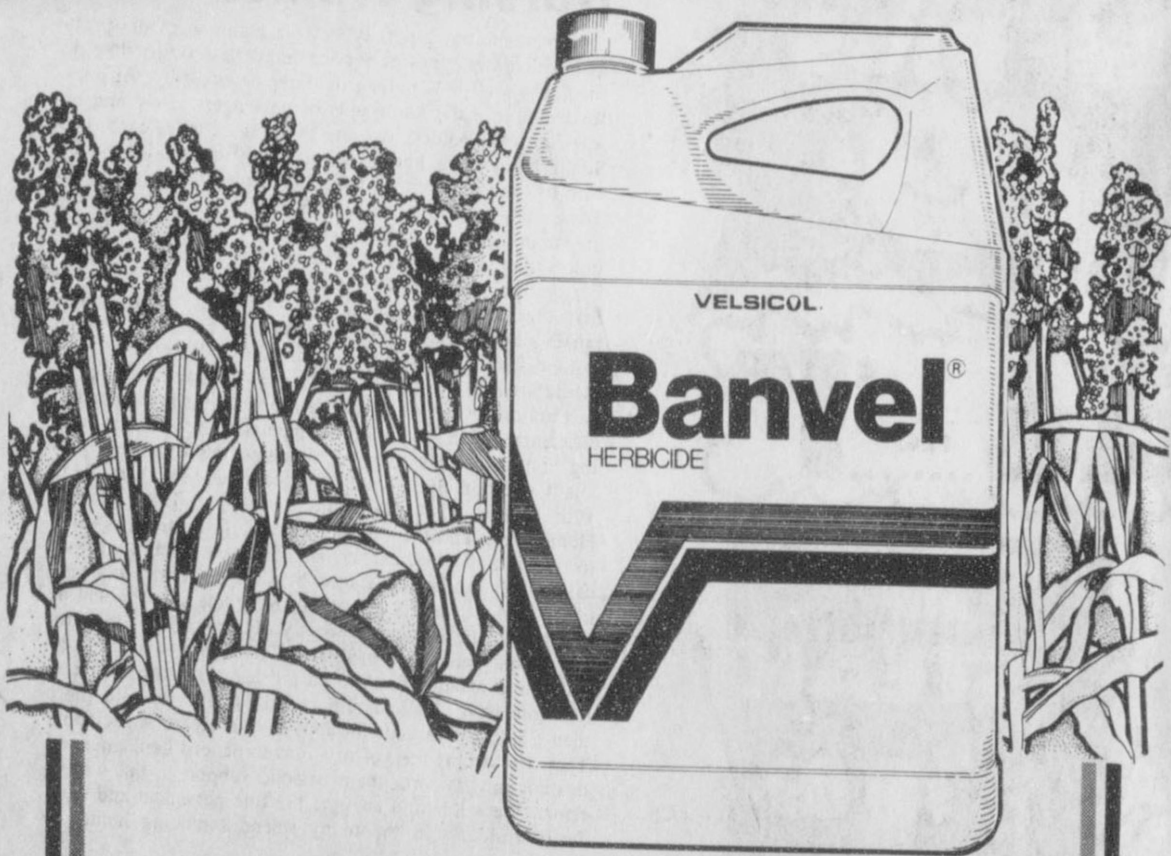

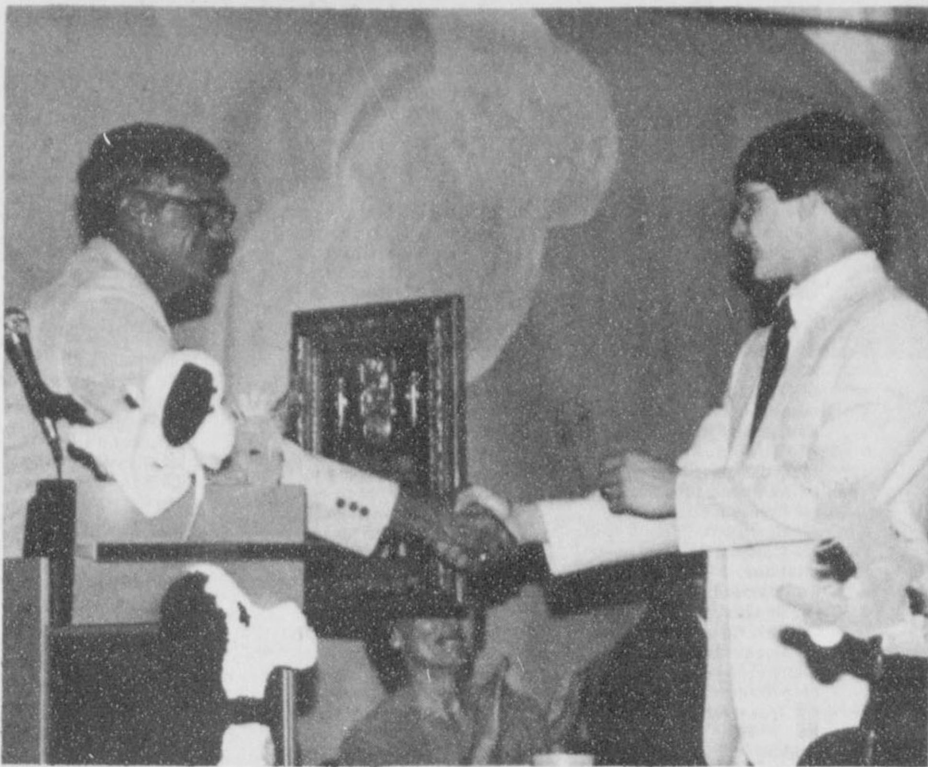

Best Tomatoes Ever

To many of us, gardening simply means growing tomatoes. A few tomato plants in the backyard garden can be a fascinating and rewarding adventure or they can be a disaster. Sickly tomato plants which produce few, if any fruit, certainly do not help the gardening spirit. Some simple advice might help those growing tomatoes for the first time and perhaps even increase yields and satisfaction for you experienced gardeners.

First, you should not attempt to grow tomatoes unless they can be placed in an area that receives sunlight at least six hours a day. They will grow with less light but simply will not produce much of a crop if placed between tall shrubs, beneath trees or between buildings.

Secondly, soil that has been well prepared and properly fertilized is essential for good growth and high yields. Poor soils can be improved with liberal amounts of organic matter and proper fertilization. A dark, heavy clay or even a fine sand can be improved by working 3 to 4 inches of organic matter and a small amount of fertilizer such as 10-20-10 or 12-24-12 into the area where your tomatoes are to be planted.

Transplanting guidelines discussed earlier certainly apply for tomatoes. Something that you should do is use a starter solution when planting tomatoes to insure adequate fertility during early stages of growth. Starter solutions can be purchased at local garden centers or they can be made at home by

mixing one or two level tablespoonfuls of a complete fertilizer in a gallon of water. Pour about a cup or so of the starter solution into the transplant hole prior to planting.

For best results set transplants in your garden on cloudy days or late in the afternoon. Space plants at least 3 feet apart in the row and 3 to 4 feet apart between rows. Protect plants from adverse conditions such as high wind and excessive heat for a week or so after transplanting.

Stake, trellis or cage all tomato varieties for best results. I highly recommend using cages to support plants. Cages are nothing more than cylinders of concrete reinforcing wire, hog wire or similar material used to support plants and keep

fruit off the ground. Make the cylinders 18 to 20 inches in diameter and from 2 1/2 to 5 feet tall. Concrete reinforcing wire is readily available and is generally considered best for tomato cages. It usually comes in 5-foot widths, and a 5/8-foot length will make a tomato cage about 18 inches in diameter. The cage can be held together by bending or crimping the wire ends around one of the vertical wires.

Place cages over plants shortly after transplanting. One plant per cage is recommended. To provide support, cut off the bottom ring of the cage so the ends can be pushed into the ground. You may want to support cages with wooden or metal stakes to keep them from falling over later in the season. The great thing about caging is that plants are allowed to grow naturally within cages. No pruning or suckering of plants is necessary.

Another advantage of cages is that they can be used to protect plants from cold temperatures or high winds. If the weather looks bad, take a plastic trashbag and put it over the cage. For a greenhouse effect, use a light-colored bag. The top of the bag can be closed in case of a late cold snap. When good weather occurs, remove the bag.

You might also try using the "pot method" of fertilizing your tomatoes. Bury a planting pot, coffee can or similar container between each plant.

Make sure the lip of the pot or container is above ground and that it will drain well. This may mean punching holes in the bottom or side of the container. As soon as you can find the first small tomatoes, apply one level tablespoonful of garden fertilizer in each container and fill it with water. Allow the water to drain and fill with water again. Apply fertilizer about once every 7-10 days. This will supply the plant with sufficient fertility to maintain good fruit size and high yields throughout the harvest season. Since this is

a method of fertilizing tomatoes and hot watering them, you still need to water as required during the season.

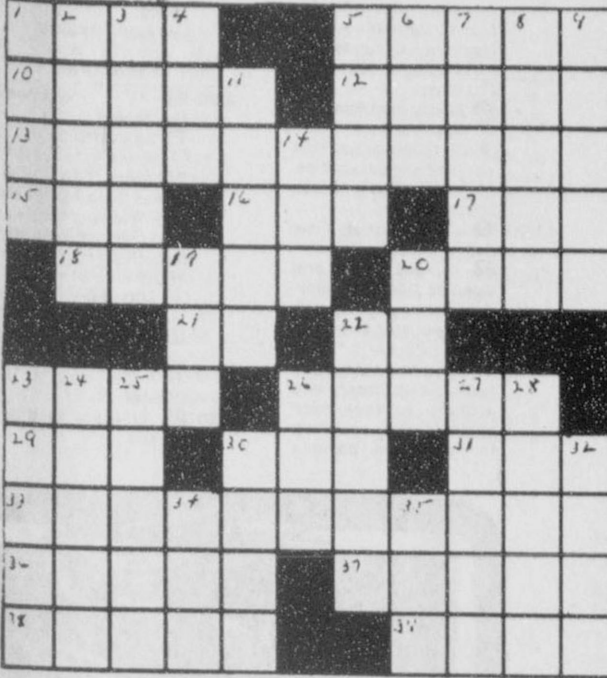
This method of growing tomatoes also works well for peppers and eggplants. It may sound like a lot of trouble, but I suggest you give it a try this spring. You may grow tomatoes like you've never grown them before.

Next time I'll talk about an ever-occurring problem--weeds--and what to do about them.

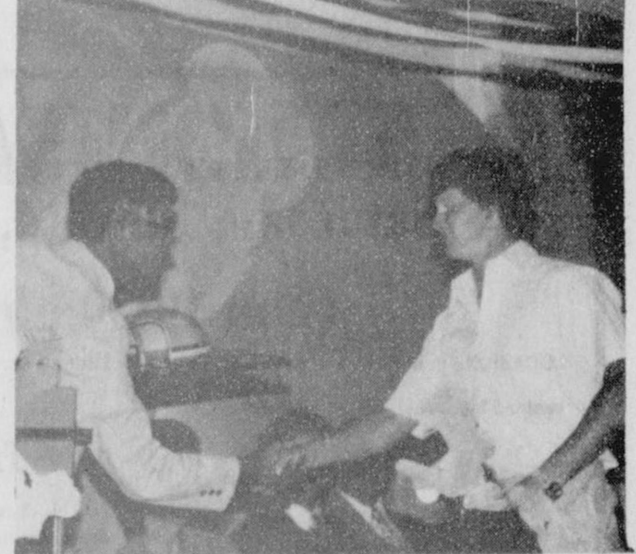

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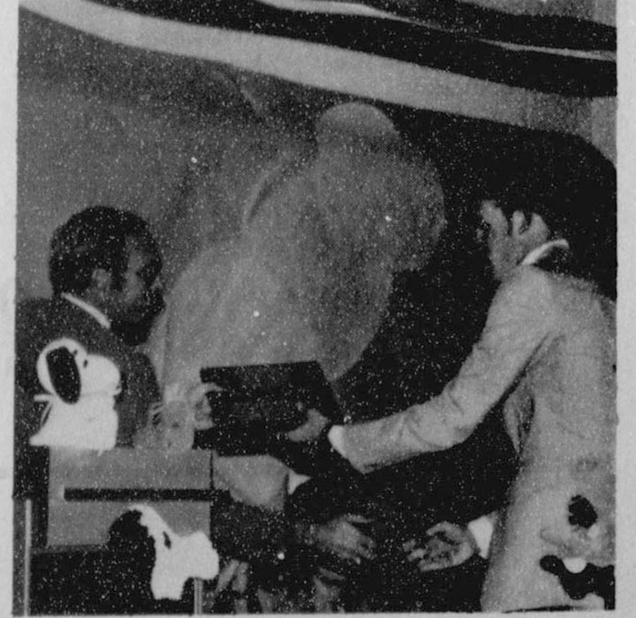

"Neat, attractive mailboxes add to the overall appearance of our community and aid in the delivery of mail," the Postmaster said.

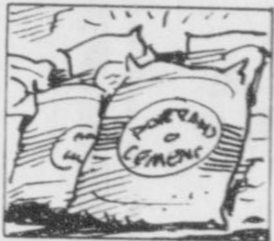
Boxes should be within easy reach for letter carriers. On

rural routes, the carrier must have access to the box without leaving his vehicle. Mailboxes on rural and contract routes must be located on the right side of the road in the direction traveled by the carrier, the Postmaster said.

"Rain or snow leaking into the mailbox could ruin the special letter; so box seams should be tight to prevent the loss or damage of mail placed in the box," he said.

Box numbers and house numbers should be clearly visible on the box, but including the owner's name is optional.

All mailboxes, must meet certain requirements for size, strength, safety and location. These guidelines are available from the local post office. Postmaster Robertson said.

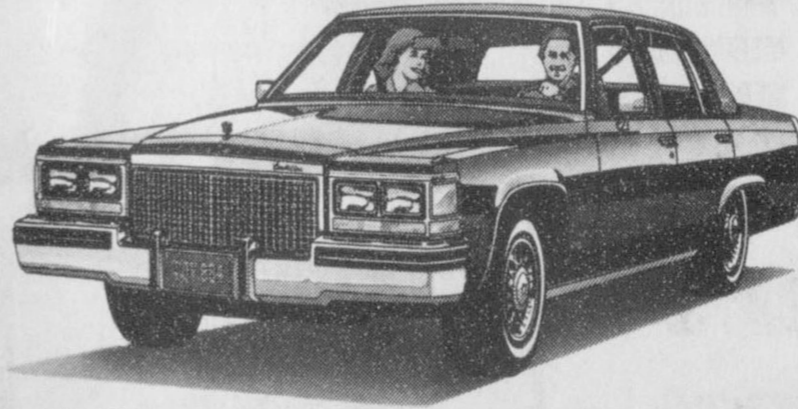

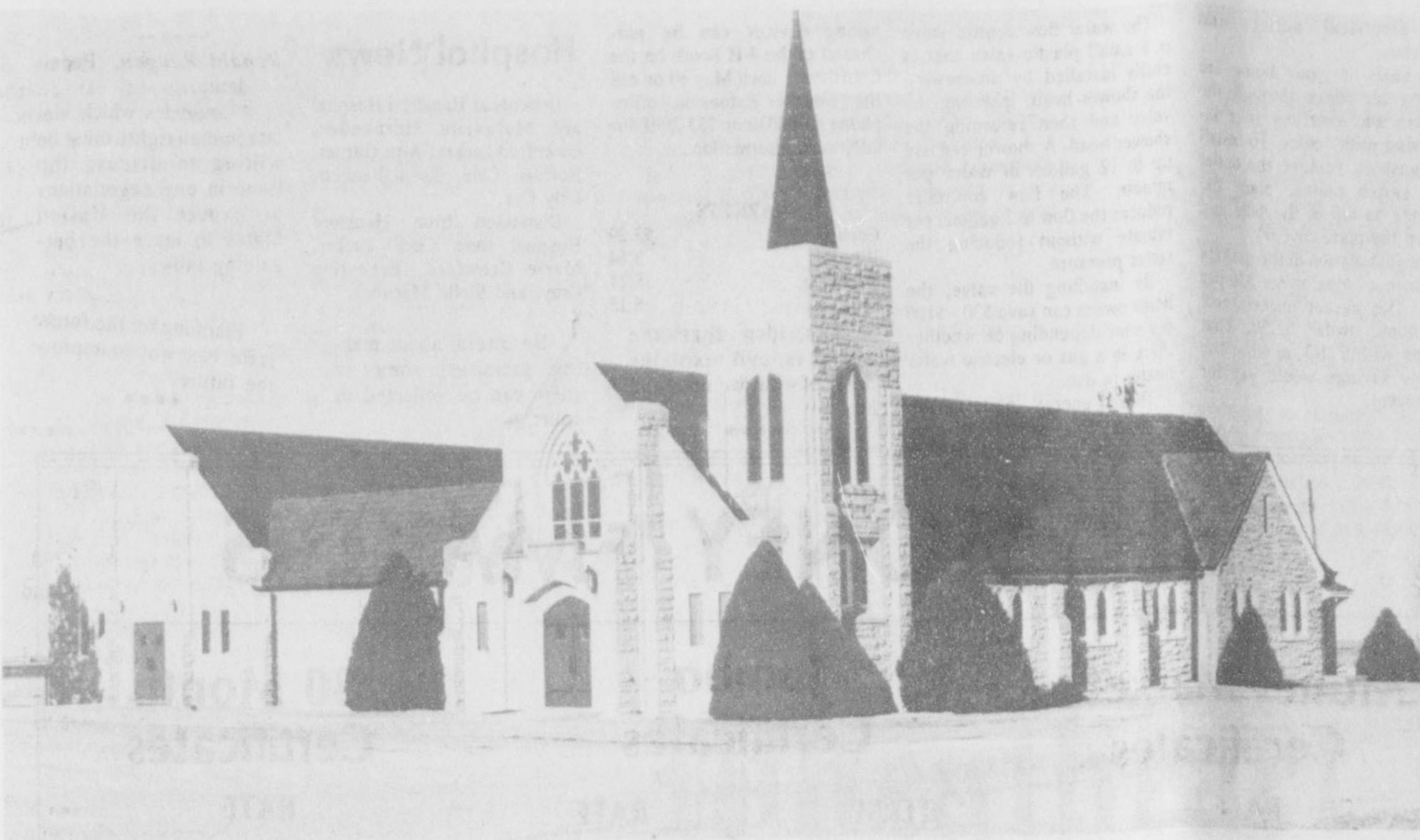

The "Oslo Posten", and organized an annual Norwegian Independence Day Celebration, "Syttende Mai" (May 17), which attracted crowds from surrounding towns in Oklahoma and Texas.

Community worship services were first conducted at the Oslo schoolhouse in 1909 by the Rev. Christian Heltne. Officially organized the following year, the Oslo Lutheran Church became the center of the farming settlement.

Mordt's land sales ended in 1913 as a result of a severe drought. When the Denver and Gulf Railroad decided to bypass the area, the townsite of Oslo (2.5 mi.s) declined. Although many settlers moved away, more than thirty families remained.

Today the Oslo Lutheran Church serves as a reminder of the area's Norwegian Heritage.

A historical marker will be dedicated at the Oslo Lutheran Church, Hansford County, Texas on May 17, 1981 at 2:30 p.m. This marker will be dedicated to the memory of the early pioneers who settled this community. Several families came

and established homes in the spring of 1909. Each year brought more families to the community. Everything went well until 1913 when there was no rain for thirteen months. During this period of drought many of the settlers moved away with reports less opti-

mistic than the advertisements from the Mordt Land Company who had promoted the sale of the land.

Through the years many have come and gone, but a good number of the earliest settlers and many more who came later became permanent residents and their descendants are the prominent leaders in the community today.

From 1924 to 1930 most of the farmers changed their farming operations from the use of horses to tractors. This released much of the pasture land that was necessary to feed the

On this May 17 Sunday School will be held at 9:45 with regular worship services at 11:00 a.m. The Dedication Service will begin at 2:30 p.m. with Jon Olsen ringing the church bell once for each year the church has been in existence. The American flag will be raised by John Dahl and Burton Olsen. "The Star Spangled Banner" will be played by Marvin Hill of Amarillo. The

Norwegian flag will be raised by Henry Moen and Mike Stedje. Ja, Vi Elsker Detter Landet ("Yes, We Love This Country") will be led by the choir from Good Shepherd Lutheran

Church, Liberal, Kansas. The invocation will be led by Pastor Joseph Podolak. A welcome will be extended by Elmo Dahl, president of the church. The speaker for the dedication will be Dr. Peter L. Peterson of West Texas State University, Canyon, Texas. Much of the research that made this dedication possible and much of the local interest is due to the work of Dr. Peterson. Dedication and unveiling of the Norwegian

Society of Texas. Special guests will be recognized by John Mark Stavlo. Jim Johnson will be Master of Ceremonies. Norwegian Folk Dances will be led by members of the Amarillo chapter of the Norwegian Society of Texas.

4-H Energy Conservation Campaign

4-H'ers from Hansford County 4-H Clubs will sponsor an Energy Conservation Campaign beginning May 30 at HANSFORD CELEBRATION. They

will be distributing free energy conservation literature. They will also offer a packet of electrical outlet and switch insulators for sale. With each

packet purchased a free shower flow control valve will be given. The outlet and switch insulating gaskets offered for sale are used to cover holes cut in walls

for electrical outlets and switches.

If seals in your home are faulty, air leaks through the outlets and switches thus increasing utility costs. To install the gaskets, remove the outlet and switch plates, place the gaskets on top of the hole and return the plate covers.

The installation of the gaskets can save a home owner \$20 per year. The gasket packets cost the home owner \$2.50. That means within 1-3 months the energy savings would pay for the packet.

The water flow control valve is a small plastic valve that is easily installed by unscrewing the shower head, inserting the valve and then returning the shower head. A shower can use up to 12 gallons of water per minute. The flow controller reduces the flow to 3 gallons per minute without reducing the water pressure.

By installing the valve, the home owner can save \$30 - \$100 per year depending on whether there is a gas or electric water heater in use. These energy and money

saving devices can be purchased at the 4-H Booth on the Courthouse lawn May 30 or call the County Extension office phone 659-2030 or 733-2901 for additional information.

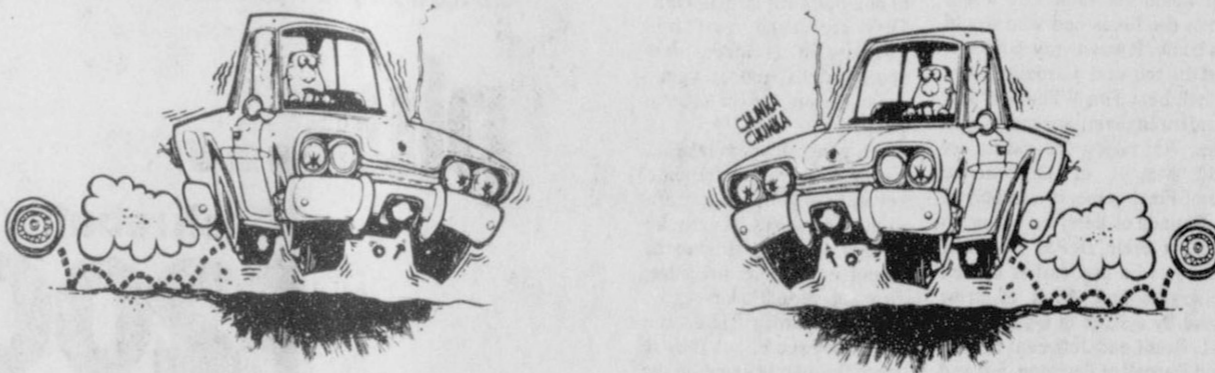

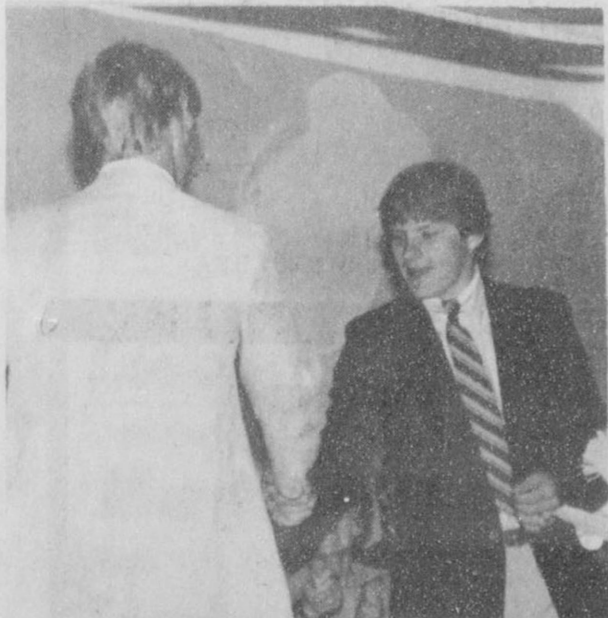

Doctor Talk

Warts are a common condition of the skin. They occur as contagious benign tumors and vary from one sixteenth to one half inch in diameter. They are found most frequently in children and young adults--and are generally uncommon in elderly people.

In general, warts take on varied shapes and fall into several categories. There are common warts (verrucae vulgaris), rough surfaced, round or oval or irregular, firm, of varied colors--gray, yellow or brown. They can occur anywhere, but they're more frequently found on the fingers, hand, elbows, knees, face, and scalp--or places mostly subject to trauma.

Interestingly, one type of common wart is located anywhere on the bottom of the foot--or plantar surface. Naturally, we call this type a plantar wart. It's very pesky and difficult to eradicate, because it's so deeply imbedded into the sole of the foot by constant walking or standing pressure. People who've experienced plantar warts can tell you how painful they can be!

The head and neck area seems to be the place where varied types of warts occur. Filiform (long and narrow) warts are found on the eyelids, face, neck or lips. Flat warts occur in youths--most often on the face. "Cauliflower" warts occur most frequently on the head, neck, scalp, and bearded area.

There are also venereal warts. We'll talk about them later.

The cure for warts is removal. Recurrence is as high as 30%. They may be surgically cut off, frozen with three or four key leaders and organizers of the conservative Democrat Caucus in the lower body of detsicated (burned off under local anesthesia).

Daylight Time A Fuel Saver

An Englishman named William Willett is credited with the plan to juggle the clocks. In a 1907 pamphlet called *The Waste of Daylight* he proposed that clocks be advanced 80 minutes each summer.

It also cut down the electric light bill. In World War I, Germany and England adopted daylight-saving systems to increase production at war plants and to save fuel. The United States initiated a seven-month-a-year daylight-saving plan in March 1918.

Protests led by farmers brought about repeal of the law in 1919. Farmers said daylight saving threw their dairy cows off schedule.

Were daylight-saving time observed in this country in March and April in addition to May through October--just two more months--we would reduce the demand for electricity in this country during those two months by the energy equivalent of 100,000 barrels of oil a day.

If a state doesn't want daylight saving it can vote itself exempt. Hawaii, Arizona, and the Eastern time zone counties of Indiana run on standard time year-round.

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Helium Production Is Possible Here

"Helium production could be possible for Hansford County, given enough yield of natural gas and a facility to extract helium from it."

These were the words this past week of a qualified engineer who was only here to visit relatives in the area and was discussing its energy possibilities informally. He did not want to be identified for obvious reasons:

"Can't you just hear the distortions of what I just said by the time it has covered the county--and can you imagine what my company (a major energy producer) would say to my spreading such a rumor?"

Based on the understanding that helium production in Hansford County is just a hypothesis right now, he continued:

"This area is located in the center of the area producing 95 percent of world's supply of helium outside the USSR. (There is no competent information on Russia's helium supply or volume production.) There is the original U.S. source near Amarillo, the bureau's facilities at the Exell plant in south Moore County and its plant at Keyes, Okla."

"Natural gas produced in this area should be rich in helium and the Bureau of Mines' Exell plant quit extracting helium from natural gas about 1972 and turned private enterprise loose on that source of production. That would be the type of helium production that could be undertaken here."

At this point, the speaker emphasized again this was a hypothesis.

"Actual production by extraction might not be feasible at all. It would require a study."

There is a market for helium and it could become very active and very devaluing now that NASA is back in the world space race with its recent shuttle flight. NASA, at present, is the biggest customer for helium. It is used to move rocket fuel-hydrogen and liquid oxygen--from fuel tanks to the rocket engines in much the same manner spray can propellant delivers the can's contents.

Other uses are for welding and deep sea diving--all a far cry from the original and at that time, the only use of helium: as a bouyant for dirigibles. However, a considerable amount is now being used in the burgeoning hobby of ballooning.

Hard on the heels of this exchange of speculations came the announcement at Amarillo by the helium operations manager for the U.S. Bureau of Mines that the Keyes, Okla. facility will be phased out. For a two-year period a skeleton crew "of about a dozen workers" will keep the Keyes facility on a standby basis. "About the same number" will be sent to the Exell plant.

The remainder will transfer elsewhere in the U.S. Bureau of Mines cope of operations or retire.

This will reduce to two the federally owned and operated helium sources in the U.S. but it is believed it will be sufficient what with a \$3.2-million expansion of the Exell plant by 25 percent and any private enterprise extraction undertaken in the future.

This plant deals only with the processing of pure helium now and is able to purify and liquify some 200-million cubic feet of the pure product annually.

Meanwhile, research goes on because it is believed present day processing and use of helium have only touched the fringes of what is known about it and what its total capabilities are.

May Memories

Remembering seems to be a heartstring of May. Practically all states remember their fallen soldiers this month--most of them on the last Monday, this year the 25th. Virginia remembers that day as Confederate Memorial Day (the Carolinas observe May 10). And a few states observe the 30th, or another day.

North Carolinians observe the 20th as Mecklenburg Day--the anniversary of a declaration of independence in Charlotte in 1775. In Massachusetts and across the nation, intellectuals observe Ralph Waldo Emerson's birth anniversary--the 25th (Boston, 1803). Perhaps the most nostalgic non-military day for Americans is the 21st.

On that day in 1927, Charles Lindbergh flew from New York to Paris in a single engine plane, spanning the Atlantic alone. He took off on the 20th and landed in Paris on the 21st. Not only did he win a prize of \$25,000 for that feat, but he won immortality.

The young American pilot lives on today in the memories of millions--and his aircraft, "The Spirit of St. Louis," can be seen in Washington's Smithsonian Museum.

Americans remember the 29th as the birthday of John F. Kennedy, the handsome young president assassinated in Dallas in 1963. Kennedy's death was especially tragic because the young president had not accomplished his goals, and in fact, had often erred painfully.

Right On

The evidence is clear--that raising the legal drinking age tends to save lives on the highway. In Michigan, automobile accidents among teens dropped 18 percent in 1979. In Massachusetts fatal accidents among teens declined even more in the last two years.

Both states recently raised the legal drinking age--as have a dozen other states in recent years. In only the last year Florida, Georgia, New Jersey and Rhode Island have done so. Virginia has restricted beer sales to 18-year-olds.

It would help further if the federal government required all brewers to clearly state the alcohol content of beer bottles and cans, including especially those containing malt liquor, on containers. What could be the harm in this?

Such information would not hinder sales; rather it would show the unknowing that they are drinking, and how much of the drug, alcohol, they are taking into their system.
