Revenue Sharing Hearings Held

At their regular meeting, Monday, members of the Hansford County commissioners court conducted hearings on requests for revenue sharing funds, purchased law books and viewed county business from grass to light bulbs.

Last year at this time there were a number of local organizations placed re-

quests before the court for operating funds from revenue sharing. This year there were only three-two of them that had participated before and the YMCA which had not. Revenue sharing funds involved will be the 1982 allocation.

Commissioners were pleased that requests were so few because they felt that

with the ever-present shadow of the loss of revenue sharing funds entirely and increasing needs of the county, they might have to lean heavily on this source of finance for county operation.

The court approved purchase of a set of law books on Texas Jurisprudence for District Judge J.E. Blackburn. Commissioners also ap-

proved the annual report of Tax Assessor-Collector Helen Dry and the payment of bills for the month.

The remainder of the court session was devoted to various matters requiring attention from lawn problems to some sections of sidewalk with "reverse" drainage when-it rains.

Next session of the court will be April 27.

Baptist laymen from Spearman and Gruver will be high in the mining country of Bolivia this time next week with a bird's eye view of much of South America sharing their spiritual faith with the people of the city of Llallagua (Yuh-YAH-gwuh), Bolivia.

Jim Fowler, Joe Garcia and Romeo Reyes will be a part of International Crusades, headquartered at Dallas, working with the congregation of La Iglesia Evangelica Bautista, a church that has been in existence 58 years.

The city of Llallagua lies 12,000 feet above sea level. Its principle economy is mining although there is diversification enough to draw citizens from the broad spectrum of people

that comprise the nationals of Bolivia.

It was also one of the earliest cities in that nation and on the South American continent to have large numbers of its population embrace evangelical faith on a predominantly Catholic-oriented continent.

Don Carlos Garcia Acero, mayor of Llallagua, forwarded a ceremonial key to the city to Spearman Mayor Ralph Blodgett, who, in turn, presented it to Fowler in ceremonies, Tuesday.

Mayor Blodgett also presented Fowler with an honorary letter of introduction to Mayor Garcia Acero and the city he administers.

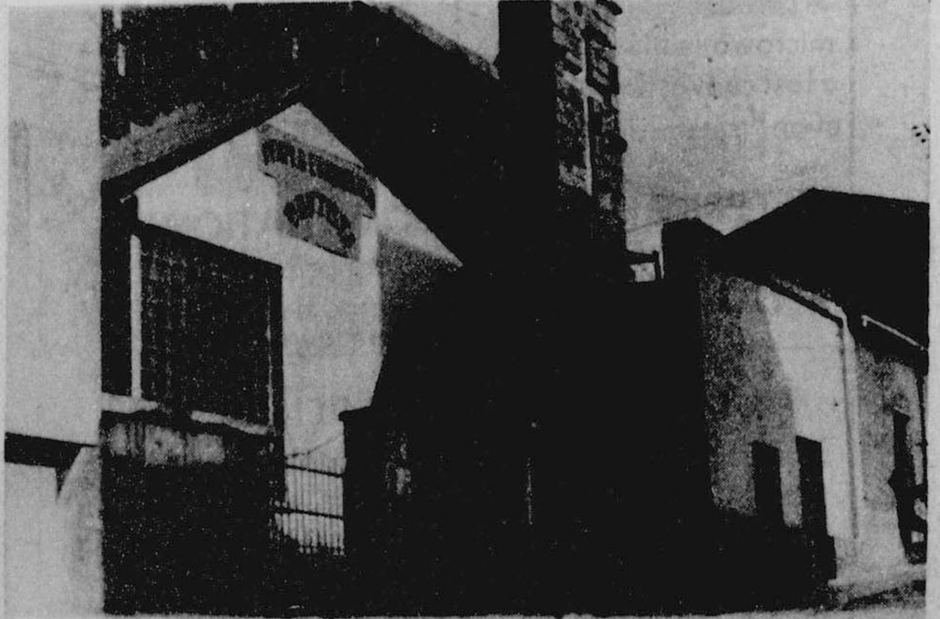
The Spearman-Gruver trio will participate in a mission

April Days

The last half of April contains anniversaries which should be recalled by all Americans. What might have been the most disastrous fire in the history of the nation began on the 18th in 1906, in San Francisco, following an earthquake. On the 19th in 1775, the battles of Lexington and Concord (about which Emerson wrote the shot was heard 'round the world) were fought.

The Battle of San Jacinto, which forced Mexico to recognize the independence of Texas, was fought and won on the 21st in 1836. Arbor Day is celebrated in Nebraska on the 22nd as is the opening of unassigned lands on the 22nd in 1889, in Oklahoma.

April 23 is the birthday anniversary of the fifteenth president of the nation, James Buchanan, born at Mercersburg, Pennsylvania, in 1791. As the last president before the outbreak of the Civil War he believed the federal government had no constitutional right to use military force to keep states from seceding but was prepared to defend federal property against attacks.

On the 24th in 1814, British troops attacked, captured and burned Washington. The 24th is remembered in Mississippi as Confederate Memorial Day.

General U.S. Grant, 18th president of the nation and the commanding general of U.S. forces which won the decisive battles of the Civil War, was born at Point Pleasant, Ohio, on the 27th in 1822. The 28th is the anniversary of the birth of the nation's fifth president, James Monroe, in Westmoreland County, Virginia, in 1758. Monroe negotiated the purchase of the Louisiana territory from France, was so popular as president he received every electoral vote but one in reelection to a second term.

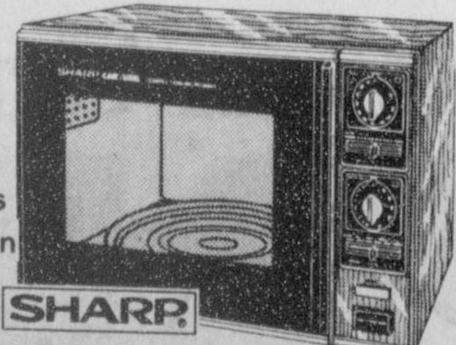

About Leeks

In Europe good cooks have long depended on leeks. In America, with some exceptions, the leek is seldom grown. And for those who care (perhaps too much) about gastronomic delights, this is a major American failing.

The leek, very much like the onion, doesn't grow into a bulb at bottom and is cut when a tender white stalk. It is sweeter, and some feel, superior to the onion. Be that as it may, there's no reason why more leeks should not be grown in this country.

Leeks can be planted from seed, an advantage over the onion, and should be thinned or transplanted later. The seed can be obtained by allowing a few of the original plants to grow into a second year. The stalks then flower--providing ample seed.

About Ashes

As gardening time approaches, and the cold weather begins to ebb, it's time to think about what to do with those ashes from burning wood—and many more Americans are burning wood these days.

Peter Tonge, writing in the *Christian Science Monitor*, reminds us that ash is a good fertilizer, usually containing phosphorus, potassium, calcium, magnesium and sulfur.

For that reason, if one keeps fireplace or woodstove ashes throughout the winter, he need buy less fertilizer. Though nitrogen may be needed (and perhaps a bit more phosphorus), the ashes will often provide all the other nutrients needed to make a good garden.

Wood ashes are about two-thirds as effective as limestone, in acid soils, since they are very alkaline. A good home-made fertilizer can be made from ashes, blood meal, bone meal and leaf mold—in a ratio of 3, 1, 2 and 4 parts respectively. This is the same as 5-10-5 fertilizer.

Since a cord of burned wood produces only about sixty pounds of ashes, one must burn much wood to accumulate a sizeable ash collection. But then there are those who would gladly part with ashes, if someone were willing to haul them away!

About Handguns

An emotional campaign has been in progress for years to curb the sale of handguns and have those in existence registered. It is said that the sale of Saturday night specials, especially, makes crime too easy.

Certainly so long as the television networks glamorize crime on commercial television, and violence of all kinds, it should not be made easy for anyone to walk to the nearest corner and buy a cheap handgun—perhaps while under the influence of alcohol or other drugs.

But it should also be recognized that any criminal who plans a crime will be able to obtain a weapon. What can be done is to make the purchase of Saturday night specials slower process, and this will discourage some spontaneous crime.

But the main remedy for excessive violence in the United States is not the control or registration of handguns—which has been available to Americans for generations—when the crime rate was relatively low. The main problem is in the educational and entertainment process in U.S. society. We have a cowboy and Indian heritage. We have too long glamorized gunplay and the use of firearms, and killing, in films and on television.

The young and impressionable are thus "brainwashed" into the world of violence by what they see on the screen and read and hear as they grow up. Reorienting our thinking and social and cultural values is the answer to rising crime, plus tough, mandatory punishment for anyone using a gun in the commission of a crime. The fact that citizens are free to own guns, as Americans always have been, is not the crux of the problem.

The opening of the Major League baseball season was once almost a time of national rejoicing. Today, with the benefit of television money, the game is prospering, but it is losing out among fans. And some clubs, which can't afford the super salaries of superstars, are threatened with either permanent second class status or insolvency.

The financial problems will eventually be solved. Few clubs will continue paying out superstar millions. There are too many players on each team's roster for such salary levels and only so much income to be had. Ticket prices can't be hiked every year.

It's not, therefore, the cash itself which is destroying baseball's image but the selfishness of players, now unionized. Young squirts earning \$250,000 refuse to play for that amount and demand \$350,000. And they are not the superstars.

But they've learned how to use the arbitration method to get all they can get—more than they're worth. They have also become prima donnas, in many cases. The slightest injury or fall brings on the trainer and team physician. The slightest illness causes them to stay out of the lineup. Etc.

That's not the spirit of Ty Cobb, Lou Gehrig and Enos Slaughter, or the great and gutsy tradition of Major League baseball players who believed in hustle, and exhibiting at least some appreciation for the club that gambled on them and trained them, perhaps for years.

It appears that today's pampered players—who lack skill compared to players of thirty years ago (watch the errors in most Major League games today) will strike next month, on the 29th. That could be a further blow to players' acceptance, and admiration, by baseball fans. Thus the opening of the season, this April of 1981, doesn't seem to be a hopeful one for baseball.

Hickerson Speaks to Rotary Club

Elbre E. Hickerson of Hickerson Jewelry presented the program for April 13. Frosty showed a film on the use and history of gold. The film showed how gold is a fundamental element which is indestructible and for this reason, together with its scarcity have made it a form of exchange for thousands of years.

One interesting point of information the film showed was that all the gold mankind has mined would make a cube measuring 18 yards square.

The United States is fourth in production, with the area around the Black Hills producing most of the gold. Canada, Russia and South Africa are the three ahead of the United States in gold production. One example of the extreme amount of work required to get an ounce of gold is in South Africa, where three tons of earth and rock are processed for every ounce of gold.

Gold, according to the film, is so malleable one ounce can be stretched 50 miles or cover 100 square feet of leafing. Other common uses of gold are: electronics, dentistry, for arthritis relief, as a cover for the

reflective glass in skyscrapers, space suit construction, a cover for the lunar landing pads and of course for jewelry.

Gold is valuable as an investment through actual possession of gold jewelry, gold bars, gold coins and gold futures. Gold is the only type of exchange that is based on itself. It's value is based only upon the current market price, period.

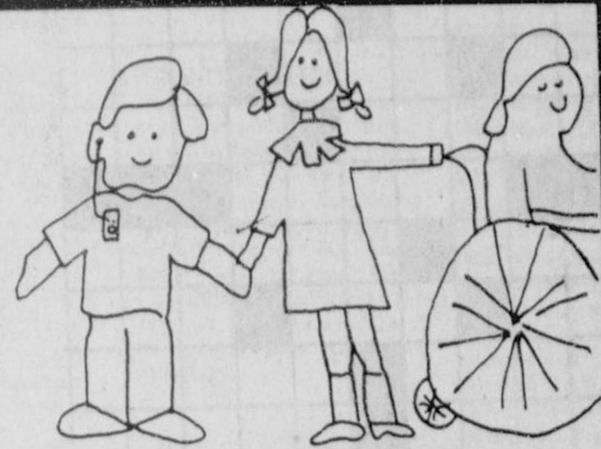

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Righting A Carter Wrong

One of the last-minute, idealistic efforts of the Carter Administration was an attempt to force a number of states to uproot, at whatever cost, a pattern of preference or predominantly one-race schools.

It ordered four states, two in the Deep South and two outside the Deep South (West Virginia, Delaware, Alabama and South Carolina) to end what certain bureaucrats termed "unconstitutional education," and --and surely this was unrealistic--the states were ordered to do this in sixty days!

Since this effort came only in January, the Reagan Administration and U.S. Education Commissioner Terrel Bell were able to review the problem. Bell doesn't believe today's pattern proves anything. In fact, he says he feels the main reason for predominantly black student bodies at many traditionally black colleges is that blacks follow family patterns, not to the school their parents, or friends, went to, and go to them because they feel more comfortable there and more confident they can make it at these schools.

He recently said--referring to the last-gasp Carter Administration effort to force states to force students to swap schools: "I would hope that we can deemphasize the stick in the closet--the cutoff of federal money."

Zealous do-gooders issuing the kind of orders that were issued to force students swaps in various state colleges (more than ten states would be affected including Kentucky, Missouri, Texas, Pennsylvania, Florida and several others) mean well. They are crusading and convinced all this is urgent and morally

justified.

What they can't understand or accept--is that different races and groups sometimes like to act traditionally or differently from the concepts of reformers. That has caused much needless trouble in the world for generations. That is why too much federal intervention is sometimes as bad as or worse than not enough.

Doctor Talk

By Harold B. Ligon, M.D.
Paul M. Lerner, M.D., a specialist in Urology, concludes his discussion about the prostate gland in today's column. His guest comments have been appreciated.

If the prostate area becomes infected, antibiotics are useful. Sometimes physicians administer prostate massages to the congestion in the gland. In any event, the specific treatment must be left to your doctor. If symptoms

become progressive, or if recurrent infections or repeated episodes of bleeding occur; or if increasing difficulty in voiding occurs, requiring catheterizations to empty the bladder then surgery is probably the answer.

Surgery of the prostate is extremely common. It usually takes one of two forms. The obstructing portion of the gland may be removed through one's own passage. This is likened to boring a hole through a cork and is called a transurethral resection or "TUR" for short. The second method is an open procedure wherein a small incision is made low down in the abdomen and the obstructing portion of the gland is removed through the

incision. The exact operation your doctor recommends will depend on the configuration of the gland, whether it has cancer in it or not, and a multitude of other factors too detailed to go into here. However, your own urologist has been trained to tailor the procedure to the individual, taking into account the entire person, his general health, and the specific condition of the prostate gland.

Human sexuality has nothing to do with whether your prostate gland will enlarge or obstruct as the years pass or not. Gays, celibates, and those still in possession of sexual vigor all have the same chance of requiring therapy. Following surgery for non-malignant enlargement, sexual performance as a male remains. Remember, your enjoyment of life is not over after surgery any more than it is for a woman following menopause or hysterectomy.

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TV COMMENTARY

TBS, headquartered in Atlanta, outdid the three famous commercial networks, CBS, NBC and ABC, in its coverage of the shooting of President Reagan recently.

WHEREAS the larger networks switched from the shooting story after a few hours, to carry regular programs, TBS stayed on the air--and moved a veteran news team to its Washington bureau to beef up its coverage.

OF course, the story was over-covered. Viewers, some in a state of shock, heard the same thing a hundred times.

TV scenes showing the wild commotion that followed the shooting indicate that the U.S. Secret Service and other law enforcement agencies are still not totally equipped to handle such emergencies.

Chaos reigned at the shooting scene for too long and some of the shooting victims lay on the sidewalk, before receiving treatment while TV cameras rolled. Perhaps medical experts and

emergency aid personnel should hereafter accompany U.S. chief executives when they make public appearances. TV, showing the confusion, might have rendered a service in this sense.

FRANK Reynolds probably summed up the views of millions accurately when he told his viewers on the day of the shooting that this America the Beautiful is also America the Violent.

IN the opening minutes of the tragedy, NBC seemed to offer the best television coverage.

AND television, in general, brought the grisly scene into America homes, even in slow motion, within minutes of the episode. There are many, of course, who blame commercial television, with its glamorized crime and gun and shooting scenes, for contributing to the violence in this country--and the networks should reexamine the level of violence in their programming as a result of this latest crime, and the rising rate all over the nation.

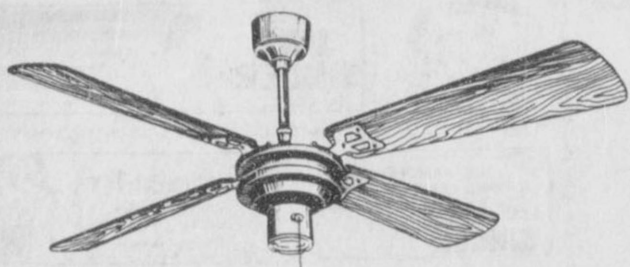

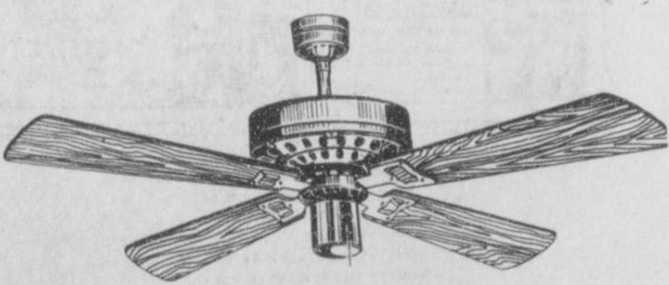

PARENTHOOD GUIDEBOOK

For a child, one of the biggest adjustments he will have to make occurs when a

new baby arrives at his front door. The new baby will change the child's life and the parents' lives forever. By preparing the child gradually in advance for the new arrival, you can help him to accept his baby brother or sister more readily. Even with adequate preparation,

the child may still show signs of jealousy. The green sickness is a normal human emotion that children and adults feel more often than not during their lives. For the child, it is a normal, yet disquieting response. When a tiny stranger moves in, the child

may rightly or wrongly feel that he has been upstaged and moved to spot Number Two. The green-eyed monster often has him under his thumb. Do not promise the older child a baby boy or a baby girl because you may not be able to deliver the goods. Let

the child help prepare for the new arrival by assisting with setting up the nursery, going to buy the baby layette or bathtub, or selecting his own outgrown baby clothes to hand down to "his" baby. Let him be the first to tell his playmates and relatives that a new baby is on the way. Talk about the new baby—what he will look like, how and what he will eat, and where he will sleep. The child will appear most envious and curious when and if you nurse the baby. Because he knows your hands are tied and you fully control him, he may misbehave, vying for attention.

World is not the choice.

STAMPS & STORIES

As rugged Americans surged westward on foot after the Revolution, more convenient methods of mass transportation were being developed. One of these—the Canal—had a tremendous impact on the rapid population and growth of the frontier lands and the establishment of New York City as one of the world's greatest trading posts.

An almost unbelievable achievement in its time, the 350-plus mile Canal was dug in just eight years by Irish laborers. When completed in 1825 it linked the Hudson River and New York City with Buffalo and Lake Erie to the west.

The realization of the Erie Canal led to the construction of additional canals originating farther west on Lake Erie and terminating at Cincinnati and Portsmouth, Ohio and Evansville, Indiana, with the Erie, they formed an inland commercial waterway which richly nourished the early expansion and development of our Nation.

Commemorating the 150th anniversary of the start of the Erie Canal, the United States issued a 5 cent stamp on July 4, 1967, at Rome, New York, where ground was originally broken.

ORLANDO, FLA. -- The arrival of Disney World, eighteen miles from Orlando, has changed this city and central Florida forever. In some ways the changes are good, in some not good.

Traffic is often too much for the road system at peak hours, but this is a common problem in many U.S. cities. The sprawl which has become greater Orlando is often an eyesore. Highways 92 and 17 which traverse the old city, become more and more honky-tonk as traffic utilizes the interstates, bypasses and new roads.

But there is an openness and bustle about Orlando that is, booming, wide-open city here—though officials have cracked down on the nightclub life in the past year.

This central part of Florida, far enough north not to be swampland and dotted with beautiful lakes and hills, is choice real estate. Good lake lots in Orlando sell for almost as much as seafront lots on the coasts.

There are many good restaurants in the area, and good motels, hundreds of new ones—attracted by Disney World. There is the adjacent city of Winter Park, which is delightful. Park Avenue there retains (miraculously) the flavor of a small-town city, with antique shops, sidewalk strolling and even an old fashioned drug store with soda fountain!

But the big tourist attraction here is Disney World, though there are now circus and sea world and many other attractions. It's eighteen miles to the west and this time of year is the best time to visit it—now and in the fall.

Summers are often very hot and it's the traditional school holiday period. April and May and October and November are the choice months—and in April the best time is after the Easter holidays.

Disney World easily uses up a day, and then another—if the visitor isn't hurried. The various amusements are clearly superior, and it's all done in a clean, fun, proper atmosphere. But if one likes to avoid crowds, then Disney

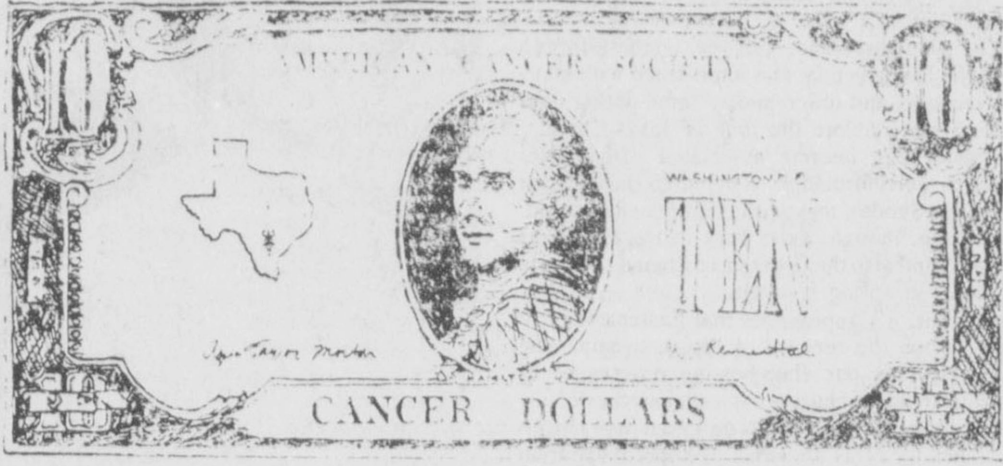

business and the Tar Heels seemed unsure. That was the ball game.

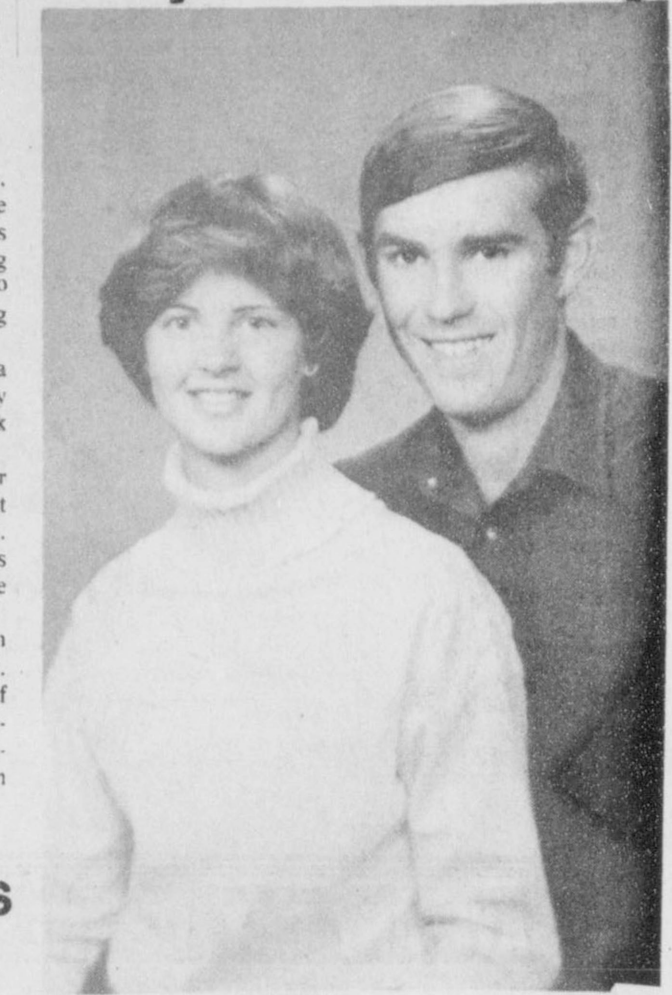

TAILORED FASHIONS--AT HOME! EASTER!

Blazers and other tailored jackets are versatile additions to a wardrobe, but "impossible" to sew? At least too difficult to tackle? Not so.

If you've hesitated to make a blazer because you think it's too hard to do or will take too long, think again.

Today's patterns, fabrics and notions make tailored jackets easier than ever before.

Here are some tips for "quickie" tailoring:

PATTERN SELECTION

Select a basic pattern that you can make several times in different fabrics for different seasons. Each time you make the same pattern, it gets faster.

Look for design details that are simple and quick. These include patch pockets instead of welt pockets and sleeves and back without vents. If the pattern has vents, plan to sew them up.

Also, in choosing a pattern, remember that lining a garment is faster than finishing all the seams. Be sure the pattern includes the lining. Making your own lining pattern is time-consuming.

Be sure the pattern has enough seams to make altering

and fitting easy. Contrary to what you might think, the "few-seams" feature of the "jiffy" or "simple" patterns makes these difficult to alter.

FABRIC CHOICES

Choose fabrics that are easy to sew on.

Tweeds and linen-like fabrics are good choices in woven fabrics, while wool, polyester or blends are the best double knits.

Fabrics such as wool flannel and velveteen take a long time to sew or press to get a nice look.

Plaids are lovely but take extra time to match during cutting.

CONSTRUCTION TIPS

Choose construction methods that eliminate hand sewing. Use fusibles for interfacing and in hems, if possible.

Remember that topstitching eliminates the need for hemming at all.

Make machine buttonholes and topstitch pockets to the jacket.

Don't skip the essentials of good construction--this will slow you down. For example, be sure to staystitch neck edges and armholes. Clip and trim seams to eliminate bulk. And press often, especially before crossing one seam with another.

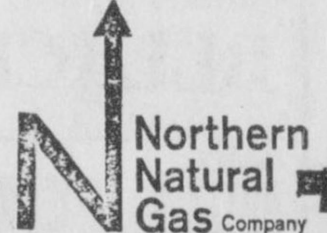

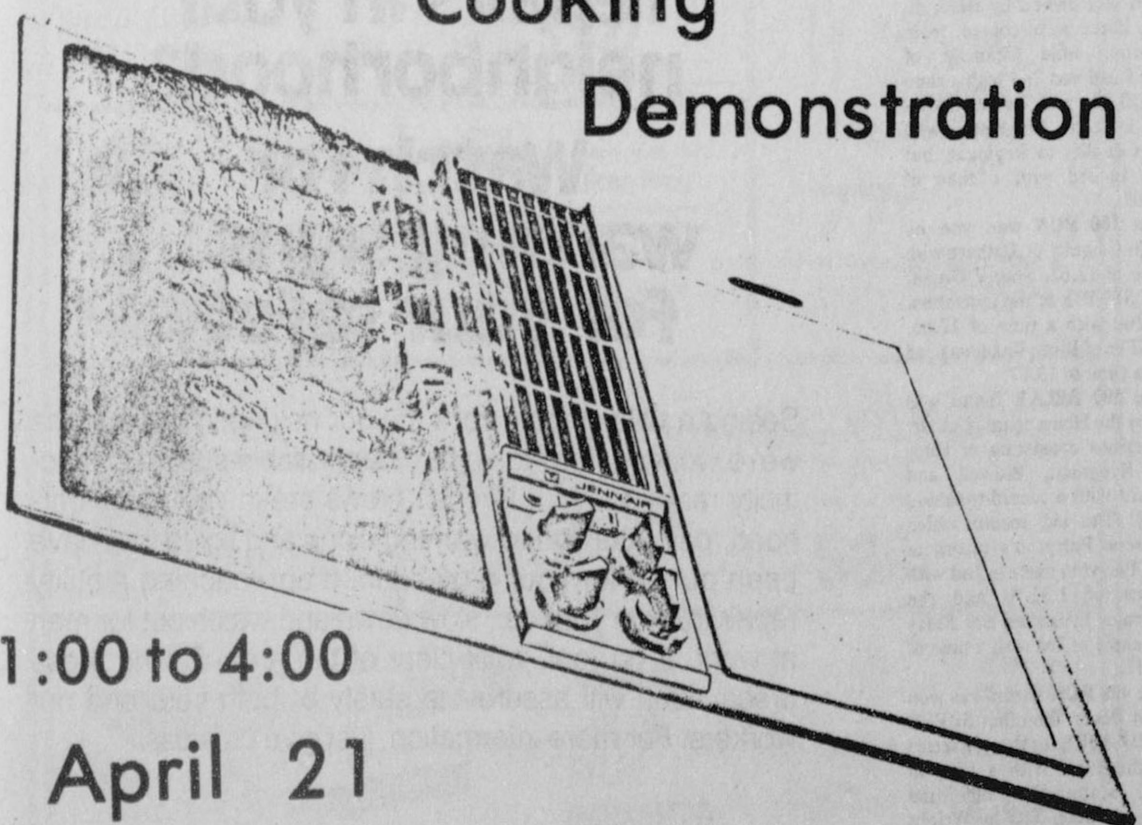

The Lynx did not place in any of the rest of the events--in the 1st, 2nd or 3rd Place division, anyway.

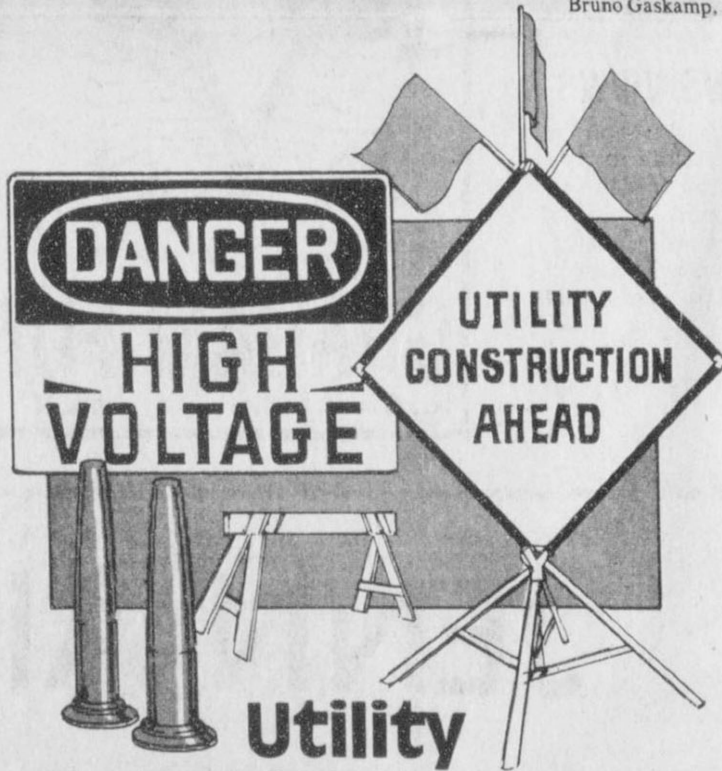

Social Security Very Valuable

What is the most valuable thing that you have?

If you are thinking of personal things then naturally you would list your family first. For physical things you would most value your health. For material things you would probably consider such things as your home, or perhaps your job.

What is of most value to you depends many times upon the circumstances and the situation at that particular time. If you become disabled, then regaining your health is most important. If you lose your job, then the loss of income is most important. And, if someone in the family dies, then their loss is the most important thing.

Howard Weatherly, Manager of the Pampa Social Security Office suggests that there may be another important possession about which you may have given little thought, but which could be directly related to all the above. This is your social security protection.

Although over 90 per cent of American workers are currently covered by social security, and regularly contribute toward the program, few actually realize the variety and range of protection that it provides. This is especially true for younger people who anticipate that it will be many years before they will benefit from social security, and that may be true, however they very well could receive benefits due to loss of earnings

Screwworm Cases Reported

AUSTIN--Efforts to contain a screwworm case in the Sonora area are being intensified, Dr. John Holcombe, Executive Director, Texas Animal Health Commission, said today.

A screwworm was confirmed in a sheep at the Texas A&M University Research Center in Sonora this past week-end. This is the second case for 1981 in Texas; a screwworm was found in a dog in El Paso last month.

A 25-mile square area round Sonora is being "hotspotted" with about 1.5 million sterile screwworm flies. This will continue for a month to six weeks. In addition, the area is being treated with pellets which contain an insecticide, insect attractant, and feeding material. The system is known as the SWASS treatment, meaning Screwworm Adult Suppression System.

Field inspectors of the Texas Animal Health Commission are also conducting a "down-the-road" survey of ranchers in the area and are distributing information on the situation.

"These actions will be extremely helpful, but we are also asking the help of every rancher to cooperate, too," Dr. Holcombe said. "We especially need the help of ranchers in the Sonora area to inspect their livestock and submit suspected samples of worms in wounds to the Mission Fly Lab," he explained.

With the Spring season at hand, all cattlemen should redouble their efforts to check their livestock regularly and submit suspected screwworm samples to the Fly Lab at Mission.

"We must know if there are outbreaks of screwworms as soon as possible so they can be brought under control and eradicated," Dr. Holcombe explained.

Mailing kits for submitting screwworm samples are available at county agent's offices, TAHC area offices, veterinarian's offices and other outlets.

An unusual number of flies of all kinds have been reported in

Bicycle Safety

Governor William P. Clements has proclaimed April 26 - May 1 as Bicycle Safety Awareness Week in Texas to remind all bicyclists of the need to travel safely in today's complex traffic environment.

"Texans have long enjoyed bicycling as a recreational activity. And as fuel costs continue to rise, bicycles are increasingly being utilized as a viable source of transportation.

"Unfortunately, however, bicycles are most vulnerable in traffic. As a result, bicyclists are too often victims of deadly or crippling accidents involving motor vehicles," the governor's proclamation reads.

Statistics support this statement. Nationwide, the National Safety Council reports 1,000 bicyclists die every year in car-bike accidents, and another 40,000 receive injuries.

In Texas alone, preliminary figures from the Texas Department of Public Safety covering the first six months of 1980 indicate that 21 persons died and 1,249 were injured when motor vehicles struck bicycle riders.

The Texas Safety Association, Texas Education Agency, Texas Association of Student Councils, Texas Department of Public Safety and the Traffic Safety Section of the State Department of Highways and Public Transportation support Bicycle Safety Awareness Week and offer bicyclists of all ages the following safety tips:

- Obey all applicable traffic regulations, signs, signals and markings.
- Observe all local ordinances pertaining to bicycle operation.
- Keep right, drive with traffic, not against it. Ride single file.
- Drive your bike defensively;

- Watch out for the other guy. Watch out for drain gates, soft shoulders and other road surface hazards.
- Watch for car doors opening or for cars pulling out into traffic.
- Don't carry passengers or packages that interfere with your vision or control.
- Never hitch a ride on a truck or other vehicle.
- Exercise extreme care at all intersections, particularly when turning left.
- Use hand signals to indicate turning or stopping.
- Protect yourself at night with the required reflectors and lights.
- Ride a safe bike. Have it inspected to ensure good mechanical condition.

Farm Issues

Austin, Texas - Texas Farmers Union President Mike Moeller today called on the Texas Legislature to enact legislation which will prohibit the future purchases of agricultural lands by foreign owners and adopt an exemption for gasohol on the five cents per gallon motor fuels tax.

"These are the two most important issues for agriculture this session, and it is absolutely essential that they be passed," Moeller stated.

Moeller led a delegation of TFU members to a House Agriculture Committee hearing on Wednesday to testify for HB 112 (Pete Patterson, D-Brookston). The bill will prohibit aliens from future purchases of Texas farmland. "It is more important to all Texans that our children are able to inherit our land than people of another country," Moeller said.

"The higher land values which are being driven up by foreign purchases in Texas are making it more difficult for young farmers to go into business. "If I have to sell my land and I want to get a good price for it, the pressure of alien purchases certainly serves to drive the market value up," Moeller explained.

"With only a few exceptions, the price of farm land in foreign countries is far above comparable land in this country. American farmland is cheap only in relation to the low income our farmers receive under current government policies."

Moeller said the Patterson bill allows individuals who immigrate to the United States to purchase agricultural land as long as they intend to become American citizens. "We are only asking the legislature to become American citizens. "We are only asking the legislature to prohibit purchases of farm land by those foreign individuals and corporations who only want the land for speculation, not those who wish to become bonafide American citizens and taxpayers."

In regards to the gasohol legislation, Moeller said TFU favors passage of HB 24 (Dan Kubiak, D-Rockdale) which will exempt the fuel from the five cent per gallon tax currently levied on all motor fuel at the pump.

"Texas is the only state in the Southwest which does not have some kind of exemption for gasohol," Moeller stated. "In order to stimulate production of gasohol, which will make us more energy independent of oil imports, we need meaningful legislation which will enable producers to be competitive with the price of unleaded gasoline."

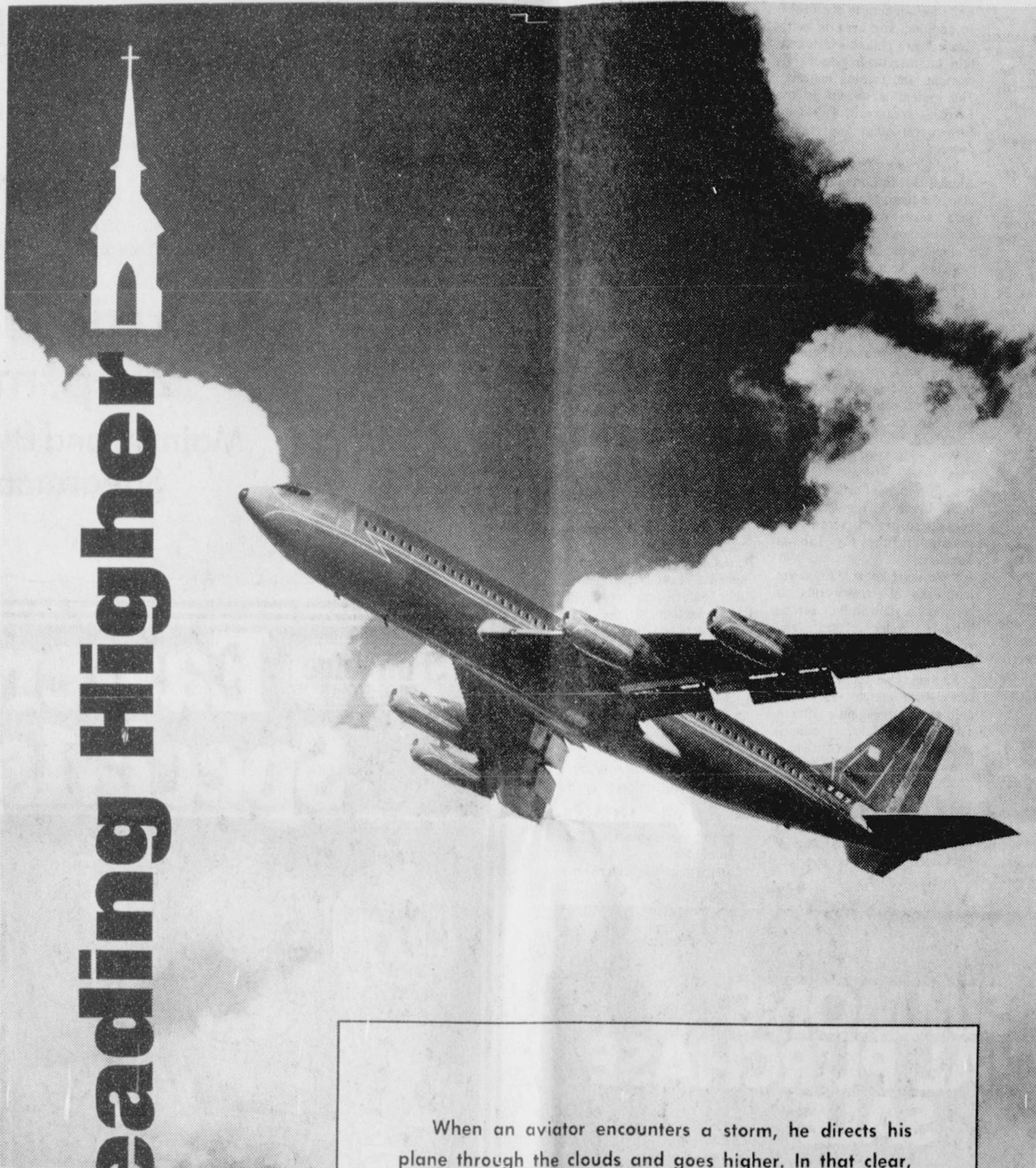
