STORM ALERT

Hansford county

Despite the wonders of radar, there is only one instrument that can reliably detect a tornado or dangerous tornado breeding clouds:

The human eye.

The Hansford County Sheriff's Department is in charge of the storm watch system that involves department members and volunteer individuals and families who contribute to the safety of the community in a storm by "keeping an eye out."

Persons too far away, such as out in the county residents, who do not have a storm shelter are advised to get in the bathtub pulling a mattress over it for protection from glass and other debris.

In addition, these rules should be followed--not because they are official pronouncements but--because they have been proved in year after year of experience in storm situations.

First, keep calm. There have been almost as many injuries from panic as from storm violence.

Have shelter options already spotted according to the time you have. Going to a public shelter, remember that others will be doing the same. Park your car out of the way so it will not tie up traffic.

In seeking information prior to taking shelter, DO NOT call the police department or the sheriff's department. What they have up to the moment is the very same thing you get on radio or television. A call will only tie up a line that might block further information.

The cable television information channel will also carry this up-to-date information. Chief Robinson said more so-

phisticated equipment will be installed in the near future but even then... it must be a MUST: do not call the police or sheriff's department.

Sheriff's department lines must be kept open for report from SKY WARN observers.

So, remember: A WATCH means conditions are ripe for a storm.

A WARNING means an actual storm system has been sighted.

In summing up, nothing more can be said than to be prepared, be calm and be thoughtful of others.

6. We have a good board and they are working to improve the system. I would like to help.

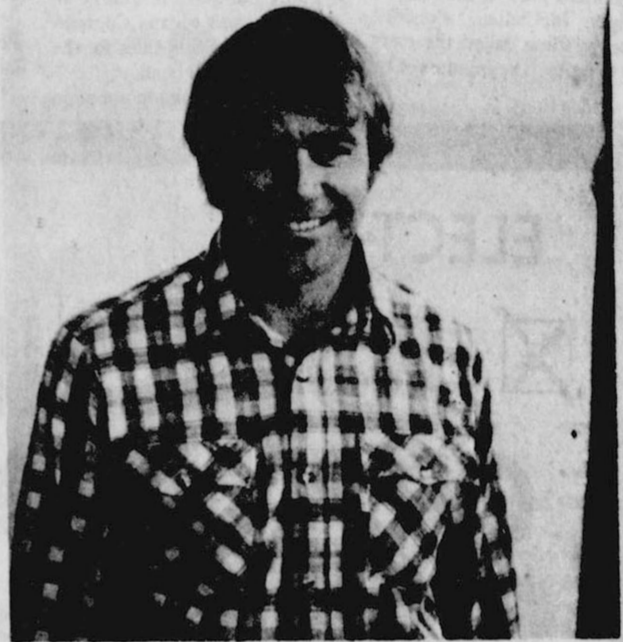
7. There is no one except God that I belong to. No special group backing my candidacy, therefore there is no prejudices.

Police Enforcement On Mopeds Starts

"Mopeds" are--as of now--the object of intense enforcement of laws regarding their operation by the Spearman Police Department.

Police Chief Ron Robinson told the Reporter he had a campaign of education regarding such laws to go with the help of the news media when he observed an illegal operator of the motor-powered bicycle-type vehicle run a stop light and narrowly miss death or injury.

"Our original intent was sparked by many, many complaints regarding these vehicles running stop controls and weaving dangerously in and out of traffic," Chief Robinson said.

"But when I observed firsthand what was happening, I decided the 'crack-down' must come immediately. It was a miracle that the out-of-town driver of the car was able to miss the two-wheeler."

The chief outlined the regulations:

As of Jan. 1, 1981, all motor-powered vehicles require

a drivers license, a vehicle license and a safety inspection sticker to operate. In the case of the mopeds this is true plus the motor operator can be younger than 15 years of age and under normal circumstances this is 18 years of age. Also, under most conditions, Chief Robinson emphasized, helmets are required.

"There will be no exceptions," the chief warned. "Every infraction will be prosecuted. Any one in doubt can stop by the police station for an exact reading of the rules."

He asked that the Reporter emphasize that this is not a courtesy warning; this is news that there will be enforcement of two-wheeler operation with

emphasis on mopeds for they are the most numerous offenders right now.

Tornado Safety Program Set Thursday

IT MAY BE THE MOST PROFITABLE TWO HOURS OF YOUR LIFE!

You will learn the difference between a tornado and a "twister" and the clouds that spawn them.

You will learn that ground-to-cloud lightning goes UP and does not strike downward.

You will get to know the clouds that breed violent storms and those that produce "just a storm."

The importance of learning such things is told in the statistics on tornadoes for a 20-year period between 1953-1973.

In 1953, the first full year the present warning system was in use, 422 tornadoes were reported resulting in 515 deaths and uncounted injuries inflicted. On 208 days of 1973, there

were 1,109 tornadoes. Some 2,481 persons were injured and property losses exceeded \$500-million. Only 87 lives were lost. It is believed the tremendous drop in life loss was due to improving the reporting and warning system and greater public awareness and participation.

Still, one life lost to violent weather is one too many. That is why the National Weather Service stages these programs and why the general public is urged to take advantage of them.

These who have devoted their lives to weather safety feel your taking two hours to get acquainted with the various potentials in a threatening storm system will be more enlightening and enjoyable than a sudden, unavoidable handshake with a tornado.

FACTS & FIGURES

The government now requires a uniform tire quality grade to be stamped on all tires to let consumers compare the relative performance of passenger car tires in the areas of treadwear, traction and temperature resistance.

Treadwear, measuring the projected tread life of the tire, is listed in multiples of ten, such as 150, 160, 170. A tire with a grade of 200 can be expected to give twice as many miles as a tire with a grade of 100.

Traction and temperature resistance ratings are indicated with letters "A", "B" and "C" with "A" indicating the highest or best grade.



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WTSU to Host Workshop

WTSU--Opportunities and problems in the rural areas of the Texas Panhandle will be the focus of "Texas Panhandle Crossroads," a workshop hosted by the West Texas State University Office of Programs for Women.

The workshop will begin at 9 a.m. and continue through 3 p.m. on Saturday, March 28, at the WTSU East Dining Hall. Deadline for registering for the workshop is Wednesday, March 25, with the WTSU Office of Programs for Women.

A \$5 fee per participant will provide a buffet luncheon and workshop materials. Child care for children between 18 months and 12 years old will be available at the WTSU Children's Center and participants must indicate at registration the desire for child care.

Keynote speakers for the workshop on rural life will be Alex Macure, who served as assistant secretary of rural affairs during the Carter administration and is involved in private consulting in Washington, D.C., and Rep. Jack Hightower, of Vernon, who represents the 13th Congressional District in the United States House of Representatives.

Workshop participants may choose from several sessions which will be offered during the morning and afternoon.

Sessions include "Finance for Agriculture," presented by Richard Cummins, WTSU instructor in agricultural business and economics; "Wind Energy Today," Dr. Earl Gilmore, research professor with the WTSU Alternative Energy Institute; "Women in Agriculture," Dr. James Thompson, dean of the WTSU School of Agriculture; and "Day Care Centers in Rural Areas," presented by Holly Tweed, a licensing agent with the Texas Department of Human Resources.

Other workshop sessions will include "Panhandle Rural Health Needs," Johnny Raymond, head of the Panhandle Rural Health Corp. of Amarillo, and Willa Albert, nurse with the Panhandle Rural Health Corp.; "Small Business Administration," Dick DeVoe with the Amarillo SBA office; "Texas Family Code," Deanna Fitzgerald Lafavers, an Amarillo attorney; "Estates, Wills and Taxes," Bill Cornett, an attorney and adjunct professor in the WTSU School of Business; "Investments," Dan Rahlfis of Canyon with Merrill Lynch, Pierce, Fenner and Smith Inc., investment firm; and "Domestic Energy Resources," Poppy Hulsey of Tulsa with Alcohol Coop Inc., which is working to develop alcohol fuel from grain.

The workshop is funded through a federal Title I grant of \$4,492 received by the WTSU Office of Programs for Women and additional funds from WTSU.

A Gruver FFA team was the highest scoring of 30 teams participating in the livestock judging contest held in conjunction with the 1981 Hansford County Livestock Show, with a second Gruver FFA team and two Hansford County 4-H Club teams and two individual Hansford County 4-H Club members in the top 10 scoring ranks.

The judging competition is sponsored by Panhandle State University, Goodwell, Okla., in conjunction with the annual livestock competition at Spearman using the animals assembled for the event.

There were a number of ties and a number of places separated by only one point. According to Hansford County Agriculture Agent Jim Smith, ties were broken by moving to the next event and--if necessary--the next event until total scores determined the tie-breakers.

Other ties will be so noted as the story progresses.

The winning Gruver team--with a score of 803--was comprised of Todd and Ty Williams, Jody Bradford and Bubba Gannin.

A Hansford County 4-H Club team comprised of Dick Smith, Monte Beck and Mark Allen were in a two-way tie for third

place with a score of 791 while Smith was in a two-way tie for second place in individual scoring with 282 points and Beck one point behind in third place with 281.

Gruver FFA's Russell Tiner was in a three-way tie for fifth place with a score of 279.

Other team places and scores were the second Hansford 4-H Club team of Melanie Morris, Jack Sparks, Debbie Burton and Chris Morris in a two-way tie for fifth with 781 and the second Gruver FFA team of Durward and Marshall Cator, Tracy Vernon and Russell Tiner in sixth with 777.

In the individual sheep competition, Pat Tucker of the Spearman FFA was number one with a score of 100. Dick Smith was in a two-way tie for second place with a score of 98.

Individual third place was a seven-way split, all with 96 points and that included Monte Beck of the Hansford 4-H Club and Ty Williams of the Gruver FFA.

In team sheep competition, the Gruver FFA squad of Todd and Ty Williams, Jody Bradford and Bubba Gannin took it with a score of 275.

The Hansford 4-H Club team of Smith, Beck and Allen took fourth place with 266 points and the Spearman FFA team of Will Jarvis, James Leib, Hadley Reed and Pat Tucker were in fifth with 265.

Individual swine competition ended in a three-way tie for first

place--all with 100 points--that included Debbie Burton of the Hansford 4-H Club.

Second place went to Gruver FFA's Russell Tiner with 98 points while Melanie Morris of the Hansford 4-H Club was in fifth with 95 points following a three-way tie for fourth.

The Hansford 4-H Club swine team of Melanie Morris, Jack Sparks, Debbie Burton and Chris Morris were in first place with 284 points.

A Gruver FFA team composed of Durward and Marshall Cator, Tracy Vernon and Russell Tiner were second with 279 points.

Individual beef scoring was a four-way tie for first with 100 points shared by Felix Sandoval of the Spearman FFA which also fielded the second place winner, James Leib with 98 points. He had to share that position with five others including Lynette Williams of Hansford 4-H Club and Durward Cator of the Gruver FFA.

In team beef competition, the Hansford 4-H Club had to be content with second place on 270 points. It was composed of Bryan Gillespie, Tracy Logsdon, Loyd Cator, and Christia Burton.

Fourth place was a two-way tie with the Hansford 4-H

Club's Smith, Beck and Allen in there with 264 points matching the Deaf Smith team.

Veteran competitors and show followers alike were agreed that the many ties for position and the many times only one point separated places in the top ten, was indicative of the quality of the show this year and the hard work that had been expended by individuals and teams alike.

Since there were ribbons and awards based on a top ten scoring situation, this is the way tie-breaking progressive scores placed the competitors:

As noted previously, Dick Smith came out of a second place tie for individual scoring into third place. Also in the top ten individuals, Gruver's Russell Tiner--actually in a tie for fifty place--came out number eight.

In high-scoring team competition, a Hansford 4-H Club team came out of its tie for third place in that position dropping tie tying Dallam County team to fourth place. Another Hansford 4-H Club team--actually tied for fifth place at the beginning--came out seventh in the progressive score totals.

The tightest tie in the judging event was in individual sheep competition with two contestants tied for second place and

seventh tied for third. Progressive scores placed Dick Smith, Hansford 4-H Club, in second place; Monte Beck of the same club in sixth place and Russell Tiner, Gruver FFA in eighth place.

In the individual swine competition, the tie-breaker for first place left Debbie Burton, Hansford 4-H Club, in second place; Gruver's Russell Tiner in fourth place and Melanie Morris of the Hansford 4-H Club in ninth place.

The beef competition, which was counted on to easily decide ties, was tight itself with four individuals tied for first place and only the second team tie in the entire event.

Felix Sandoval, Spearman FFA, in the four-way tie for first, placed fourth putting James Leib, Spearman FFA, fifth; Lynette Williams, Hansford 4-H Club, seventh and Durward Cator, Gruver FFA, fifth.

The Hansford 4-H Club team of Smith, Beck and Allen came out of a beef team tie in fourth place.

Ag Agent Smith lauded both the work of the judging teams, individuals and the judges who had to score them.

He termed the entire event this year one of the greatest successes he has seen.

Solar -

AUSTIN—Railroad Commissioner Mack Wallace has told the Texas Legislature that expansion of franchise tax exemptions for the state's solar industry would speed the development and utilization of an alternative, domestic energy resource to offset heavy dependence on unstable foreign oil suppliers.

Testifying before the House Ways and Means Committee, the senior member of the Texas energy regulatory agency maintained solar can become a significant part of the Texas energy mix with some support from government.

Wallace appeared before the House committee as chairman of the Solar Advisory Committee of the Texas Energy and Natural Resources Advisory Council. The solar panel, after nearly a year of public hearings and assessment of testimony, recommended additional franchise tax exemptions that are the thrusts of the House bill.

He stressed that companies would continue to pay taxes as usual on the non-solar part of their business.

Wallace noted that Texas was among the first state to offer sales and franchise tax incentives for the use of solar and wind energy, with corporations engaged exclusively in manufacturing, selling and installing solar and wind devices totally exempted from the tax.

That action of the Texas Legislature in 1975 was followed two years later by a broadening of the exemption to apply to corporations that made, sold, or installed solar and wind devices, the energy official cited.

"Still, only 50 of the approximately 200 Texas firms in the solar and wind business fall into this category," Wallace reported.

Wallace told the Texas House Energy Resources Committee that the public will be protected at a minimum cost by a bill licensing solar installers.

H.B. 1191, sponsored by Rep. Carlyle Smith of Grand Prairie, would provide for a licensing procedure that requires a person to demonstrate an adequate knowledge of the field before performing solar energy work, explained Wallace.

"The present licensing situation varies from one locality to another, but in most places it does not adequately assure that the practitioners are qualified, or that qualified solar specialists can obtain a license without being qualified and licensed for other trades as well," Wallace said.

"The public is the ultimate loser in both cases," he testified. Wallace further explained that solar contractors currently face several, sometimes two dozen or more, local jurisdictions in their trade territory.

"A state-wide licensing procedure would provide uniform and fair requirements for all, and the public would be protected at a minimum cost," Wallace testified.

The solar energy advocate explained that the public needs to be protected from inadequate poorly performing and sometimes dangerous solar systems which can result from incorrect sizing, improper orientation,

department of West Texas State University; Bobby Weaver, PPHS CURATOR OF ETHNOLOGY, and William C. Griggs, museum director; and Bobie Speer of Amarillo, anthropologist.

Byron Price, PPHS Museum curator of history, will be assisted by Carol Daffern in exhibit preparation. Mary Louise Loyd of the Amarillo library is project director. Dr. Joe Taylor, retired, Amarillo College history department, is evaluator for the project.

The one-year project is a "library community outreach program for adults to promote study and appreciation of Great Plains history", according to the University of Mid-America announcement.

Nine libraries nationwide, museums, historical societies and humanities scholars will

carry out the programs, which will center on six films from UMA's television course, "The Great Plains Experience", produced in 1978. The localized programs will also use the libraries' humanities resources, relevant art, artifact and other special collections. UMA received a \$40,137 grant from NEH in early 1980 to plan the project.

"A major thrust of the programs is to reach residents in rural areas, the elderly, minorities, the hard-to-reach, and the less educated," said Sarah Rosenberg, project director and head of UMA's division of program development. "The project will encourage studies in the humanities and the 'Great Plains' films provide an excellent vehicle for study of regional and local history."

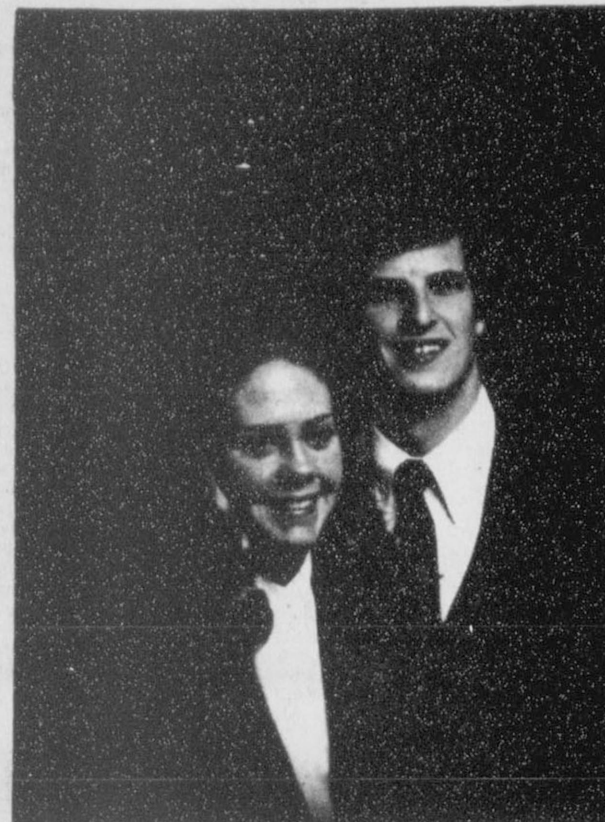

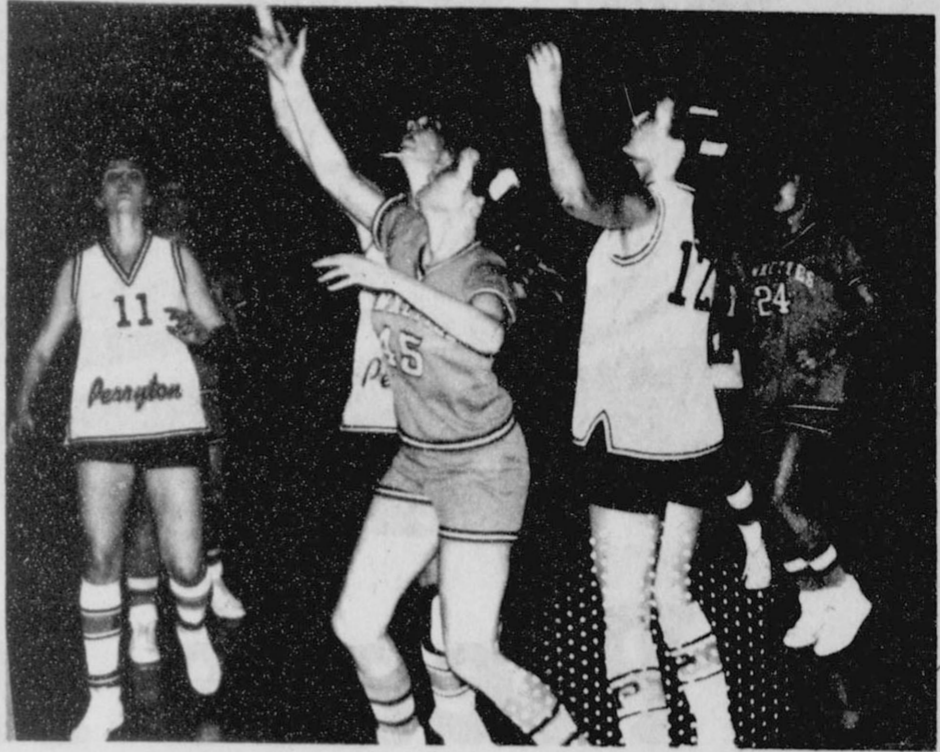

total sales.

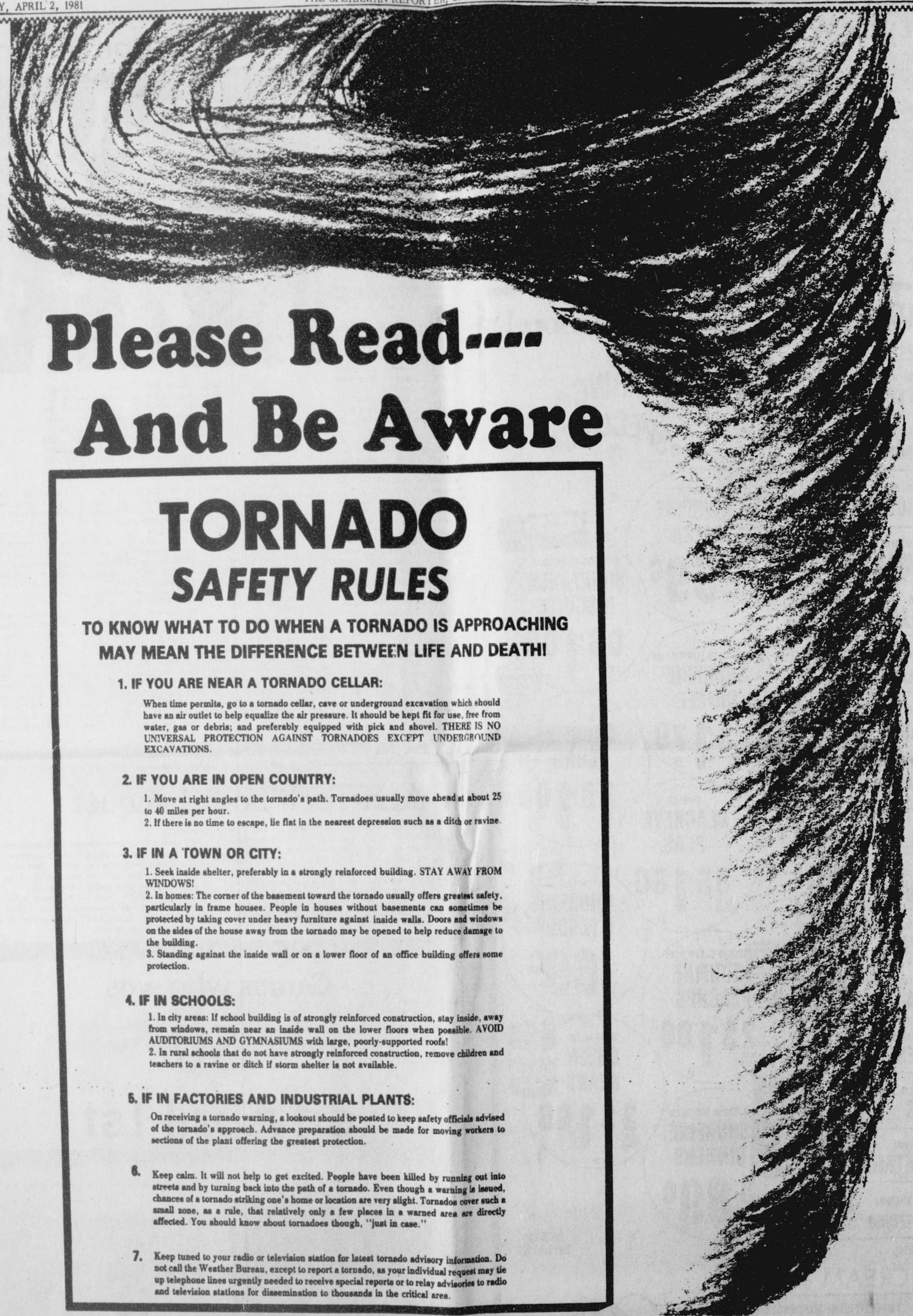

Please Read... And Be Aware

TORNADO SAFETY RULES

TO KNOW WHAT TO DO WHEN A TORNADO IS APPROACHING
MAY MEAN THE DIFFERENCE BETWEEN LIFE AND DEATH!

1. IF YOU ARE NEAR A TORNADO CELLAR:

When time permits, go to a tornado cellar, cave or underground excavation which should have an air outlet to help equalize the air pressure. It should be kept fit for use, free from water, gas or debris; and preferably equipped with pick and shovel. THERE IS NO UNIVERSAL PROTECTION AGAINST TORNADOES EXCEPT UNDERGROUND EXCAVATIONS.

2. IF YOU ARE IN OPEN COUNTRY:

1. Move at right angles to the tornado's path. Tornadoes usually move ahead at about 25 to 40 miles per hour.
2. If there is no time to escape, lie flat in the nearest depression such as a ditch or ravine.

3. IF IN A TOWN OR CITY:

1. Seek inside shelter, preferably in a strongly reinforced building. STAY AWAY FROM WINDOWS!
2. In homes: The corner of the basement toward the tornado usually offers greatest safety, particularly in frame houses. People in houses without basements can sometimes be protected by taking cover under heavy furniture against inside walls. Doors and windows on the sides of the house away from the tornado may be opened to help reduce damage to the building.
3. Standing against the inside wall or on a lower floor of an office building offers some protection.

4. IF IN SCHOOLS:

1. In city areas: If school building is of strongly reinforced construction, stay inside, away from windows, remain near an inside wall on the lower floors when possible. AVOID AUDITORIUMS AND GYMNASIUMS with large, poorly-supported roofs!
2. In rural schools that do not have strongly reinforced construction, remove children and teachers to a ravine or ditch if storm shelter is not available.

5. IF IN FACTORIES AND INDUSTRIAL PLANTS:

On receiving a tornado warning, a lookout should be posted to keep safety officials advised of the tornado's approach. Advance preparation should be made for moving workers to sections of the plant offering the greatest protection.

6. Keep calm. It will not help to get excited. People have been killed by running out into streets and by turning back into the path of a tornado. Even though a warning is issued, chances of a tornado striking one's home or location are very slight. Tornadoes cover such a small zone, as a rule, that relatively only a few places in a warned area are directly affected. You should know about tornadoes though, "just in case."
7. Keep tuned to your radio or television station for latest tornado advisory information. Do not call the Weather Bureau, except to report a tornado, as your individual request may tie up telephone lines urgently needed to receive special reports or to relay advisories to radio and television stations for dissemination to thousands in the critical area.

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
