Baker-Taylor, Sheriff Co-hosts

Theft Seminar Here A 'First'

Law enforcement officers from four states will attend a seminar on theft of oil field equipment here Thursday, co-hosted by Baker and Taylor Drilling Co. and the Hansford County Sheriff's Department...and find it is not just another Texas barbecue!

Some \$30-to-50 million in oil field equipment is stolen in Texas annually and Roy Bulls, "majordomo" of Baker and Taylor, said there was no way to accurately estimate how much of this was in the "oil patch" of the high plains nor loss by his company alone.

According to Hansford County Sheriff R.L. McFarlin, registrations for the seminar--to be conducted in the "County Barn"--have come from New Mexico, Oklahoma, Kansas and as far away as Odessa in Texas. Two impressive facts mark this seminar. John Sartain,

economist and research specialist for Texas Mid-Continent Oil and Gas, Dallas, said Texas' oilfield equipment losses amount to at least one-third of those reported throughout the nation and...while he has been involved in considerable research on the subject, this is the first seminar of its type he has on record in the nation.

According to Sheriff McFarlin, the "feed" will start about 6 p.m., Thursday. The first session of the seminar should begin about 7 p.m. This will be an address by Bob Flowers of the Texas governor's office, dealing chiefly with the governor's crime package.

Then the program will go to Bill Milner, state police intelligence officer in charge of oil field equipment loss investigations.

Sheriff McFarlin said the final phase of the seminar--a

workshop session wherein officers traded information--would be restricted to law enforcement people only.

The sheriff said he felt Officer Milner would bring those attending up to date on the efforts of Sen. Bob Glasgow, Stephenville, of Texas Senatorial District 22, in the current session of the legislature to put some "teeth" into Texas laws regarding oil field equipment thefts.

Sen. Glasgow has currently up for consideration, SB 676 which would require the manufacturer to place identification marks on all pieces made and sold; SB 677 which would require vendors (dealers in oil field equipment) to be licensed by the Texas Railroad Commission; SB 678 making it a presumption of theft to have possession of oil field equipment without possession of a bill of sale; SB 679 making it a

felony for theft of natural gas or crude oil regardless of the amount involved or the considered amount of value.

A previous bill by Sen. Glasgow, still in consideration, would make the theft of any piece of oil field equipment, regardless of considered value, a felony.

"Texas Mid-Continent is backing Sen. Glasgow to the hilt," John Sartain said. "We feel this is the first realistic legislative effort in some time to make it easier to identify stolen equipment and apprehend and incarcerate the thief or thieves."

Sartain, who has been doing research in this area of oil field loss to theft for some weeks, now, said the figures--\$100-million for the U.S. and \$30-to-\$50 million in Texas--were not inaccurate as they read but are inaccurate when the yet unre-

ported loss is considered.

"In my weeks of research on this," Sartain told the REPORTER, "I have not encountered one single seminar such as this. I think Baker and Taylor and your Sheriff's Department are to be highly commended for this effort. I feel you just might have some folks up there of the caliber of Sen. Bob Glasgow."

\$10,000 Generator Is Stolen

Almost as emphasis on the seminar here, Thursday, on oil field equipment theft, the Hansford County Sheriff's Department received the report of the theft of oil field equipment valued at some \$10-thousand from the Exxon-Rossen location three-quarters of a mile south of Spearman.

Sheriff R.L. McFarlin said an investigation was mounted immediately.

Taken was a motor generator on lease to Criswell Service Co., Perryton, from an Amarillo firm. The generator was a KATO and the motor power was John Deere.

In other activity, the sheriff said his department was investigating the theft of four saddles, brides and other tack equipment reported by Charlie West and valued at \$2,500.

Sheriff McFarlin said that, along with these two new reports, he was continuing work on existing cases.

Recent accounts of arrests, recoveries and prosecutions in The Reporter have marked the success of the work of the Hansford County Sheriff's Department thus far this year.

Five Now Looking At Council Seat

The list of candidates registered for positions on the Spearman city council shot up like temperatures in the present scourge of influenza making the rounds after the Sunday edition of The Papers reported that not one person -- not even an incumbent -- had declared intention to run for one of the three positions on the panel.

At stake are three two-year terms ending for Frances Lof-

tin, Jim Nicholson and Gene Cudd.

Apparently, until it was revealed in the Hansford Plainsman, Sunday, few knew there did not have to be a legal or official notice opening candidate registration nor of the deadline that closed it--nor the fact that an election did not have to be officially called until ten days after the deadline for candidate registration.

Beginning Monday and through Tuesday until press time, five candidates had registered for seats on the city council.

Registering procedure is a bit different from that for school board posts in that the city has only one precinct so the three positions will go to the three candidates polling the most votes individually.

The aspiring slate, thus far, is

comprised of Jim Mercer, Bob Pearson, Gerald Heinrich, Frank Shields and Frank Salgado.

While the candidate-filing deadline is midnight, Wednesday, city officials felt at press time that registration would end with the close of business and the city offices (where registration must be made) at 5 p.m.

While the Texas Secretary of State (who rules on election

matters in the state) has declared a candidate may contact the appropriate city officials or employees any time prior to the midnight deadline and register. However, with an almost "no-show," no one at city hall anticipated an after-hours rush to register.

No official announcement has been forthcoming from incumbents with terms expiring regarding their seeking re-election.

Crawford Joins Race for School Board Post

One name -- Johnny Crawford -- has been added to the roster of candidates for positions on the board of trustees of the Spearman Independent School District (SISD) since the Sunday edition of The Papers.

Due to a disparity in the deadline for candidate-filing and calling of the election notice requirements, "pickin's" were lean for the school board posts and nil for city council candidates until Tuesday.

There are three positions open on the school board. Two of them are three-year terms and one is the two-year unexpired term left open when incumbent Clark Mires moved to Stratford.

At press time, Tuesday, the school board candidate slate shaped up in this wise:

Three candidates were vying for the two three-terms. They are Jim Davis, Tommie White and Craig Schuman. Roger

Odegaard and Johnny Crawford had declared for the two-year unexpired term.

Candidates are required to declare which position they seek at the time of registration.

While midnight, Wednesday, is the legal deadline for registering as a candidate, it is expected none will apply after 5 p.m., Wednesday, when school offices close normally.

According to the office of the Secretary of State of Texas -- who has jurisdiction over elections within the state -- a candidate could contact an appropriate school official after 5 p.m. and prior to the midnight deadline and be registered according to statute.

Since there has been no great gathering of potential candidates to date, school officials do not anticipate any late, after-business-hours requests for registration.

April 4 is election day.

Tower Named 'Minute Man Of The Year'

WASHINGTON--Senator John Tower (R-Texas) Tuesday night, February 17, was named "Minute Man of the Year," the highest honor bestowed by the Reserve Officers Association of the United States (ROA).

The award is presented annually on behalf of the 126,000-member ROA in honor of "the citizen who has contributed most to national security in these times."

"Of course I am honored to receive this award, but it takes on a special meaning in light of the group bestowing it and this particular point in history when the country appears to be waking up to the importance of maintaining a strong national defense," Tower said upon learning he was to receive the Minute Man Award.

"And above all, we must remind the country that the most important link in our national defense system is

comprised of the men and women in uniform, both on active duty and reserve status," he continued.

"If we can't maintain the caliber and morale of our military personnel, we will watch the very foundation of our defense system begin to erode."

Tower was unable to accept the award personally as he was meeting with government leaders in several European and Middle Eastern nations on his first fact finding mission as chairman of the Senate Armed Services Committee.

Mrs. Lilla Tower, the Senator's wife, accepted the award for him, while Senator John Warner (R-Va.) delivered the major address at the Washington Hilton banquet that was expected more than 2,000 reserve officers and their spouses from throughout the United States and overseas.

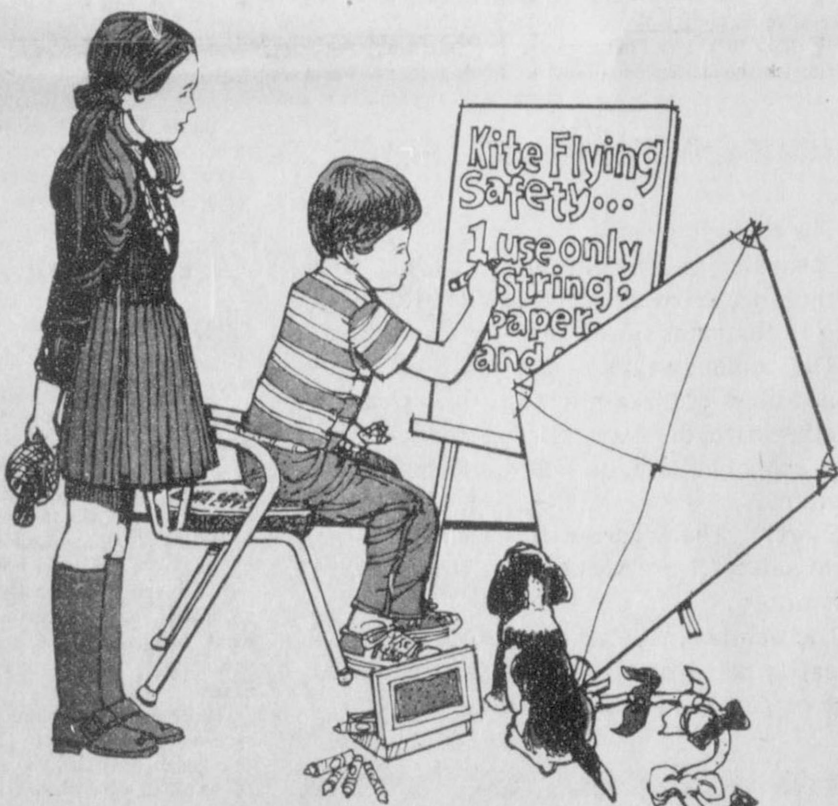
Origin of Pancake Suppers

'Illegal Aliens'

What do fire ants, gypsy moths and walking catfish have in common? According to the March Reader's Digest, they are some of our most pesky "illegal aliens."

When an inspector asks a returning traveler--"Do you have any meat, fruit, vegetables, plants or other agricultural products?"--he's not being frivolous. Failure to uncover seemingly harmless items can have devastating effects. The Mediterranean fruit fly currently ravaging gardens and fruit trees around San Jose, Cal., arrived in a couple of "wormy" mangoes a traveler slipped past an inspector. Dumped in the garbage, the "worms," the larvae of the fruit fly, matured. Despite a \$3 million pest-control effort, the fruit fly has already migrated to adjacent Alameda County.
Walking catfish started out as a two-inch aquarium curiosity. According to science writer Fred Warshofsky, it escaped into Florida's canal system. "Today, thousands cling to the sides of canals, ditches and drainage pools all over the southern part of the state," he writes. More than just a pest, the catfish feed on other fish, among them some of Florida's finest sport fish, such as bass and bluegill. The sport-fishing industry is big in Florida, so the proliferating catfish are not welcome.
An African fish, the blue tilapia, was touted as a possible solution to the algae choking many lakes in the United States, as well as being an excellent food and sport fish. But before they could be properly evaluated, eager fishermen pirated some away to a neighboring lake. The tilapia, it was found, dominates wherever it lives, and it has spread to eight other states. In 1972, six years after its illegal release, blue tilapia comprised 93 percent of all fish in one simple lake. Worse, the fish will not take a hook.
"Quite simply," Warshofsky concludes, "we need laws covering the importation of exotic fish or animals similar to those governing agricultural and meat products."

Those who have been hoping and working for unity in the Christian faith must acknowledge that the latest word from likeable, popular Pope John Paul II makes clear a long road is ahead.

On his recent Asian trip, the Pope flatly said there will be no change in the Catholic Church's position on abortion, birth control and divorce. Speaking in Asia, where population problems are extreme, his words on birth control were especially significant.

The Pope's adamancy is one reason China refused to invite John Paul to visit China. (Another is that China's present government refuses to allow a foreigner to appoint its ranking church bishops and, from abroad, run the administration end of its church.)

Polls show that a majority of American Catholics favor church-opposed birth control methods, even though in this country the population explosion is not in any way the problem it is in nations like China and India; China, with about a billion people, claims that only through modern birth control has the nation avoided periodic famines claiming millions of lives, a regular occurrence in that country in the past.

There are those who fear John Paul's words will be costly in human life in Asia. Included in the former group are many Catholics high in the Philippine Government—which provides free birth control clinics in an effort to stem population growth, and poverty.

"The spirit of the times is seen in fashion before it is seen at the voting booth," the director of New York's National Organization for Women chapter told a Texas Christian University audience recently.

Virginia Corne believes the strides of the 1960s and 1970s in both women's rights and fashions are fast disappearing.

Current fashions reflect a worldwide political conservatism and renewed effort to keep women in tow, she claims. Comfortable, utilitarian clothes are out, right along with the pro-women politics that once sanctioned the Equal Right Amendment and reproductive freedom.

In her TCE presentation, Ms. Corne pointed to White House fashions. The egalitarian style of the Carter years—cardigan for the president and a six-year old inauguration dress for his wife—have been replaced by it Reagans' white ties and designer dresses.

She insists that the conservative tide began much earlier than the new administration. The late 1970s major New York newspapers were forecasting return to fashions that please women as sex objects.

The image of a woman soft, alluring and useless is just about par for women's fashion. Ms. Corne said. It's the sex politics of an era that dict fashions, she believes, and the politics usually aim to the women prisoners of th clothes.

Texans Don't Need to Pay

AUSTIN, Tex.—State Comptroller Bob Bullock Wednesday said Texans don't need to pay taxes on factory rebates offered for the purchase of new cars.

He also said car buyers who have mistakenly paid automobile sales tax on the rebate amount are entitled to a refund. Bullock said the big three American automobile manufacturers are all currently offering some type of rebate to encourage the sale of new cars.

Bullock said rebates are cash discounts regardless of the method used to compute the amount or the method used to

pass the rebate along to the consumer.

Rebates should be deducted from the price of a new car before the state's four percent motor vehicle sales tax is calculated.

If the sticker price is \$7,500, for example, and the rebate is \$500, the price of the car for tax purposes is \$7,000, he said.

Smithlawn Maternity Home

LUBBOCK—Smithlawn Maternity Home is serving its 2,000th Smith girl since their beginning in 1960.

As the first cottage-style home in America, Smithlawn provides a responsible alternative for an expectant mother. She can live in the five bedroom brick home in complete confidentiality as she furthers her education and receives top medical care from various local hospitals.

The average stay in the home is three months. Girls who stay longer have more time to elaborate on the decision of giving up their baby to the Smithlawn Adoption Agency, established in 1966.

Smithlawn elder Joe Phillips says that women's attitudes have changed many times in the past 20 years.

"Now—even though abortion

is easy to come by, there is a growing conviction against it. Girls are more family oriented," Phillips said.

Staff Director Howard Hulett said, "We try to help the girls find a more contributing life." One girl had come to Smithlawn as a member of a theft ring and a ward of two states. After leaving Smithlawn, she had Tennessee connections inform Hulett of her newly directed life which was a result of the guidance and direction she received while in the home.

The maternity home and adoption agency are supervised by Smithlawn Church of Christ and supported by church affiliations in Texas and surrounding states.

Young Adults And Marijuana

Over 80 percent of young adults in the 18-25-year age bracket who live alone have tried marijuana, said Dr. S.B. Sells, research professor of psychology and director of the Institute of Behavioral Research (IBR) at Texas Christian University.

When young adults live with a roommate, the incidence of marijuana use rises to 90 percent, Sells added.

As director and founder of the institute at TCU, Sells operates a widely recognized research program in drug abuse treatment evaluation and epidemiology. The research institute, which was established in 1962, holds one of the most comprehensive library collections of drug abuse literature and research data in the United States.

Since 1972, the use of marijuana among teenagers has increased from 14 percent to 31 percent, said Sells. Research indicates that although the age of first use of marijuana has become progressively younger, it is more attributable to an increase in opportunities than a change of attitude in the teen-age population.

"The typical user is part of a subset of youth population whose lifestyles and associations with users provide opportunities to use drugs," he said.

In addition, he said statistics indicate that children are more likely to try marijuana in families where the mother or older sibling smokes cigarettes and drinks alcohol. However, there is no data to show that the father's use of tobacco and alcohol influences an adolescent's abuse of illicit drugs, Sells said he did not believe that this was indicative of a father's lack of influence on the children but was more attributable to the fact that fathers were often

working or separated from the home.

"There are three main characteristics of adolescents who initiate and continue drug use. Autonomy and independence, lack of concern for conventional customs institutions and a high acceptance of transgressions against conventional morality are the most common characteristics," said Sells.

The more a child strays from the bonds of family and conventional morality, the more likely the chance of drug abuse. In these cases, the adolescent will replace conventional bonds with peers who accept such behavior.

For young adults, "involvement in family life discourages the use of illicit drugs," said Sells. "Marriage, the presence of children in the home and success in school or work are deterrents to drug use."

industrial waste into items of real economic value.

"The purpose of this legislation is to encourage companies to purchase pollution control equipment to improve the environment. Unfortunately, this equipment is usually so expensive that some companies have found it cheaper to pay the fines for polluting, rather than to buy and install the sophisticated anti-pollution devices that are needed. I believe this bill will help to remove some of the economic disincentives that presently exist for a better environment," Senator Mengden said.

"It is certainly in the best interest of the state to provide tax incentives to fight pollution. A clean environment, without loss of jobs, is a goal that all Texans share," Senator Parker said.

Senator Mengden, the chairman of the Subcommittee on Energy of the Senate Natural Resources Committee, also introduced SB 717, to exempt industrial or commercial energy conservation equipment from the sales tax. This would include devices with the primary purpose of recovering waste heat or waste steam for effective conversion into electric power generation, heat, lighting, or refrigeration.

Recreation and Tourist Complex

LIVINGSTON, TX--Sunday, March 1, marks the beginning of the sixteenth year of operation for the Alabama-Coushatta Indian Reservation's "Camping Recreation and Tourist Complex" in Polk County. The Tribes began their visitor-oriented industry in 1965 with a simple arts and craft shop and museum.

Today these quiet people are known nation-wide as "A Special Part of Texas!". Their 4,000 acre reservation-home located between Livingston and Woodville on U.S. Highway 190 preserves perhaps the last stand of virgin timber in the Piney Woods section of the famed Big Thicket.

The Alabama-Coushatta tourist facility offers a unique blend of culture and recreation focused on the Tribes' historical link with the surrounding forests. "Some of our older tribal members believe that if we continue to protect our trees, they will continue to protect us." This statement comes from Reservation Superintendent Roland Poncho.

"We welcome visitors for two very important reasons," Poncho explains. "We are anxious for our fellow Texans to know and realize the special part our people played in developing this great state. And, secondly--certainly, the most important reason, many people fail to understand the role our Tourist Complex plays in providing badly needed services for the Tribes."

Poncho went on to point out that shrinking state appropriations have made the success of the tourism program doubly important to the Indians. "Without adequate revenue we may have to cut off vital medical services."

Even with difficult times ahead the Alabama-Coushatta seem determined to continue offering families and visiting motorcoach tours a quality recreational spot. "Inflation is hounding our visitors as much, if not more, than it is us," according to reservation's media spokesperson David A. DeLong. "We feel that a family outing should be enriching as well as fun, but today the first question asked is always, 'How Much?'"

"We have actually lowered our adult admission prices this season," he said, "and we've gone to an all-day offer which allows a family more time for more fun." DeLong also detailed a full-scale renovation of the complex aimed at eliminating unsuccessful elements and upgrading the more popular attractions such as the Living Indian Village.

Visitors to the Reservation may travel deep into the Big Thicket on specially built tour busses as Indian guides describe the history of their tribe and the beauty of their land. Traditional and modern Native American dances are performed in a stockade-like structure while Indian women pound corn into the necessary ingredients for "sof-key" and fry bread. Children and their parents may also ride on a miniature "Iron Horse" railroad line commemorating the importance of the logging and timber industries to East Texas and the Tribes.

During the summer months Sundown Amphitheatre is the home of a professionally-produced outdoor drama authored by Dr. Kermit Hunter of Dallas. "Beyond the Sundown" tells the story of the Tribes' struggle to remain at peace during the Texas war for independence from Mexico.

Year-round primitive camping as well as full-service sites are available along the shores of Lake Tombigbee, a man-made twenty-six acre lake named after the Tombigbee River in Alabama, the original home of the Tribes. A diorama Tribal Museum located on the reservation details their migration westward into Texas.

Support of a Bill

AUSTIN--Attorney General Mark White today expressed his support of a bill to be introduced and co-sponsored in the Senate by Senators Peyton McKnight (D., Tyler) and Bob Glasgow (D., Stephenville), and in the House of Representatives by Representative Neal T. "Buddy" Jones (D., Hillsboro) which would require the defense to raise any technical problems in an indictment before the trial so that such non-substantive formal deficiencies could not be raised on appeal. White said that yesterday's decision by the Texas Court of Criminal Appeals to dismiss indictments against six people convicted of possessing cocaine because of legal technicalities illustrates the need for a change in the law. White was not critical of the Court, but he said the decision clearly shows that the law must be changed to prevent guilty parties from being freed on technicalities that have been hidden from the trial court.

The Brain

til very recently, brain damage was considered to be irreversible. The belief was that the brain's inability to grow new nerve tissue contributed to permanent disability. New techniques have now made it possible, however, to observe that the brain really does grow nerve tissue after brain damage, said Michael Chafetz, doctoral degree candidate at Texas Christian University.

Chafetz and Dr. Fred Gage, TCU associate professor of psychology, are studying a special kind of nerve growth in the intact portions of a rat's brain following damage in that area.

At present, Chafetz and Gage do not know if this growth contributes or inhibits the animal's recovery from brain damage. Their current research attempts to uncover what effect the growth has on such damage, and the first step that they have undertaken is to measure the nerve growth. Chafetz and Gage recently completed a research report detailing this initial effort. The work was partially funded by a grant from the scientific research society of Sigma Xi. Prior to his work at TCU, Chafetz received his bachelor's and master's degrees from Tulane University. Dr. Gage who holds the Ph.D. degree from Johns Hopkins University, joined the TCU faculty in 1976.

Companion Bills Introduced

Representative Jerry Cockerham, Republican from Monahan, and Senator Walter Mengden, Republican from Harris County, have introduced companion bills in the House and Senate, HB 1249 and SB 707, to permit a court in which an individual is sued by a state agency to order the state agency to pay the defendant's court costs and attorney's fees upon a finding by the court that the state agency's suit was frivolous, unreasonable, or without foundation.

IRS News

There are at least 36 million U.S. taxpayers who could be filing the simpler Federal income tax Form 1040A this year instead of the Form 1040, according to the Internal Revenue Service. Taxpayers who earned \$20,000 or less (\$40,000 or less if married and filing a joint return) during 1980, and whose income is from wages, salaries, tips or unemployment compensation, and who have not earned more than \$400 in interest or \$400 in dividends in 1980, can file a Form 1040A. If a taxpayer is filing only for the purpose of getting a refund of the earned income credit, the interest or dividend income can exceed \$400. A Form 1040A may also be used if a taxpayer does not claim credits other than the earned income credit or the political credit.

Filing the Form 1040A can save time, is easier, and can make errors less likely. However, many taxpayers must file the regular Form 1040. For example, taxpayers who itemize deductions, claim more exemptions than are shown in the tax table for their filing status, or wish to income average must file the Form 1040. A taxpayer filing as a qualifying widow(er) with a dependent child must file a Form 1040.

Those taxpayers who choose to claim certain credits such as the child care credit, residential energy credit, credit for the elderly, investment credit, foreign tax credit, or work incentive credit, should file the Form 1040.

ment in, and control of our lives. It seems that in some instances many of these state agencies are totally unrestrained in the length that they will go in propagating and implementing rules, guidelines, and regulations. They can sue the citizen who dares to have the audacity to challenge one of their rulings. The threat of expensive prolonged litigation is a deterrent that keeps many citizens from seeking review of, or vindication of, their rights in civil actions, in administrative proceedings, or in defending themselves against unreasonable governmental action. This must be stopped. These agencies must be held accountable for any litigation they file against a citizen," Representative Cockerham said.

Senator Mengden stated that this legislation will cause state agencies to be a lot more careful in filing civil suits against citizens. "If a person is genuinely in violation of a valid law or regulation, then our state government should certainly compel enforcement through all appropriate means, including civil suits. But they better be sure they know what they are doing. If some state agencies keep filing suits that have absolutely no merit, it's only fair that they reimburse the citizens for the costs of defending themselves against these suits," he said.

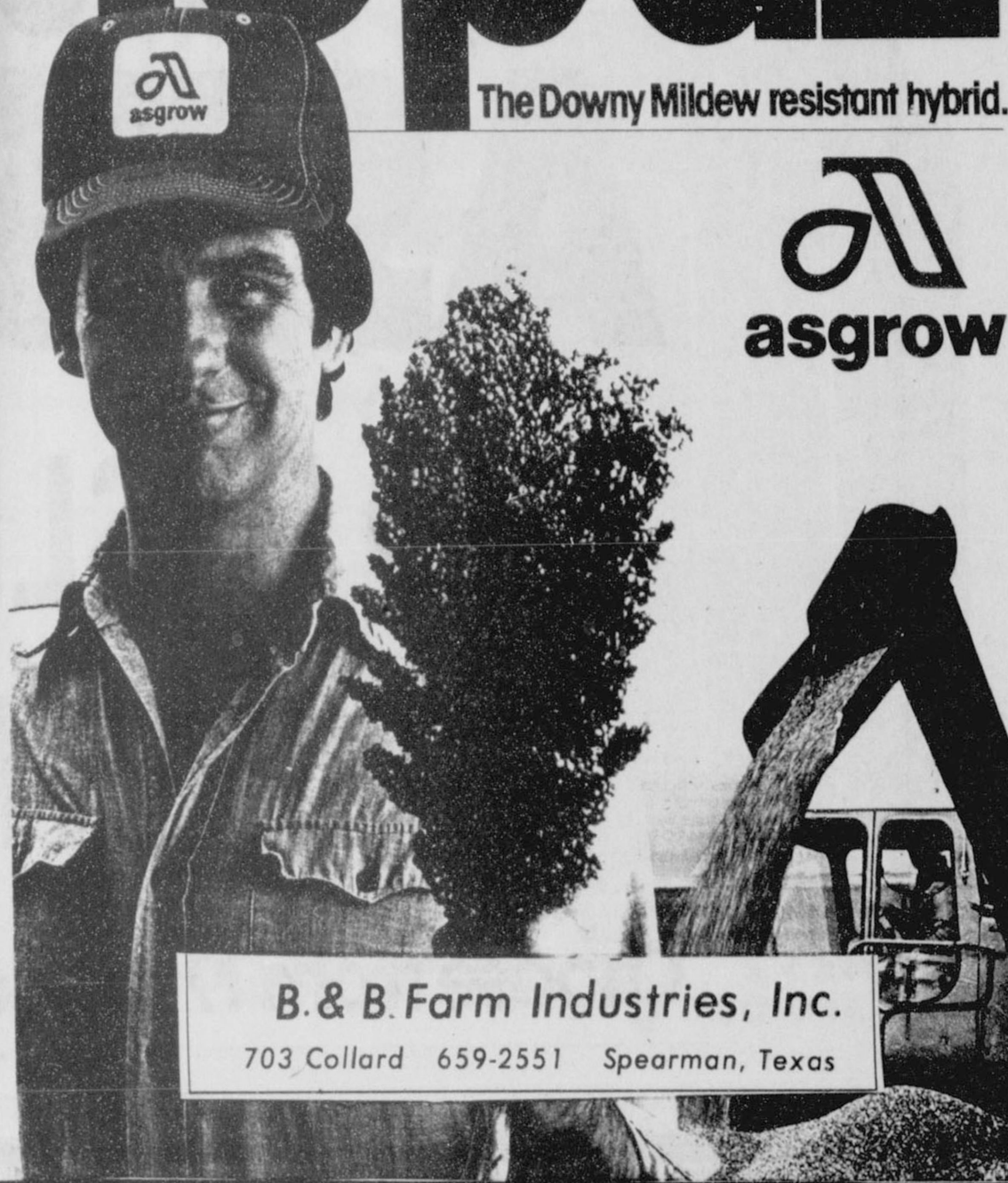

Hired And Fired By Board Of Directors

There's a close relationship between corporate executives and elected government officials, in the opinion of Raymond Hagel, former chairman of the board and chief executive officer of Macmillan Inc.

"Executives are hired and fired by a board of directors just like congressmen are by their constituents," he said. "They experience many of the same conflicts that politicians do. An executive must be concerned with the social good, the company's good, and, in truth, he is frequently concerned with his own good," said Hagel.

Hagel recently has been commuting every week from New York City to Fort Worth as a David L. Tandy Executive-In-Residence at Texas Christian University. While at TCU's Neeley School of Business this spring, Hagel is teaching two courses—an honors section for undergraduate business students and a graduate-level class on "The Executive in the Corporate Environment."

Hagel's experience as chief executive for Macmillan is reflected in the assignments he has given his honors students. One group will be exploring what effect "talking machines" will have on the language business. Since Macmillan owns Berlitz Language School, the problem is one which Hagel can closely identify with.

A native of Jersey City, N.J., Hagel started his career in 1938 as a publicist for McGraw-Hill. After serving in the Naval Reserve during World War II, he became president of Smith, Hagel and Knudsen, Inc. in 1948.

Crowell-Collier, predecessor of Macmillan, hired Hagel as a consultant to aid the floundering company. "Post-war inflation and the advent of television ultimately put Collier's magazine out of business," said Hagel.

Following a proposal he submitted, however, the board of Macmillan hired Hagel in 1959 to enact his proposal which would cause the company to "rise like a phoenix from its own ashes."

Honesty is the best policy because, in the end, it pays the biggest dividends.

Greatest Political Earthquake

"The elections of Nov. 4, 1980, represent the greatest political earthquake of our generation," said syndicated columnist and political commentator George F. Will.

In an address to the business alumni of Texas Christian University, Will said the election marked the "conclusion of a decade of political turmoil." This was illustrated by the fact that only three states have the same two senators that they had in 1970. In the last election, 1,125 years of seniority were lost, he added.

This instability was caused by

the "reverberations of the Yom Kippur War and Pearl Harbor. Prior to World War II, only one in 10 Americans paid income tax. Not until the 1970's did the weight of the welfare state grow too heavy," he continued.

Even though the American people showed their dissatisfaction in the last election, they are deeply conflicted in the desires they hold, he said. While people talk about the weight of government, they don't really mean it.

Over 46 percent of American families receive some transfer from the government, Will said. People have basically had

the attitude of "cut my neighbor's subsidy." This attitude will be a problem as Reagan tries to meet the mandate that was given to him in the November election.

From 1973-75, Will was Washington editor of National Review, the leading conservative journal of ideas and political commentary. In 1977, he received the Pulitzer Prize for commentary at the age of thirty-five. Will now writes a syndicated column for Newsweek and appears on ABC's "Nightline."

4-H Horsemanship

A 4-H Horsemanship Clinic was held Friday, February 20, and Saturday, February 21, at the Pat Patterson arena. Twenty-one 4-H'ers participated in the clinic put on by Karen Russell from Hutchinson, Kansas. One unique feature of the program was the use of a video-tape which enabled 4-H'ers to view themselves on a TV

screen after they rode prescribed patterns on horseback. Meals were catered by the parents and the clinic was concluded with a hamburger fry Saturday night.

Thirty two youth were present at the first meeting of the 4-H Veterinary Science Project. The next meeting will be March 4 at the County Barn.

Poisonings Increase

The child is screaming and coughing. Mother runs to the garage and finds the child coughing, gagging, and having difficulty breathing and falls unconscious to the floor from a pan where his dad was washing greasy car parts with gasoline. An unusual occurrence? "No," says Michael Ellis, director of the Texas State Poison Center. "Spring and summer always brings us an increase in the number of ingestions of gasoline and other petroleum distillates." During 1980 the Poison Center was contacted over 19,000 times for a poisoning emergency and some 11,000 times for general information about preventing poisoning. "The poison inquiries are primarily about children," Ellis said, "in fact, about 70% of all our calls involve the child who is 5 years old or younger. This is the prime age for small objects found down low to go directly in the mouth." And what about our child who drank the gasoline? "Gasoline and other petroleum distillates such as furniture polishes, lamp oils, lighter fluid, etc. present us with considerable problems," Ellis noted. "If these products get into the lung of the child, the lung can be coated with the liquid and asphyxiation and

death over a several day period occurs all too frequently." And there isn't much we can do about the situation." March 15-21 is National Poison Prevention Week and a good time to check for poor storage of poisons. Although the ingestion of foreign substances occurs quite frequently in the young child, luckily true poisonings do not occur nearly as frequently. "Rushings the patient to the hospital emergency room after they have ingested a foreign substance, is not the best approach to the problem," said Ellis. "About 85% of the time the patient can be treated at home and does not require medical attention. Call the Poison Center first, and let them help you determine whether medical attention is necessary. In this way the patient is traumatized to a minimal degree if no medical attention is required."

Since a poisoning emergency occurs whenever you are least expecting it, the telephone number of the Poison Center is a very important number to keep handy. In Galveston, the telephone number is 1-713-765-1420. It is answered 24 hours a day, 7 days a week. Keep the number handy, remember, children act fast, so do poisons.

Citizens Be Aware

Austin-Kenneth E. Graeber, executive director of the State Property Tax Board (SPTB), today announced a statewide program to make citizens more aware of their rights, remedies and responsibilities as taxpayers.

The public education program involves the State Property Tax Board, local tax assessors throughout Texas and the print and broadcast news industries, Graeber said.

He added that the awareness program consists of two elements, the first of which involves distribution of a comprehensive 12-page pamphlet entitled, **Taxpayers' Rights, Remedies, Responsibilities**, while the second phase of the program consists of efforts by news media to inform all Texans of tax rendition deadlines and the procedures and requirements to apply for homestead exemptions and productivity values.

Graeber said that local tax assessors are cooperating in this part of the taxpayer education program. The efforts are being conducted in March to provide sufficient time for taxpayers to apply for all tax relief to which they may be entitled before local tax rendition deadlines.

To qualify for most homestead exemptions and productivity valuation for agricultural land, Graeber noted that applications should be made to each jurisdiction which taxes a particular piece of property before the rendition period ends. "Most of the state's local taxing units have rendition deadlines of April 1 or April 30 and failure to make timely application may cause loss of the tax relief until the next tax year," he added.

In 1982, when the new Property Tax Code will be fully implemented, all taxing jurisdictions will have a rendition deadline of April 1," Graeber said.

Free copies of the **Taxpayers' Remedies** pamphlet are available by contacting local tax offices. Supplies are limited, however, and may be quickly exhausted in some jurisdictions.

The pamphlet covers a broad range of tax-related matters and is designed to help Texans become more knowledgeable on how the property tax system operates. If a local tax office runs out of copies, citizens may request single copies by writing the State Property Tax Board at P.O. Box 15900, Austin, Texas 78761.

SPTB officials indicated that the following categories of homestead exemptions are available:

--General Homestead. Those persons qualifying for a residence homestead are entitled to a \$5,000 exemption off the market value of their homestead for school tax purposes. An additional \$3,000 county homestead exemption from assessed value is available against the portion of the county tax rate for farm-to-market roads or flood control.

--Persons 65 or older. Elderly citizens are entitled to an additional \$10,000 exemption off the market value of their residence homestead for school

taxes. And, while an elderly citizen's property may increase in value through the years, the school taxes owed in any one year cannot be greater than the amount owed in 1979 or in the first year the property owner qualified for the exemption, whichever is later. An annual application to the school tax office is required.

By local option, school districts, cities and counties may offer additional exemptions to elderly homeowners of not less than \$3,000 of the market value of the residence homestead.

--Disability Exemption. Citizens who are totally disabled and qualify for the residence homestead exemption are entitled to an additional exemption of \$10,000 off the market value of their residence homestead. This exemption applies to school taxes only. A property owner may not receive both this disability exemption and the \$10,000 exemption for the elderly.

School districts, cities and counties may offer an additional local option disability exemption of not less than \$3,000 off the market value of the residence homestead.

--Disabled Veteran or Qualifying Survivor. Certain disabled veterans or their survivors may be entitled to an exemption ranging from \$1,500 to \$3,000 from the assessed value of any property they own. The amount depends on the percentage of service-connected disability.

This exemption may be applied against the value of any property owned on January 1 of the year in which the application is made. The disabled veteran must be a Texas resident and complete an annual application at local tax offices. Only one property may receive the exemption and VA or armed forces documents verifying disability are required.

Land which is being utilized for agricultural purposes may be eligible for tax relief. Qualified landowners hold the option of having an agricultural or open-space land valuation applied to their property. Details on what types of land may be taxed on productivity rather than market value are available in local tax offices or in the **Remedies** pamphlet.

Social Security

Each year, by April 15th, people receiving Social Security benefits are asked to file an annual report of their earnings. The necessary form will be received in the mail by those needing to report.

The annual report is used by the Social Security Administration to assure that the person received the correct amount of benefits for 1980. If too much, or too little was paid, adjustments are made after the annual report is received.

There is, again this year, an increase in the retirement test exempt amount for people receiving social security. For people under 65 all year, the 1981 exempt amount is \$4080. The 1980 amount was \$3720. For people 65 or over, the 1981 exempt amount is \$5500. The 1980 amount was \$5000. Generally, a person has \$1 in benefits withheld for each \$2 of annual earnings over this exempt amount.

An additional reminder is that holiday season bonuses are counted as wages for social security purposes, and therefore, could increase anticipated annual earnings.

Mental Retardation Month

Persons with mental retardation are those who develop at a below average rate and experience unusual difficulty in learning, social adjustment and economic productivity. An estimated three percent of the population of the United States or more than six million people are believed to be mentally retarded. This population includes approximately 102 persons in Spearman, Texas.

Mentally retarded persons are found among every race, religion and nationality; every educational, social and economic background. One out of every ten Americans has a direct involvement with the problem by virtue of having a mentally retarded person in his or her family.

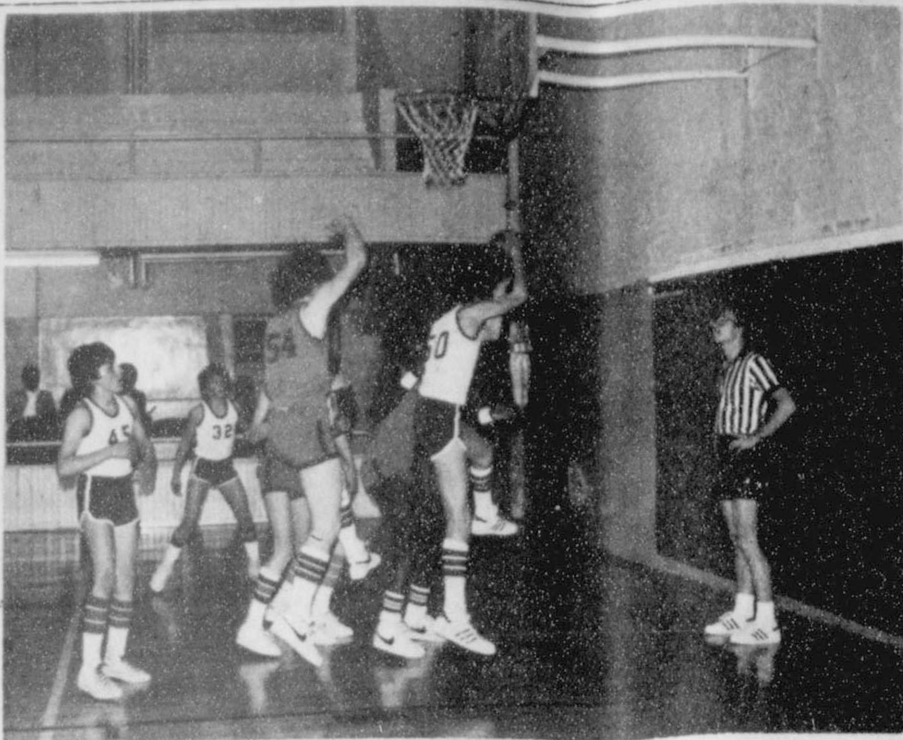
Mental retardation should not be confused with mental illness or emotional disturbance, although a retarded person may become emotionally disturbed. Mentally retarded people simply have a learning problem; they learn more slowly than others. Mental retardation can be caused by any condition that hinders or interferes with development before birth, during birth or during early childhood. Many causes have already been identified, although these account for only about a fourth of all identified cases of mental retardation.

Increasingly, people are realizing that mentally retarded persons, and person with other

handicaps have the same rights as anyone else...especially the right to live as normal a life as possible.

March will be observed as Mental Retardation Month to help acquaint the general public with the presence and needs of mentally retarded persons and their families within their constituency, neighborhood or community. Retarded persons often need a guiding hand in shopping, in cleaning house, in cooking or in making wise choices, particularly in purchasing items. Parents of retarded children would appreciate having a person to call on to babysit if they need to shop or have an appointment or need some free time to themselves. The opportunity for service to mentally retarded persons and their families are endless if people will learn more about mental retardation and become sensitive to the presence of these people in their midst. Let them know you care.

Program and services for mentally retarded citizens of the Texas Panhandle are available in the public schools and through various towns where satellite centers of the Amarillo State Center for Human Development are located. Day programs sponsored by the Amarillo State Center are located in Borger, Childress, Dumas, Hereford, Pampa, Perryton, Tulia and Wellington. Citizens in other towns can contact the Amarillo office for services.

LAWN and GARDEN TIPS

DORMANT SPRAY PREVENTS INSECT OUTBREAKS LATER



Spraying before the leaves appear can make your trees healthier all summer.

Now, in early spring, is the best time to prevent future pest outbreaks with a dormant spray program.

A dormant spray is used on a tree or shrub while it is leafless and dormant—live but not actively growing. A dormant spray is so effective because it kills overwintering insects and diseases before they have a chance to multiply and infest new growth.

In general, dormant sprays are most effective against scale insects, mites, mealy bugs, many types of insect eggs and hibernating caterpillars.

Dormant sprays are usually composed of oil, lime-sulfur or a combination of the two. The lime-sulfur spray has fungicidal action which can be used against rose canker, black spot, mildew, scab, and other fungus diseases. Some dormant sprays are a combination insecticide-fungicide that will control both insects and plant disease. Always read label directions carefully and follow them exactly.

Dormant sprays should be applied before buds swell and when the possibility for heavy freeze damage has passed. In most locations, this means that spraying should be done in early Spring.

Spray only when the temperature is above 40 (F), and

when a freeze is not expected within the next 24 hours. Apply on a calm, sunny day so the plants have a chance to dry before night.

The National Sprayer and Duster Association suggests when you spray that you cover the plant thoroughly without overspraying. Spray all plant parts—twigs, branches, and trunk—just to the point of run-off.

For best results, NSDA specialists also recommend that you use proper spray equipment. A slide-type sprayer is ideal for dormant spraying. This type of sprayer can reach high into trees and can also be adjusted to spray low-growing plants and shrubs. A compressed air sprayer, with a tank capacity from one to four gallons, is also good for the application of dormant sprays to shrubs.

For larger jobs—such as an orchard—a power sprayer provides the greatest ease and versatility.

When you finish your early spring spraying, always clean your sprayer, keeping it ready for the next job.

A little planning coupled with a dormant spray program now will bring you rewards in the warmer months ahead as you enjoy pest-free trees and shrubs.
