Dedication, Open House

Sunday ceremony for Hansford Manor

The new Hansford Manor extended care nursing center will be formally opened and dedicated in ceremonies conducted by the Chamber of Commerce at 2 p.m., Sunday.

The CoFC gold-jacketed Ambassadors will participate in a ribbon-cutting that heralds an Open House at the Manor from 2 to 5 p.m., Sunday.

Informally, the extended care center for senior citizens has been open for some time with 27 elderly residents enjoying the brightness, beauty and comfort of the facility.

That is just 12 persons short of a capacity census.

"I have had to accumulate considerable experience to qualify for this position," commented Manor Administration Ray Wasil, "but I don't say that to boast but to qualify a superlati-

"This is the most supported facility of its type I have ever seen and that support is evidenced three ways: the number of people contributing, the amount of their contributions and the skilled and judicious way that support has been applied."

Noting this support left nothing for his staff to worry about but their duties in running the facility, Wasil brought us to our turn to note he and his staff were doing the job admirably.

There are 18 nurses aides and even spreading them over shifts, the 27 residents of Hansford Manor are comfortably aware there is at least one at hand when needed. This distills down to a wide margin of personal attention if needed.

So hard-working are these aides and so appreciative of the

facility are the residents that it is possible for a staff of three to "keep house."

Four licensed vocational nurses are over the nurses aides and they in turn work closely with the Director of Nursing.

This ultimately centers the entire effort at the Manor on three persons: Administrator Wasil, Director of Nursing Deloris Guthrie and Activities Director Jody Harnish.

They are capable of handling it.

Wasil was actually a microbiologist when he came to this post. His specialty was viral diseases -- the bane of the elderly. This gives him a "leg up" on spotting health problems.

Deloris Guthrie not only has that keen edge of responsibility that comes to dedicated nurses, she has a dedication to her fellow human beings and that makes her talents and personality ideal for the Manor.

But . . . minute by minute of every walking day -- outside any health crisis -- Jody Harnish is on the spot. The "Golden Years" of rest without responsibility sound wonderful but it actually means boredom is always waiting in the wings. However, finding ways to fight it is just a part of Jody's job.

She must also stage events that will keep up a heavy traffic of visitors to the Manor . . . to keep the residents there remembered by those still caught up in the flurry of the work-a-day world.

Next to these three are LVNs Vera Dominguez, Ada Ruth Diggs, Patsy Hunt and Rosetta Tindell.

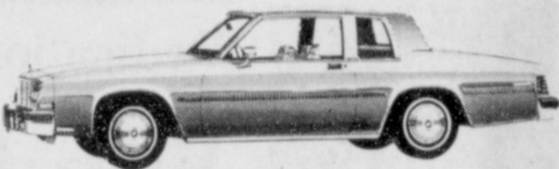

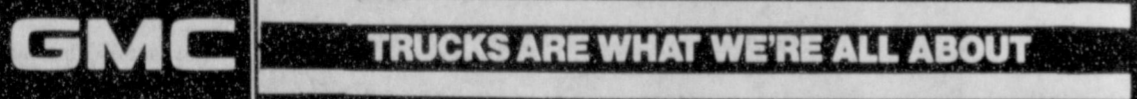

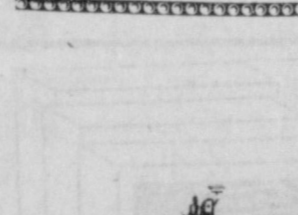

Perryton back leads 3A standouts

Perryton quarterback Clint Allred is a positive thinker, according to Coach Robert Langford.

"He's willing to do things that make things happen," said Langford. "Some kids are not willing to gamble because bad things might happen. He looks at it from the standpoint that good things might happen."

Running Perryton's option to near perfection Friday night, Allred led the Class 3A Rangers to a convincing 39-6 victory over Class 4A Dumas.

Allred, brother of former West Texas State University defensive starter Perry Allred, rushed for 135 yards on 10 carries and passed for an additional 14 yards and a touchdown as the Rangers improved to 1-1 on the season.

Allred is the Globe-News' player of the week in Class 3A. "I know the (opposing) coaches are concerned about stopping him," said Langford.

"He reads all three options real well. Once he gets up the field, he doesn't mind pitching the ball when he gets in traffic. We've picked up a lot of yardage over the last few years when he's done that."

Allred, who also starts at defensive cornerback, is one of Perryton's tri-captains and the key to an offense which has averaged 384 yards in two games. Both games were against Class 4A opponents.

"He's a real heady ball player," said Langford. Spearman's Dennis Randall and Dalhart's Randy White were the top

contenders for this week's player-of-the-week award.

Randall rushed for 201 yards on 19 carries as Spearman clubbed Sanford-Fritch, 28-7.

White had 176 yards rushing on 22 carries and blocked a punt that led to a Golden Wolves' touchdown in Dalhart's 27-2 win over Stratford.

Randall scored on a 71-yard run on Spearman's first possession of Friday's game as the Lynx improved to 1-1 for the season.

"He's the fastest kid we have in school," said Spearman coach Larry Lanier. "He's big and strong and tough. He's the best back I've ever coached."

"He can outrun people when he gets in the open field. If he can't, he'll run over them. He shattered his head gear in a game against Stratford. Whoever comes up to tackle him had better be prepared."

Dalhart's White scored touchdowns on runs of 1 and 7 yards as the Wolves improved to 1-1 on the season.

"He doesn't have much speed, but he certainly will stick it to 'em," said Dalhart coach Buddy Sharp.

Others receiving honorable mention player-of-the-week nods are Dalhart's Jay Fixen and Rocky Romero, Friona's Charlie Morgan and Dimmitt's Mark Bruegal.

Fixen (linebacker) and Romero (defensive tackle) were keys to the Golden Wolves' defense which issued Stratford just 24 total yards.

Morgan rushed for 164 yards on 24 carries as Friona evened its season record at 1-1 with a 34-6 win over Boys Ranch.

Morgan scored three times. He had TD runs of 25 and 10 yards and a 7-yard pass reception for a score.

Friona coach Tommy Moss said Morgan, who's now rushed for 260 yards on the season, had 62 yards worth of rushing called back Friday because of penalties.

Dimmitt's Bruegal rushed for 82 yards and two touchdowns in the first half of the Bobcats' 21-0 win over Plains.

Bruegal, a 5-10, 180-pound junior tailback, sat out the second half with a knee injury.

LAUNDRY-ROOM TACTICS: SAVING MONEY OR MAKING MISTAKES?

Energy savings that stem from laundry-room tactics can be dramatic, but laundry mistakes can become a pocketbook tragedy.

Know your laundry's performance capabilities and limits before trying to save energy—at your own expense.

COOLER-WATER WASHING
Energy conservation in the laundry room starts with lower water temperatures for the washer, but don't switch to cooler temperatures until you know how to use them.

In water below 60 degrees F., detergents become ineffective. Also, lower water temperatures affect a granular detergent's ability to dissolve, the colder the water, the slower a powder will dissolve.

So use a liquid detergent—or predissolve a granular one—if you want to use lower water temperatures.

You can't always use cool temperatures for the best effect, either. For removing certain soils, such as oily or greasy stains, hot water at about 140 degrees F. is a must.

Otherwise, heavily soiled laundry may become gray and dingy if you wash it in cool or cold water several times.

Cool-wash cycles definitely have their place in today's complex world of textiles and advancements in treatments for them. Many washes require warm, cool or cold water because of color, fiber content or finish of fabrics.

Another energy conservation

tactic sometimes focuses on cramming washers and dryers too full of laundry items.

Don't allow your clothes "standing room only"—they need "elbow room" so enough wash water and dry air can reach them.

If you crowd them, clothes won't wash clean, and some may not dry enough.

Also, excessive abrasion of clothes can occur when a washer is overloaded or when too-little water is used, and this can cause "pilling" or balling up of man-made fibers on clothes.

'EASY' WITH THE BLEACH
Bleach is another possible disaster in the laundry room as consumers use more of it to help overcome the "dingies" that result from using too little detergent or too-cool water.

Some polyester cotton blends and 100 percent cottons have chemical finishes that actually "grab and hold" chlorine bleach. These fabrics should warn you of this.

Read labels and follow instructions so you don't ruin them by trying to use bleach.

For most all other fabrics, overuse of bleach will result in damage such as rips and tears. Again, read labels—especially the one on bleach containers.

ALWAYS dilute bleach before it comes into contact with clothes.

When using a bleach dispenser, add bleach before loading the washer with clothes to avoid accidentally spilling bleach on dry clothes.

LAUNDRY A FAMILY AFFAIR
Finally, make learning the

ropes about laundry—and energy savings—a family affair. With more women working outside the home, laundry often is done by husbands and children, so all family members need to know about laundry "do's" and "don'ts."

Educational programs conducted by the Texas Agriculture Extension Service serve people of all ages, regardless of Socio-Economic level, color, sex, religion or national origin.

BRIEF EXPLANATORY STATEMENTS OF PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS GENERAL ELECTION NOVEMBER 2, 1982

PROPOSITION NO. 1 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 1 proposes a constitutional amendment that prohibits any state ad valorem tax. Receipts from previously authorized state ad valorem taxes that are collected after the effective date of the proposed amendment shall be deposited to the credit of the general fund of the county collecting the taxes and may be expended for county purposes. Taxes collected before that date shall be distributed by the legislature among educational institutions eligible to receive those funds under prior law. The proposed amendment also repeals a section of the Constitution levying an ad valorem tax for a construction fund for 17 state colleges and universities.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:
"The constitutional amendment repealing the state property tax."

PROPOSITION NO. 2 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 62 as amended by Senate Joint Resolution 10 proposes a constitutional amendment that would eliminate the \$80,000,000 ceiling on state welfare aid during any fiscal year. The amendment would set the state welfare spending limit at \$160,000,000 for the 1982-1983 biennium. The amendment further provides that, for each subsequent biennium, the maximum amount spent for state welfare shall not exceed one percent of the state budget. The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:
"The constitutional amendment to authorize the legislature to provide assistance through the appropriations process to needy persons and to place a ceiling on payments for needy dependent children at one percent of the state budget."

PROPOSITION NO. 3 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 8 proposes a constitutional amendment that would exempt machinery and equipment used in the production of farm and ranch products from taxation. No dollar limits would be imposed and the exemption would apply to corporations and partnerships as well as to families and individuals. The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:
"The constitutional amendment exempting implements of husbandry (agricultural machinery and equipment) from ad valorem taxation."

PROPOSITION NO. 4 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 77 proposes a constitutional amendment that would authorize the Legislature to set a four year maximum term of office for board members of certain water districts and conservation and reclamation districts. The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:
"The constitutional amendment authorizing the Legislature to provide terms not to exceed four years for members of governing boards of certain water districts and conservation and reclamation districts."

PROPOSITION NUMERO 3 EN LA BOLETA

"La enmienda constitucional que autoriza a la Legislatura proveer plazos de no más de cuatro años para los miembros de las juntas gobernantes de agua y distritos de conservación y reclamación."

PROPOSITION NUMERO 5 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 119 proposes a constitutional amendment that would authorize Tarrant and Bee counties to hold county-wide elections to abolish the county treasurer's office by majority vote. Should the county treasurer's office be abolished, the duties, powers, and functions of that office would be transferred to the county auditor or the successor to the auditor's functions. The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:
"The constitutional amendment to abolish the office of county treasurer in Tarrant and Bee counties."

PROPOSITION NUMERO 6 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 6 proposes a constitutional amendment that would raise the constitutional interest rate limit on state general obligation bonds from 6% to 12%. The new 12% ceiling does not, however, apply to bonds issued by the Veterans' Land Board. The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:
"The constitutional amendment increasing the maximum interest rate allowed on state general obligation bonds to a weighted average annual interest rate of 12%."

Postal Service warns investors

The U.S. Postal Service today cautioned coin collectors and investors to check local dealers, libraries or newsstands for coin collecting publications to determine current coin prices before responding to mail-order offers that may grossly inflate the actual value of the coins.

The warning followed signing of a consent order by National Monetary Center, P.O. Box 37438, Washington, D.C., 20013. The Postal Service also is investigating several other coin promotions containing offers similar to those made by N.M.C.

N.M.C. was twice accused of misrepresenting "Morgan" silver dollars, designed by George T. Morgan and issued between 1878 and early 1921, describing them as relatively scarce, "double minted-marked" and authorized by a special act of Congress. N.M.C. also was accused of failing to make clear that its National Monetary

Centers were not connected in any way with the Bureau of the Mint or any other government agency.

The Postal Service most recently filed seven additional complaints against N.M.C. claiming the company was misrepresenting Kennedy silver half dollars minted in 1964, "Liberty Head" silver dollars minted between 1922 and 1935, and U.S. gold coins minted between 1894 and 1881 in two-and-a-half dollar, five dollar, 10 dollar and 20 dollar denominations.

The consent agreement reached with N.M.C. means the company continues to deny each of the allegations but has signed the agreement in order to avoid the cost of a law suit.

As a result, all incoming business mail held or coming in to Washington, D.C., Roslyn, New York and Glen Head, New York for the company after August 25 will be referred to a

court appointed trustee. The trustee will open all mail and segregate orders or remittances for any of the affected coins and record the name and address of senders so that a disclosure letter involving terms of the agreement--and an offer to refund money--will be returned

to customers in 30 days. The trustee will continue to handle coin orders until completion of administrative proceedings to determine the truth or falsity of N.M.C.'s advertising. Both sides will present their evidence in hearings set to begin October 12 in Washington, D.C.

PSU has enrollment increase

Panhandle State University has experienced a significant increase in enrollment. Comparing the fall semester of 1982 with the 1981 fall term, the University has shown a 15% increase in head count, the total number of persons attending classes. The 1981 total was 1213 students. According to Jack Begley, registrar, there are 1392 students attending Panhandle State this term.

Tuesday, September 7 was the final day to enroll. The figures listed are of that date and will be used in reporting to the state agencies. An increase in full time equivalent students was also registered. A full time equivalent (FTE) Student is one taking 15 credit hours per semester. There are 15,612 credit hours being taken this fall

compared with 14,813 a year ago. This reflects an increase in excess of 5%. There are 340 freshmen at PSU now as compared with 290 in the fall of 1981.

PSU President, Dr. Tom Palmer, said "I'm very pleased with these figures. I believe it shows that our recruiting program is paying dividends. The generous scholarship plan that has continued to grow and expand can also be credited." The University has already scheduled appearances at numerous college day programs. Candi Kelly and Virginia Schlitt of the PSU admissions office will be telling the Panhandle State Story to high school seniors and junior college sophomores throughout the 1982-83 academic year.

SMALL BUSINESS—A RESOURCE WE MUST PROTECT

You can look around the square of any Texas town and see the backbone of the state economy—and of the national economy. It's small business and it provides half of all jobs. By the current state definition there are 260,000 in our state—that's 97% of all Texas businesses. The small businessman and woman not only provide jobs and pay taxes; their independent tradition also helps explain the enduring quality of our democratic form of government.

The state of Texas recognizes the importance of small business and has programs to help it. But we can do better.

For one thing, we can abolish the sales tax on utility bills which now falls basically on small business owners. Large manufacturing and processing firms don't have to pay the tax, but the grocer, retailer and florist do. It is not fair.

My opponent opposed doing away with this tax in the last session of the legislature. The tax will bring in an estimated \$220 million in 1984-85. But when you compare that with the extra \$5.1 billion the legislature will have to spend during that time, I feel we can do without the tax and the reve-

nue it will bring. And, as Lt. Governor, I would support its repeal.

I would also support putting into effect recommendations of the small business task force initiated by the Governor. Two of these recommendations are especially appealing. One is to help small business borrow money at better rates. Most small businesses which fail do so because they are under-capitalized. To help that situation, franchise tax money would be deposited in participating banks, which would, in turn, make loans at lower rates to small businesses.

The other recommendation is that we form a group of small business development centers at colleges and universities statewide. Money for the centers would come from the U.S. Small Business Administration, the state and participating schools. The centers would provide training, counseling and other help to small business owners so that they could be more competitive in the marketplace.

Albert Graves speaker at tobacco meet



Albert Graves was on the program at a meeting in Florence, S.C. sponsored by Clemson, University and Philip Morris. The objective of the meeting was to review current marketing regulations and procedures in an effort to determine future changes that would result in better quality tobacco products at a lower cost.

The farmers in the southeast are having the same problems that Spearman farmers are experiencing (higher operating costs with less product income). Also in the tobacco economy, a recent 4 cent per pack tax increase will reduce net profit. The United States tobacco farmers are faced with the same problems that our car manufacturers are faced with—mainly imports.

Philip Morris can get tobacco from Brazil at \$1.35 that would cost \$2.35 from South Carolina.

There was considerable time spent on the need for clean tobacco (less sand, foreign material, etc.).

Al reviewed scheduling procedures for growers computers print and telling each grower the time of day to arrive at the tobacco auction warehouse and how many pounds of tobacco to bring to the warehouse. This simple procedure is used throughout the industry. Also, Joanne made schedules for tobacco markets for several years (telling buyers the time and sequence of selling at a warehouse, and how many pounds to purchase).

Three main systems of selling were presented. One—use the present system, however, increased use of computers and scientific measuring devices etc. Two—use mechanized sales systems for selling tobacco. (tobacco moves past the buyers instead of buyers walking past the tobacco), or three—use a press and compact 5 sheets of tobacco into one 1000 pound bale. This would permit the buyers to visit more warehouses each day and choose the exact grade of tobacco their company

needs. Albert gives credit to any success he may have had to his mother, Viola Graves who has been running the Baker Hotel and Bus Station for many years by herself—most efficient person he knows.
