lity ideal for the manor. But . . . minute by minute of every walking day -- outside any health crisis -- Jody Harnish is on the spot. The "Golden Years" of rest without responsibility sound wonderful but it actually means boredom is always waiting in the wings. However, finding ways to fight

it is just a part of Jody's job. She must also stage events that will keep up a heavy traffic of visitors to the Manor . . . to keep the residents there remembered by those still caught up in the flurry of the work-aday world.





Energy savings that stem from laundry-room tactics can be dramatic, but laundry mistakes can become a pocketbook

Know your laundry's performance capabilities and limits before trying to save energy-at your own expense. COOLER-WATER WASHING

Energy conservation in the laundry room starts with lower water temperatures for the washer, but don't switch to cooler temperatures until you know how to use them.

In water below 60 degrees F., detergents become ineffective. Also, lower water termeratures affect a granular detergent's ability to dissolve. the colder the water, the slower a powder will dissolve.

So use a liquid detergent -- or predissolve a granular one--if you want to use lower water temperatures.

You can't always use cool temperatures for the best effect, either. For removing certain soils, such as oily or greasy stains, hot water at about 140 degrees F. is a must.

Otherwise, heavily soiled laundry may become gray and dingy if you wash it in cool or cold water serveral times.

Cool-wash cycles definitely have their place in today's complex world of textiles and advancements in treatments for them. Many washes require warm, cool or cold water because of color, fiber content or finish of fabrics.

CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS **GENERAL ELECTION**

PROPOSITION NO. 1 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 1 proposes a constitutional amendment that prohibits any state ad valorem tax. Receipts from previously authorized state ad valorem taxes that are collected after the effective date of the proposed amendment shall be deposited to the credit of the general fund of the county collecting the taxes and be expended for county purposes. Taxes

collected before that date shall be distributed by the legislature among educational institutions eligible to receive those funds under prior law. The proposed amendment also repeals a section of the Constitution levving an ad colleges and universities.

The proposed amend-ment will appear on the ballot as follows:

constitutional amendment repealing the state property tax.'

NOVEMBER 2, 1982

House Joint Resolution 62 as amended by Senate Joint Resolution 10 proposes a constitutional amendment that would eliminate the \$80,000,000 ceiling on state welfare aid during any fiscal year The amendment would set the state welfare

PROPOSITION NO. 2

spending limit at \$160,-000,000 for the 1982-1983 biennium. The amendment further provides that, for each subsequent biennium, the maximum amount spent for state welfare shall not exceed one percent of the

state budget. The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to authorize the legislature to provide assistance through the appropriations process to needy persons and to place a ceiling on payments for needy dependent children at one percent of the state

PROPOSITION NO. 3 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 8 proposes a constitutional amendment that would exempt machinery and equipment used in the production of farm and ranch products from taxation. No dollar limits would be imposed and the exemption would apply to corporations and partnerships as well as to families and individuals.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment exempting implements of husbandry (agricultural machinery and equipment) from ad valorem taxa-

PROPOSITION NO. 4 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 77 proposes a constitutional amendment that would authorize the Legislature to set a four year maximum term of office for board members of certain water districts and conservation and reclamation districts.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment authorizing the Legislature to provide terms not to exceed four years for members of governing boards of certain water districts and conservation and reclamation districts."

PROPOSITION NO. 5 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 119 proposes a constitutional amendment that would authorize Tarrant and Bee counties to hold county-wide elections to abolish the county treasurer's office by majority

Should the county treasurer's office be abolished, the duties, powers, and functions of that office would be transferred to the county auditor or the successor to the auditor's functions.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to abolish the office of county treasurer in Tarrant and Bee counties."

PROPOSITION NO. 6 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 6 proposes a constitutional amendment that would raise the constitutional interest rate limit on state general obligation bonds from 6% to 12%. The new 12% ceiling does not, however, apply to bonds issued by the Veterans' Land Board.

Albert Graves was on the program at a meeting in Florence, S.C. sponsored by Clemson, University and Philip Morris. The objective of the meeting was to review current marketing regulations and proceedures in an effort to determine future changes that would result in better quality tobacco products at a lower cost.

The formers in the southeast

The farmers in the southeast are having the same problems that Spearman farmers are experiencing (higher operating costs with less product income). Also in the tobacco economy, a recent 4 cent per pack tax increase will reduce net profit. The United States tobacco farmers are faced with the same problems that our car manufacturers are faced with-mainly imports.

Also, Joanne made schedules for tobacco markets for several years (telling buyers the time and sequence of selling at a warehouse, and how many pounds to purchase).
