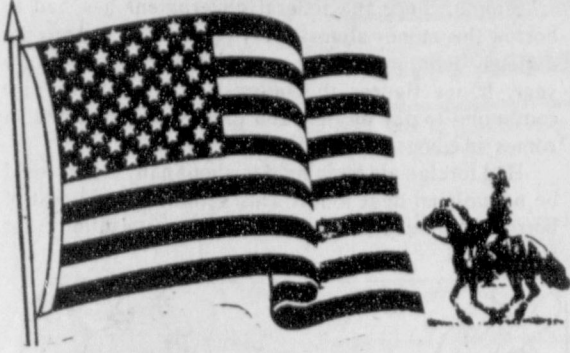

## Court approves jail equipment

At their statutory court session for August, conducted Monday, Hansford County commissioners approved one action item on the agenda, processed the routine items peculiar to this first session of the month and discussed various items that might appear for action on future court agendas.

Commissioners approved the purchase of the necessary air-park system for the county jail that will be necessary for compliance with jail standards when the next examination comes around.

The only other action item on tap, Monday, was the matter of participation in the High Plains Food Bank and the panel--at the recommendation of County Judge R.L. McClellan--deferred action on this matter until commissioners could have more information in hand.

Judge McClellan emphasized that this did not mean the Hansford County commissioners court was turning down participation. Rather, it meant commissioners were interested enough that they wanted to become better briefed on the project.

Members of the court discussed a number of problems within their premise in the county. Chief among these is a bridge--or the lack of one in the precinct of Commissioner Buddy Lowe. The unit fell victim to the elements that ravaged the county this spring and summer.

Also considered was the condition of the courthouse parking area where grass is growing up through the surfacing and where fissures are appearing in that surfacing.

Of course, no action could be taken since these items were

not on the agenda--which is standard practice for the commissioners...to be briefed on a problem before it is scheduled for action.

The routine matters of the court--minutes of the last meeting, approval of the treasurer's report and payment of any claims--were approved without dissent.

Commissioners court sessions are conducted each second and fourth Mondays in the month in the conference room of the Hansford County court and are open to the public.

## School lunch prices set

The governing board of the Spearman Independent School District (SISD) met in regular session Monday night with only a few last minute actions looking for the start of a new school term beyond the routine.

Establishing lunch prices and filling two staff positions took care of the last minute details of the start of school.

The board approved the employment of Rebecca Roller and Abbie Reyes as new teacher aides. This completes the academic staff to this point. The panel had previously approved a total of 12 new teachers for the coming term.

In what the board feels was some very shrewd management on the part of those most responsible for the lunch program of the entire system,

lunch price changes ranged from only a nickel at the elementary level to 15 cents for high school students.

Teachers will pay an additional 20 cents this year while visitors will pay 25 cents more.

The price schedule will be: elementary students, 95 cents; junior high, \$1.05; high school, \$1.15; teachers \$1.50 and visitors, \$2.

With no individual or groups wishing to appear before the board, the routine part of the session was dispensed with quickly. The approval of minutes, payment of bills and assorted minute details filled out the minutes of the current meeting, Monday night.

Establishing a quorum at the outset was no problem because only one member of the panel was absent.

## Pringle-Morse School Begins Aug. 25

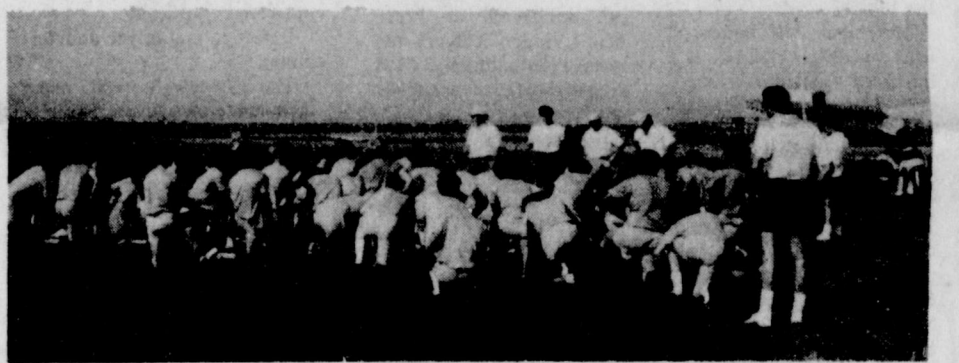
The Pringle-Morse School, located in Morse, will begin classes Aug. 25 at 8:30 a.m. Registration is set for the week beginning Aug. 16.

Two new teachers at the school this year are Collette Trammell and Helen Lee.

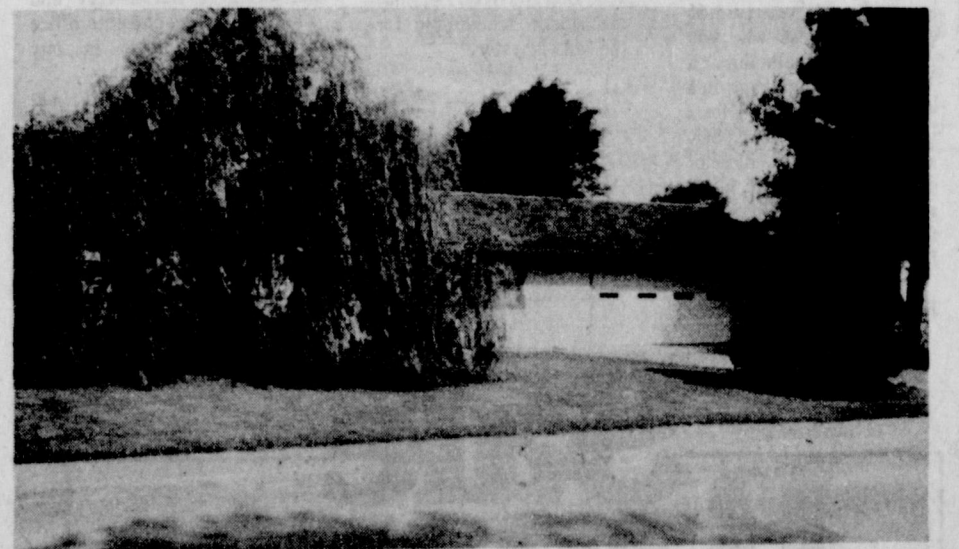
As of Tuesday morning, the board was still looking for a coach and science teacher.

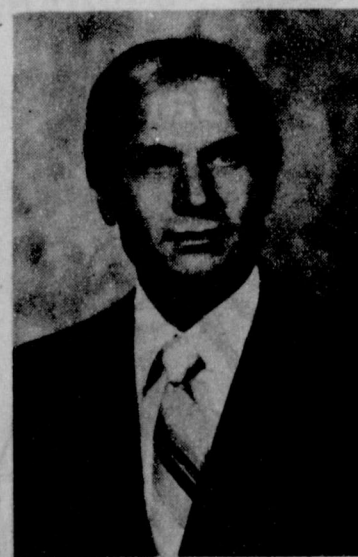

## How Much?

Senator Jesse Helms (R-NC) recently computed the cost of foreign aid since World War II and came up with a surprising conclusion. The American taxpayer has spent \$2,304,257,000,000 to help foreigners.

Since the actual amount of dollars appropriated each year for foreign aid totals less--\$286,467,000,000--one might ask how the larger figure is arrived at.

Simple. Since the federal government has had to borrow this money almost every year, which adds to the national debt, it has had to pay interest on it every year. If one figures the interest U.S. taxpayers are continuing to pay on the \$286 billion appropriated, it comes to about \$2.3 trillion!

Had foreign aid been held to about half, there would be no national debt today. This shows the real cost of borrowing money (and paying interest into infinity) for foreign aid.

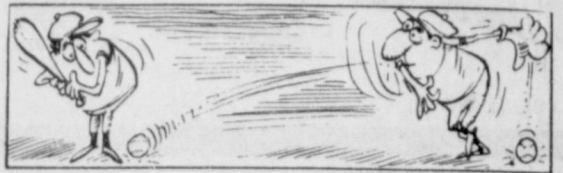

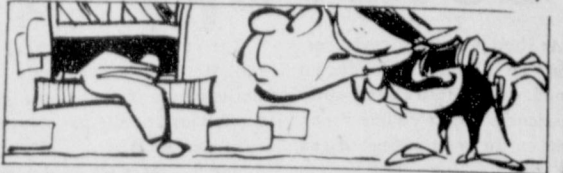

### Receive Scholarships

WTSU--Five Spearman High School graduates have been awarded Don and Sybil Harrington Honor Scholarships to attend West Texas State University for the 1982-83 academic year.

More than 350 students who will enter WTSU as freshman students for the fall semester which begins with registration on Wednesday, Aug. 25, have been designated as Don and Sybil Harrington Honor Scholars.

The Don and Sybil Harrington Honor Scholarship program has grown since 1979 with five gifts each of \$200,000. The Don and Sybil Harrington Foundation of Amarillo added the fifth gift in June to bring the scholarship fund total to \$1 million.

Of the 328 Don and Sybil Harrington Honor Scholars in 1981-82, 87 percent will return for this year and 51 percent of those who will return have maintained a 3.0 grade point average on a 4.0 scale to be eligible for a scholarship the second year, said Keith Winter, director of development. The latest gift expanded the program for students to be eligible for the third year.

Don and Sybil Harrington Honor Scholars who score a

28 of a possible 36 on the American College Test and 1,220 of a possible 1,600 points on the Scholastic Aptitude Test college entrance examinations also are designated as President's Honor Scholars and receive an additional \$100 scholarship each academic year.

We were browsing through some old National Geographic the other day and came across an interesting article, subtitled **Smallpox erased in a decade.** That small phrase packs an enormous wallop, because smallpox has ravaged the world for thousands of years, claiming millions of lives as the most dreaded of diseases. Of Asian origin, it was easily spread by the Crusades through Europe and by the Spanish and Portuguese explorers in the New World. There were no racial, climate or isolative barriers. It was a threat to literally everyone in the world. Cortes' explorers in Mexico and neighboring areas transmitted smallpox to the Indians, killing 3.5 million; a fact which is said to have brought down the Inca and Aztec nations. Also, in North America, smallpox takes a lot of credit in opening the frontiers to easier settlement.

It will be hard to achieve the relatively strong economic growth predicted for the rest of the year unless interest rates fall in the very near future.

## Reagan's Decision Severe Blow To Grain Producers

The United States missed a prime opportunity to negotiate a favorable long term grain agreement with Russia this year, according to Elbert Harp, Executive Director of Grain Sorghum Producers Association. President Reagan decided to block negotiations of another long term agreement with the Soviets at this time because of their involvement in the martial law crackdown in Poland.

"The 1982 Soviet grain crop is the smallest in recent years," Harp said. "It has suffered severe damage because of adverse weather conditions throughout much of the grain producing area. Russian imports of grain may exceed 40 million metric tons during the next year.

"It is always easier to negotiate favorable trading arrangements when the buyer is in

desperate need," Harp continued. "If Russia has better crop conditions next year it will not be nearly as easy to negotiate a favorable long term trading contract."

"After the Carter embargo of 1980, the Soviets turned to other nations with the potential for grain production, enabling those nations to develop production capabilities and seriously compete with U.S. producers. President Reagan's decision has, in effect, done the same thing. These nations; Argentina, Australia, Canada, France and others, now have the assurance of a Soviet market for their grain. They will press for maximum production to take advantage of that market.

"A long term agreement of grain sales to the Soviet Union would alleviate the pressures of burdensome surplus on the U.S.

grain market. U.S. farmers are currently selling their grain at prices far below the cost of producing them. U.S. 1982 crop estimates indicate that this surplus will grow even larger this year. At the same time, U.S. grain producers' traditional and potential markets have been handed to their competitors. The future of U.S. grain producers has once more been used as a tool for international politics," Harp said.

### HANDLE CREDIT HISTORY "WITH CARE" -- INVESTIGATE, UPDATE

Operating on credit has become a way of life with today's high cost of goods and services and the dangers of carrying large sums of money. So handle your credit history "with care" -- investigate it and keep it up to date.

This is especially important if you're planning to apply for new credit or have been turned down for credit unexpectedly.

Start with local credit-reporting agencies, such as the credit bureau. These agencies keep a record of how consumers use credit or misuse it.

If you've ever used credit, a local or nearby credit bureau probably has a file on you. This file is the major source of your credit history, unless you live in a small town where you've established credibility and intend to apply only for local credit.

Your credit bureau is important because most potential creditors don't send separate inquiries to each creditor--they merely request information from the credit bureau.

You have a right to see your file, or at least a summary of the information in it.

If you have been denied credit within the last 30 days, this service is free. If not, a fee will be charged for the report. Fee amounts vary from bureau to bureau.

Understanding the credit bureau's job is important, too. They are privately owned agencies who do not determine credit worthiness. That is the job of the creditor--only the creditor decides to grant or deny credit.

Credit bureaus simply provide the facts in your file--and they charge the potential creditor for the service.

If you have no credit history, some creditors may interpret the lack of credit history almost as negatively as they would poor credit use. So it's a good idea to establish credit and be sure the record is on file with the bureau.

Once credit history has begun--and you've checked with the credit bureau to make sure, don't ignore it from then on. Keep your record up to date.

This will ensure a satisfactory credit record just when you need it most--and it will prevent your record from doing a

"disappearing act" in today's complex system of record-keeping.

For example, if you move, your credit history may be on file in your old "home" town and not yet transferred to your new "home" town.

If there is no credit bureau locally, your files may be kept by a bureau in the nearest city.

To find out, ask a local officer or store manager who they send reports to.

In updating your credit history, it's helpful to understand that creditors whose records are computerized send reports to bureaus about every 30 days. They generally send both "good" and "bad" reports. Loan agencies usually report new loans. However, some noncomputerized stores may send only "bad"-credit information.

If you marry, the bureau may have two files on you--one in your own name and a joint record with your spouse. You and potential creditors receive information from both files in that case.

If you find an error in your file, point out the fallacy to the bureau. They are obligated to investigate the issue in question. If they find the information is not correct, they will send the correction to every creditor who has received information about you in the last six months--if you request them to send it.

If the bureau finds no error, you may place a written record of "your side of the story" in the file and request that this be added to information sent to creditors who have asked for your credit history within the last six months--and to potential creditors in the future.

If your file is incomplete because some of your creditors have not reported, or if you've moved recently, you may want to update your files, especially if the new information will help you obtain credit.

Again, if you've been denied credit recently, the bureau will update your files without charge if you provide appropriate names, addresses and other necessary information.

Otherwise, most bureaus will charge a fee for each creditor contacted to update the record.

Or you can personally contact your creditors and ask that they send a record of your credit use to the appropriate bureau.

When you move, your records

are generally transferred to the bureau servicing your new area. If the transfer is not automatic, the bureau usually will write for your records when it receives an inquiry on you.

Finally, in keeping your credit history updated, remember that information the bureau provides potential creditors can include the following: how much you owe each creditor, the largest amount charged, past-due amounts, how often and for how long accounts are past due and if accounts are paid on time.

Creditors who usually report to bureaus include utility companies, telephone companies, department stores, specialty shops, banks, savings-and-loan associations, finance companies, mail-order stores, gasoline companies and bankcard companies.

**GSPA Recommends Changes In Feed Grain Program**

Secretary of Agriculture John R. Block has called for public comment by August 26 on provisions of the 1983 feed grain program, the details of which must be announced by Nov. 15. Block said he plans to announce the 1983 program well in advance of the Nov. 15 statutory deadline.

Grain Sorghum Producers Association (GSPA) believes the 1983 feed grain program should be aimed at stabilizing grain prices so a farmer can again have the potential to earn a profit on his crop. The current program will permit a profit only in the event of a worldwide crop failure.

Any time there is an estimated two month's carry-in supply of grain, prices will be at, or below, the established CCC loan plus carrying charges. History of the past twenty years shows that, in the absence of a loan level at the cost of production, the market price

exceeded the national average cost of production only when the supply dropped to a one month's supply carryover.

"Carryover stocks" refer to stocks left over at the end of the marketing year. A "month's supply" is the total amount expected to be consumed in one month.)

The U.S. had a three and one-half month's supply carryover of corn and sorghum the beginning of this marketing year (Oct. 1, 1981) and prospects are that the amount will increase with the 1982 harvest. Prices are well below the loan and even further below the cost of production.

GSPA states that it will be necessary to reduce the total combined carryover of grain sorghum and corn to less than 700 million bushels (one month's supply) before farmers can expect any profit from

market prices. This can be achieved only by a program designed to take land out of production, and it must be attractive enough to assure participation. Diversion payments and higher loan levels are necessary.

It is a known fact that Government costs will be less with an adequate diversion program and higher loans. The congressional Budget Office studies have shown that it costs the government less to pay diversion payments than to pay storage and interest on grain in the loan and reserve.

GSPA believes it is in the national interest to have a strong and healthy agricultural economy. A farmer's economic situation is healthy only when he can make a profit. The current feed grain program assures surplus production, prices below the cost of production, bankrupt farmers and a poor national economy. It needs drastic changes and those changes need to be announced soon.

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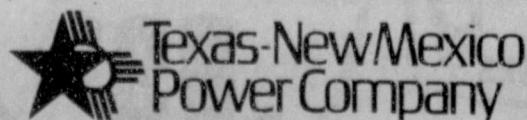

According to reliable reports, Ted Turner's Cable News Network (a network designed to be different from the three New York-based networks) is being refused advertising by a number of major corporations.

Turner has called the output of the three New York-based television networks trash and worse. He's trying something different with Cable News Network and his superstation in Atlanta.

CNN's news is good and much improved in the past year; its programs in sports and films are often a refreshing change from the sterile, loud-mouth "Broadway" stuff beamed hour after hour on CBS, ABC and NBC.

It's, therefore, very much in the national interest that this fourth, innovative television network survive and offer an alternative, long needed. Millions of Americans have serious objections to the moral level of standard programming on the three New York-based networks.

Turner is an outsider competing against three powerful networks whose programming and news is too much alike to suit millions of Americans. One suspects there would be many in commercial television, in the so-called Big Apple, who would not be unhappy if CNN should fail.

Those advertisers refusing to include CNN in their advertising budgets are in effect siding with three broadcast corporations which have brought such a listasteful and unfortunate moral level TV programming into the American living room.

Any competitor who seeks to offer something on a higher moral level, in better taste, deserves support from viewers and American business. The public should know which corporations are boycotting CNN, and what their connections (in board memberships, corporate structure and the Old School Tie) are.

**August, 1914**

An August that changed the lives of most human beings on this earth was August, 1914. The war that erupted that month sixty-eight years ago ended a way of life, a style of living, an idealism that was partly romantic chivalry; it also introduced Communism to the world through Russia.

America, it's now known, went into that war against Germany largely on misinformation and propaganda. The famed liner *Lusitania* was indeed carrying contraband when torpedoed and sunk. And Germany had a valid claim to conduct unrestricted submarine warfare in view of the fact that the British Navy was starving the German people systematically with its worldwide blockade.

But the German Emperor (Kaiser) was a proud and pompous man, not effective in the field of public relations. American sympathy also went out to its mother country because of the common language and heritage.

But the question remains whether the defeat of Germany in 1918 produced anything good. The treaty of 1919 embittered Germany, made a new war certain and produced Adolf Hitler. Germany, to bring about Russia's surrender in 1917, helped Lenin to power and thus planted Communism in the western world.

Many believe the Kaiser's Germany, had it not been destroyed, would have been less troublesome than Russia's Communism. So the fabled war to end wars actually produced another greater war twenty-one years later--and few would argue today that it produced results worth the awful cost to the world.

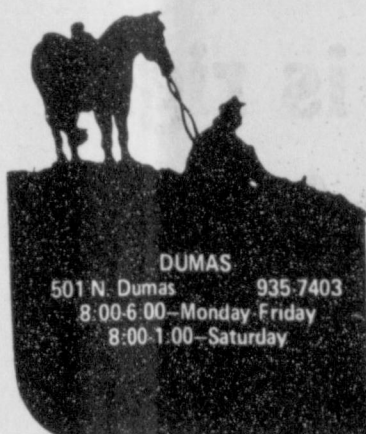


Should you be afraid of lightning in summer thunderstorms? Will you be able to see the bolt that strikes you, if you're hit?

There is no reason whatsoever to be afraid during a lightning storm. There is reason to be sensible, and to stay out of places where lightning is most likely to strike. But you will not see the lightning that hits you--if you're hit.

It's technically possible, of course, that if you were standing outside in the open and saw the streak of lightning high above, starting down toward the earth, that same bolt might hit you. But chances are that it wouldn't. And chances that you'll see the discharge that strikes you are almost nil.

So there is no reason to fear lightning; if it hits you, you'll know nothing about it, and there will probably be no agony beforehand, if it's fatal. Therefore, take sensible precautions and do not risk unwise exposure, and then sit back and enjoy the great show that is lightning. If you'll spend some time at a window with a sweeping view, you'll find it is a magnificent sight.

WASHINGTON, D. C. -- If not Major League baseball's best pitcher today, Steve Carlton of the Philadelphia Phillies is certainly among the two or three best. He may well be the best.

This year, Carlton is demonstrating control and a variety of pitches to go with the fast ball, which may not be quite as rapid as it once was.

His curve, however, and changeup, are both effective this year. Carlton's record, after a bad start, is most impressive because he has been so consistently good this year. Opposing managers almost always save their best pitcher to face Carlton.

### ON FALL CROPS

WARMINSTER, PA. -- Mid to late summer, meaning August in most of the United States, is the time to plant fall crops in home gardens, says Ted Torrey, vegetable research manager for a major seedsmen.

Therefore, his games often are 1-0 or 2-1 or other low-scoring games. If he didn't get the best pitcher of each team thrown at him, his record would probably have been 14-6 when it was 12-8.

Carlton doesn't talk to the media--that is, doesn't give interviews. Some think that's a sign of snobbishness. Fellow players almost unanimously reject that appraisal. Carlton is sensitive; he's more shy than extrovert. And the press in many areas has been tough on players like that--and can be brutal.

As long as the big fellow pitches like he's been doing, the public will appreciate him, and should.

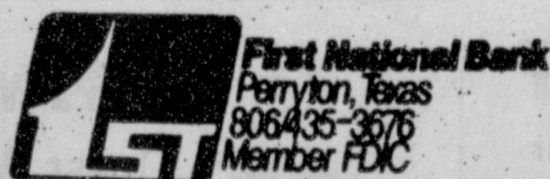

# Strake Talk

## FREE SPEECH AND THE A.C.L.U.

On May 20, 1982, U.S. District Judge John Singleton ruled that the children in Aldine schools, outside Houston, could no longer include a phrase praising God in their school song.

That made the American Civil Liberties Union (ACLU) very happy. They had been party to the suit, claiming that the song violated constitutional provisions of separation of church and state.

On July 3rd, the Supreme Court ruled that states can indeed ban the distribution of child pornography. That made ACLU very unhappy. One of their spokesmen was quoted in the press as complaining this violated the constitutional provisions of free speech.

If this all seems strange to you, perhaps it is because it is strange. The ACLU is constantly worried about the "free speech" rights of pornographers, but seemingly is on the other side of the fence

when the question turns on the free speech rights of school children. One cannot escape the conclusion that the ACLU would defend the "right" of school children to distribute smut, but they would deny them the right to sing the praises of God.

And if you ever wonder where the ACLU gets the money to pursue its goals, consider this: a lot of rich people in high places give them a lot of money. Our current Lieutenant Governor Hobby, for example, held a fund raiser for them in his Houston home that raised some \$60,000. He is very proud of his efforts in this regard, defending it repeatedly while out on the campaign trail seeking reelection. That is one of the many areas where he and I are in disagreement.
