The Spearman Lynx Seniors played their final game on Lynx Turf-at Lynx Stadium-Friday, October 29. It was a sad occasion for some fans, because most of the Seniors were hurt and were not able to participate in their final "home-stand". The game was against one of 1982 Powerhouses, the River Road Wildcats, the final score was 47 to 12. Altogether there are thirteen (13) Seniors on the squad, out of the 13, 4 were on the sidelines hurt, 1 was came back from being hurt and 8 played in the game, that doesn't exactly mean that most of them were not hurt, some still played even if they did get hurt. Well it was a nice cool night for football. Dennis Randall, Lynx Senior Tailback, with good Offensive Line blocking, rushed 25 times for 179 yards, putting him over the 1,000-yard mark for the year. Dennis is thrilled getting over 1,000 yards for the season, any back would be!

Dennis scored the first touchdown for the Lynx on a 64 yard rumble to tie the score at 6 in the first quarter. The Lynx lost the ball three times, 1 on a fumble and the other were interceptions. The halftime score was 21 to 6. Ross Donahue, Sophomore Quarterback, drove his Lynx on a good drive in the final quarter, with four downs to get a touchdown and 5 yards to push it in. Ross did the good-ole quarterback-sneak-it was executed beautifully by the Lynx Line and Ross just drove in, at this point the score was officially 47 to 12. The Lynx will face the Perryton Rangers for the final game of the season for the Lynx. It is an

important game for the Lynx, as well as for River Road. The Wildcats' fans will be cheering the Lynx on, for if the Lynx defeat the Rangers, which they could, then that would put the River Road Wildcats in the post-season State football play-offs. While for the Lynx, are winless in District play and would love to win their final game, but another reason is that the Lynx will be playing their arch-rivals, the Perryton Rangers. This will be an excellent game, because any time that the Lynx and Rangers get together for a game, it is one of the best games of the season for both teams.

The Rangers record is now 7-1-1 for the season and 2-1-1 in District Play, they must defeat the Lynx, and at the same time, hope that the Wolves can defeat the River Road Wildcats, in order for the Rangers to get to go to post-season play. Some of these guys might be able to play on Friday night, and some other Lynx might have gotten hurt in the last game or in practice.

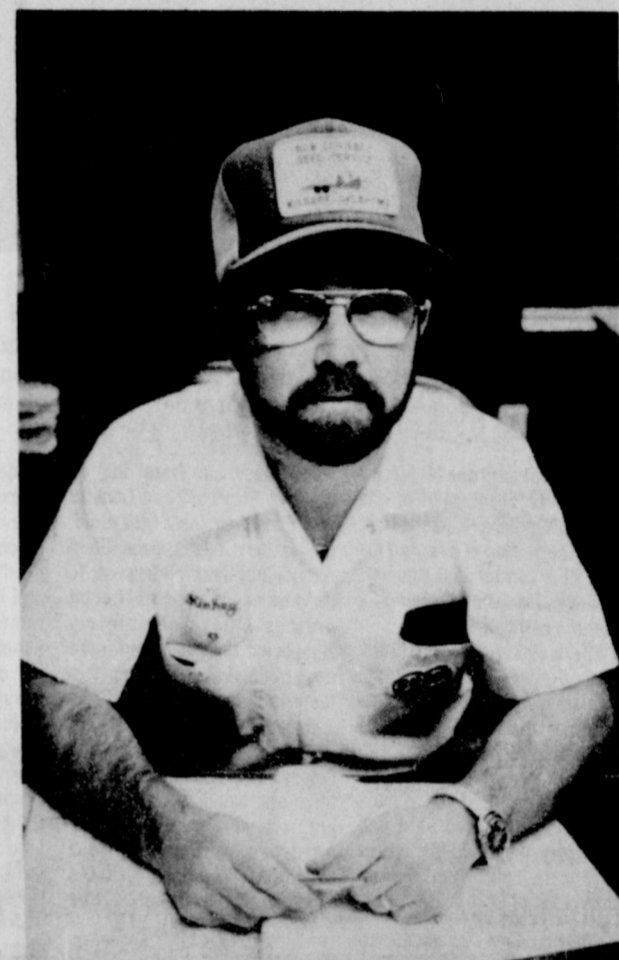

### Her Favorite Recipe Donetta's Rolls

- 1 pkg. dry yeast

- 1/2 c. sugar
- 1 t. salt
- 1/2 c. shortening
- 2 eggs
- 4 c. sifted flour

### MOST FOLKS STILL FEEL 'HOME' IS 'SWEET HOME'

In spite of shortcomings, most folks still feel "home" is "sweet home". More than four of every five American households regard their housing units as "good" or "excellent", says a report recently released by the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) and the Commerce Department's Census Bureau.

About the same number of those surveyed in the 1978 study also rated their neighborhoods in similar terms, with homeowners, suburban and non-metropolitan dwellers the most satisfied.

### 'COLD WATER' ITEM

Basement water leakage threw "cold water" on otherwise great ratings for homes, those in the survey said, as this problem was the most commonly reported structural defect. Some 6.3 million homeowners

with basements reported signs of water leakage, and 2.2 million renters said the same.

### OWNERS HAPPIEST

Homeowners were happier with their dwellings than renters were: 90 percent of homeowners as compared to 70 percent of renters gave "excellent" to "good" ratings.

Income also related to satisfaction levels in the survey, with more than 70 percent of families earning \$50,000 or more giving an "excellent" rating to their homes. On the other hand, only 30 percent of families earning less than \$10,000 rated their homes as "excellent".

### OTHER FINDINGS

Other findings in the survey included these:

- 1) 10.4 million households (14 percent) reported signs of rats or mice.
- 2) Northeast residents reported the largest ratio (12 percent) of heating breakdowns during the

- winter of 1977-78.
- 3) About five percent of U.S. households closed off rooms for warmth or to save energy during winter months.
- 4) Some 19 percent of the South's housing units lacked heating equipment or had none at all.

### Live bald eagle to visit 4 cities

Americans in four southwestern cities will get a chance to view their national symbol -- a live American bald eagle -- next month when "Migisiwa" goes on tour.

Migisiwa, a 12-year adult male bald eagle on loan to the National Wildlife Federation from the federal government, will visit New Orleans, Houston, Dallas, and Omaha from November 8 through 21 for a series of educational presentations in commemoration of 1982 as the "Year of the Eagle." The tour, sponsored by Exxon U.S.A., is the sixth in a

series of scheduled trips designed to help focus public attention on the plight of the bald eagle, now an endangered species throughout most of the United States.

In each city, Migisiwa's schedule includes a variety of programs at zoos, nature centers, schools and corporations.

Migisiwa has been in captivity since 1970, when he fractured his right wing in a collision with an automobile in Florida -- an injury that prevents him from ever returning to the wild. For the past twelve years, he has been in the

Federation had worked for more than eight months to garner support for the presidential proclamation.

While at the NWF Migisiwa is under the care of naturalist Roy Geiger, an expert on eagles and other raptors, or birds of prey. Geiger will accompany and care for Migisiwa's throughout the series of tours.

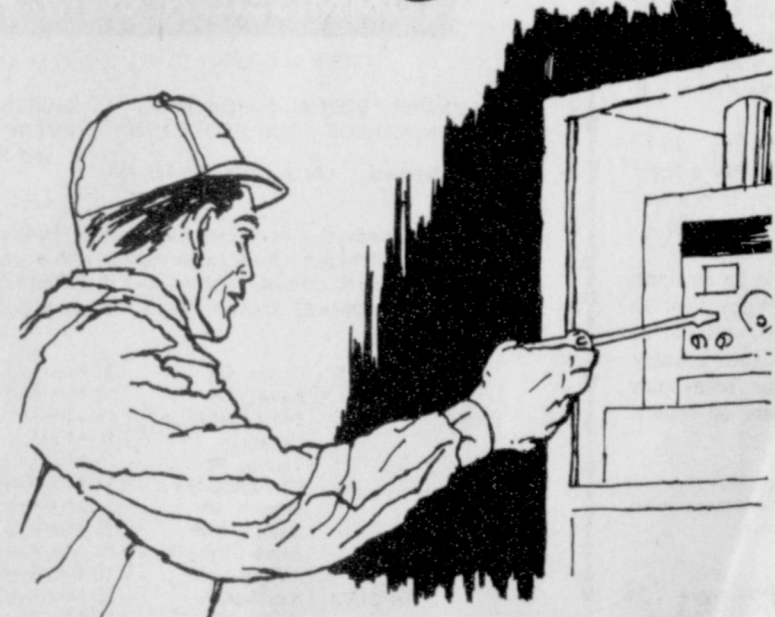

#### 1982 INTERNATIONAL CHRISTMAS MAILING DATES ANNOUNCED

For those with relatives in the armed services stationed overseas, or who wish to mail holiday greetings and packages to others living in foreign countries, now is the time to be making holiday mailings, according to the U.S. Postal Service.

Parcels sent to military personnel in Africa, Australia, Central and South America and Southeast Asia have to be mailed by November 8 if shipped by Space Available Mail (SAM), the least expensive means to ship parcels by air.

November is also the month when parcels shipped via Parcel Airlift Mail (PAL) should be sent. Mailers who choose this service for personal military parcels pay the surface rate plus a surcharge. Packages are airlifted domestically to a gateway facility then airlifted on a space available basis from the gateway to the APO (Army or Air Force Post Office).

Here are three important "calendars" of suggested mailing dates to assure parcels and greetings will arrive on time:

Back in 1942, American troops made their first thrust at Germany in World War II on November 7. Hitler had declared war on America several days after the Japanese sneak-attacked Pearl Harbor in December of 1941.

United States military forces were not ready for a two-ocean war, but there was a desire to do something the first year. U.S. Marines invaded Guadalcanal in August of 1942 (after the great victory at Midway in June) and U.S. forces landed in French-administered North Africa, November 7.

Thus, within the first twelve months of the conflict, U.S. forces were on the offensive against both its major enemies.

North Africa gave U.S. military forces the bleeding they needed for tougher fighting ahead. U.S. fighters, P-39's, P-40's and P-38's, were roughly handled by the Luftwaffe's Me 109's. U.S. ground troops suffered sharp defeats in some cases, though outnumbering the enemy heavily. The British Eighth Army was there to close the pincers and do a major part of the job.

In the landing at North African ports, Washington and London had assured the French there was no design on their territory, but many French military commanders opened fire on the landing Americans.

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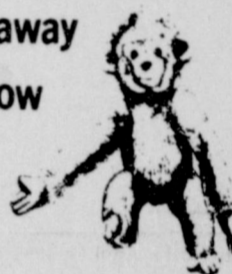
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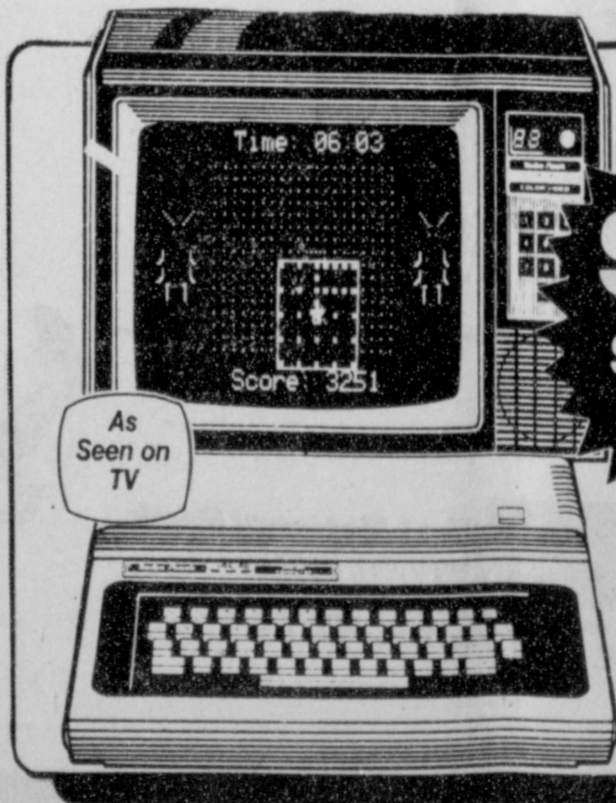
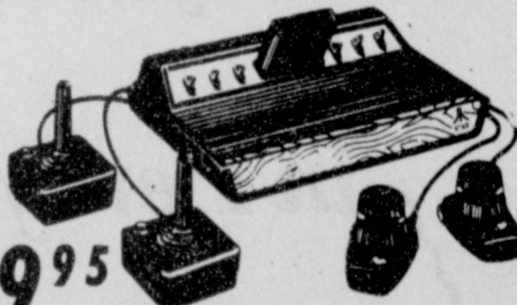
