## SEX EDUCATION:

# Buck passed belongs to taxpayer

Sex education.

It has been a bitter controversy for more than a decade with leaders in most communities tossing it about as a "hot potato" - parents sweeping it under the rug as real dirt - and the childless showing no interest at all.

Now, in the light of recently released figures, it is coming under the close scrutiny of that poverty candidate, the Taxpayer.

Figures reveal sex education is the case where lack of a program is costing the taxpayer more than a program would.

\$6-million dollars annually to deliver babies conceived in ignorance by sexually uneducated adolescents!

Taxes pay for 69 percent of births to mothers under 15 years of age and 46 percent to mothers age 15 to 19 years. Medicaid reveals that 40 percent of deliveries it pays for are to adolescent mothers and fixes the average cost of such deliveries at some \$1,260 each.

In the entire nation, Texas is second only to California in the number of unwed mothers.

If that doesn't wound your pride, the Texas Panhandle has the highest rate in the state for pregnancies among whites and blacks and the second highest among Hispanics.

This is not sudden problem. Back in 1980, Catholic Family Service estimated that, in Texas, one in nine girls between 15 and 17 years became pregnant. State statistics show that almost 1,000 babies were born to mothers under 15 years of age in 1980.

In 1982, Texas recorded births to five girls nine years of age!

Statisticians in the state believe the final 1982 calculations will show teen promiscuity well above the 1980 figure of 41 percent - which included one-third of all the girls in the state between 15 and 19 years of age.

This is not a "hurrah" to

generate sex education at the public school level although presently that seems the most logical medium by virtue of abdication of responsibility by church and home.

It is simply an effort to voice the fact that there is a great group sexual ignorance among teens.

Before church leaders and parents take umbrage at the "abdication of responsibility" reference, consider this problem has been growing in the very face of church and home influence.

Any person who has had a sincere spiritual experience will admit such an experience on the part of any young person could save them from the results of sexual ignorance with moral strength, but . . .

As one church leader, speaking to his denomination at the state level noted: the number of unwed mothers under age 19 and the number of teens established to be "sexually active" account for more adolescents than are

enrolled in the Sunday Schools of that denomination or sitting in its sanctuaries to worship.

The failure of the home to cope with this mass of sexual ignorance is divided into two areas: many mothers and fathers grew up uneducated by their parents and are not capable of imparting needed knowledge and . . . a great number of teens will not listen to their parents.

There is a further breakdown between parents and child after a girl "gets in trouble." She is either afraid to tell her parents or, if she does, more times than not she is cast out on her own.

Add a great number of these girls and their care to the bottom line figure taxpayers are paying out to cope with sexual ignorance.

The public school systems of the land have been making an effort at establishing sex education simply because they are having to deal with the greatest number of the teens involved. Public schools,

face their own set of obstacles in the effort.

First, no workable format has been established. Some schools try and fail and then look to others to see what they are doing and find it often not as workable as what they were doing.

Too, schools with sex education programs at present are, in the main, using these programs at the senior class level. Yet a Planned Parenthood counselor in a Texas Panhandle city says she knows children as young as 11 years are experimenting with sex.

The most successful sex education class created is still like the old days of teaching eight grades in a one room school house. In such a class there will be serious students concerned with the sexual phase of their future. There will be some so sexually ignorant from lack of parental guidance they are on a level a millennium from the serious student.

Then, between these levels there are two groups: those that try to cover their ignorance from their peers with disruptive remarks or questions carefully couched in inanity - and those whose only interest is purely prurient.

In the final analysis, the

school's relationship to the student is academic, not custodial. School monies are public funds and if the public does not want to spend them on sex education the school must honor this.

So . . . where does the responsibility fall? On The Taxpayer!

There are few abortions growing out of this problem. Unwed teen mothers are keeping their babies. Many of them end up on welfare - especially if their parents cast them out. Most of these mothers and their babies suf-

fer ill health. If they need hospitalizing and cannot pay, by law in Texas, no county hospital can turn them away.

Who pays? That's right! - And remember, The Taxpayer has already paid out \$6-million in one year to get these babies born.

If any other area of tax-supported function was as neglected, as grossly mismanaged as sex education, there would be a great hue and cry from the taxpayers. With sex education, the only effective hue and cry has been against it.

The challenge to sex education opponents brings only one answer: "These are OUR children!"

-But those people make up only one segment of the tax-paying public. Many who pay taxes have no children. They are already contributing to the cost of the educating the children of other people. Now they are being asked to support the results of promiscuity-in-ignorance.

Mr. Taxpayer, that hand in your pocket is after another buck because it just passed one!

## 'Golden' snow soaks soil

No one knows what the manna in the wilderness looked like but Hansford County farmers to a man think it must have been like snow!

The worst snowfall remembered in the Panhandle blanketed Hansford County and the High Plains with an official eight inches with the majority coverage running an unofficial nine to twelve inches. The National Weather Service people say the type of snow, and the coverage pattern means two to three inches of soil moisture for winter wheat and conditioning fallow ground.

--And the beauty of this is that the snow moved in so fast the ground it fell on was not frozen so absorption could start immediately.

However, "city folks" across the Panhandle saw no beauty in it at all and benefitting farmers had to join them in either fighting huge drifts or resigning themselves to total immobility until the thaw comes.

The first snow storm came in on a strong wind that caused huge drifts. The second and third days, snowfall in the county was straight down for an even covering and then the wind rose again creating more drifts. There are rural roads in the county running between walls of snow higher than a car, created by road-clearing machinery.

Blessing that it was, the wintry storm would have brought Hansford County to a halt but for the tireless work of

city, county and state road crews.

The system of storms experienced here were born in the Pacific, struck California, then were funnelled across the Texas Panhandle by a split in the jet stream that drives weather systems across the nation west to east with ripples like a muleskinner's whip.

The larger flow of the split was to the north of us here while the split-off that had moved south started back north and the storms were held over the Panhandle by the north and south barriers of the divided jet stream.

What's next? There is -- at press time -- another system headed east out of California. It is not as severe to begin with and

official forecasters are saying -- at press time -- the snow in it should fall out in the mountains leaving us only rain.

The Panhandle was "socked in" with the airport at Amarillo shut down for the first time in its weather history, but nowhere was the property damage such as California suffered nor the total standstill such as the same storm caused when it reached the northeast section of the country.

It is felt the greatest damage in the Panhandle will be to highways, roads and streets. In Spearman, Gruver and the county in general it is believed road surface damage will be there when clearing comes but will be slight in terms of repair costs.

However, at this point, this is just a surmise.

--So is any guess as to "recovery time" before the next winter storm . . . or whether we will have another bad one at all.

We know God is over all and his work wonderful.

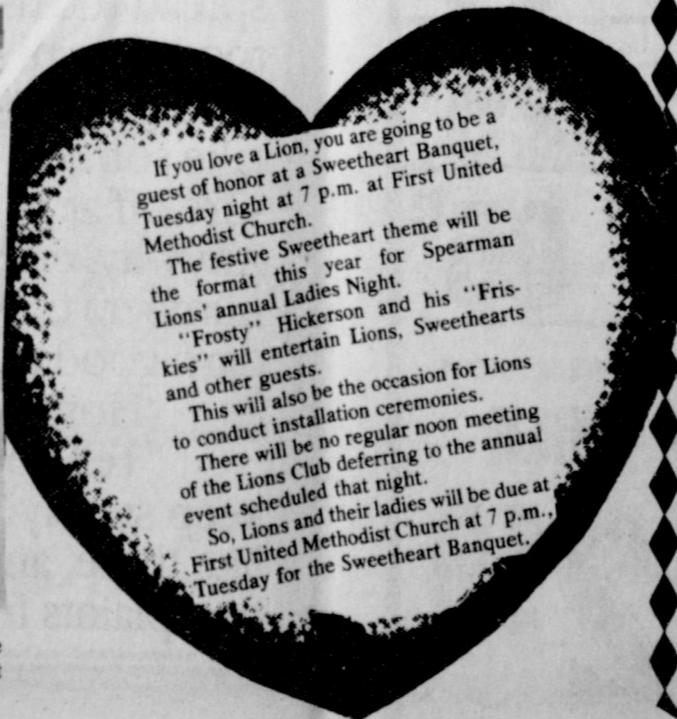
These have been February days that God hath made

## Brucellosis controls

Regulations encouraging vaccination for brucellosis control have gone into effect in Texas, reminds Jim Smith, county agent with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System.

The regulations apply to cattle being shipped into Texas as well as cattle being moved intrastate.

The two-area program for Texas has become Class B and Class C, effective Jan. 12. The Class B area is comprised of 140 counties in the western half of the state, and the Class C area is composed of 114 counties in the eastern and coastal areas of Texas. These areas were previously known as the Class A control and Class B control areas, respectively, the agent says.

New vaccination requirements for cattle entering either area of Texas from outside the state include:

After July 1, 1983, female breeding cattle four months of age or older must have been vaccinated before entering Texas with these exceptions:

- a. Cattle from a certified free herd.
- b. Cattle being shown in fairs or exhibitions.
- c. Cattle from commuter herds.
- d. Cattle for slaughter or quarantine feedlot.

Female cattle four months of age or older born after Jan. 1, 1983 must have been vaccinated when moving from one area to another in Texas, while those born before that date can move within Texas without

having been vaccinated. Cattle born after Jan. 1, 1983 changing ownership within the C area must have two negative tests at least 60 days apart unless they have been officially vaccinated. Officially vaccinated heifers of dairy breeds under 20 months and beef breeds under 24 months which have not calved and are not pregnant are exempt from test.

Non-vaccinated female cattle entering either B or C area of Texas from a Class C state or area require two negative tests 60 days apart until July 1 of this year, after which all females will need to have been vaccinated, the agent says.

## POLICE REPORT:

### INCIDENT REPORTS



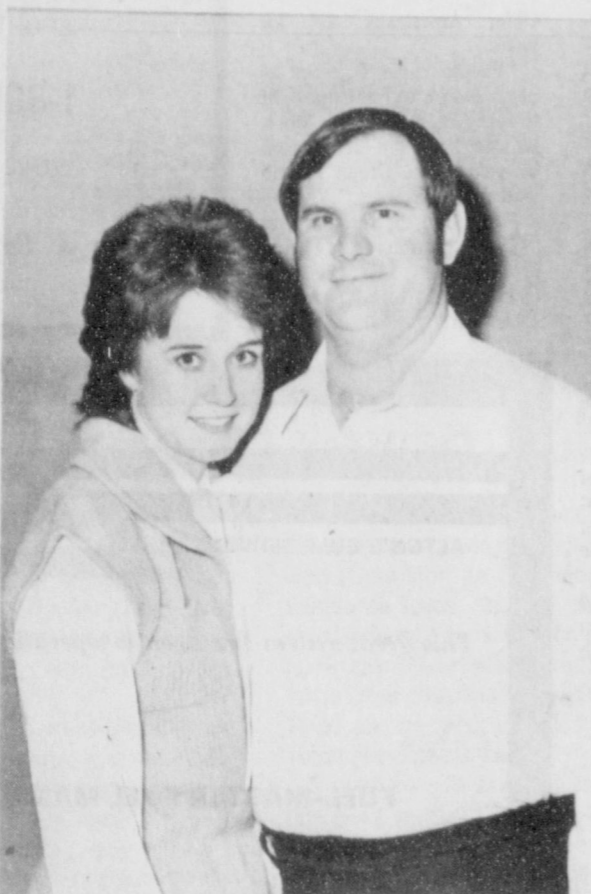

### SAVE BY SEWING

Clothing costs are increasing along with everything else, but sewing your own clothes can be one way to save money. Consumer Price Index figures show clothing to be increasing by 5 percent while most other items have been increasing by 10 percent. This makes clothing a good buy, but even a 5 percent increase can hinder your budget.

A dress, for example, can be made for about 30 percent of what it costs to buy one of comparable style and quality. It has been forecast that nationwide interest in home sewing will increase. Companies that sell fabrics or notions have observed significant sales increases.

Many pattern companies have come out with patterns that are fast and easy to sew. Look for patterns that have few pattern pieces, clear instructions, and useful tips like special fitting ideas or special sewing techniques.

You may want to start out with something simple like a T-shirt, before you try a blouse. It is a good idea to sew shorts before attempting culottes or tailored slacks.

Other items that are fast and easy to make are lingerie, unpleated shirts, and dresses. You may want to consider

buying items that are more difficult to make. Involved patterns with special features may be too time-consuming.

Whether you make all your clothes or sew only to supplement your wardrobe, home sewing can save money on clothing costs.

Choosing the right fabric for a particular fashion is important. It can make a difference in your finished garment.

Read the suggested fashion fabrics listed in the pattern catalogue, or on the back of the pattern envelope, and choose from that list. If the pattern gives specific information such as "not suitable for plaids" or "for knits only", believe it!

When you find a recommended fabric that you like, be sure to read all of the information on the bolt, including care instructions. Ask for a care instruction label, and sew it into the finished garment.

Be a smart shopper and find the right fabric for your fashion.

WACO, TX--More than 500 Texas Farmers Union members and friends attending Texas Farmers Union's annual convention in Austin January 20-22 heard the state's newly-elected top officials pledge their support for farmers and rural programs, including the TFU Green Thumb employment program for older workers.

TFU Green Thumb employs more than 1,000 rural, low-income elderly persons in schools, senior centers, libraries, and museums in 111 counties across the state.

New Agriculture Commissioner Jim Hightower said Texas farmers are "innovative, productive--and they are broke. Thousands are staring bankruptcy in the face. We can't have an economic recovery in this country until the farmers recover."

Hightower promised to work with farmers and farm communities to bring about some changes. "We worked with you to save the Green Thumb

program," he said, referring to successful efforts to maintain Green Thumb funding in the face of proposed budget cuts. "That's one battle we won."

Hightower recognized that the larger problems facing farmers would require immediate and concerted action. "It's time to raise less corn and more hell," he said.

Governor Mark White, in his first major address on farm policy since taking office, expressed his solid support for family farmers, the "biggest and most efficient producers in the United States."

"One thing we do better in Texas than anywhere else on earth is produce food and fiber. White told the farm group. "We just can't let you go out of business." The governor said he was planning to work closely with Hightower and other officials to advance the farmer's cause.

Also addressing the convention were Congressman J.J. (Jake) Pickle of Austin; Texas House Speaker Gib Lewis; Attorney General Jim Mattox; State Treasurer Ann Richards; and Texas Farmers Union President Mike Moeller.

Moeller, elected to a second two-year term by convention delegates, said Green Thumb

had been a vital part of the

Older Americans Act for years.

"People came together as never before to fight the fight to save Green Thumb," Moeller said, "and the main reason we won is the Green Thumb workers themselves."

Pickle told the farmers that "Green Thumb is a great program and you (Farmers Union) ought to be proud to sponsor it."

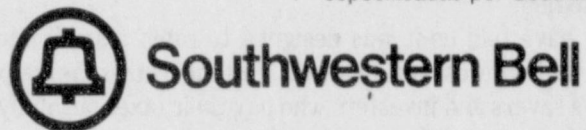

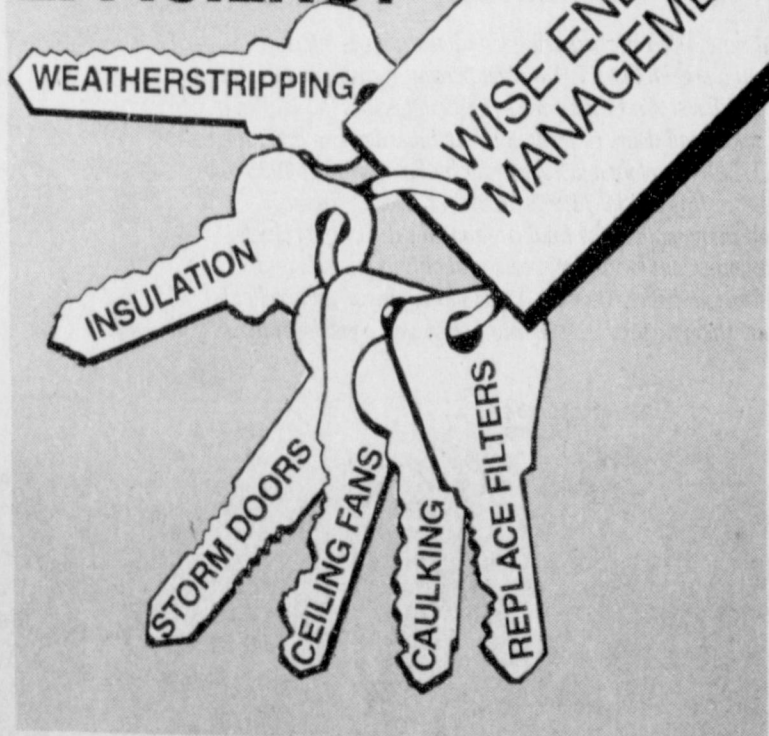

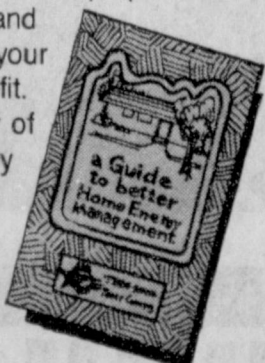

## CONGRESS WANTS A PIECE OF YOUR SAVINGS.

Recently, Congress quietly passed a withholding law that will cost American savers and investors the use of 10% of their interest and dividends.

In simple terms, effective July 1st, 1983, this new law requires banks and other financial institutions to deduct 10% of the interest or dividends you earn on your savings and investments. That money then goes to the Internal Revenue Service in much the same way as payroll deductions are now handled.

The sponsors of this law have told us it was designed to catch a small minority of Americans who evade taxes on their interest and dividends. But the truth is the law penalizes the great majority of America's savers and investors who pay their taxes faithfully. What's more, the federal government is now receiving all the necessary information to curtail tax cheating.

Though the law does include exemptions for some low income and elderly Americans, if they go through the red tape of filing an application, most savers and investors will forfeit some of the money they could earn in compounded interest.

We urge you to join our efforts by writing letters to your representative in Congress and to the two senators from this state. Tell them you want the 10% withholding tax repealed, because it would impose an unfair penalty on savers like yourself.

For assistance in contacting your representative and senators please ask any of our bankers. If we all act now, Congress will get a clear message from the voters back home, and they will work to repeal this needless law.
