The fire started shortly before 5 P.M. Friday at the Foster Testing Co. plant when two employees of the Permian Oil Co. were transferring condensate gasoline from their trucks to two of four large storage

The program is the USDA response to the Soil and Water **Resources Conservation Act of** 1977 (RCA). SCS and Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service offices throughout the state have a supply of a leaflet that summarizes the program containing a pre-addressed, postage-paid response

The Tea Party

One of the fateful days in the history of the country was December 16, 1773. On that day, sixteen colonials disguised as Indians boarded a ship in Boston Harbor and threw its cargo of tea into the water.

It's impossible to completely justify this incident. Some of the incentive for it stemmed from ethnic anti-British sentiments and earlier tax actions.

The colonies weren't represented in Parliament. Yet London had sought to impose stamp taxes in the colonies. The reaction had been so strong Parliament removed most of them, leaving only a tax on tea.

The East India Company had then arranged to lower the price on tea so that it was about the same as if there had been no tax. But that didn't satisfy the revolutionaries. They refused to accept the tax in principle, and dumped the tea overboard anyhow.

Parliament responded by moving the capital of Massachusetts from Boston to Salem and closed Boston Harbor to all commerce. The bitterness which resulted from these actions was a contributing factor to the revolt of the colonies a few years later.



yourself in less than an hour. "Begin by saving the plastic ring connectors that hold six-packs of beer or soft drinks together," say Chris Cock-ing, hospitality and gift shop supervisor for Jos. Schlitz Brewing Company.

About 30 six-pack connectors will make a full 20inch wreath," Cocking advises, "and be careful when removing the plastic connectors so they don't stretch out of shape or break.





American Food Prices Still A Bargain For Consumers

AUSTIN-Abundance is a unique blessing for American consumers and certainly something to celebrate, but the cost to farmers of that abundance should also be recognized this year, Agriculture Commissioner Reagan V. Brown said recently.

"Even with higher prices oday, the American family this Christmas will spend less of their disposable income than one in any other developed country," Brown said

Food prices have risen less in the past year than other consumer items and services. From September 1980 to 1981, the price for food consumed at home rose only 11.3 points, while the Consumer Price Index for all commodities rose 27.6 points, according to the latest reports from the U.S. Department of Agriculture.

"Both food and farm prices are impacted by inflation, the high cost of oil, and high interest rates, just as with most other commodities, Brown said. "These problems are national and worldwide in scope and all industrial nations are suffering from



AUSTIN -- Agriculture Commissioner Reagan V. Brown called the recent Federal policy change on the use of Compound 1080 in coyote control "a step forward for ranchers trying to protect their livestock." The Interior Department

Thursday (Nov. 19) announced a reversal of previous policies which prohibited use of Compound 1080 in collars for sheep and goats. The Environmental Protection Agency had banned the use of the chemical except in experimental programs. The Interior Department has requested EPA to remove the restrictions on use. EPA is expected to announce hearings soon. Brown said that for

livestock raisers in Texas, use of some type of effective control could mean a saving of about \$21 million a year, the estimated losses by sheep, goat, cattle, and poultry producers.



RETIREMENT PLANNING **First of Five Parts**

How To Retire As A Millionaire On \$5.48 A Day

(Notes his is the first of a five-part series on the new laws g the Individual Retirement Account (IRA). This e describes how you can retire as a millionaire by maximum allowable contribution into your IRA year. Other installments in this series will discuss what you can expect if you can't afford to contribute the full \$2,000 per year, the IRA advantages for couples, and how to use an IRA even if you think you're too young - or too old --- to start planning for retirement.)

If you've ever fantasized about being a milfionaire, that fantasy may be turned into a reality thanks to the new laws governing the Individual Retirement Account (IRA).

The new rules, which go into effect January 1, 1982, finally bring the advantages of tax-sheltering and controlling a retirement fund within reach of every wage-earner. Previously, IRAs were available only to persons not covered by company pension or profit sharing plans.

"The new IRAs are a real tax-shelter bonus for working people," says Doris Tarrant, chairperson of the Banking Advisor program for the American Bankers Association (ABA). "Whatever amount, up to \$2,000, you contribute to your IRA each year can be deducted from your gross income before you figure your taxes. If you contribute \$5.48 a day or \$2,000 a year for 36 years, at 12 percent interest, it would add up to just over \$1 million.

If you're skeptical about \$2,000 adding up to \$1 million after 36 years, you can figure it out for yourself: Start with \$2,000, multiply by 12 percent for one year, which is \$240. For year two, add \$2,000 to the \$2,240 and multiply by 12 percent.

Continue this calculation and you will find that after 36 years you will have contributed \$72,000 and your account will total more than \$1,085,197. The interest alone will be over \$1 million!

Check with your employer to see if you will be offered an IRA payroll deduction plan. Two thousand dollars per year would mean taking about \$38.46 out of your weekly check. That's not much to pay for a million-dollar retirement.

And remember, you're also getting a tax-shelter benefit from this retirement savings plan. You will not be taxed on that \$2,000 of income you're contributing to an IRA or the interest earned on it before you reach age 591/2 So the IRAs are really worth much more than the money accumulated.

At age 591/2 you can withdraw all or part of the money without penalty, and you will be taxed at the

YOU HAVE "NUCLEAR POWER"

AUSTIN Nobody wants their community to become a nuclear waste dump. We are no exception As you know by now, the

Department of Energy is considering putting a highlevel nuclear waste dump in the Panhandle. It is by no means certain the dump will be located there, but it is possible. You probably also know

by now that this decision will be made entirely by the federal government, and that there is not much the state can do about it. But there is something you can do about it. Texas is unique in that nearly all the land in the state is owned by the state itself or by private land owners. The federal government owns large tracts in nearly every other state, particularly in the West. This means the federal

government will have to deal with a private landowner to locate the waste dump.

If the government really wants to put the dump on someone's land, it can condemn the land, using its powers of eminent domain. This process, however, can be expensive and timeconsuming.

Because the government now is in a hurry to dump the waste, we can stall them, possibly even stall them clear out of Texas, by refusing to lease to them. Another tactic we could use is to write a deed restriction into our deeds before we sell property. We could insist the land never be used to store nuclear waste. This would not be binding against the federal government, but it would take a lawsuit to overturn the restriction. This would take time, and the federal government is in a hurry. We need for a good Panhandle lawyer to volunteer to show us how to put such a restriction in our deeds. The last tactic we could

use is simple protest. We need to write letters, to call and to send telegrams to the Department of Energy, telling them we do not want any part of their nuclear garbage.

Finally, there is a bill in Congress that would allow states to appeal to Congress to block establishment of these dump sites. It is S.R. 1660, also known as the National Nuclear Waste Policy Act of 1981. It is in the U. S. Senate Energy and Natural Resources Committee. Sen. Lloyd Bentsen is a member of that committee. We urge all of you to write Sen. Bentsen and Sen. John Tower, Russell Building, at Washington, D.C., 20510. Also write the Department of Energy, Nuclear Waste Terminal Storage Office, 505 King Avenue, Columbus, Ohio 43201.

Man had dreamed of flying like a bird for centuries. But it wasn't until two Ohio brothers named Wright, at Kitty Hawk, North Carolina, made a successful flight in a heavier-than-air machine on December 17, 1903, that the air age began.

Americans can be proud the first flight took place in this country. Englishmen, Germans, and Frenchmen, as well as others, had been working toward the long-cherished goal. Orville and Wilbur Wright of Dayton had been experimenting with gliding craft for years when on one of them they finally mounted a sixteen horsepower motor. On the 17th, it flew more than 800 feet for 59 seconds.

S.P. Langley of the United States was also on the verge of success with his aircraft (equipped with a steam engine) and Octave Chanute, also an American, was flying a craft without a motor at this time. Sir Hirman Maxim of England and Otto Lilienthal of Germany were close to success.

The flying machine presented to the world in 1903 developed slowly until World War I, but from that time on there was no doubt the 20th century would be the air-age century.

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
"The Southern Association of State Departments of Agriculture, of which I am president, will initiate an educational program in the 9 states now so heavily infested," Brown said. "I have encouraged the other 3 regional groups to do the same.

Brown said the imported fire ant is a threat to agriculture, to urban residents, and to those who enjoy the outdoors. In the South now there are 230,000,000 acres infested with fire ants. In Texas there are 40,000,000 acres, and that number is growing every day. One hundred seven counties are infested now. Forty-eight have officially requested assistance in a control program next spring, and 3 or 4 more counties have requests

on the way.

Small wildlife in infested areas are being killed by the ants. Farmers and ranchers are having to abandon acreage because they cannot work the fields and because baby calves can die from multiple bites. The impact of infestations in schools, parks, recreation areas, and private homes has been in the news ever since the heavy rains this
