Lynx To Scrimmage Sunray Fri

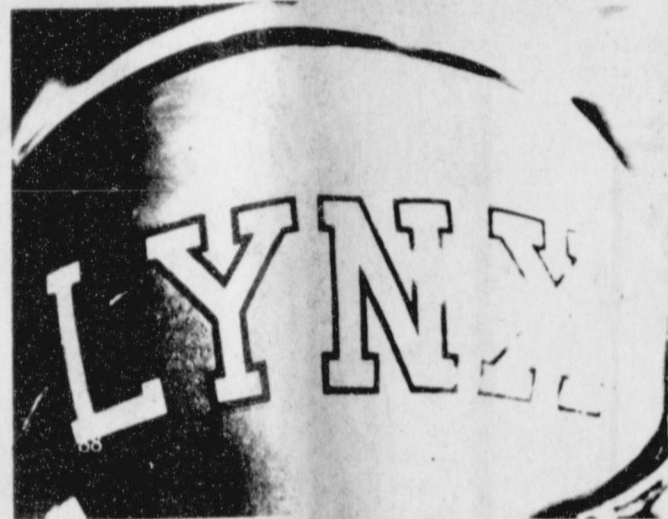
The Spearman Lynx held their own against the Dumas Demons in a scrimmage here Friday night, August 21, although the Demons outscored the Lynx.

Spearman Sales Tax Rebate Up

State Comptroller Bob Bullock reported August city sales tax rebate checks to 952 Texas cities will total \$95.8 million.

This month's payments brings the cities' year-to-date totals to \$439.3 million compared to \$392.9 million during a comparable period in 1980.

On a statewide average, sales tax payments are up this year by nearly 12 percent over 1980, according to Bullock.

August payments include quarterly payments from merchants and businesses for the year's second quarter.

The City of Spearman received \$33,519.10 for this pay period compared to \$12,828.21 for the same period last year. This is up 27.29%. Total 1981 payments to date is \$136,523.57 compared to \$107,258.14 for the same period last year.

The City of Gruver received \$5,533.23 for this pay period compared to \$2,381.90 for the same period last year. Total payments to date this year to the City of Gruver is \$21,055.92 off 6.26% from the \$22,461.27 received for the same period last year.

Martinez Winner

This past weekend, the Perryton area had their annual Wheatheart Celebration. There was a Country 10,000 meter run that had lots of runners, 93 completed the race. Ben Padilla of Amarillo won the overall in Men's competition with a time of 33:44. He also won the 15-19 age group.

Isabel Martinez, Spearman resident that competes in as many races as he can, competed in the Country 10,000 meter run. He won the 40-49 age group with a time of 39:51. The closest to him was Leo Carlen of Borger, who won 2nd with a time of 45:43; Gilbert Judd, of Beaver, Okla., was 3rd with a time of 50:02. Jerry Farney of Perryton was 4th with a time of 50:52 and Ed Gilliland of Follett, was 5th with a time of 56:44.

Spearman Pledge Center To Support Telethon

In conjunction with the Jerry Lewis Labor Day Telethon, members of the Spearman Emergency Services will be operating a pledge center in Spearman. Ed Williamson and Ronnie Bullard will be the coordinators for the center this year, which will be located at the Fire Department. The pledge center will be open during the same hours as the Telethon, from 8:00 P.M. Sunday, Sept. 6 to 6:30 P.M. Monday, Sept. 7.

Residents in Spearman can call a special number during those hours to make their pledges to the Telethon, in support of the Muscular Dystrophy Association. The number which has been assigned to operate during the 21 1/2 hour telethon will be 659-5565.

Pledge center volunteers are also planning a door-to-door drive for Labor Day. Children interested in helping Jerry's Kids should come by the center location on Monday, September 7, to pick up an official canister, Telethon Badge, and instructions. In addition, anyone wishing to volunteer their time to assist with pledge center activities should contact Mr. Williamson or Mr. Bullard, the center coordinators.

Another activity that has been planned is a boot staff. Members of the Fire Department will be at some of the

major intersections of town and will be seeking donations to fill their fire boots. Anyone giving a donation will be given a small plastic Fireman's hat. There will also be a pre-sale of Jerry Lewis Labor Day decals to be ironed on shirts. These decals are selling for \$1.50 each. Each one of the kids that goes on the door-to-door drive will receive one of these decals

and one of the little fire hats when they return with their donations to the fish bowl. Re-registration Starts Aug. 31

It's 'Branding' Time Again

It's time to "brand your brand."

That is the explanation of brand re-registration--coming Aug. 31--best understood by the Texans who deal in these historical marks of the cattle trade.

Brands, a traditional part of the western cow country since men began building herds of cattle, were originally owned and kept in-violate by rope and revolver until a more settler way of life came to the cattle business.

With the return of the rustler to the scene in the forties and thefts of large number of beeves continuing into the sixties, the state of Texas passed a law

(Article 6899j, VTCS) requiring owners of various livestock within the state to have distinct marks and brands and record them with the clerk of the county in which their livestock is located.

That law, effective Aug. 30, 1971, also required that livestock owners registering brands and marks within six months of that date must re-register them at ten-year intervals thereafter.

This means all brands registered in 1971 must be re-registered in 1981.

Aug. 31, Hansford County Clerk Marie Gould will begin re-registering brands and will do so for a six-month period running through February,

1982. Brands NOT re-registered within this period will be released after March 1, 1982.

The fee for this re-registration is \$5 for each location (each county) in which livestock is kept and brands and marks registered.

Many a tenderfoot will ask what the "marks" are. Mostly they consist of ear marks (a custom that introduced the one word: "earmark") that were first secretly done as an added means of identifying stolen stock if the brand was altered.

Many an old-timer has asked: "Why registration? Everybody knows the XIT, four sixes, Lazy

S and other traditional brands." Well, it seems the brands were known but not the owners in every case. When modern day cattle rustling began, much of it consisted of loading cattle into trucks, forging a bill-of-sale and hauling them to market.

Almost any name could be signed as the "seller"--particularly with the lesser known brands--and there was no way to check it out for there was no official record of ownership readily available.

Now there is. --And it works to the benefit of the cattle owner to keep his brand and mark duly registered.

Oh, yes. A new brand may be registered any time. It just must be a brand or mark not registered and in use by any other livestock owner in the state.

A member of a cattlemen's association said earlier in the Spring that when it comes to using brands, courtesy and tradition are pretty well observed in leaving brands to the men who originated them.

He also emphasized again that cases of theft of livestock were a another matter and registration could make the difference in recovery and conviction or no.

So, come Aug. 31, get your brand on your brand...for sure.

The Liberty Bell

The famous Liberty Bell, symbol of our freedom, will be 229 years old this month. There were actually four liberty bells cast, two in England and two in Philadelphia.

The bell was delivered in August of 1752 and the local committee was completely satisfied except for one thing--it cracked when rung.

Charles Stow and John Pass of Philadelphia were commissioned to recast the bell. Their third bell turned out to be our famous Liberty Bell, for which they were paid about \$303.

ON SMOKE DETECTORS

About 185,000 smoke detectors sold under six popular brand names were recalled recently because a defect could keep the alarm from sounding even in a burning building. Smoke detectors manufactured between March 1, 1979, and March 15, 1981, with brand names Chloride Protector, Archer (sold through Radio Shack stores), Masterguard, Vanguard, Vantage I and Protector Systems are being recalled.

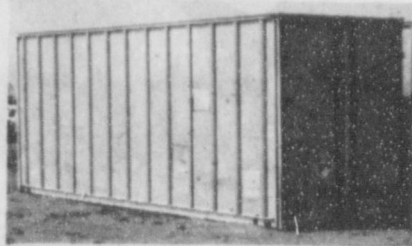

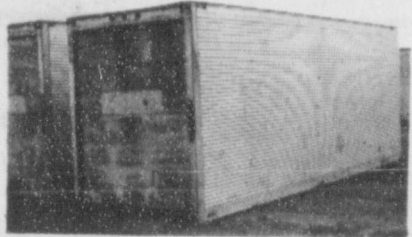

County Loses Brucellosis-Free Status

In the continuing battle against brucellosis, Hansford County, Texas, lost its certified-free status this month, according to the U.S. Department of Agriculture.

Other counties losing their certified-free status counties are Franklin in Idaho and Garfield in Utah. When counties gain certified-free status, cattle moves from them with

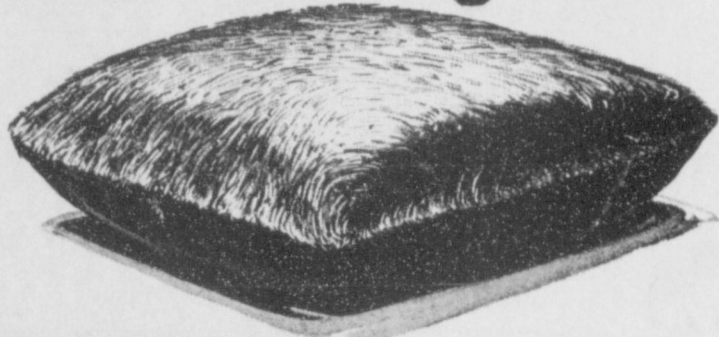
fewer restrictions, explained Dr. Paul Becton, the veterinarian who directs the national brucellosis eradication program for USDA's Animal and Plant Health Inspection Service,

Washington, D.C.

He said that two-thirds of the nation's counties and 31 entire states plus the U.S. Virgin Islands, are certified free.

Brucellosis, sometimes called Bang's disease in animals, is a bacterial disease of cattle, swine and other animals and can be transmitted to people.

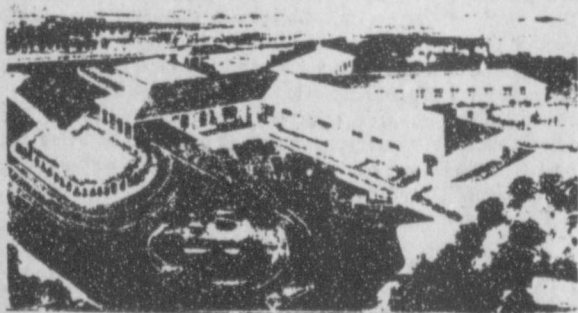

Spanish Chicken

- 2 medium sized hens
- 6 T cooking fat
- 4 large onions chopped
- 1 large green pepper chopped
- 1 No. 2 can tomatoes
- 1 t salt
- 12 cloves
- 3 bay leaves
- 1 t poultry seasoning
- 1 t ground sage
- 1/2 t savory
- 1 clove garlic
- 2 c uncooked rice

Cut up chicken, salt and pepper well, Melt cooking fat in large, heavy iron cooking pan. Fry chicken until done. Add onions and pepper and fry until partly done. Add cloves, bay leaves, poultry seasoning, sage, savory and garlic. Cook 3 minutes, stirring constantly. Cover chicken with water and add tomatoes. When boiling add 2 cups uncooked rice. Cover closely and cook slowly for 30 minutes.

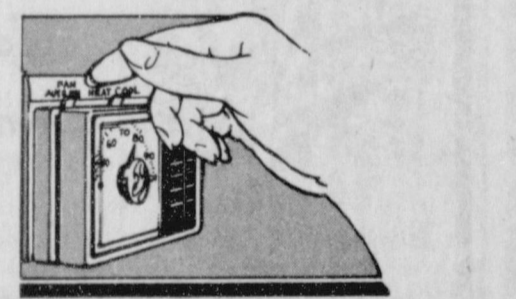

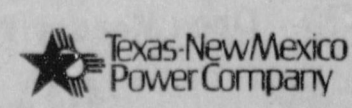

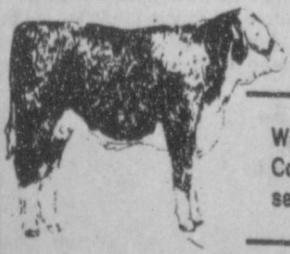

Drawn to Texas Tech by her enthusiasm for West Texas and the school's proximity to the family's Diamond M Ranch at Snyder, Jean McLaughlin Kahle was an active student.

Wendell Mayes Jr., is a pioneer West Texas broadcaster who began his radio career in 1942. World War II interrupted that career, but Mayes put his broadcast experience to work as an aviation radio technician aboard the carrier USS Yorktown.

After the war Mayes returned to Texas and entered Texas Tech. In 1949 he graduated with honors in electrical engineering. He then devoted full attention to the maturing broadcast industry in Texas. He is today president of KNOW-AM in Austin, KCRS-AM and KWMJ-FM in Midland, KCSW-FM in San Marcos, and KCWM-FM and KVIC-AM in Victoria.

In 1978 Mayes was named Pioneer Broadcaster of the Year by the Texas Association of Broadcasters. That same year he was inducted into the Texas Tech Mass Communications Hall of Fame.

He is a trustee of the Texas Broadcast Education Foundation, which he helped found and which he served as president 1973-76. He is secretary of the Hadliners Club in Austin.

Mayes has served in several organizations combating diabetes. He is vice president of the International Diabetes Federation, member of the National Advisory Council of the American Diabetes Association and a 1977 recipient of the Addison B. Scoville Award of the American Diabetes Association.

He has served Texas Tech as chairman of the Mass Communications Advisory Committee 1971-74, vice chairman of the Texas Tech Loyalty Fund 1974-76 as a director of the Texas Tech Foundation 1971-79. He and his wife, Mary Jane, have three children and three grandchildren.

Malouf Abraham attended

Texas Tech 1930-33 before returning to his hometown of Canadian where he has been engaged in business since. Abraham is an independent oil and gas operator and head of Malouf Abraham Inc.

Abraham served as mayor of Canadian from 1953-57 and was elected to the Texas House of Representatives in 1966. In 1968 he was the first Republican representative to run unopposed in Texas. During his legislative career, Abraham served on several committees, including urban affairs, education, revenue and taxation, and elections.

He is active in numerous civic organizations. Abraham is a past president of the Canadian Chamber of Commerce, past director of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce and past vice president of the Panhandle Landmen's Association. Abraham has been instrumental in the establishment of lakes, parks, a home for the aged and

a school for the retarded in the Canadian area. Those efforts were recognized by the American Association of Petroleum Landmen which in 1971 presented Abraham its "Citizens Award."

In 1979 Abraham was appointed to the Energy Resources Committee, Interstate Oil Compact Commission, by Texas Gov. William P. Clements.

Abraham is a former representative of the Texas Tech Ex-Students Association. He recently funded a \$5,000 annual scholarship in the College of Business Administration in honor of his brother Tom who in 1932 received one of the first bachelor of business administration degrees at Texas Tech. Abraham and his wife, Iris, have two sons and a daughter. W.B. "Dub" Rushing, a Plainview native, has lived in Lubbock since 1925 and has been active in numerous civic activities and a supporter of Texas Tech University.

Tower Speaks To Conservation Officials

Current officers of the organization are: John Frantz of Hartley, president; Robert Jacobson of Adrian, vice president and Larry Don Smith of Perryton, secretary-treasurer.

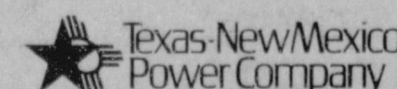

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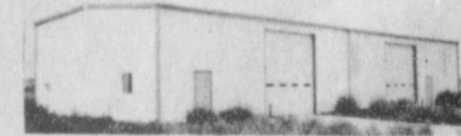
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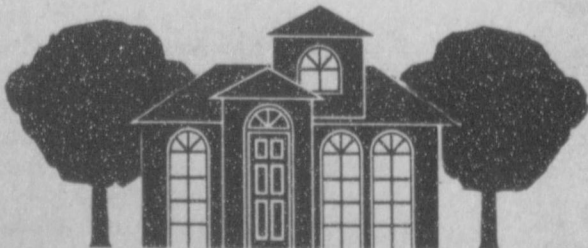
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Billy Graham At Baptist Convention

Field demonstrations have shown the combination fungicide formulations provide the most effective disease control on small grains.

Seed protectants introduced in the last few years are generally as effective as the mercury compounds. Result demonstrations have shown that seed treating does make a difference that is well worth the cost. Sure, there are years when conditions are favorable and there will not be any significant difference between treated and untreated seed, but the loss to disease is great enough in those

other years that the yield difference in just one such year will cover the cost of seed treatment for many years.

Small grain farmers have a wide variety of seed protectant chemicals to choose from.

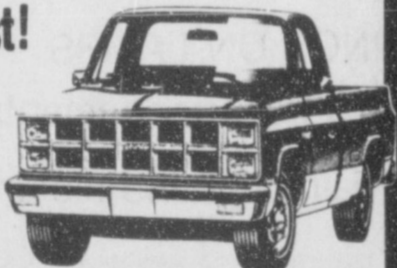
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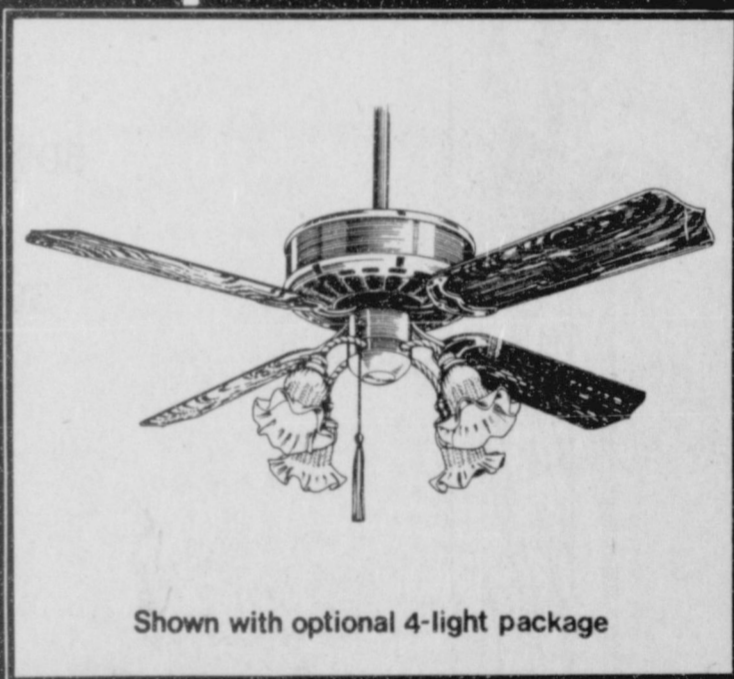


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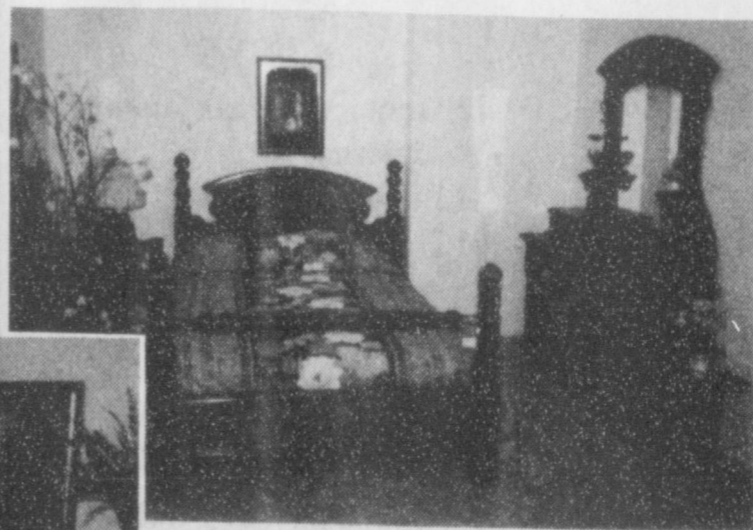
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
