They are: Larry Witten of Olton, the current TGSPB Chairman; Ralph Mabry of Lubbock and K.B. Parish of Springlake. New to the Board is Bob Gillispie of Gruver.

Elections are held biennially to fill four positions on the twelve-man Texas Grain Sorghum Producers Board. The election was conducted by mail balloting which concluded on September 15. A canvassing committee met on September 29 to tally the votes and certify the election. Chairman of the canvassing committee was Lubbock Extension Agent Ollie Linder, Assistant Marketing Director for the Texas Department of Agriculture Bob Gray and TGSPB Executive Director Elbert Harp.

The sole objective of the TGSPB is to work on projects that will improve the profitability of grain sorghum production.

New TGSPB Director Bob Gillispie lives on a farm north of Gruver in Hansford County. He has about 640 acres in grain sorghum this year. Bob and his wife, Kathy, have two sons and a daughter.

TGSPB directors are non-salaried elected officials of the state of Texas. The newly elected Board members will be sworn in at the next TGSPB meeting scheduled for October 13 in Dumas. At that time, the Board will elect its officers for the next year.

## Prisoner suicide is first in county

This week, tragedy stalked the Hansford County jail in the form of a prisoner suicide when 19-year old Christopher Shawn Swenn hanged himself with a pair of prison-issue trousers.

Swenn had been arrested and arraigned on a charge of theft by check. He was scheduled to go into court, Monday, to answer the charge.

An autopsy was performed here in Hansford County by Dr. Erdmann of Childress, currently serving the area as pathologist in such matters. His preliminary report exonerated the Hansford County Sheriff's Department of any burden in the death.

In addition to the autopsy, the entire incident from arrest to death was personally investigated by the district attorney.

In layman's terms, the cause of the self-destruction was believed to be early indulgence of a child who could not bear the emotional pressure and embarrassment of the charge and incarceration.

In other activity, the Hansford County Sheriff's Department

ment will be making the second trip to return a car theft suspect. Some weeks ago, Jessie Earl Bowen was returned from Hopkinsville, Ky., arraigned and released on \$5,000 bond.

Currently, he is a suspect in another vehicle theft. A pickup stolen in Hansford County was recovered in San Francisco, Calif. and Bowen is being held in that city for return to Hansford County.

Saturday, the Sheriff's Department, assisted by local DPS Trooper Max Gunn and Dale Burrows, Amarillo, of the Department of Public Safety Auto Theft Division, found the "skeleton" of a pickup truck in the northeast sector of the county that had been reported stolen from Truck City, Amarillo.

Despite the fact that "VIN" numbers had been destroyed, the vehicle was identified as that reported stolen.

The engine, transmission, seats, front glass and bumpers had been stripped from the unit as well as destruction of identification numbers. It had been rolled on its top and the wheels stripped from it. An attempt to burn the remains of the vehicle failed. It was only slightly damaged by fire.

The Sheriff's Department and the Department of Public Safety are continuing the investigation into the incident. There is a strong suspect in the incident.

The Sheriff's Department will be going into the next session of court, Oct. 12, with a number of cases.

Shawn was born in Las Vegas, Nevada, April 28, 1962 and spent 18 of his 19 years here in Spearman. While at

Spearman High School he was a member of the Spearman Lynx football team and later served in the U.S. Marine Corp at San Diego, California.

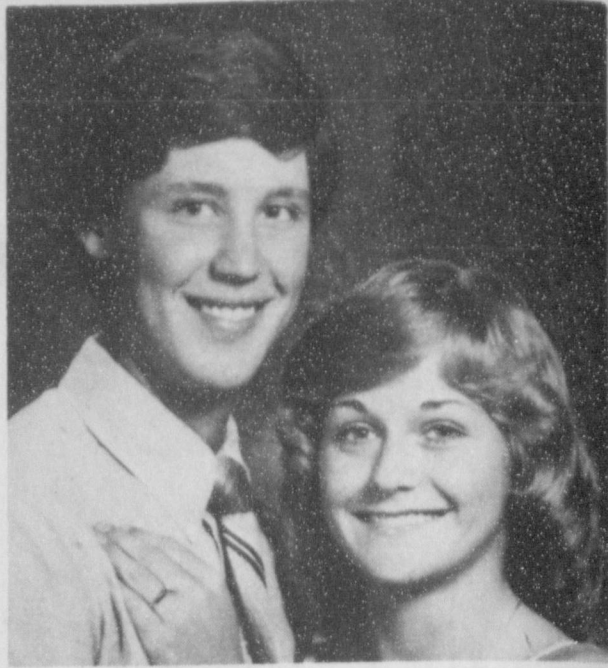


**Artist of The Month**

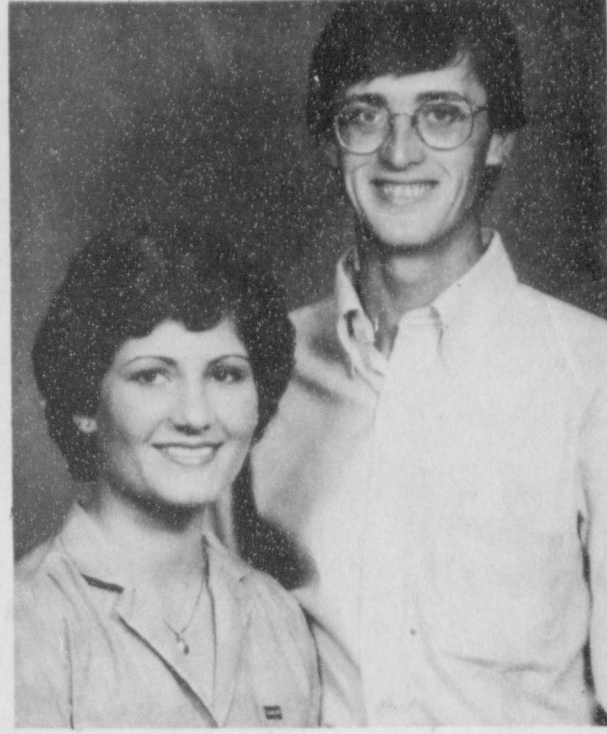

Mark Hardin, administrator for the Hansford County Hospital spoke to the Rotary Club on Monday, October 5 and gave an update on the progress of the new Extended Care Facility and other renovations taking place at the hospital.

The construction on the Extended Care Facility is about 70% complete. Work will begin on concrete sidewalks and parking shortly. Work on the individual rooms in painting and tiling are progressing. Furniture has arrived. Occupancy is expected by March of '82.

Thirty six of the 39 beds have been spoken for, most residents are to be past residents of Spearman who have been living in facilities in surrounding communities.

There will be a respiratory and physical therapy section to the new facility together with a barber and beauty shop. The facility will have 13 private and 13 semi-private rooms. All but four of the rooms have been furnished through local donations.

The overwhelming support from Spearman and residents of Hansford County has been great. The pledges made have been paid on schedule and exceeding expectations. The general finances of the hospital have been good. The general renovation, with painting and upgrading the hospital has been accomplished and the budget balancing.

Another new piece of equipment which will be in operation is a computer. The programming of this computer is like that of major hospitals and will streamline the billing, update insurance percentages on billing, etc. This will be a great asset to the hospital.

A point Mark made was that with the progress that the hospital and community have made Doctors visiting the area are impressed with the long range planning and updating at this facility.

It was announced there will be a Board of Directors meeting on Thursday (tonight) at 7:30 in the Commissioners Courtroom at City Hall.

### Haig's Warning

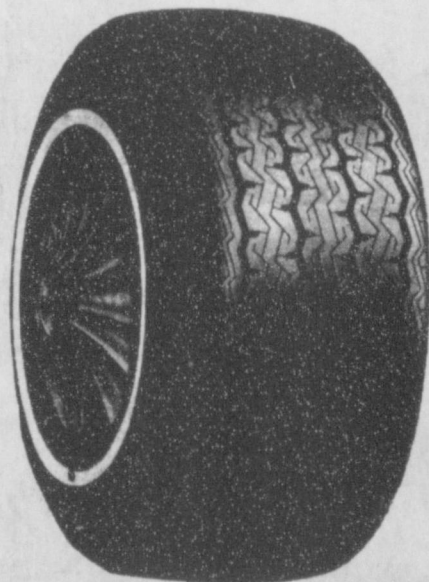
**Lynx To Face Tigers Eye to Eye**

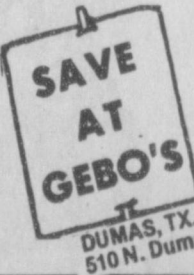

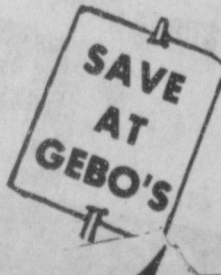

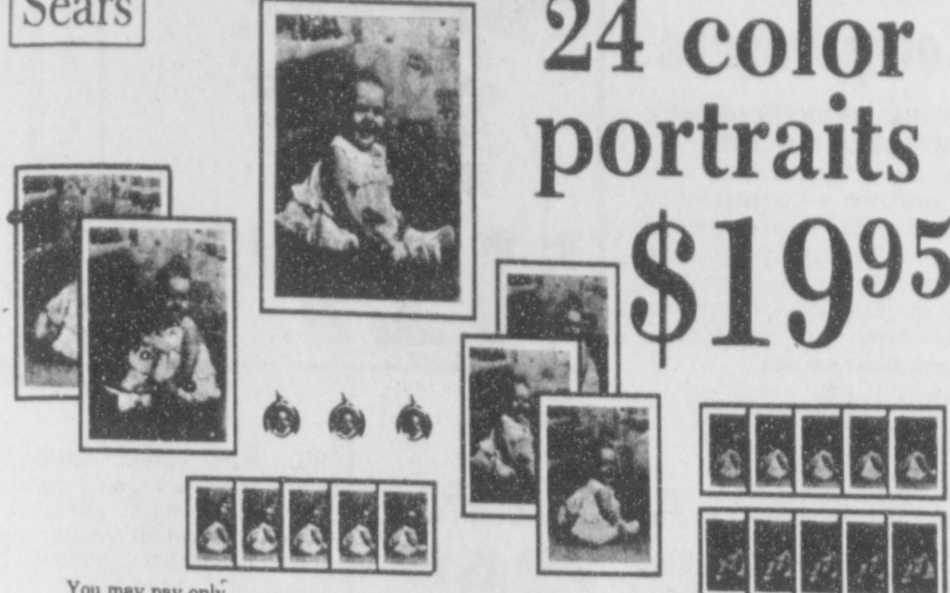

# Wheat program provisions outlined

The Secretary of Agriculture has outlined tentative provisions for the 1982 wheat program. In a letter from the Agriculture Stabilization and Conservation Service, the nine provisions have been outlined, and it is emphasized that they are not final until enactment of pending farm legislation.

The provisions are as follows:

1. Participation is voluntary.
2. One must meet these requirements to be eligible for program benefits such as target price protection, price support loans, and the farmer-owned reserve program. The level of these benefits will not be known until Congress passes new farm legislation.

3. Farm wheat acreage bases will be established using the 1981 wheat acreage planted for harvest.

4. To participate, the farm's 1982 wheat acreage, planted for harvest, must be at least 15 percent less than the farm's wheat acreage base.

5. An acreage of eligible cropland equal to 17.65 percent of the 1982 wheat acreage planted for harvest must be devoted to a conservation use. (Set-aside is equal to 17.65 percent of a farmer's planted wheat acreage). The practices that the set-aside must be devoted to will be announced later.

6. The acreage devoted to a conservation use cannot be mechanically harvested. Grazing will be permitted on these acres from November 1, 1981, through April 30, 1982.

7. Offsetting Compliance will apply (If a farmer participates on one farm, he must participate on all farms.)

8. Cross Compliance will not apply. (If a farmer does not

participate in the wheat program, he is still eligible for benefits on other crops if he meets their program requirements.)

9. No payment will be made on the acreage devoted to conservation use.

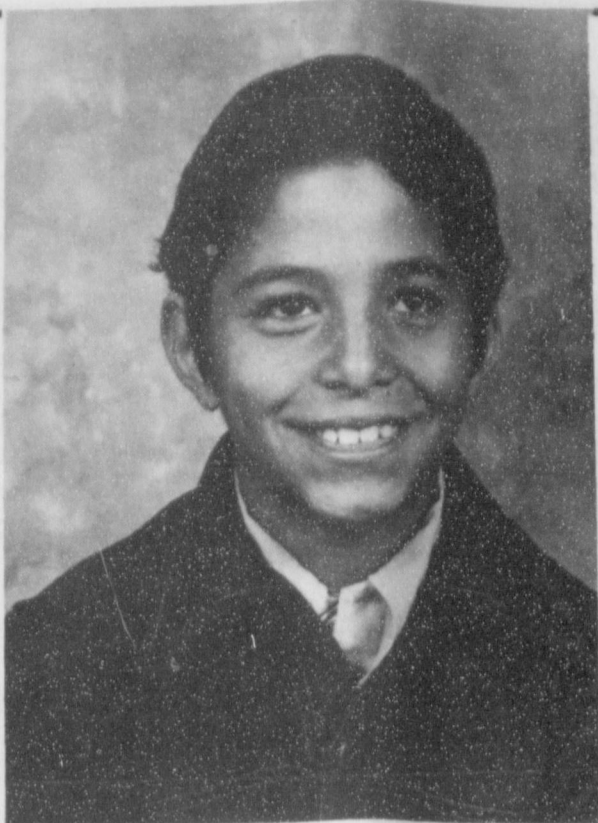
## Fruits & Nuts

This is the time of year many enjoy their own home-grown apples, grapes, nuts, etc. And in many areas of the country this year there is a bumper crop, especially of apples.

Yet many with a full harvest fail to make apple cider, or grape juice or wine--so that the harvest can be enjoyed for months to come. Limited amounts of cider and wine production are legal. Apples and nuts can be stored for long periods but grapes should be quickly utilized, either for jellies, juice or wine.

Wine-making in some sections of the country has long included the addition of sugar and water. But the finest wines are pure grape juice, naturally fermented. And grape juice can be prevented from fermenting these days, and preserved.

If recent September cold snaps mean anything, the coming winter may be severe. And those fruits and nuts available now might be badly missed in the months ahead if not collected and put away. That's also true of potatoes, onions and other garden crops which can be stored, canned or frozen. In other words, October is the last call for storage and preservation of 1981 fruit, vegetables and nuts.

## Senator Bill Sarpalius Reports



### BINGO!

AUSTIN - The people spoke last November. In a statewide election, they said they wanted bingo in certain circumstances.

During the special session, we had a chance to vote on the legislation that would make certain bingo games legal, and put the wishes of the people into operation. It was a hard choice for me because, like many people in our district, I really don't approve of gambling in any form.

Yet I voted for the bill. Here's what we voted for:

We approved a bill to legalize bingo games by well-established charitable organizations, which will use the bingo revenue for fund-raising purposes. The county in which the games are authorized may impose a tax of two percent of the gross receipts on the game.

This is a local-option bill, like the liquor by the drink. For bingo to be legal in a county, city, or justice precinct, it must be approved by a majority of the voters of

people who are law-abiding. In fact, the organization must have been in existence for at least three years (ten years for churches) before it is eligible for a bingo license. Therefore, we do not expect bingo to cost counties more than the tax it will generate.

Bingo was one of the hard choices we faced, but it was a good illustration of our government at work the way it is supposed to work. The people now have a greater choice than they had before, both at the state and the local level. They can vote to allow taxed and regulated bingo games to help churches and charities, or they can vote to keep it out.

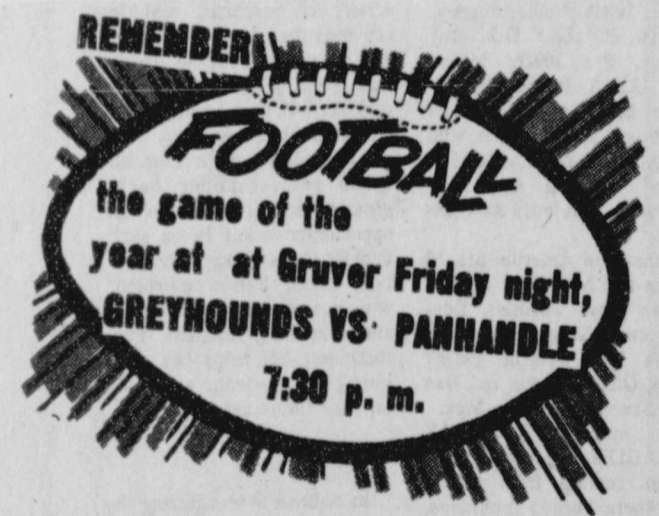

The next meeting will be Nov. 5 in the Parish Hall at 7:30 p.m.

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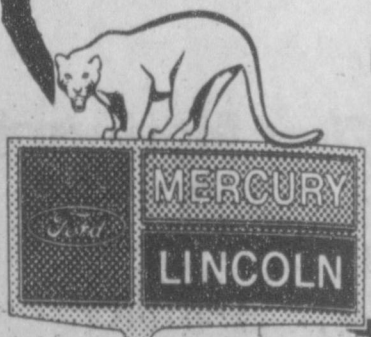
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### New Video Discs

Just as Americans in another era were forced to choose between 33 and 45 r.p.m. phonograph records (also 78's), today there are three different, new video discs appearing on the market.

And the buyer must decide whether to buy a disc at all. Until now the home video recorder was the only choice. It's a tape system, which can tape TV shows, and with a camera, make one's own video tapes. It sells for about \$800 (without the camera) and should probably still be the choice of most.

But smart sales heads learned they could produce a disc that sells for several hundred dollars less, and they figured many would buy a disc system for \$500 or \$395 who wouldn't buy an \$800 tape system. And, it must be said, the disc systems offer a better picture and better sound, in some models.

But the buyer of a disc system is buying no capacity to record programs nor to tape his own. He can merely buy or lease discs—cheaper admittedly than tapes—but they cannot be erased and used again and some must be carefully preserved.

Magnovox introduced the first video disc player—LaserVision. It plays an hour and nothing touches the surface of the disc. RCA introduced the next, with a stylus—it costs about \$200 less, though with what some feel is lower quality. But many big sales chains are pushing the RCA and it may become very popular.

A third system, called VHD (Video High Density) is just now being introduced, is also expected to be inexpensive and has some of the superior features of LaserVision.

Just as U.S. TV sets offer inferior picture quality compared to European sets, but are cheaper, it may be that the scramble to sell the most, first, will become

dominant in the U.S. The disappointing thing is that none of the three disc systems is compatible.

Similarly, the two tape systems which have been on the market in recent years are incompatible. Currently, the VHS system is outselling the Beta system. If it becomes the "33" of video tape recorders, nevertheless many Beta sets are already installed across the nation—and the smaller Beta cassette cannot be used in VHS tape machines.

### HIGHTOWER HIGHLIGHTS

Congress has completed work on President Reagan's "economic recovery package" by passing the Hance-Conable tax cut bill. This legislation, which I voted for after much revision and improvement, provides a three-year, 25% across-the-board reduction in personal income tax rates starting this October. It provides some significant and hard-won tax relief provisions for small oil royalty owners, independent producers, farmers and ranchers, residential non-profit child care facilities like orphanages, married couples and businessmen among others. We won several important tax relief victories with passage of this complex bill.

I know people want to give this President and his plan a chance. Consistent with my advocacy of lowered federal spending, lowered taxes and a balanced budget, I voted for both the President's budget and tax cut plans.

On the day of the final House vote, there was more similarity between the Democratic and Republican versions than people realized. The President's bill was revised several times in the last two weeks before the vote. It was revised only after some of us energy-state Democrats succeeded in getting windfall profits tax relief provisions put in the Democratic version.

#### Windfall Profits Tax Relief

During my campaign for re-election last year, I reaffirmed my intention to work towards repeal of the so-called windfall profits tax. This would relieve the thousands of independent oil producers and small royalty owners in our district who are the victims of this ridiculous energy and taxation policy.

During the tax debate in mid-July, the Republicans opposed putting windfall profits tax relief in their tax bill, even defeating an amendment by Senator Bentsen in the Senate. However, this was before we succeeded with the Democrats on the House Ways and Means Committee. After several conversations with key Democrats, they agreed to add provisions helpful to district's like ours

to their version of the tax cut. With provisions to assist married couples, farmers, ranchers and small businessmen, the Democratic proposal at this time allowed more and better tax relief than other proposals.

#### Reagan Version Revised

Then, concluding that many conservative Democrats were going to support the Democratic version because it was better at that stage, the Republicans reversed themselves and revised the Hance-Conable plan, putting in virtually the same or better energy provisions that some of us had successfully negotiated into the Democratic bill. With other changes too detailed to mention here, the Reagan version became much better for most people in our district.

After this time, the President appeared on nationwide television and solidified support for his version. My staff and I talked to roughly 3,000 people calling in over a period of some 36 hours, most of whom were for the President and whatever he was proposing. On the day of the vote, I reviewed the final written version of the Ways and Means Committee plan. Seen only at the last minute, it did not include other key provisions I had asked to be included and I was released from any commitment to support it. I voted for the President's final version because it was better for the 13th District.

#### The District Wins on Taxes

The great victory for the 13th District is twofold. First, we passed a three-year tax cut bill which I supported early in concept and which we all hope will relieve people of oppressive federal taxes which remove personal incentive and discourage national productivity. Second, we won some direct, significant energy tax relief for those who should have been exempted from the windfall profits tax to start with.

The ball is now in the President's court. If he succeeds, we all win. If his plan fails, we must try other solutions. Thank you, too, for calling in or writing to let me know your views on these matters; your awareness and involvement will be crucial if these policies are to work.

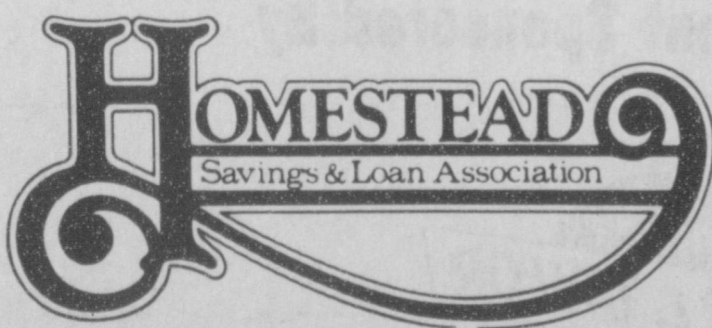

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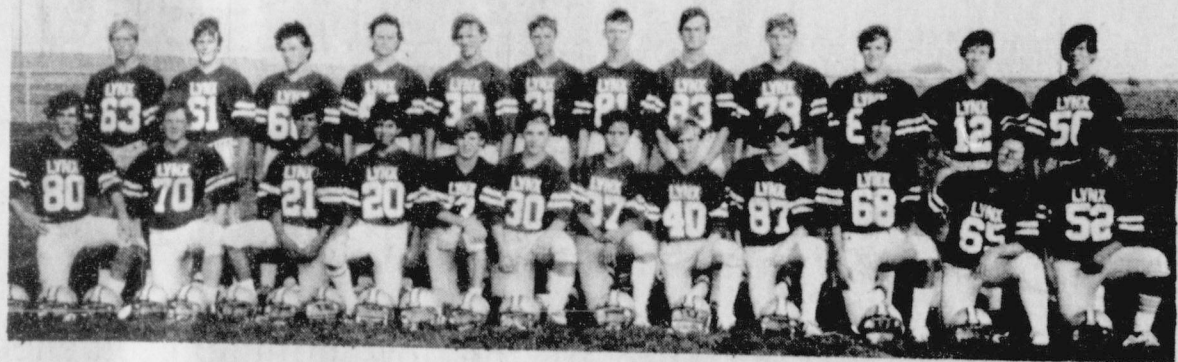
