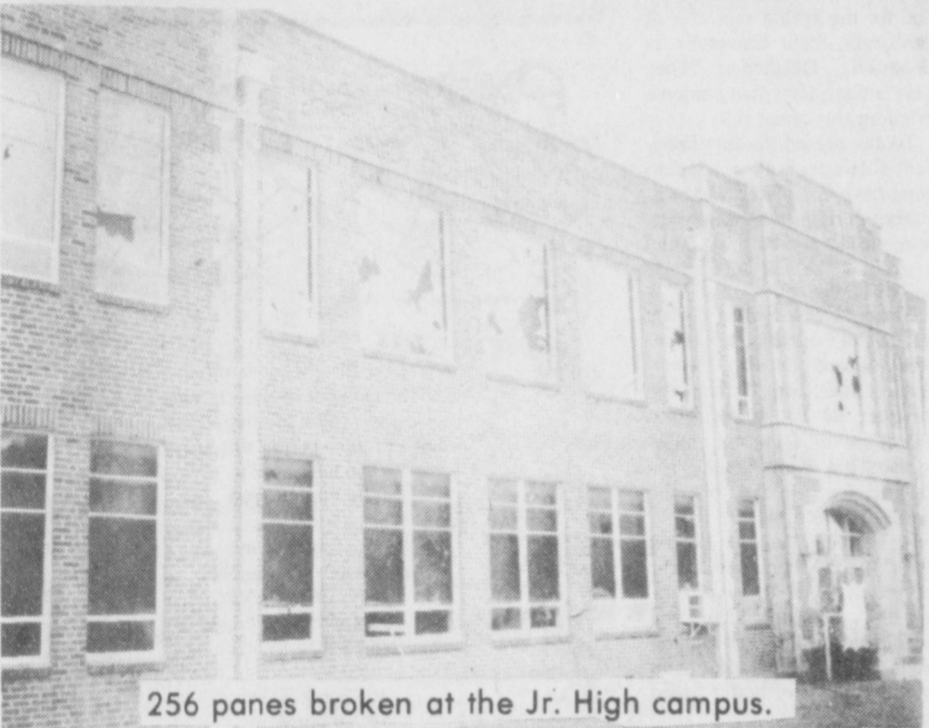

## Storm damage severe here!

Residents of Spearman and the immediate area dodged tornadoes and the chariots of wind that brought them to town for some four hours Monday night until the "all-clear" sounded and tired took over.

Most went to bed leaving damage inspection for the morning, hoping more wind and rain would not find the myriad broken windows.

Some residents east and southeast of town went to bed in strange places, their homes badly damaged or totally destroyed.

Tuesday morning light revealed Spearman streets green with a carpet of leaves and branches covering almost every thoroughfare in town -- while lawns were carpeted with pieces of damaged roofs and carpets were covered with shards of glass from window panes.

After a long, heart-felt sight of thanksgiving was offered up by hundreds for the fact that no one was injured anywhere in this storm, an assessment of the damage toll began.

Perhaps the most tragic scene of the storm was on the Bill Jackson farm where Mike Tucker and his new bride had been moved into their brand new three-bedroom, two-bath, mobile home for one hour of honeymooning when they had to run for their lives. After the storm, two bathroom commodes were the only evidence of the home that was.

The John L. Sullivans took refuge in a basement under their ultra-modern trailer home one-half mile north of the Harold Crooks place to find that home destroyed when they came up for the aftermath of the storm.

There was another mobile home totally destroyed on the Brown place adjoining DACO. Homes and buildings were damaged or destroyed on both the Brown place and at DACO.

Harold Crooks spotted a twister about a half-mile west of his place southeast of Spearman and he and his wife set out in their car to outrun it. Traveling north they had just about made FM 759 -- driving 80 mph to barely keep ahead of the funnel behind them -- and they saw a larger, more menacing tornado funnel traveling east right up the roadway of FM 759, leaving debris in its wake.

The Crooks' were headed for the J.D. Wilbanks place, not knowing the Wilbanks were heading for their car to flee, seeking safety but were driven back in the house by tornado winds.

They were not injured but the Wilbanks home suffered heavy damage with every window broken either by high winds or large hail stones. The barn and

other outbuildings were destroyed.

When the Crooks' finally got back to look at their home, the house was badly damaged, every outbuilding was either destroyed or heavily damaged and the remains of their airplane was left in the front yard.

--And these are not nearly all the chapters in the grim story of the storm. The old Schubert place was hit, both Greever places were hit and many others that have not even been reported in town because those suffering losses still combing the area for some semblance of articles that were once personal possessions.

Meanwhile, back from the ranches into the city of Spearman itself, an adjuster from the Pittsburg Glass Company said he had never seen so much glass damage in any storm at any place in his career.

There were 256 windows broken on the Spearman Junior High Campus alone. The Junior Lusby headquarters lost all its glass. There was hardly a residence nor a vehicle in Spearman that did not suffer damage.

In the city, it was hail that took the toll. As the storm moved toward Spearman in an arc sweeping from south to west, base-ball size hail began its popping and crackling warning. One of the weather watchers reported early in the gathering storm that hail had beat out the windshield of the vehicle he was driving just west of Spearman.

Many city residents who obeyed radio warnings and taken cover, thought the tornado was sweeping through the city shortly before eight o'clock because of the roar. They remained under cover to find later the noise was a straight wind blowing the rain and hail across town.

Kudos should go to the "storm staff" of Radio Station KRDF. They were on top of the situation all the way with calm but crisp instructions according to the storm reports at the time. At one point it was noted they, because of acoustical studios, could not hear the sirens. They were able to track the storm for listeners through law enforcement and weather watchers.

With twisters pointing their "stingers" down from the black turbulence overhead in almost any direction, radio was keeping track of these reports. At one point, with the same calm he reported every sighting, Coy Palmer announced once more: "We are told there is a twister almost on the ground directly over the radio station."

In a last "wrap-up" move before press time, it was discovered that if you wanted to talk with someone who went through the storm, just pick a person -- any person -- from the long lines at insurance offices and auto body shops in the city.

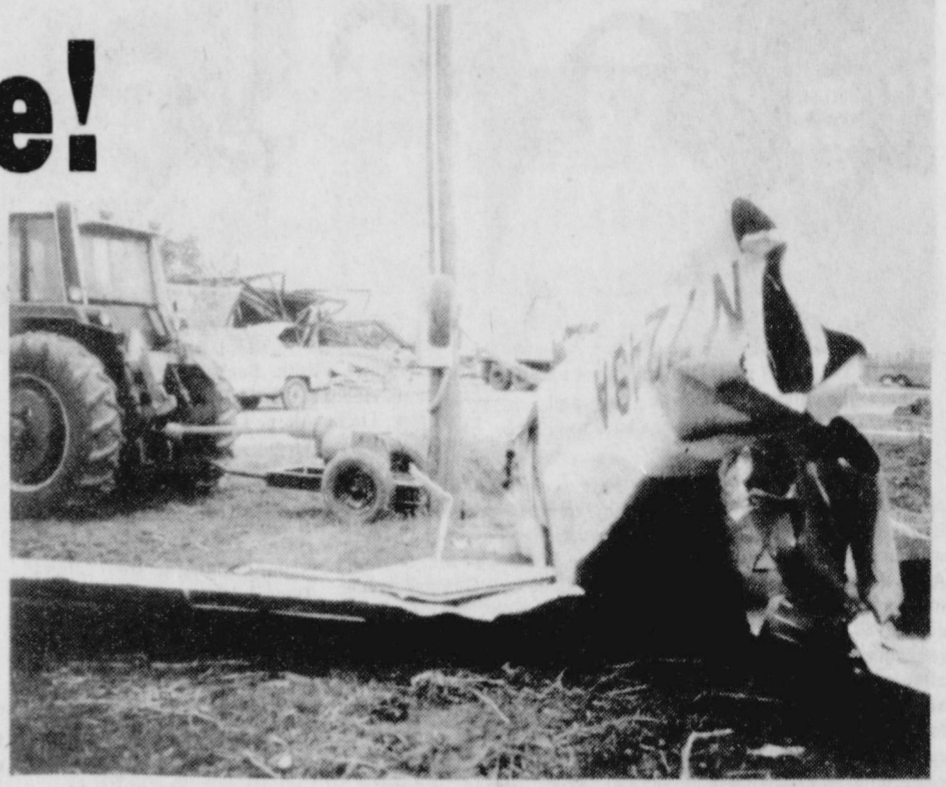

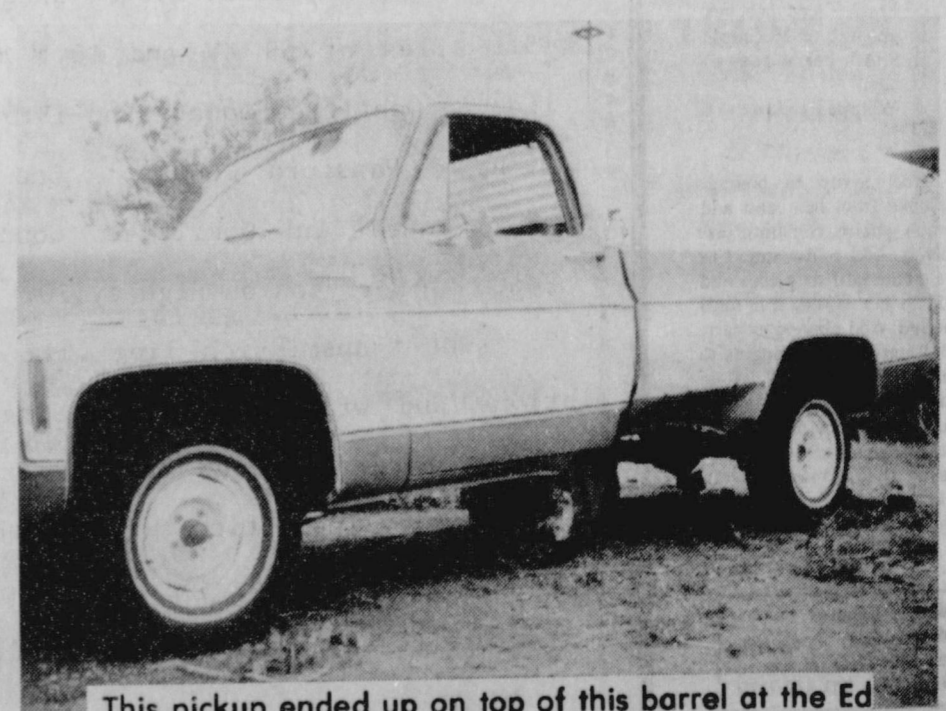

It does not guarantee a painless childbirth, nor does it prohibit the use of medication or anesthesia when necessary. The class meets one night a week in the evenings for six weeks at the Gruver Library. The fee for classes is normally paid directly to the instructor. \$30.00 is payable by cash or check in advance or the first night of the class.

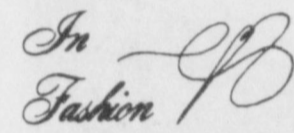
## La Leche League Meeting Set

## RECIPE

What could be more refreshing during this hot weather than chilled desserts using fresh fruit? Try this refreshing and cool dessert some hot night.

### Peach Pie

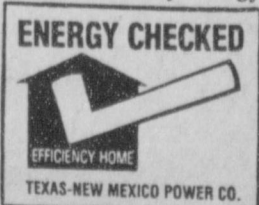
- 1 c peach syrup
- 1 pkg. lemon flavored gelatin
- 1/2 c cold water
- 1 pt. vanilla ice cream
- 1/8 t almond extract
- Fresh sliced peaches about 2 to 2 1/2 cups
- 1 9-inch baked pastry shell
- Whipped cream

Heat syrup to boiling. Remove from heat and add lemon gelatin. Stir until dissolved. Add cold water. Cut ice cream into six pieces and add to hot liquid. Stir until melted. Add almond extract. Chill until mixture begins to thicken and mound when spooned—about 40 minutes. Fold in 2 cups of peaches. Pour into cooled, baked pastry shell. Chill until firm. Garnish with whipped cream and peach slices.

## Top Fighter Ace Meets With Nazi Leader Last Time In April, 1944

ASHEVILLE, N.C.—"I  
think computers are fine and  
sophisticated aircraft are  
great but, in the end, the key  
is the pilot in aerial combat.  
The pilot, even in modern  
fighters, is the critical factor  
in winning control of the  
air."

That's the view of Gen-  
eral Gerhard Barkhorn, one  
of the greatest fighter aces in  
history with 301 aerial  
victories over the Russians in  
World War II. He was view-  
ing today's world align-  
ment, especially the matchup  
between NATO and  
WARSAW alliances in  
Europe.

Barkhorn's career as a  
pilot and German Air Force  
leader goes all the way back  
to the last world war, when  
he entered the Luftwaffe as a  
youth from Konigsberg--now  
under communist control.  
Though he began his air  
fighting relatively late in  
the war, after the easiest  
victories, he became by 1944  
the most successful German  
fighter ace.

In the fifties, sixties and  
seventies he helped build the  
modern-day German Air  
Force and is up-to-date on  
today's precarious military  
balance, or imbalance. (He  
feels NATO needs more in-  
expensive but capable  
fighters, plus more emphasis  
on comradeship and morale  
in the squadrons.) Visiting  
in Asheville, he recalled grim  
days:

"We were always out-  
numbered by the Russians in  
the last war. But that's not  
decisive. Tactics, morale, or-  
ganization, intelligence, all  
these factors play a role in air  
operations.

"Morale in our  
squadrons was very high.  
We thought we could handle  
the Russian pilots and we  
could, so long as we were not  
too badly outnumbered. I  
think that's still true today to  
a degree.

"We were so imbued  
with spirit and military in-  
doctrination and the propa-  
ganda of the government  
that even in 1944, the last  
time I met Hitler, we still  
believed in victory.

"It was in April, two  
months before you American  
and other Allied troops  
landed in France, in 1944.  
My victory total had contin-  
ued to grow and I was the  
leading ace in the Luftwaffe.  
I had been decorated by  
Hitler in Russia thirteen

months earlier, in March of  
1943.

"Then he had greatly im-  
pressed the three of us who  
sat with him for an hour late  
one night, over tea and  
cakes, and he had been  
totally convincing. This time,  
however, we went to the  
Obersalzberg, where his  
mountain home was, in the  
Alps. Asheville reminds me  
of the Alps in many ways.

"Hitler had only a year to  
live, and yet at this time, the  
Allies were not yet in France,  
Germany still held Rome,  
and there was hope, I be-  
lieve, too, this was about the  
last season Hitler enjoyed his  
beautiful house in the Alps;  
he came in April and stayed  
until after D-Day. He shot  
himself in April of the next  
year, in Berlin, in the under-  
ground bunker.

"One could see how  
much he had changed in a  
year but he was still in  
command of the situation  
and alert. After the bomb  
explosion which he survived,  
three months after this  
meeting, Hitler's physical  
constitution deteriorated  
rapidly. The process had  
already begun in April, 1944  
and I could see how much the  
strain had taken out of him  
since the March, 1943  
ceremony.

"This time there were  
many of us, not just three,  
and we all stood at attention  
and were decorated. Hitler  
made a short statement  
about the war and didn't  
have much time to spend  
with us. It's hard for Ameri-  
cans to understand, but we  
pilots didn't know anything  
about mass murders at this  
time and wouldn't have be-  
lieved it.

"We were behind Hitler  
because he was Germany's  
wartime leader and because  
he had done wonders for the  
country and its economy  
before the war. You mustn't  
forget how much he accom-  
plished. Everyone had work.  
We had the first autobahn,  
the first people's car, the  
Volkswagen, sports clubs,  
and vacation and theater  
clubs for workers, youth  
organizations, etc. Most of  
all, the nation had been  
pulled up from ruin and a  
guilt complex and the people  
again had pride and were  
united in a strong country.  
That's appealing to young

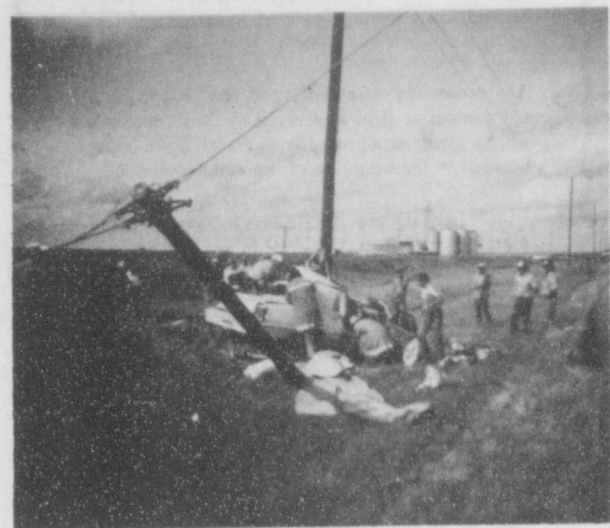

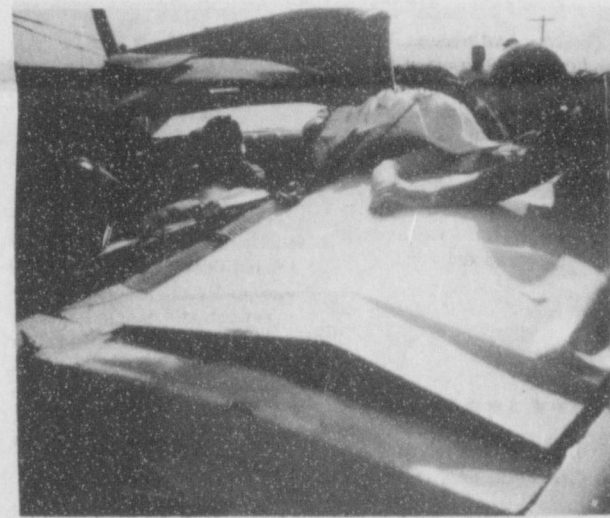

# Jack Oakes Is New Hospital Board Member

Hansford County commissioners had to name a new hospital board member and learned they will have to name a new county health officer -- but the budget hearing was the main part of the "program" at the regular court session, Monday.

After all persons wishing to speak to the budget had been heard, commissioners settled down to the budget itself.

While every county's budget goes through many revisions before adoption, the chief concern this year was the adjustments that must be made from the first draft because of the inroads made in the tax base by exemptions for those over 65 and the 40 percent homestead exemption that is a part of easing property owners into 100 percent property valuation across the state.

Taking exemptions and other developing adjustments into account, the taxable base from which the county will draw its operating funds should be \$378.9-million. This is up from the current budget base of 1353.7-million.

Commissioners also reviewed the delinquent tax roll and voted to accept a figure of \$16,331.49 in taxes past due. It was noted that some accounts were so old and so small that it would cost the county less to drop them than try to collect them. Helen Dry noted that state law prohibited this.

The commissioners approved the roll and went on to some individual items for the forthcoming budget. They agreed to include the cost of one four-channel radio for one of the H and S ambulances in the new budget. It is believed the city will purchase the second unit for the other ambulance if there are no federal funds available for both through PRPC.

The radio units will give the ambulances communications with law enforcement units without having to go through the Spearman Police Department dispatcher -- a very important capacity in the event

of a major catastrophe in the area.

Also considered for the budget was use of the area "detox" unit if and when one is in operation. This would be a "non-hospital" treatment center for alcoholics and would greatly reduce the cost to the county for handling these cases. Cost would be at a rate of ten cents per capita county population.

Commissioners concurred that they would go along with this program once it was operational but would not authorize any funds until later. Hospital Board Member Jimmy Vernon had expressed his desire to resign as soon as a replacement could be found. The court contacted Jack Oakes and he agreed to serve. His appointment was ratified by the commissioners.

Commissioners consulted with Judge J.E. "Chunky" Blackburn regarding a bill to the county for its portion of the salary of an additional probation officer -- where the state had been paying the salaries of such probation officers. Judge Blackburn said he had not had time to research the reason but he felt it was because the addition had been mandated by state regulations and the money was not in state coffers until the new fiscal year that begins in September for the state. He said he felt Austin would pick up the additional salary at that time.

Where two or more counties share such services -- probation officers, district attorney and their staffs -- administration of the program falls to the most populous county. In both such cases, this is Hutchinson County. When additional assessments are made to Hansford County for such programs, commissioners "bird dog" the situation carefully before authorizing funds.

The granting of easements to General Telephone and Phillips Petroleum Companies, consideration of courthouse property insurance and routine reports and payment of bills comprised

the agenda for the meeting. The next regular meeting will be June 28.

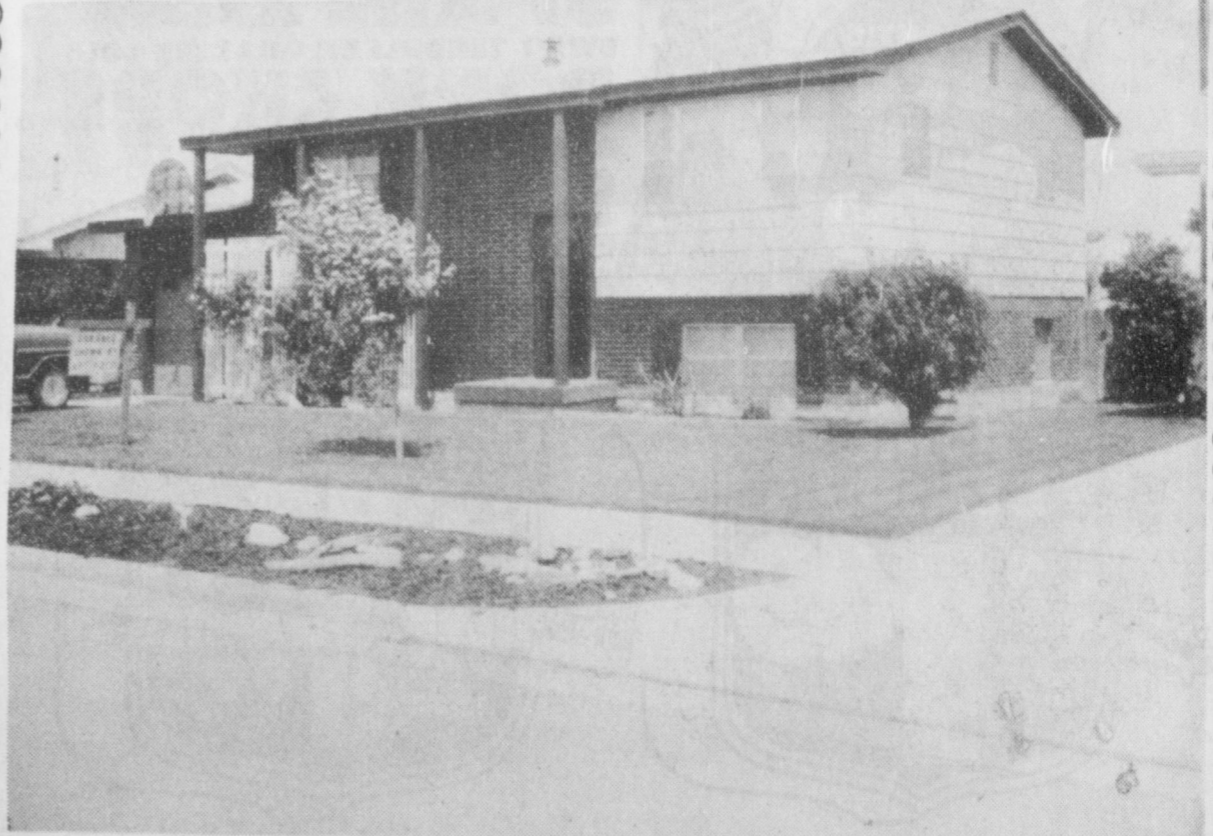

### Nightower Pleased By First Budget Resolution

"I am pleased that the House approved a budget measure that we can send to a conference committee for further improvement. This has been a long process but it's critical that we approve legislation that will move this country toward a balanced budget and do it as quickly as possible."

Although this Latta version provided for a lower deficit figure in fiscal 1983, it did not go as far as the Democratic version in moving us toward a balanced budget. However, it will now go to a House-Senate conference committee which will hopefully improve this version in a way that will be more helpful to our district and the country generally in these difficult economic times."

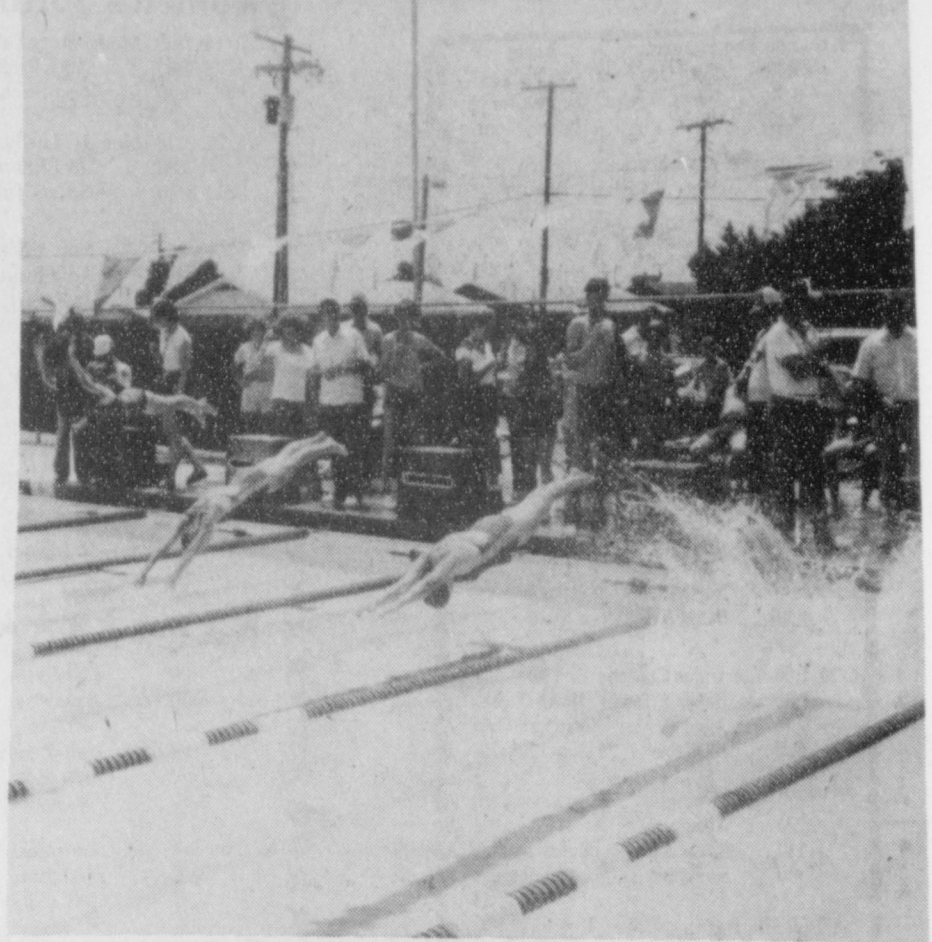

WTSU Enrollment Up

WTSU-Registration officials at West Texas State University say they hope enrollment for the first summer session, which shows only the second significant increase in 10 years, sets a trend. Enrollment after the only day of regular registration showed an increase of 70 students. After several days of late registration and four class days, 2,542 students have enrolled for the first session. The figure is an increase of 198 students over

last year's 2,344 for a comparable period. The figure also is above the 2,464 final count for the 1981 first summer term, said Lila Vars, WTSU associate registrar. "We're usually in the ball park or down," said Vars, who compared figures for the past decade. The highest enrollment for the first summer term was 10 years ago with 2,775 students. Enrollment then began steadily

to decline until 1975 when figures showed a slight increase. The 1980 and 1981 summer terms also registered a slight increase. The 198 increase is the largest since 1972. Registration for a variety of workshops, seminars and camps will continue through the first summer session and the second term which begins on Thursday, July 8, with registration.

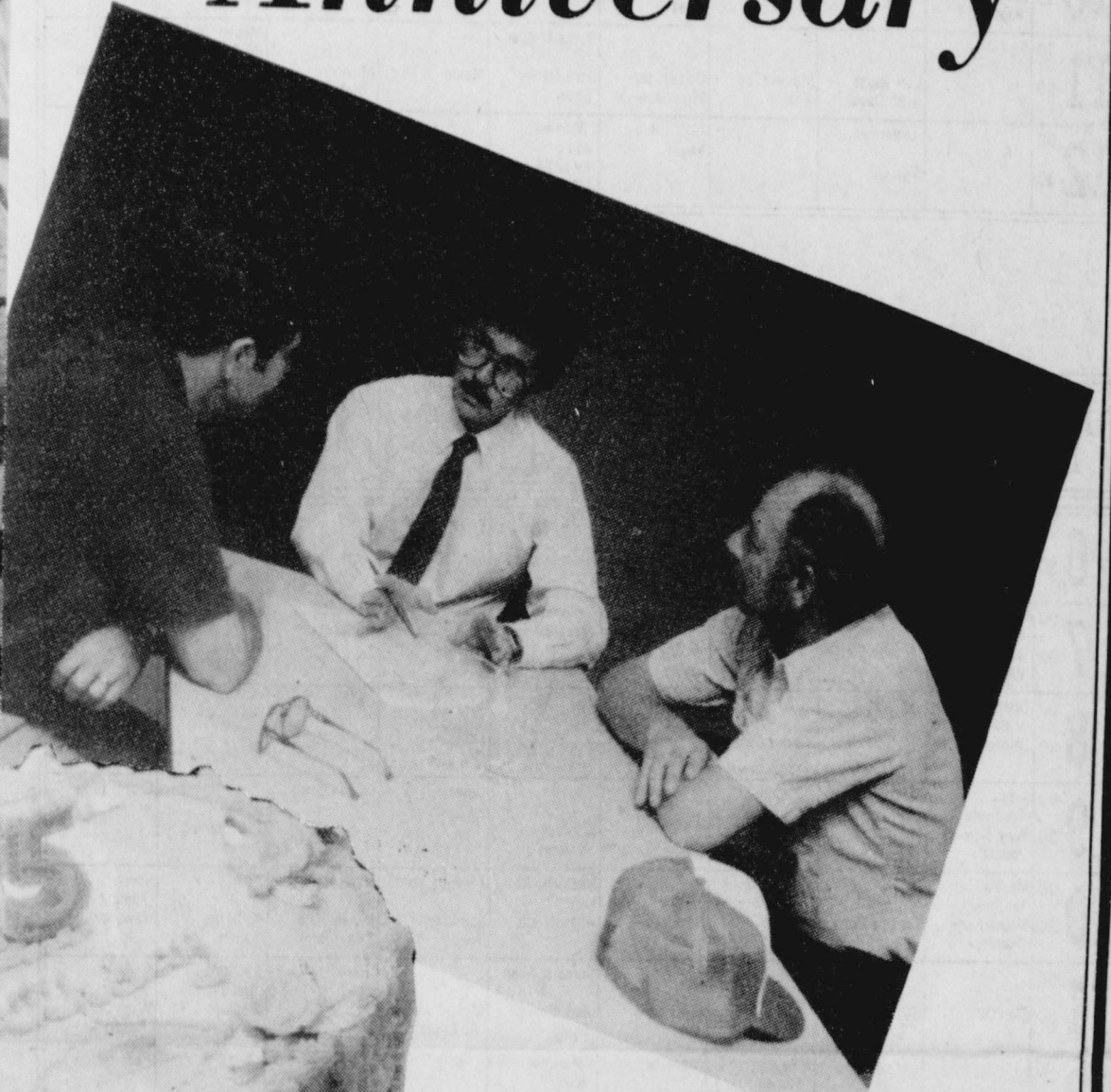

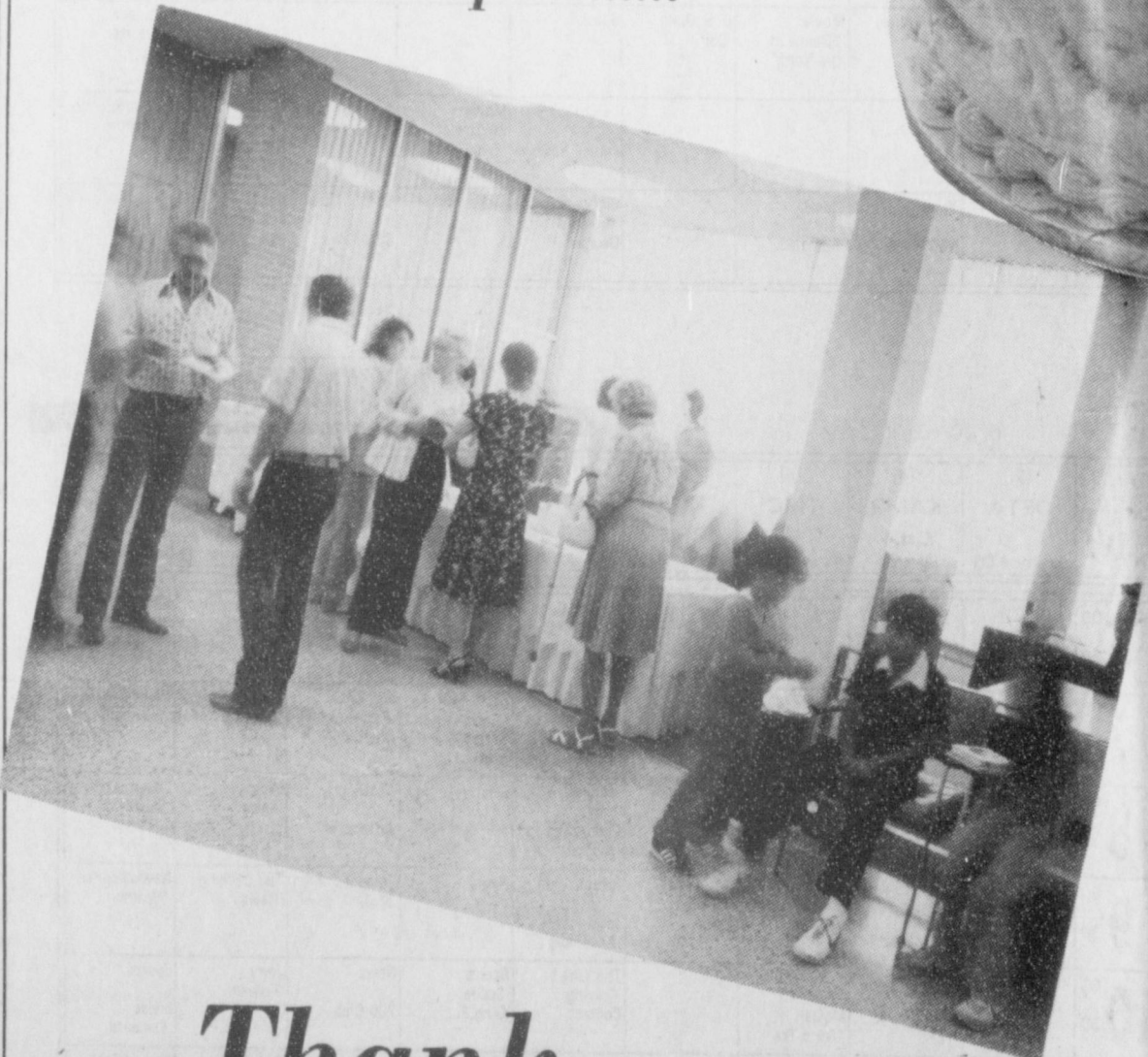
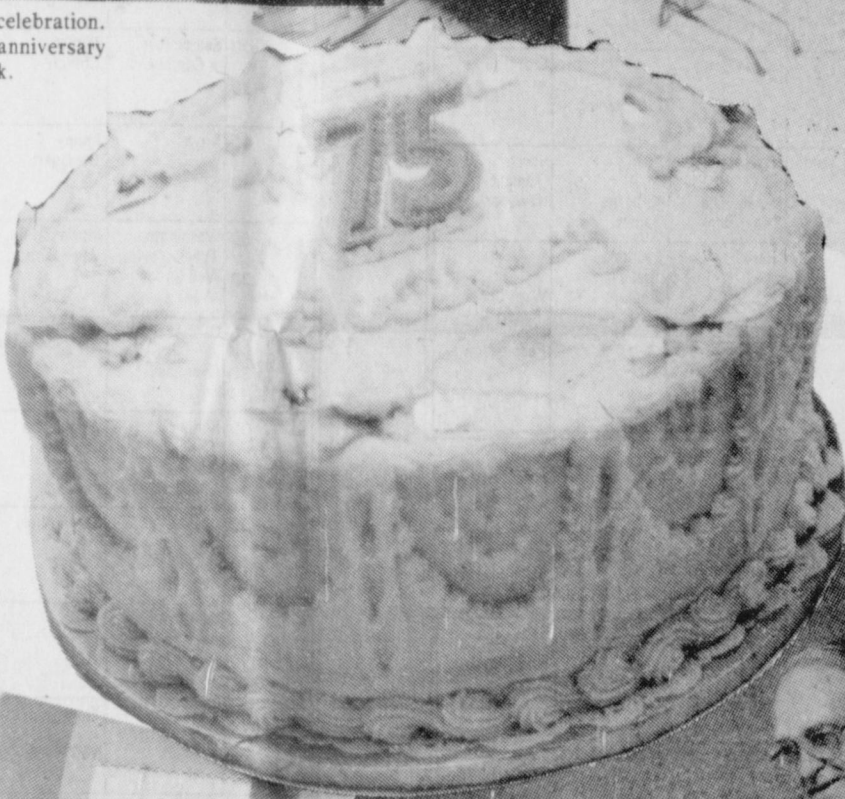
