Editorial

THE CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS

A letter mailed to every newspaper in the state of Texas, coming from Ex-Governor Jim Ferguson, informs our voters that he is for all the amendments but one. Jim was not for the No. 1 amendment, providing for a state dispensary system to have exclusive sale of distilled liquors. Jim did not call it by that name but referred to it as the monopoly amendment, misleading.

The novelty of practically all of the newspapers of the state agreeing with Jim Ferguson for the first time in his long political career has attracted much attention, and papers on our exchange desk apparently be-

grudgingly give James E. a bit of credit for good logic. Not so with this writer. We still disagree with Mr. Ferguson. We stay with him on all the amendments except No. 1. This writer is most emphatic in favor of No. 1 amendment.

People all over the state are passing up the amendment without giving it much thought. Some paid propaganda of the invested liquor interests got their work in early on this proposed amendment, and it is difficult for the average man to give the amendment the consideration due it.

What is the argument against this amendment. It would place the state in the liquor business. Correct. It would corrupt officials. It might do that, but we have tax paid boarding houses for corrupt state officials, and if we cannot elect and select men from among our population that can conduct the affairs of the liquor traffic to the lasting benefit of both the consumer and non-consumer, then we had better turn our government over to the Socialists and give up.

This argument of corruption is based on the idea that we would not be able to administer the law without the bulk of the officials receiving bribes, and dishing out special favors. It's absurd. — etainetaoinn hands of the state, then the tendencies would be far more towards a strict enforcement of the rules, and less acceptance of bribes for special favors, than under the profit system that places a lot of Texas money into the pockets of out-of-state distributors. Just try to trace the capital that is behind liquor in this state. You will find that the bulk of it comes from other states, and that the vast profits of the Liquor trade is relayed to wealthy liquor dealers out-side the state of Texas.

The proposed amendment has behind it the idea that has worked so successfully in the dominion of Canada. The results in Canada are specific. First, there is less tendencies towards carousals, drunken parties, introduction of liquor to the youth of that nation. Second, it has been proved that the handling of the liquor un-

der the government supervision, has proven a profitable venture, and money normally gobbled up by private capital, has gone into the coffers of the government to lighten the burdens of the tax-payers. Third and most beneficial of all, perhaps, is the fact that the strictest care has been used in seeing that the quality of the liquor is standard.

Those of the nation who cannot appreciate this last safeguard, might recall the days of Jake-leg in our nation, the mounting death list that followed the reign of poison bootleg whiskey. At best whiskey as used in this nation, is a detriment to health. Then if the state does not have the most favorable opportunities to regulate the grade and substance of the whiskey that is consumed by your citizens, the tendencies will be for the distributors to neglect the quality and increase the profits.

Think over this matter. It is essentially a moral question. Which had you rather have dispensing liquor, the paid servants of the state, who must account to the people for their every action, or the licensed dealer.

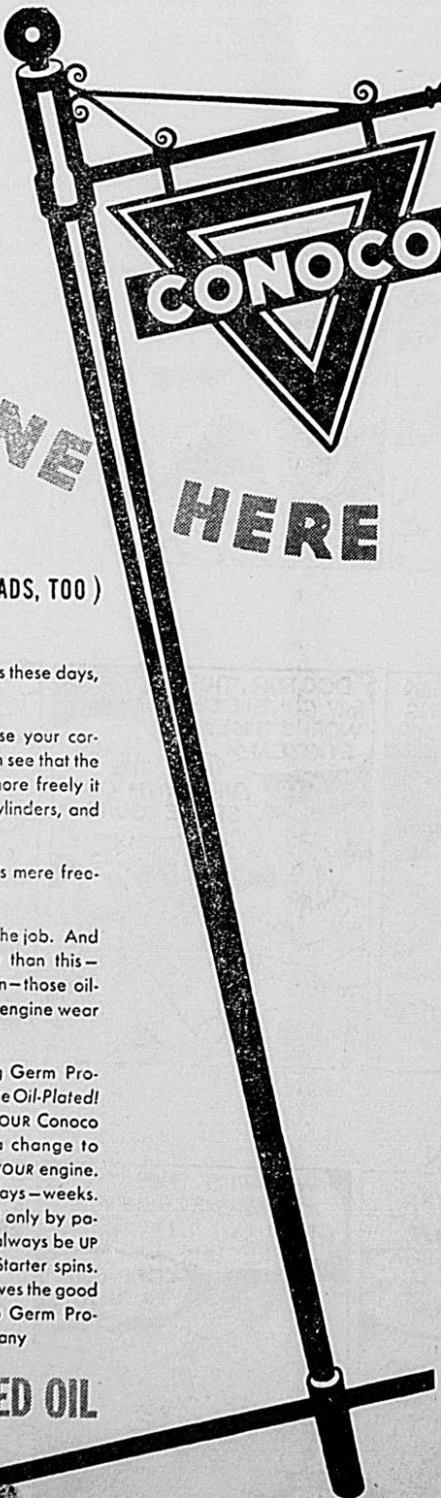

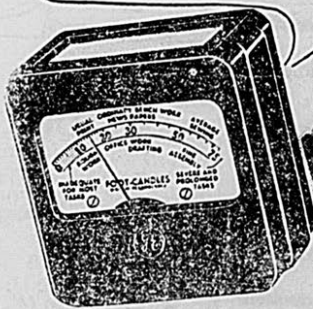

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Read The Following Amendments So You May Vote Intelligently

AMENDMENT NO. 1

The first proposed Constitutional Amendment to face the voter on November 3rd is S. J. R. No. 3-A, which provides for a State dispensary system to have exclusive sale of distilled liquors and all profits from the sale of such liquors would go to the State. The sale of spirituous distilled liquors for private profit, as is now the case, is prohibited within this State, by this Amendment, except when such sale is made to the State, according to B. P. Matocha, Secretary of State. It is further provided that the State of Texas shall have the exclusive right to purchase at wholesale and to sell at retail such distilled spirituous liquors. This sale shall be made only in unbroken packages and no such liquors shall be consumed on the premises where sold. The difference between the proposed plan and that now in effect would simply be one of ownership—i. e. by the State rather than the individual.

The State would maintain various places of business for the purpose of the sale of such liquor direct to the customer. These places of business would only be maintained in the counties, precincts or incorporated towns that, by local option elections such sale has been made legal.

Local option as now in effect would not be changed by adoption of the amendment. The sale of alcoholic beverages containing not more than 3.2 per cent alcohol which has been legalized in such political subdivisions shall not be prohibited by this section. This Amendment further provides that the open saloon shall not be reestablished. It is also provided in this Amendment that the Legislature shall have the power to regulate the sale for private profit and possession of distilled liquors for medical, scientific and mechanical purposes.

AMENDMENT No. 2

Proposal No. 2 effecting a change in the State Constitution is S. J. R. No. 18 providing that the Legislature shall have the right to levy taxes to provide a Retirement Fund for school teachers and persons employed in public schools, colleges and universities, supported wholly or partly by the State.

According to the interpretation of Secretary of State, B. P. Matocha, is provided that the State shall contribute to such Retirement Fund an amount equal to that paid for the same purpose from the income of each person. It is a matching plan. Each person so employed in such State schools, colleges and universities will likely be required to set a-

side so much of their salary and the State will set aside a like amount. This Amendment further provides that the amount contributed to such Retirement Fund by the State shall not exceed any time five per cent of the compensation paid to each such person by the State or school district, and shall not be more than One Hundred Eighty dollars for any one person in one year.

No person shall be eligible for a pension under this Amendment who has not taught twenty years in the State of Texas, but those who retire before they have finished their twenty years in this State and who have been contributing to the fund shall be entitled to a refund of the moneys paid into the fund.

All funds provided from the compensation of said persons, or by the State for such Retirement Fund, as are received by the Secretary of the State of Texas shall be invested in bonds of the United States, the State of Texas, or counties or cities of his State or in bonds issued by any agency of the United States Government, the payment of the principal and interest on which is guaranteed by the United States Government.

Persons who are the recipients of pensions from such Retirement Fund shall not be eligible for any other pension retirement funds or direct aid from the State.

AMENDMENT No. 3

For a number of year there has been a definite movement to give State Employees the benefit of Workmen's Compensation insurance. The State, by law, requires other employees in all other industries to carry such insurance on its employees while the State has not done so.

It will be possible for the State to insure its workers under the terms of the third proposed Amendment to the State Constitu-

tion, which will be submitted to Texas voters November 3rd, according to Secretary of State B. P. Matocha.

The amendment is permissive and not compulsory. It gives the Legislature power to provide such insurance. It does not compel them to do so.

AMENDMENT NO. 4

Removal of the absolute power of pardon and parole from the hands of the Governor and vesting it largely in those of a non-political board, is the effect of Amendment No. 4 on the Nov. 3rd ballot. This Amendment S. J. R. No. 26, makes provision for the Governor to grant parole, pardon commutation, etc. of sentences upon the recommendation of a Board.

In interpreting the Amendment Secretary of State Matocha said "The proposed Board of Pardons and Paroles would be comprised of three members one of whom would be appointed by the Governor; one by the Chief Justice of the Supreme Court and one by the Chief Justice of the Court of Criminal Appeals. They will serve for six years, one member's term expiring every two years. It is thus impossible for one member to have complete charge of the Board."

The Governor is given the power to grant one thirty day reprieve in a death case. This is his only initiative, however. He has the veto power on all recommendations and he may revoke paroles and conditional pardons.

This amendment was given its impetus by Governor James V. Allred, who is advocating its enactment. It is believed that its adoption may be a step toward ending abuses and stopping mistakes made in the issuance of various forms of clemency.

In cases of treason, under the terms of the proposed Amendment the Governor has the power to grant reprieves, commutations

of punishment and pardons with the advice and consent of the Legislature.

At the present time all power of clemency, commutations, etc., is vested in the Governor and no small portion of his time is devoted to reviewing the thousands of applications. It is a strain and a responsibility which many feel is too much to place on any one individual.

AMENDMENT NO. 5

Proposal No. 5 to the State Constitution known as S. J. R. No. 14 proposes to raise the salaries of certain Constitutional Officers, namely the Governor; Attorney General, Comptroller of Public Accounts, Treasurers, Commissioner of General Land Office and the Secretary of State.

This Amendment provides that the Governor shall receive as compensation for his services an annual salary of Twelve Thousand dollars instead of four thousand, and he now receives and shall have the use and occupation of the Governors Mansion fixtures, and furniture.

The salary of the Attorney General would be fixed at \$6,000 instead of \$4,000.

The Comptroller of Public Accounts, the Treasurer and the Commissioner of the General Land Office each hold office for a term of two years, reside at the Capitol of the State during continuance in office, perform the duties required of them by law, and now receive \$2,500 per year. This Amendment would increase the salary of these officials from \$2,500 to \$6,000 annually.

The Secretary of State is appointed by the Governor, with the advice and consent of the Senate, and holds office during the term of the services of the Governor. The present salary of the Secretary of State is \$2,000 per year. This Amendment would provide for a salary of \$6,000.

AMENDMENT NO. 6

Limiting the representation of the larger cities is the clear intent of H. J. R. No. 9 relating to the apportionment of State Representatives for the county of this State whose population exceeds 700,000 people.

It is provided by this Amendment that no county in this State shall be entitled to more than one apportionment in the State Legislature unless the population of such county shall exceed the population as ascertained by the recent U. S. Census.

In the event a county shall have a population in excess of 700,000 people then such county shall be entitled to one additional representative for each 100,000 population in excess of 700,000 population.

This Amendment also provides that no district shall be created which would permit any county to have more than seven Representatives except under the above condition.

Simply speaking, H. J. R. No. 9 would limit the number of representatives in the State Legislature to not more than 7 in any county unless that county has a population of 700,000. In the case one more would be allowed for every one hundred thousand above the seven hundred thousand.
