It was a great weekend for just about anything--especially boxing. The Spearman YMCA Boxing Club has 4 coaches--Eugene Yarbrough, Butch Lasater, Bobby Archer and Ricky Riggins. The team did a fantastic job bringing home the TEAM TROPHY--the 2nd year in a row for this award. The TEAM TROPHY is awarded to the team with the most points--the Spearman-YMCA team had 30 points--twice as many more points than the other teams. Points were awarded as follows--1st Place winner received 3 points and the 2nd Place finisher received 2 points. Four of the 18 members that could not attend because of some reason or another were Eugene Brown, Paul and Dallas Trosper and Kevin Knox.

Friday, February 19, was the first night of lots of exciting action. Mr. Yarbrough said that he was proud of all his boxers--the Spearman-YMCA Boxers--because they "...fought their hearts out"!! Each match was in a different weight class, teams from Spearman, Amarillo, Tulia, Fritch, Muleshoe, Stinnett and Hereford--these were the teams that fought on Friday. The first match was between Spearman's Matt Archer and Amarillo's Eloy Valverde--this was in the 45 lbs. PEE WEE Division. Valverde won the match. The second match was in the 55 lb. PEE WEE Division. Those matched in this bout were Marcus Brashears of Amarillo and Brian Beck, member of the Spearman-YMCA Boxing Club. Brian fought with determination and in-turn won the match. In another 55 lb. PEE WEE Match, Timmy Tinner of Tulia was matched up against Chad Riggins of the Spearman-YMCA Boxing Club. Chad

tried, but the winner was Tinner of Tulia.

Brady Braggs of Fritch, in the 60 lb. PEE WEE Division, had a BYE--the match had been scheduled with Eugene Brown of the Spearman Club, who could not make it--Baggs being the winner. In the other 60 lb. PEE WEE Division Bout, Mark Eakin of the Spearman-YMCA Boxing Club was matched up against Johnny Orozo of Muleshoe, but because of some circumstances, Mark was the winner because of a BYE.

Charles Henery of Stinnett didn't fight in his 80 lb. Jr. Division against Phillip Herrera of Amarillo, making Herrera a winner with a BYE. Anthony Orozo of Muleshoe went up against Rupert Brashears of Amarillo in a 75 lb. INT. Match. Orozo won the match. David Riche of Fritch fought against James Ruez of Hereford in a 112 lb. Sr. Division--Ruez won the bout.

Curtis McGill of the Spearman-YMCA Boxing Club went up against Brian Beck, also a member of the Spearman-YMCA Boxing Club in a 55 lb. PEE WEE Division. Both being very good boxers, but Brian had the better half and won the match. In another 55 lb. PEE WEE Division bout, Jack Blaylock of Amarillo went up against Timmy Tinner of Tulia--or I should say, they were suppose to fight, but Blaylock didn't showup and Tinner was pronounced as the winner of the bout with a BYE. An exhibition match was fought between Michale Horton of Fritch and Ricky Lopez of Gruver. There was one match fought for 1st and 2nd Place--the match was between Brady Baggs of Fritch and Mark Eakin of the Spearman-YMCA Boxing Club. Tony Herndon, also of the Spearman-YMCA Boxing Club, fought a great bout against Deno Munoz of Hereford in an 80 lb. INT. Tony won by "retirement"--the ref stopped the fight. In the 90 lb. INT. Division, Frank Flores of Amarillo and P.D. Hurd of Tulia were scheduled to fight. Hurd of Tulia won the match with a "RSC"--Referee Stops Contest.

The final match was between Rodney Tolliver of Amarillo and Merwin Parker of Tulia. Parker of Tulia won the match--in the 112 lb. INT. Division. James Ruiz won his contest--which was to be against Allen Parker of Tulia--by a "walk-over"--this meant that the Ruiz' opponent didn't show up.

Wesley Baggs of Fritch and Archie Hunicutt of Amarillo fought in one of three exhibition matches. Another exhibition was Ricky Lopez of the Gruver Boxing Club going up against Deward Cator, also of the Gruver Boxing Club. Marshall Cator of the Gruver Boxing Club fought the final exhibition match against David Ruiz of Hereford.

There was a 139 lb. OPEN Match between Michael Horton of Fritch and Wendall Holland of Stinnett--Holland scratched.

Each one of the boxers from the Spearman-YMCA Boxing Club did a magnificent job at their Regionals. All the matches were exciting. The next Meet will be at Liberal to be held this weekend--26th and 27th of February.

## Sheriff's dept. has busy week

The Hansford County Sheriff's Department logged a busy week with the arrest of one subject for credit card abuse, one for theft of services, one AWOL from the military, a fugitive juvenile and two court convictions.

On a warrant issued here, Canadian authorities took Ricky Lane McFarlin in custody and arraigned him for felony credit card abuse. He

posted a \$1,500 bond at Canadian. According to Sheriff R. L. McFarlin, he will be bound over for the grand jury.

Joe Wayne Dubose, 24, was arrested for theft of services. He appeared in court and made full restitution and all charges were dropped against him.

Tony Barrera was arrested Friday on a complaint of being absent without leave from the

military. He was released Tuesday to military authorities from Dallas.

Also released Tuesday was a juvenile apprehended here after he ran away from the Texas Youth Center. He was turned over to state authorities.

The Hansford County jail facilities became a point of detention this week for 35 illegal aliens rounded up in a

sweep of the northeast tier of Panhandle counties by the Border Patrol.

The Sheriff's Department marked up two more convictions in court here this week. Roger Campbell received two years in the Texas Department of Corrections and Jessie Bowen received a five-year sentence. Bowen was returned from Chicago to face charges of car theft.

## Public School Week, March 1-5

The Spearman School District will be among 1,000 public school systems in the state which will be observing the 128th annual Texas Public Schools Week March 1-5.

"Although parents and the public are invited to visit our schools throughout the school year, a special invitation is being extended during Texas Public Schools Week," James Cunningham said.

"All classrooms, elementary through high school will host open house during this week and the community is invited to see first-hand how the school system operates," Cunningham said.

Texas Public Schools Week was organized in 1950 so that community members might have the opportunity to see first-hand how their local public school system operates.

During the past 32 years, it has been used to increase the public's knowledge about the schools, to encourage parents to visit their child's school and to help the public gain an appreciation of what schools and the community are doing for them.

School officials are encouraging parents and the public not only to attend the open house at their neighborhood school but to visit during the day, have lunch with their child and sit in on a classroom session.

"We endeavor to help each student develop personal knowledge, skills and competence to maximum capacity. We want to maintain the highest level of quality education for each child in our schools," Cunningham said.

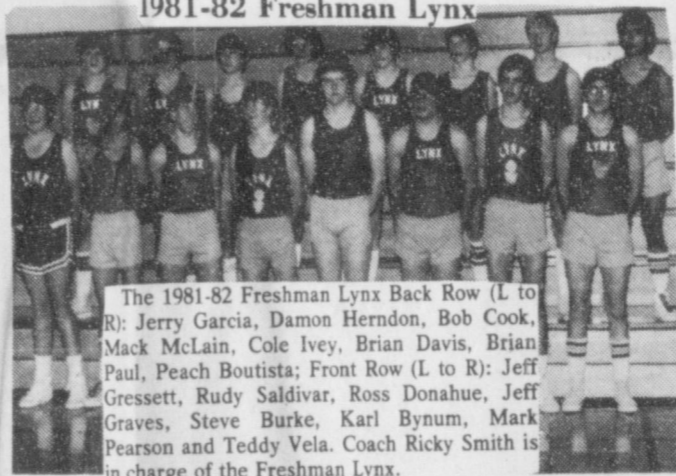

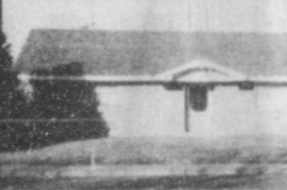

The students should be commended for doing a great job on their Solos and so forth. Standing by oneself on stage, in the middle of hundreds of

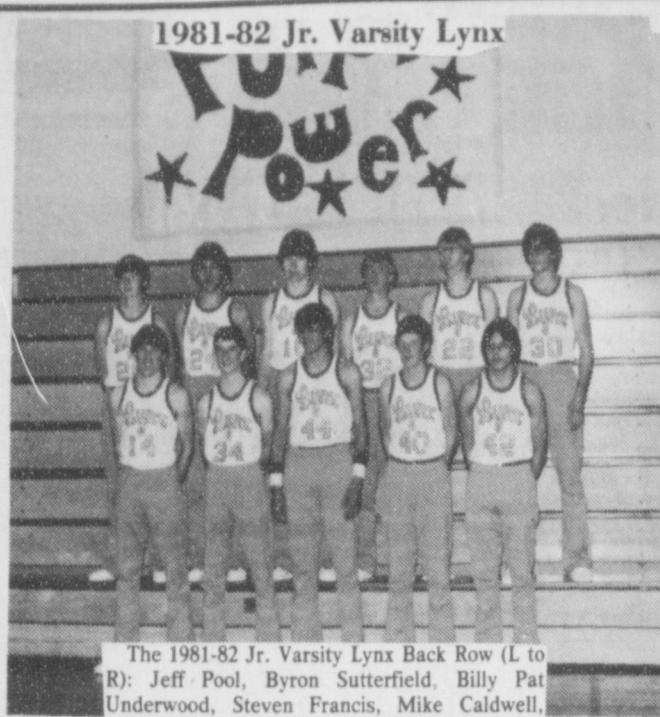

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# New Texas Property Tax Code Brings Major Changes

AUSTIN—Kenneth Graeber, executive director of the State Property Tax Board (SPTB), today announced a statewide effort to inform property owners in Texas of their rights and remedies as taxpayers.

"Major changes in the state's tax laws were effective January 1 with implementation of the new Texas Property Tax Code," Graeber said. Among the more significant provisions are those which:

--Establish a central appraisal district in each county which will value all property for tax purposes and provide that value to each taxing unit in the district;

--Provide a single board of equalization—which will be empowered to hear taxpayer appeals on a wide range of matters rather than just questions of value;

--Make it possible for taxpayers to file all exemption applications and property renditions with one office in a county rather than with multiple tax offices;

--Permit one-time applications for homestead exemptions and open-space land valuation, rather than annual applications as previously required;

--Provide, for the first time in Texas, a method for taxpayers to limit property tax increases to eight percent annually through an initiative and referendum process applicable to all taxing units.

Graeber said that in all except 17 of the state's 254 counties, the new appraisal district has been implemented. Local officials delayed appraisal district operations until 1983 in Bexar, Glasscock, Gray,

Hartley, Jasper, Jeff Davis, King, Leon, McMullen, Oldham, Moore, Rockwall, Stone-wall and Zapata counties.

Implementation of full appraisal district operations was delayed until 1984 in Bowie, Crockett and Harris counties.

The SPTB administrator noted that in counties which have delayed appraisal district implementation, taxpayers should file their property renditions and exemption applications with city, school, county and special district tax offices as in prior years. In all other counties, renditions and exemption applications should be filed with the appraisal district's chief appraiser.

"It is important that taxpayers file renditions and applications for tax relief prior to May 1," Graeber said.

To call attention to available exemptions and tax administration procedures, he noted that SPTB will be working with appraisal districts, local tax offices and the state's news media to help make Texans aware of changes in the law.

"State law requires any person who owns or manages income-producing personal property on January 1 to file a rendition statement with the appraisal district," Graeber noted.

Additionally, the chief appraiser of a county may require rendition of other taxable property upon notice to the owner or manager.

Special rendition procedures apply to property on which an exemption applicable on January 1 terminates during the tax year. In such a case, the person who owns or acquires

the property on the date eligibility for the exemption terminates must render the property for taxation within 30 days of that date.

Transportation companies subject to regulation of the Railroad Commission are required to render the value of their intangible property to the State Property Tax Board.

Banks and railroad companies are required to file special rendition statements with the appraisal district chief appraiser.

Graeber said rendition forms are available from appraisal district offices or from local tax offices in those counties where appraisal district implementation was delayed. Transportation businesses may obtain report forms from the State Property Tax Board in Austin.

Complete information on rendition requirements and on the availability of tax exemptions and special valuation for agricultural land is contained in a pamphlet produced by SPTB titled "Taxpayers' Rights, Remedies, Responsibilities."

The pamphlet, which also included suggestions on how to prepare and present a taxpayer appeal, is available at no charge from appraisal district offices, from most local tax offices, or from the State Property Tax Board.

"The property tax is the primary source of local government revenue in Texas, and will generate approximately \$6 billion this year to help fund the operations of public schools, cities, counties and special districts," Graeber

said. "We urge all property owners to become familiar with the tax process and to file renditions and apply for all exemptions or other tax relief measures to which they are entitled," Graeber concluded.

## Discussions

### On Rural Banking To Highlight Confab

COLLEGE STATION-- Some 300 bankers from throughout Texas are expected to gather here March 1-3 to discuss such key issues as rural banking and the holding company movement, the economy, farm policy, the future of banking and of Texas agriculture, and the outlook for various agricultural commodities.

The discussions will be part of the 30th Texas Farm and Ranch Credit Conference for Commercial Bankers at Texas A & M University, says Dr. Bud Schwart, economist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A & M University System, which is sponsoring the event.

Headlining the conference will be U.S. Congressman Tom Loeffler of Kerrville and Phil Gramm of College Station. Loeffler will discuss "Banking Now and Future" while Gramm will give an overview of the nation's economy.

The entire first afternoon of the conference will be devoted to the pros and cons of the holding company movement as it relates to rural banks.

The second day's program will include talks on "Texas Agriculture in the '80s" by Texas Commissioner of Agriculture Reagan Brown and on "The Implications of National

Farm Policy for Texas" by Dr. Ron Knutson, Extension economist in marketing and policy.

A session on "Recognizing and Managing Problem Farm Loans" and discussions on the special requirements of crop, livestock, dairy, and farm equipment loans also will be featured.

The conference will include a special session on oil and gas leasing hints since many agricultural landowners have witnessed increased oil and gas activity.

Of special importance to bankers will be the closing session of the conference which deals with the outlook for major agricultural commodities, notes Schwart. Extension economists will provide an up-to-date perspective on rice, dairy products, soybeans, grain, cotton, sheep, hogs and cattle to help bankers cope with farm loans and related matters.

Bankers and lending officials interested in taking part in more extensive training are invited to participate in an agricultural credit analysis workshop March 3-5. The workshop will include computer simulation techniques and the use of income statements, cash flows and balance sheets in making and servicing loans.

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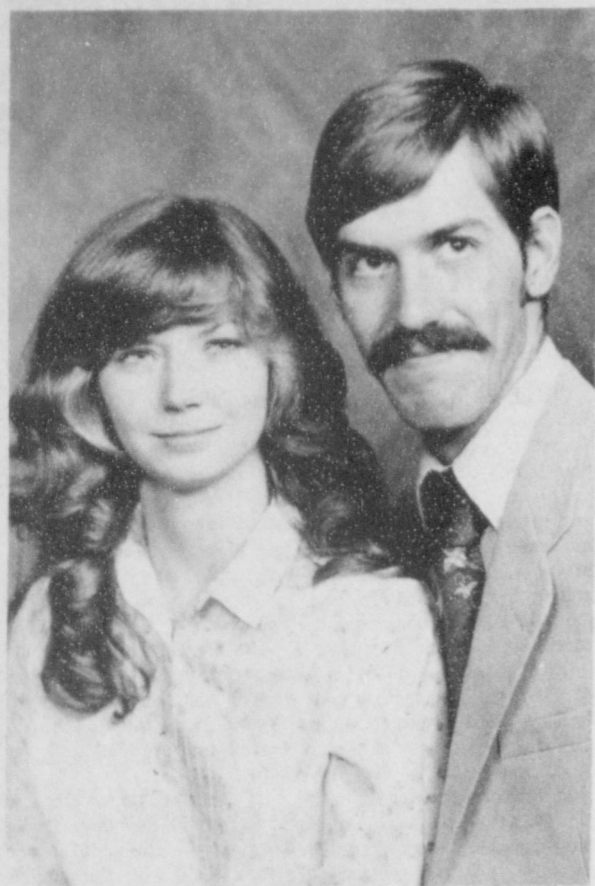

## March 2 Texas Flag Day

March 2 is Texas Flag Day. Over 10,000 flags are expected to be flying for this official Texas Heritage Day.

Around Texas, organizations and individuals are taking this opportunity to pay tribute to their state and its flag by flying the "Lone Star" on their homes and public buildings. Local activities will include flag raisings, proclamations by mayors and county judges, speeches and special programs by service clubs, historic organizations and patriotic groups.

The Texas flag was adopted in 1839 as the official standard of the Republic. It became the state flag after the Treaty of Annexation was signed in 1845.

There were several designs for a national flag prior to 1839, but each of them incorporated a single star. The star signifies that Texas was alone in the Mexican Confederation and that the star of liberty was rising.

This gave Texas its nickname, "The Lone Star State." Texas Flag Day is a Texas Heritage Project of the Texas

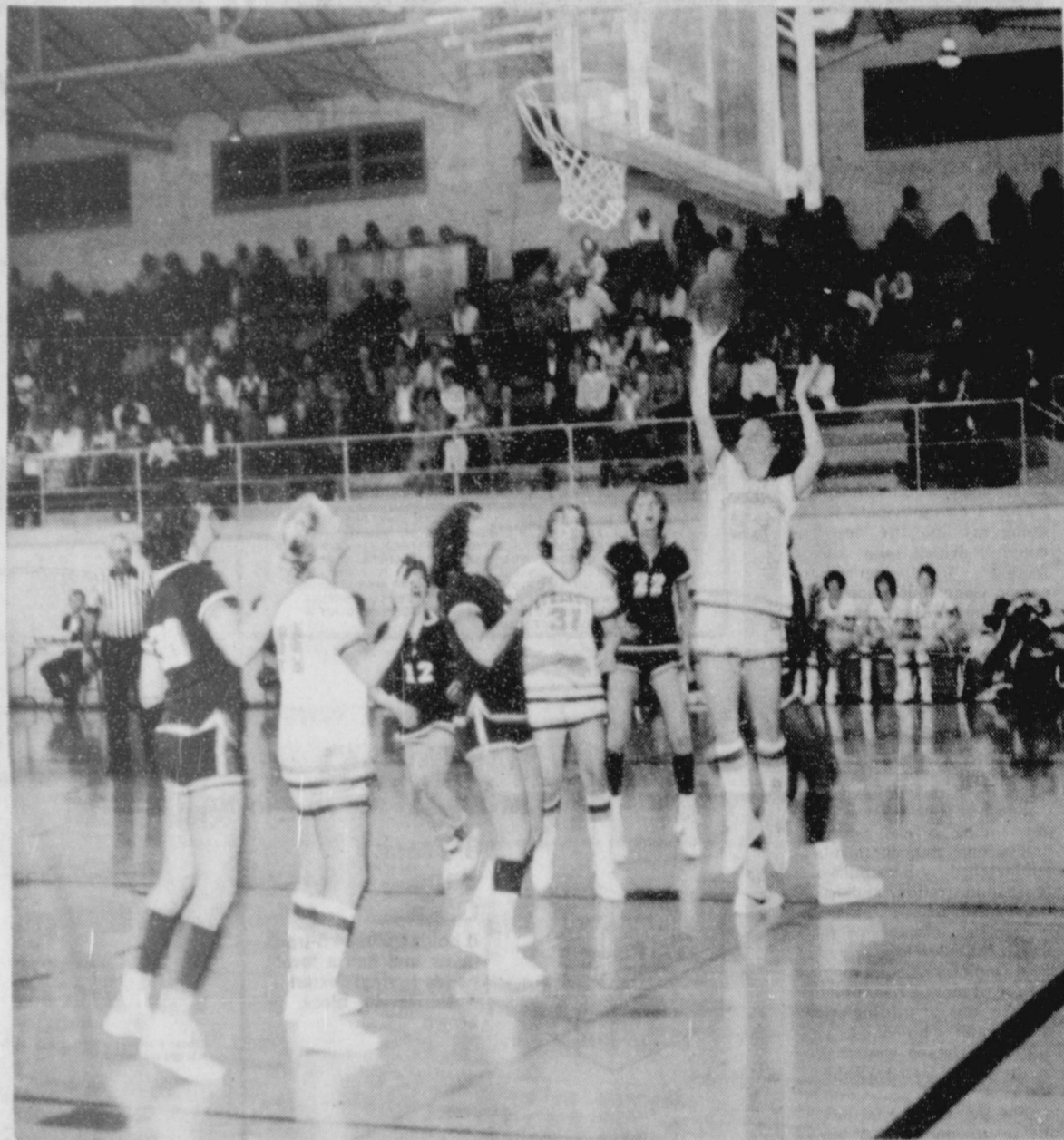

## DREAMS TOOK THE TOP

The General Is A Nurse



"I wanted to travel, to meet people and to live in different places, but I didn't want to have to start all over again each time I went to some new place. I wanted continuity, so that I could keep on practicing the things I was learning. So I joined the Army!" says Brig. Gen. Hazel W. Johnson.

Ever since she'd been 12 years old, back in Malvern, Pennsylvania, she'd dreamed of being a nurse—but she'd never imagined becoming Chief of the Army Nurse Corp and the first Black woman Army General in the history of the United States!

"That I did not anticipate," General Johnson says. "What I did anticipate was doing my job the best I could." Which she did. During her distinguished career, General Johnson has been awarded the Legion of Merit, Meritorious Service Award, and the Army Commendation Medal with Oak Leaf Cluster. Twice she has earned the Army Nurse of the Year Award, during tours of duty that took her to posts across the United States, to Korea and Japan.

She has been cited as an outstanding officer whose professional nursing talents are matched by her abilities for administration, and has been distinguished for her pioneering efforts in research and development of field sanitation equipment for use of mobile field units. "We look at nursing and the people who do it in a little different way than in the past," General Johnson says.

She points out that men make up more than one fourth of today's Army Nurse Corps. General Johnson contrasts this to an average of less than three percent at civilian facilities.

A strong advocate of continuing studies, General Johnson received basic nursing education at Harlem Hospital, New York City; and was awarded her Bachelor's degree from Villanova University, her Master's degree from Columbia University, and her Doctorate in Nursing Administration from Catholic University of America, Washington, D.C.

"I tell my students, being Black is an incident of birth," she says, "the work you do is your way of building a life, of meeting challenges openly and honestly."

"The Army probably offers the best challenge for nurses," she says, stressing "education opportunities, chances to get ahead, to learn nursing and to practice a number of medical specialties."

The first requirement for an Army nurse, General Johnson points out, is a Bachelor of Nursing degree, and then, "a desire to grow, to develop and progress—and to get out and get the feel of your country and the world!"

### Livestock Exports Reach Record Levels

AUSTIN--A surge in the number of slaughter sheep and goats bought by Mexico and exported through the Texas Department of Agriculture (TDA) livestock export facilities helped the pens to set records for the number of head exported and their value in 1981.

Agriculture Commissioner

Reagan V. Brown said livestock exports through the pens nearly tripled, and value of the animals rose by almost a third.

TDA personnel helped across 200,235 animals at the four border facilities and one near Houston Intercontinental Airport. The livestock was valued at \$33,433,015.

Approximately 115,304 animals were slaughter sheep worth approximately \$4 million. Slaughter goats totaled 43,988 worth more than \$1.5 million.

Holstein cattle had the greatest dollar value of animals shipped through the pens. Slaughter sheep, Brahman cattle, slaughter

goats and Quarter Horses were next.

In 1980, 33,330 slaughter goats valued at \$1,106,229 and 8,764 slaughter sheep valued at \$293,153 were shipped through the pens. All livestock from in and out of state that year totaled 70,141 head, worth an estimated \$21,888,423.25.

### NOW THE GOOD PART

AUSTIN -- While we stand by our earlier column that federal budget cuts to the Texas Employment Commission will hurt Texas, there is at least one part of the President's budget plan that we support.

Texas has paid about \$8 billion into the federal highway fund since 1956, but the federal government only has returned about \$6 billion of that money to us for our highways. In other words, we have donated about \$2 billion to other states for their highways.

Twenty-five percent of Texas highway taxes must go into a federal highway trust fund. We put more into that fund than we are allowed to take out.

Only two other states have received a smaller portion of highway funds, compared to the amount they put in the trust fund. In 1980, we got about 88 percent of our money back.

We could use that money. We have 73,000 miles of highways in this state, which is more than any other state, and may be more than any other nation in the world, except the United States. We all know that many of these roads are in bad repair.

In fact, we have 7,746 miles of road in this state in "poor" shape and 32,000 in only "fair" shape. We have 15,197 bridges that need work to bring them up to standards. That's the greatest number of bad bridges in any state in the union.

So we see that even though we have the best system of highways in the world right here in Texas, we could use that \$2 billion that we have given Uncle Sam since 1956.

However, there is one catch. The President may put the responsibility for highways back into the hands of the states, but keep the old highway tax formula. If that happens, we'll be just as bad off as we were before. We will be footing the bill for highways for Yankees who never have set foot in Texas.

World Day Of Prayer

World Day of Prayer, an international celebration sponsored in the United States by Church Women United, will be held March 5, 1982, at the Church of the Brethren at Waka at 9:30 for Fellowship and 10:00 for the program.
