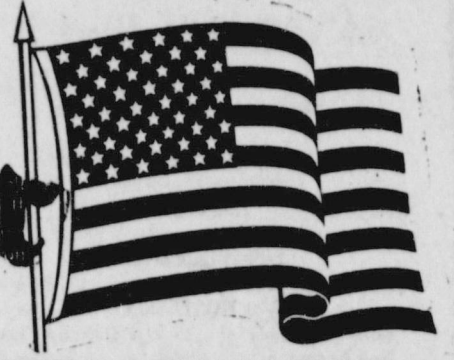

7th & 8th Lynx Teams Host Annual Tourney

The 7th and 8th Lynx and Lynxettes will be hosting their annual Spearman Jr. High Invitational Tournament. The Tournament will be this Thursday, Friday and Saturday--January 14, 15 and 16. The teams entered other than the Spearman 7th and 8th Lynx and Lynxettes, are the 7th and 8th Perryton Raiders, the 7th and 8th Sanford-Fritch Eagles, the 7th and 8th Dalhart Wolves, the 7th and 8th Gruver Greyhounds and Lady Greyhounds, the 7th and 8th Stratford Elks and Elkettes, the 7th and 8th grade Sunray Bobcats, the 7th and 8th grade Canadian Wildcats and, of course, each team plays at a different time and either in the Lynx Little Gym--the Old Gym, or the Lynx Varsity Gym, the

Big Gym--the New Gym. The 7th Lynx, coached by Dan Shaver, will be playing against the Canadian Wildcats on Thursday, January 14, at 4:30 p.m. in the Old Gym. If the 7th Lynx win on Friday, then they will be playing in the Semi-final game--which will be played Friday, January 15, at 4:30 p.m. in the Old Gym against the winner of the Stratford/Sunray game. Then, if the 7th Lynx win on Friday, they will be on their way to play for the Championship in the 7th boys bracket. This Championship game will be played at 3:00 p.m. on Saturday, January 16, in the New Gym. The loser in this game goes home with the 2nd Place Trophy, while the winner takes home the 1st Place Trophy and

the title--"1982 Spearman Jr. High Tournament Champions". Another route that the 7th Lynx can go will be, if the 7th Lynx lose to Canadian on Thursday then they will have to win on Friday, January 15, at 11:30 a.m. in the Old Gym against the loser of the Stratford/Sunray game, or the 7th Lynx will not be able to participate anymore, if they do win, they will participate in the Consolation game which will be played Thursday, January 16, at 10:00 a.m. in the Old Gym. The 7th Lynxettes, coached by Terry Crocker, will play against a tough Canadian Wildcat team on Thursday, January 14, starting at 5:45 in the Old Gym. If the 7th Lynxettes--which they could--

beat Canadian, then they will advance to the Semi-final game which will be played at 5:45 p.m. on Friday, January 15, in the Old Gym against the winner of the Stratford/Sunray game. If the 7th Lynxettes happen to win on Friday, then they would automatically play in the 7th grade girls Championship game which will be played on Saturday, January 16, beginning at 4:15 p.m. in the New Gym. The winner of this game will then be "crowned" 1982 Spearman Jr. High Tourney Champions and "reign" for a year. The loser of this game would take home the 2nd Place Trophy--a very good prize against tough teams like the ones in this tournament. IF the 7th Lynxettes happened to stumble and lose

to Canadian, then they would play on Friday, January 15, beginning at 12:45 p.m. in the Old Gym and beat the loser of the Stratford/Sunray game in order to stay alive and play for the Consolation Trophy. The Consolation game will be played on Saturday, January 16, beginning at 11:15 a.m. in the Old Gym. The 8th Lynxettes, also coached by Terry Crocker, will play Canadian on Thursday, January 14, beginning at 4:30 p.m. in the New Gym. If the 8th Lynxettes beat Canadian, they then will play in the Semi-final game--on Friday, January 15, at 4:30 in the New Gym--against the winner of the Stratford/Sunray game. If the 8th Lynxettes win on Friday, then they would advance to the

8th grade girls Championship game--which will be played on Saturday, January 16, starting at 5:30 p.m. in the New Gym. The loser of this game would go home with 2nd Place and the winner would go home with the 1st Place Trophy and be known to all that participated in this tournament as the 1982 Spearman Jr. High Tourney 8th grade girls Champions. If the 8th Lynxettes lose to Canadian on Thursday, then they must win on Friday, January 15, at 12:45 p.m. in the New Gym against the loser of the Stratford/Sunray game in order to be able to qualify for the Consolation Trophy. The Consolation game will be at 12:30 on Saturday, January 16, in the Old Gym. 11:30 p.m.

The 8th grade Lynx, coached by Tom May, will take on the Canadian Wildcats at 5:45 p.m. in the New Gym on Thursday, January 14. If the 8th Lynx can beat Canadian then they will play against the winner of the Stratford/Sunray game in the Semi-final game which will be played on Friday, January 15, beginning at 5:45 p.m. in the New Gym. If the 8th Lynx win on Friday, then they will advance to the Finals which will be played at 6:45 p.m. on Saturday, January 16, in the New Gym. The winner in this game will be the 1982 Spearman Jr. High Tourney 8th boys Champions and take home the 1st Place Trophy. The loser, on the

other hand, will take home the 2nd Place Trophy. If the 8th Lynx lose in the Semi-final game, then they will play in the 3rd Place game which will be played at 1:45 p.m. on Saturday, January 16, in the New Gym. Let's say, that the 8th Lynx lose on Thursday, then they must beat the loser of the Stratford/Sunray game beginning at 12:45 p.m. on Friday, January 15, in the New Gym, to be able to compete for the Consolation Trophy. The Consolation game will be played at 1:45 p.m. on Saturday, January 16, in the Old Gym. Go on out and cheer on your 7th and 8th grade Lynx and Lynxettes--they all have a chance at the title, so why not cheer them on.

J.W. "Buck" Buchanan Announces For Re-Election

district was drawn to agree with 1980 populations. Buchanan points out that the 88th "is established as of now, but there is a challenge in federal courts of all Texas House re-districting and something could change. "But, as of now, I have 13 counties with similar economic interests and geography. I am pleased to represent them and am going ahead with my campaign on the premise that the district will remain as it is now drawn." The Hansford county native has a long record of service in agricultural, civic and youth work, and has received a number of awards for this achievement, locally and regionally. He has been president of Water, Inc., the Texas Water Conservation Association, the Dumas Chamber of Commerce,

the Moore County Fair and Association. Buchanan is recognized as a leading authority on North Plains and Texas water resources and has worked in developing Texas water plans and legislation. Rep. Buchanan was elected in 1980 in his present term, but had served two terms in the House several years back. He serves on two permanent House committees--Natural Resources and re-districting, and has been named by the House Speaker to serve on three interim committees to prepare recommendations on legislation at the next session, in 1983. In two House terms he served previously, Buchanan was instrumental in establishing the North Plains Research Farm at Etter and in exempting gas companies from being

classified as utilities for selling gas for irrigation. "I believe that my experience in the Legislature, at different periods, gives me a perspective to effectively serve the area, particularly with changes we know are coming up," Buchanan declares, and adds: "The federal government is eliminating its grants program in favor of giving this job to the states. This means that the Texas Legislature will figure in financing for local projects that previously have been designed out of Washington. "I believe this is a better way to go, and I will work to assure that the people of the 88th district have their needs heard and met in Austin." Rep. Buchanan devotes much of his time to his job as Representative, in the district and in Austin, and says of the

office: "I have worked constructively in Austin for the Panhandle--and I have worked to defeat legislation that served special interests or that increased state spending needlessly and carelessly. "I hold that a Representative has a responsibility to oppose bad legislation. I am proud to have a record of being conservative and responsible, as my district expects me to be." "I am asking your support and vote in the 1982 elections on my record of serving the district," Buchanan adds. "I will be visiting over the district in the months ahead to keep abreast of people's needs and wishes--and to ask and thank you for your support." (Pol. YMCA Boxing Tourney Here This Weekend

The Spearman Boxing Club, coached by Eugene Yarbrough, is hosting a Boxing Tournament Friday and Saturday, January 15 and 16, at the Hansford County YMCA, 501 South Hazelwood. Competition begins at 7:30 P.M. both nights. The local club participates in a multi-city boxing association, under A.A.U. competition. There are approximately a dozen clubs which participate in these weekly bouts rotated among the various communities, including Spearman, Gruver, Guymon, Tulia, Stinnett, Amarillo, Plainview, Hereford, and Borger. Boys are matched according to experience and weight in the competition. Coaches become aware of each boys' ability and work to match them fairly equally each weekend they compete. Trophies are given for the boys, in the tournaments for first and second place. The competition on Friday evening is preliminary to the finals in competition on Saturday. Boys winning the Friday night bouts are moved into the finals on Saturday. There will be an admission charge of \$1 for students and \$2 for adults, and there will be a concession area. Proceeds from the event help defray expenses of equipment, tape and travel for the club. Local sponsors for the Spearman Boxing Club, in addition to the YMCA are Junior Lusby Cats and Baker & Taylor Drilling Company. Plan to attend both nights, Friday and Saturday at 7:30 P.M.

Criminal sentences imposed here

A criminal case session of district court was convened at Spearman Monday and short shrift was made of a number of cases. Elmer Eugene Black was sentenced to three years in the Texas Department of Corrections for violation of probation. Roger Campbell was sentenced to two years in the Texas Department of Corrections for the unauthorized use of a motor vehicle. These were cases that involved work by the Hansford County Sheriff's Department. That department is currently conducting an investigation of a burglary reported Tuesday morning. It apparently occurred between the hours of 4 - 7 P.M., Monday. Hit by the thieves was the home of Bob Hill located three miles south of Spearman on the Mike Garnett farm. Taken were a color television set, a toaster and two guitars. At press time, the trial of LeRoy Cata -- which opened the Tuesday session of criminal district court at Spearman -- was still underway. Cata was apprehended with the weapon, a sawed-off shotgun, in his possession. While it was established as the death weapon, no charges have, as yet, linked Cata further with the homicide. Cata is being tried for felony possession of a prohibited weapon. The case grew out of a sheriff's department investigation of a homicide at a home near Gruver where a young woman was shot to death some months ago.

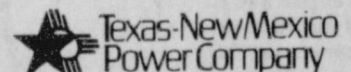

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County starts new calendar year

In their first commissioners court session of the new calendar year, Hansford County commissioners got it underway with a number of actions that were routine this time of year -- such as county holidays, jail and ambulance contracts and payment of county employees.

A pact with Gruver was ratified for the care of that city's prisoners who must be incarcerated. It is virtually the same agreement the county has with the city of Spearman for care of prisoners.

County Judge R. L. McClellan said approval of the contract with the local ambulance service was in the offing if the final wording and provisions are essentially the same as those first proffered the county for ambulance service.

Commissioners entered into the court session prepared to accept bids for a truck for Precinct Four but there were no bids forthcoming. The court duly authorized the re-advertising for bids on this vehicle.

In a discussion of insurance for the county, some of the proposals made to the court for county coverage were rejected and revised insurance program presentations requested.

Members of the commissioners court approved Jean Pearcy as deputy clerk in the county-district clerk's office.

They also approved the purchase of three new typewriters for the tax assessor's office.

Commissioners approved an order to pay county officials on a salary basis. This is a routine matter required to officially

establish such fiscal policy for the operational year.

Also routine was the agreement upon a calendar of holidays for 1982 so that vacations and other observances can be planned well ahead. There were no major changes here from the basic 1981 holiday schedule.

Other items considered and actions taken had to do with the routine of operating the county day by day.

At the outset of a new calendar year, it might be well to remind all county residents of the meeting dates for the commissioners court and the fact that these meetings are open to the public.

There has been some confusion in the mind of the average man-in-the-street regarding this fact. Executive (or

closed) sessions for the purpose of discussing privately certain privileged matters have led to the belief on the part of some laymen that such meetings are entirely closed to the public.

This is not true.

The court can schedule such an executive (closed) session as a part of the agenda of a regular court session. However any consensus reached is just that and definitive action must be taken then in open session.

Because of this misunderstanding, some who said they would like to attend court sessions have been reluctant to do so for fear they would be embarrassed by being turned away.

This is never the case. Hansford County commissioners have a justifiable pride

in the way in which they execute their duties and the resulting progress in the county. They welcome an audience.

They conduct two sessions of commissioners court each month unless special circumstances dictate otherwise.

By state statute (law) they must meet the second Monday of each month. Other meetings are at the discretion of the commissioners court. In Hansford County, they also meet the fourth Monday in each month.

Meetings are conducted in the conference room of the offices of County Judge McClellan.

Persons having business with the commissioners court should consult with the office of the county judge well ahead of the court session in which

he or she wants to appear.

The reason for this is the requirement by law that an agenda be established and duly posted a prescribed period ahead of the meeting date. No item of business not so handled can be acted upon.

Commissioners are free to discuss any matter but no action can be taken on any matter unless it has gone through the advance notice process.

Again for emphasis: this is not an arbitrary rule on the part of Hansford County commissioners. It is the law of the land and all public meetings -- be they county, city or other -- must comply.

Next session of the Hansford County commissioners court will be Jan. 25 beginning at 10 A.M.

Hightower Releases Figures On Farm Debts

Vernon, TX--Representative Hightower today released the figures he had requested from the Farmers Home Administration last December with regard to the financial condition of borrowers in the 13th Congressional District.

In a letter to the Texas

Congressman, the Washington officials of the Department of Agriculture reported that out of 16,000 farm borrowers in Texas, about 35 percent are delinquent. The officials estimated 1,250 would not be able to obtain additional credit or refinance their accounts.

The letter went on to explain that of that 1,250 borrowers, 900 were in the West Texas/Panhandle region of the state. Representative Hightower expressed concern that 72% of the farmers in serious trouble were concentrated in the West Texas/Panhandle region.

"I am not asking that Farmers Home continue to extend financing to farmers that are in an economic hole that they cannot climb out of," Hightower explained, "but the agency does need to take into consideration the past disasters

and the price disasters of this year. There is a difference between bad weather and bad management.

"The numbers reported are bad enough and close to the reports that had caused my first concern. My concern is that if we are not creative, this is just the tip of the iceberg. If large numbers of farmers are forced to liquidate, farmers

and taxpayers are both going to suffer. I am hearing reports on farm sales now of weak prices for farm equipment and far more lookers than buyers.

"It took close to a month for the U.S.D.A. officials in Washington, D.C. to get these figures together. I hope we all have a better understanding of the situation and action will be based on factual information.

The nature of the problem is serious and no one involved should approach it without an understanding of what can happen. If loans can be paid back, it will be better for all."

"The local farmer committees set up in Farmers Home, working with the county Farmers Home officials, know the people involved and understand who can pay loans back.

I hope they will have the flexibility to make common sense decisions."

"We established beyond any doubt so far as establishing a case is concerned, that the death of the woman was accidental. The only charge

Texas Municipal League president Alan Henry today announced the formation of a statewide task force of mayors to develop plans for meeting Texas' long range water resource needs.

The task force is comprised of 50 city officials representing communities of every size throughout the state.

Mayor C. Ralph Blodgett is one of the 50 city officials. Henry, who is mayor pro tem of Lubbock, said the panel would look at two inter-related factors -- water supply and sewage treatment -- that will determine whether Texas cities will continue to grow during the 1990s and beyond.

7th Lynx Lose By 1 In Tourney

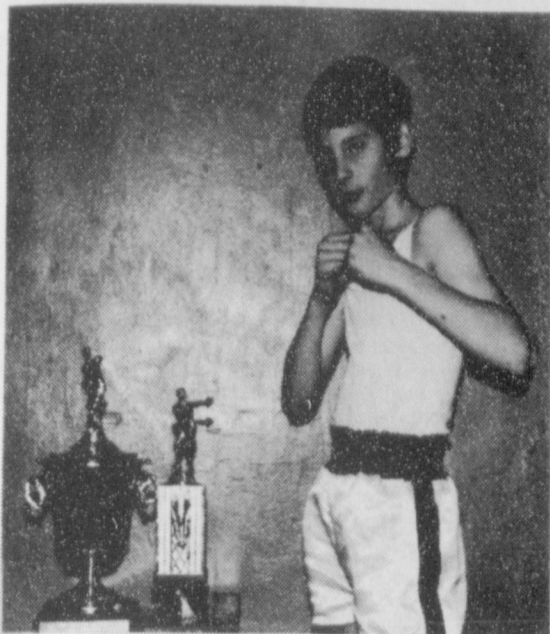
The Spearman Jr. High Tourney was something else, with results that were somewhat surprising to some.

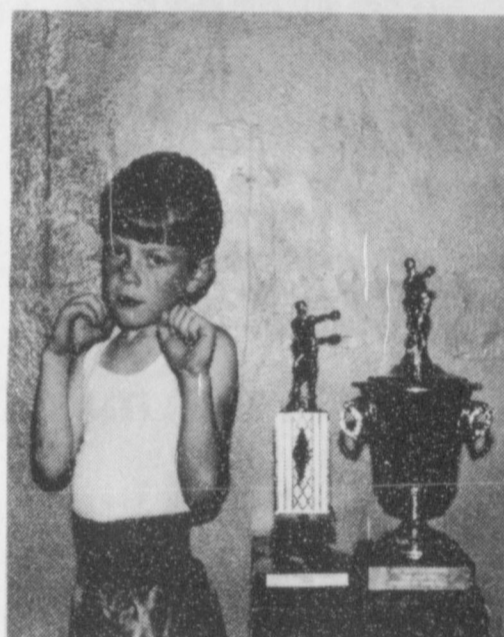

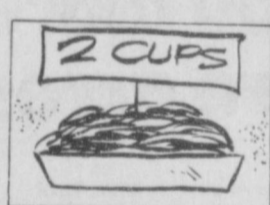
