

The board hired Kenneth Friemel as junior high principal to replace G.W. Robinson who resigned the position this spring. Friemel has been a biology teacher and coach at Spearman High School for several years.

June Sexton, coordinator for the women's softball league has arranged for an Umpire School to be held on Wednesday, May 26, beginning at 6:00 p.m. ASA Umpires from Perryton will be here to sanction those participating in the school. We urge those who will be assisting in umpiring the men's and women's games throughout the

softball season to participate.

Required testing of Spearman's three siren warning systems has been scheduled for 1 p.m., Saturday, May 22, according to Police Chief Ron Robinson who is responsible for the testing.

The three systems will be tested in three sequences of one minute duration with a "quiet" period between test periods.

'This is an excellent opportunity for Spearman citizens -especially new residents in the city -- to become familiar with "voice" -- the different tone of each of the audible warning devices." Chief Robinson pointed out.

Starting at 1 p.m., the first in the sequences will be the fire siren. This lets citizens know there is a fire in progress and that volunteer firemen and emergency vehicles will be responding to the fire alarm.

Allowing a respite for the ears of the public, the alert siren normally sounded during tornado warnings will be run up. All these devices must be tested to be sure they are not

tests set inoperative due to weather and wear but the tornado warning alert "screamer" is particularly important. If ever needed, it will have to be heard over the noise of the storm that made its sounding necessary.

The final sequence -- required by federal regulations -- will be the testing of the attack warning siren. This is the siren that will be sounded as soon officers and civil defense personnel are ever alerted for an nuclear attack.

"I hope the public will bear with this testing." Chief Robin-son said. "But the uncomfortability of the noise can be turned profitably if residents will learn to distinguish between the

This the first such testing in a year but the chief noted that testing could be required every three months, henceforth.

"One more thing." Chief Robinson alerted, "If there is bad weather that could lead residents to believe these tests were a serious storm alarm, these test sequences will NOT be run but will be postponed for

MEET ME AT THE FAIR - And the biggest fair of all this year is the 1982 World's Fair in Knoxville, Tennessee. Past fairgoers have been the first to ride an elevator, eat an ice cream cone or talk on a telephone, and this year will be no different. 

CATALOGS for a tax-supported books-by-mail service are available at the Hansford County Library. Books by mail service is again





SPOT LAWN WEED CONTROL

Q. I have been unable to control the crabgrass and other weeds in my lawn with regular maintenance, and they have taken over a goodly portion of it. What do I do? A. Most weeds can be controlled in the spring with a spray

program. Annuals such as crabgrass, dropseed, foxtail, and goosegrass are, according to the National Sprayer and Duster Association, most successfully controlled with a pre-emergence herbicide which should be applied prior to seed germination. See your garden supply retailer or county agent for assistance in choosing the right weed control material for your lawn.

Always follow label instructions carefully.

Q. Could you give me some tips on the technique and equip-ment to use for lawn weed control?

A. Spray application to a lawn may involve total coverage or spot application. The National Sprayer and Duster Association suggests a compressed air sprayer with a tank capacity of one to four gallons for lawn weed control.

If your lawn area is large, you may want to consider a small power sprayer with a tank capacity of about 10 gallons. It will cover large areas fast, especially when equipped with a multinozzle boom or a single broad-spray nozzle.

NSDA specialists advise spraying with course droplets 18 inches or less from the grass. This distributes the spray evenly and minimizes drifting onto and harming non-target plants.

It's best to select one sprayer for weed control, mark it plainly, and use it only for that purpose. Weed killers are hard to clean out of sprayers, and even a small residue could cause problems if the same sprayer were later used on vegetables, flowering plants or ornamentals.

Q. My lawn has many bare spots in it; what is the best way for me to keep it thick and healthy?

A. Keep in mind that a thick, healthy turf helps prevent crabgrass and other troublesome weeds. Weeds, like other plants, need moisture and nutrients to survive. If your lawn is so thick that there's no place for weeds to start, then weeds won't have a chance. Good cultural practices, including regular mowing, watering, and spraying for insects and disease, help develop a dense turf and prevent weed invasion through the
