Did the more liberal IRA allowance which took effect this past tax year delay consumer spending and, instead, boost the stock market?

If what some analysts believe is the right statistical evidence--that of the fifty billions going into new, en-larged IRA accounts annually, forty billions are going into stocks, one can see how the new IRA law fueled the market's advance.

It may have been that consumer buying and general spending would have picked up earlier had not so many taxpayers been putting their savings from lower taxes into IRA's

The limit went up for the past tax year to \$4,000 for married couples--from under \$2,000. That absorbed much money which might well have gone into consumer spending, obviously.

And that might be one of the reasons why the stock market began its recovery seven or eight months ago, about six months ahead of the now-recognized turnaround for the economy in general.

The significance of the new situation pertains to more than the tax year 1982, however, for this \$40 billion dollars going into stocks will presumably continue to go into stocks, which for longterm growth potential are

always attractive to savers. This means that the stock market might reasonably expect, in the next few years at least, that the added IRA money being channeled into stocks will tend to support the market for growth stocks.

Because the forced deposit law requires you to return your empty containers to the store where you bought them or to another store that sells THE PARTICULAR BRAND OF BEVERAGE YOU BOUGHT. And before you get your deposit back, chances are YOU'LL HAVE TO WAIT IN LINE TO GET ALL YOUR CANS AND BOTTLES COUNTED.

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

AUSTIN-Everyone finances a car purchase at one time or another, and with the credit purchase goes the risk of repossession." Many consumers want to know whether the lender has the right to repossess the car and whether it is legal to do so. Whether or not it is legal depends on the terms of the sales contract. All sales contracts will contain certain provisions such as:

1. The right of the lender or seller to repossess the automobile if the "security interest" is jeopardized,

2. The requirement that the purchaser carry insurance on the automobile, and

3. The right of repossession if the purchaser fails to pay. Whenever the lender or seller feels his security interest is in danger or the buyer fails to buy the insurance agreed to in the sales contract, or fails to make payments, the lender may repossess the automobile as long as no "breach of the peace" is committed. Usually the lender will notify the consumer of the repossession and at the lender's option the consumer may have the alternative of bringing the payments up to date instead of having the automobile

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

Preservation Week

AUSTIN--"Preservation is Housing America" has been proclaimed as the theme for National Historic Preservation Week, May 8-14. In Texas, this heritage awareness week is sponsored by the Texas Historical Commission and the National Trust for Historic Preservation

Some 5,000 preservation and neighborhood groups in the nation will hold events in honor of Preservation Week. Their purpose is to make the public aware of the important contribution historic buildings are making to the prosperity of America's cities and towns, particularly in meeting the critical need for affordable housing.

"Living in old houses makes good sense for everyone. It keeps neighborhoods healthy and supports the tax base of cities. Historic buildings are the anchors of our community," according to Texas Historical Commisson Executive Director Curtis Tunnell.

The issue of housing was chosen as the theme for the eleventh Preservation Week because new economic realities make preservation and rehabilitation a viable alternative to demolition and new construction, and an economically preferred approach to the demand for housing in this country. Virtually one-third of the country's total housing stock is more than 40 years old--a substantial resource of almost 27 million units.

The Texas Historical Commission, the state agency for historic preservation and sponsor of Preservation Week in Texas, provides a variety of educational and consulting services. The Commission's 18 governor-appointed members oversee a staff of professional historians, archeologists, architects, museologists, and experts in related fields. The THC works closely with some 250 county historical commissions and numerous nonprofit heritage groups across the state. The commission also is Texas' liaison office with federal agencies on preservation

The National Trust, responsible for Preservation Week across the country, is the only national, private, nonprofit, membership organization dedicated to the preservation of historic buildings, districts, and maritime resources in the country. Chartered by Congress in 1949, the Trust provides technical and advisory services to its member organizations through its Washington headquarters and six regional offices.

hepatitis A and hepatitis B. These two viral diseases are inflammatory conditions of the liver, and they were formerly called infectious hepatitis and serum hep-

atitis, respectively. (Remember now, there are other causes of hepatitis, but our discussion is confined generally to viral hepatitis).

The liver is one of the major organs of the body, and an inflammatory process involving this organ can be a very serious clinical situation! It can be fatal.

Hepatitis A is less serious and is generally spread by water and food borne con tacts; fecal-oral contact; and just plain person-to-person contact.

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






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

Grain Sorghum Board requests nominations

Texas Grain Sorghum Producers Board has set September 15, 1983 as the date for its biennial election of directors. Three sorghum farmers will be elected to the board for six year terms. They will fill positions of directors whose terms expire this fall.

Producers Board is responsible for the administration of collections and expenditures of grain sorghum assessments from the twenty-nine county area of the Texas High Plains in which TGSPB operates. Any sorghum farmer within this area is eligible to have his name placed on the ballot. A nomination requires the

farmer's signature to certify that he is willing to serve and the signatures of ten other

sorghum farmers who are also subject to the TGSPB assessment. All nominations must be received by TGSPB by August 15, 1983. Nomination forms may be requested from the TGSPB office, Box R. Abernathy, Texas 79311.

On September 1, ballots will be mailed to sorghum farmers whose names are on file in the TGSPB office. Ballots will also be available in the office of each county agent in the twenty-nine county TGSPB The TGSPB assessment is

used to carry on a program of market development and research to improve the profitability of sorghum production. TGSPB was established by a referendum of sorghum producers in 1969. Counties in-

Many older persons have problems that require some adjustment in meals. But you can deal with these problems rather than ignoring them.

Buying necessary foods may be difficult on a fixed income. Whenever possible, do the shopping yourself. Shopping costs less than having groceries delivered, there are greater choices, and you may find it an enjoyable challenge in stretching your budget.

Don't let lack of energy or poor eyesight interfere with preparing good meals. Use a large print cookbook if you are having trouble reading recipes. You can check one out from the public library or purchase one from a book-

When you don't have the energy to cook a full meal, try preparing smaller, more frequent meals. There is nothing magic about three meals a day. Five small meals a day are fine as long as they include needed nutrients and the calorie intake maintains reasonable body weight.

If you have dental problems or wear dentures, you may need to use more foods that are soft and easy to chew. Use strained or chopped fruits that are prepared for infants as sauce for milk desserts or combine with tapioca or rice. Serve strained vegetables instead of whole vegetables. or add them to ground meat.

Meal planning is especially important for older adults. Here are some suggestions that will help you plan care-

• Follow recipes so food is well prepared and not wasted.

• Use shortcuts to save time and energy. Mixes, readyprepared or home-prepared, and other prepared or partially prepared food will demand less energy



LEMON LAWS

AUSTIN - We have heard complaints from automobile owners in the Panhandle who have been the unfortunate possessors of a lemon car or truck. We have also heard testimony at the state capitol from people who are frustrated with the lack of consumer protection in this state in regard to lemon

automobiles.

One automobile owner recently testified at the state capitol that her 1978 stationwagon had been in for repairs 54 times without ever being properly repaired. The repairs on that one automobile ranged from three rebuilt engines, to numerous transmission repairs and a series of fuel line adjustments.

The cases involving lemon automobiles in Texas are many. Texans invest a lot of money in the automobile industry. In fact, Texas ranks in the top five in the nation in the number of car buyers. We have a problem with lemon automobiles here, and the Texas Senate has decided to take action which will better protect the automobile consumers in Texas.

The Texas Senate has voted to make automobile dealers and manufacturers liable for cars and trucks that turn out to be lemons. Under this new legislation, if the manufacturer or distributor is unable to make repairs to conform the vehicle to the express warranty after a reasonable

number of attempts, the manufacturer or distributor must replace the vehicle with a comparable one, or accept return of the vehicle, and refund to the owner the full purchase price, less a reasonable allowance for owner use. Senate Bill 1141 will require dealers and manufacturers to replace a vehicle or to refund the price of the automobile, if the vehicle has been in for repairs four times during the warranty period, or if it had been out of service for 30 or more business days during that time.

Under this Bill, dissatisfied owners would have to complain to the Texas Motor Vehicle Commission about an alleged failure to make satisfactory repairs to the vehicle under terms of the warranty. The Commission would then review the case and determine if the manufacturer should be ordered to furnish the customer with a new automobile or a refund.

The recently approved lemon law passed by the Texas Senate means there will be new regulation of manufacturers and sellers of new motor vehicles and new protection for the purchaser of a new motor vehicle.
