Speaking to a noon luncheon gathering of Spearman Lions Club Tuesday, the Rev. Bruce Chesser, pastor of First Baptist Church, was describing a unique new 24-hour telephone prayer ministry launched here by the church.

Rev. Chesser, invited to appear as guest speaker for the meeting, told the Lions First Baptist started the hot line for intercessory prayer and was backing the ministry financially.

But, he added, the new ministry is a community-wide service cutting across denominational lines and should not be thought of as being just for Baptists.

He said intercessory prayers are unselfish prayers--prayers for others--and that the Bible describes the value of such prayers. Chesser said anyone who has a need or a problem and feels he or she would like the prayers of others, may ask for such prayers by simply dialing 659-2911, day or night.

He explained the telephone prayer ministry effort is being headed by June Day and Betty Thomas. "About 50 people are right now involved in the program and more are needed," Chesser said.

Although the special prayer line is open 24 hours a day, they have not been able to staff it around the clock, he said, and at times especially in the middle of the night, callers may be answered by a recording, asking them to leave a message.

Chesser said, "Our goal is to have someone there all the time answering the request for prayer calls." He said those taking the calls simply take prayer requests and "don't do counseling--it's not their job."

Responding to a question, the Rev. Chesser said the prayer request calls are treated "very confidentially"...Callers do not even have to give their name if they don't want to.

"Sometimes we get calls where they give us no name and won't even tell us what their problem is--just that they need our prayers."

When this happens, they get the prayers they request, he said, for "the Lord already knows their problems."

He said the prayer line has been publicized in Spearman Reporter ads, on stickers and on radio and television commercials, and summed up by telling the Lions, "We believe in the power of prayer and know you do, too."

The meeting opened with the Lions and guests singing, "My Country 'Tis Of Thee" led by Rev. Al Lindley, club taitwister.

Dr. Doug Steger led the pledge of allegiance, and Billy Miller offered the blessing.

The Lions involvement in the upcoming Hansford County Roundup Armadillo Races was discussed and Rich Melton, secretary, read a letter of appreciation from the Women's Division of Spearman Chamber of Commerce for the Lion's support of the Miss Hansford County Pageant.

Miller, who was in charge of this week's program, introduced the Rev. Chesser as guest speaker. The Rev. Lindley, who is moving to Perryton, said in jest, "I've enjoyed being a part of the most worthless club in town...I guess that's why I fit in so well."

### Hitler Diary Finale

The recent flap over phony diaries supposedly written by the late German dictator Adolf Hitler is not a good advertisement for journalists, historians or journalism in general.

West German government experts have declared the diaries forgeries, but not until after a German magazine paid over four million marks for them, other newspapers had signed up for serial rights and at least one prominent British historian—who should have known better—had validated them.

No one has yet accounted for the money. And among the many questions being asked is why there was so much interest in these alleged diaries. In America, particularly, there seems to be some resentment, some shock, that their reported existence stirred so much interest.

That was quite logical and natural. Adolf Hitler, obviously beserk on the subject of Jews, was the Napoleon of the 20th century. His rise to power, through the electoral process (and rough-house tactics admittedly) was phenomenal. The economic recovery he brought Germany was a financial miracle.

That he was ahead of his time in designing autobahns, cars (the beetle), and weapons is unquestioned. That he conquered just about all of Europe is history. If he had not been "nuts" on the question of Jews, he would already be treated by historians as a genius in many fields.

Thus the interest, natural enough, in this lowly corporal of World War I who rose to a position of power where he dominated all of Europe.

## Vietnam Veterans National monument to be dedicated on Memorial Day

ANGEL FIRE, N.M.—An awe-inspiring national shrine, honoring the sacrifices made by American servicemen and women during the Vietnam War, will be dedicated here on Memorial Day, May 30, as the DAV Vietnam Veterans National Memorial.

Thousands of Vietnam veterans, families of those killed in Vietnam, and veterans of other wars are expected to throng the peaceful Moreno Valley in northern New Mexico where the memorial rises dramatically from a hillside

dotted with pinon pines and native grasses.

Significantly, the dedication of the DAV Vietnam Veterans National Memorial will occur almost 15 years to the day since U.S. Marine Corps Lieutenant David Westphall and his brother, Douglas, almost single-handedly built the majestic structure as a tribute to David and all who fought in Southeast Asia during the Vietnam War.

Begun in 1968 and complet-

ed in 1971, the memorial and its valley setting are surrounded by towering peaks of the majestic Sangre de Cristo mountain range. Built originally as the Vietnam Veterans Peace and Brotherhood Chapel, this memorial has never been embroiled in any controversy, and the American flag has always flown prominently at the site.

Several years ago, the Disabled American Veterans began providing substantial financial support to help maintain the chapel and add limited improvements. However, it

soon became apparent that far greater assistance was needed if the memorial was to be

perpetuated for future generations of Americans. In late 1982, with Dr. Westphall's full approval, DAV leaders established a separate nonprofit corporation, the DAV Vietnam Veterans National Memorial, Inc., to assume full ownership and responsibility for all operations, expansion and fund raising to maintain the memorial as a major American landmark. Dr. Westphall will remain as memorial director.

Weekend dedication activities include a Volksmarch on May 28th and 29th, with participants dedicating their 10-km hike to a Vietnam POW/MIA or a victim of the fighting in Vietnam. Several veterans groups are planning much longer treks to the dedication events from all parts of New Mexico...and some from neighboring states.

On Sunday evening, May 29th, a solemn vigil will be held at the memorial for those still missing following the Vietnam War. For this special event, the winding roadway up to the chapel will be lined with 2,500 luminaria, a long-time Southwestern tradition of glowing candles in paper bags. Other activities, beginning on Sunday, May 29, will include a Vietnam veterans art exhibit, sky diving, the Purple Heart Riders, Indian tribal dance groups, special entertainers, a picnic hosted by Vietnam Veterans of New Mexico, and other events still in the planning stage.

The two-day tribute to Vietnam veterans will climax at 2 p.m. on Memorial Day, May 30, with formal dedication of the DAV Vietnam Veterans National Memorial. Participating in the event will be prominent national and New Mexico state officials, including U.S. Senator Pete V. Domenici and Governor Toney Anaya. The dedication ceremonies will be opened and closed with a fly-over by military jets and helicopters from the New Mexico Air National Guard.

"The DAV extends an open invitation to anyone who wishes to join in honoring

Vietnam veterans during this exciting two-day event," said Edward G. Galian, national commander of the three-quarter-million-member DAV.

"It promises to be a deeply moving, emotionally charged experience—an experience appropriate to the dignity of Vietnam veterans, the prayer for peace, and the hopes of America, which are so beautifully reflected in the inspiring architecture of the DAV Vietnam Veterans National Memorial."

### RECIPE

Eggplant Casserole

- 1 eggplant.
- 1 c shrimp, fresh or frozen
- 2 medium sized tomatoes
- 2 T butter
- 1 c bread crumbs
- 1 small onion
- 1/2 c chopped celery
- Worcestershire sauce
- Salt and pepper
- 3 eggs

Crushed potato chips

Why are the first drops of thunder showers the biggest ones? Are the first drops usually those which turn into hail?

In spring and summer days, when thunderstorms produce showers every day or so, careful observance will prove that the first drops of a thunder shower are definitely the largest ones.

That's true because only the largest drops fall through the updraft which comes with the leading edge of a thunderhead.

That updraft (which turns into a downdraft at the end of the thunderhead) carries many drops up again, and if strong enough, will carry them to high altitude and freeze them, producing hail.

So the first drops from a thunderhead are widely scattered, usually, only the heaviest falling through the updraft, and the ones that sometimes become hail.

To see how many times a drop of water has been carried aloft and frozen (which determines the size of hail), cut a hailstone with a sharp knife and count the layers.

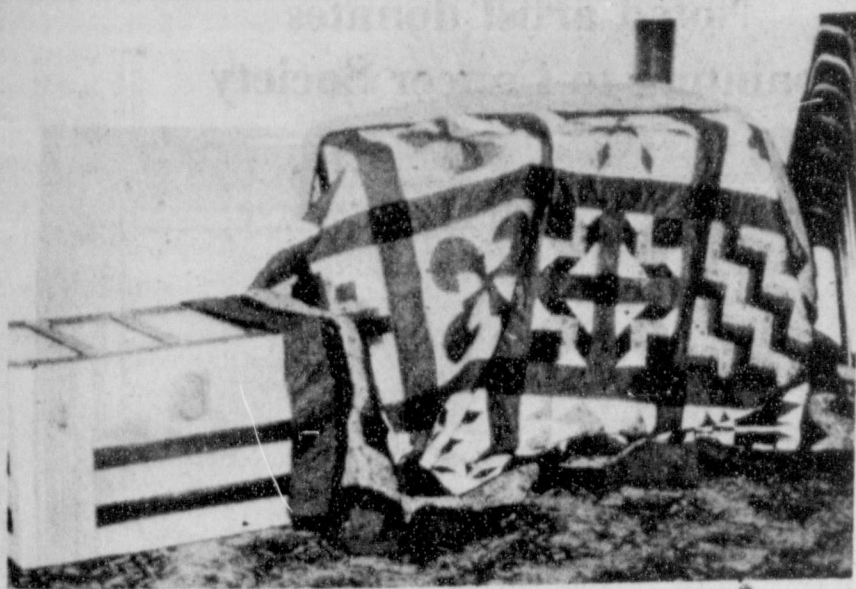

### TV COMMENTARY

By Bente Christensen

THE latest study (Television Audience Assessment) released in late April shows the thin hold commercial television has on viewers, so many of whom still can't tune in anything better on their sets.

THE independent survey indicates that even the most-watched network shows don't hold viewers' attention solidly enough to keep many from turning to other channels when incessant commercials bust in.

THIS result is in line with a recent National Association of Broadcasters (McHugh-Hoffman survey, which found that 48 percent of those polled in a recent sampling watch less TV now than they did six years ago.

THE same survey revealed only 38 percent watched TV more.

THESE results don't mean fewer people are watching television. That's

because the country's population continues to grow and new sets are being installed. But more are turning to cable and avoiding the three commercial networks, and that trend is certain to continue if the same old trite, stereotyped hash continues to the average fare.

EVEN British television quality is showing deterioration. The recent Masterpiece Theater productions are a far cry from what they were a few years ago.

THUS, cable and satellite and tapes are likely to play a larger and larger role in television viewing. The NAB/McHugh - Hoffman survey--reported on at the recent Las Vegas convention of broadcasters--contained the ominous finding for commercial moguls that TV viewing is coming to be considered a negative influence by many Americans.

## Birth defects seminar planned

HELP CHANGE THE FUTURE...WHY? A community is only as healthy as its children are, who will be the leaders of tomorrow.

The nation's most serious child health problem is birth defects, which every year strikes more than 250,000 babies. They suffer from mental retardation, deafness, blindness, missing limbs, defective blood cells or body chemistry disorders. A birth

defect is an abnormality of prenatal origin in the body structure, function or metabolism. The causes of many birth defects are unknown. Some are inherited. Others thought to be caused by environmental influences. The majority probably result from a combination of both. About 15 million Americans have birth defects. This number includes babies with markedly low birth. Some 1.2 million infants, children

and adults are hospitalized annually for treatment. Babies born prematurely probably have a better chance of survival in the U.S. than anywhere else in the world, thanks to enormous medical strides of past decades. Yet in spite of this, our nation stands embarrassingly behind 16 others in reducing infant mortality.

for a woman to have her baby, not only in the State, but in the entire Nation. Some of the reasons behind this statement will be discussed in the upcoming Community Seminar, sponsored by the Golden Spread Chapter of the March of Dimes.
