Turkey Shoot With Rifles Planned For November 11th

D. M. Jones, about the only Hansford county citizen who can shoot a rifle good enough to hit a dime at 20 paces, is chief range officer for a big turkey shoot to be staged near Spearman either Nov. 11th or Nov. 12th.

The plans for the shoot calls for rifles at 200 yards. Jones will have a plate as a target, and everyone that can break the plate will get a turkey. Any rifle or any sight can be used.

Jones declares that a 22 rifle will carry plenty good for the shoot. He says those who have high powered rifles may bring their guns or use the rifles that will be available for their use. Jones, who is a national rifleman will adjust the sights so most Spearmanites can hit a saucer at 200 yards. In order to get the Spearman newspaper in the shoot, Jones has agreed to let him select his own plate—and it's a platter out of Burl's Cafe, big enough to house a half of a baby beef.

SCS HELPS CHANNING MAN SOLVE WATER PROBLEMS

Water shortage had been a serious problem on John L. Matthews' 1,640-acre ranch eight miles northwest of Channing for 12 years. Water had to be hauled at considerable expense and loss of time for home use as well as for the eleven head of livestock. There was no water for a home garden with the result that living costs were increased through necessary purchase of fresh vegetables and canned foods.

All of this has been changed now! Under provisions of the Department of Agriculture water facilities program Matthews last year obtained a long-time loan at a low interest rate for installation of a well, windmill and stock tank. The loan was made by the Farm Security Administration and the Soil Conservation Service did the construction work and gave technical assistance.

Hansford county residents are eligible to receive help from the Soil Conservation Service and the Farm Security Administration.

HANSFORD GRAND JURY MAKES RECORD

According to Judge Jack Allen, Hon. Judge of the 84th judicial district, the Hansford county grand jury established a record for this district, and possibly for the State of Texas, Monday of this week.

The Grand Jury was assembled at 10:00 a. m., received the charge given by Judge Allen, released from the court room at about 10:30 and began active work considering evidence at about 10:45 a. m. At 12:10 p. m. the jury had considered evidence and returned indictments in four cases.

WATER STORAGE TANK BEING REPAIRED REPAINTED THIS WEEK

Contract was awarded to Quirk contracting company to recondition, repair and repaint the city water tower. The contract covers a five year period calling for reconconditioning and renovating each year. Included in the contract is the insulation of the lead pipe to the water tank. One coat of red lead paint will be followed by a coat of aluminum paint, inside and outside the water tank.

It is estimated that the work will require 3 weeks time. City manager Bob Douglas stated that emergency arrangements were completed so that fire fighting would not be handicapped for lack of water. An extra motor has been installed to lift the water to the city mains so that the volume of water would be just as great as if the storage tank was filled with water.

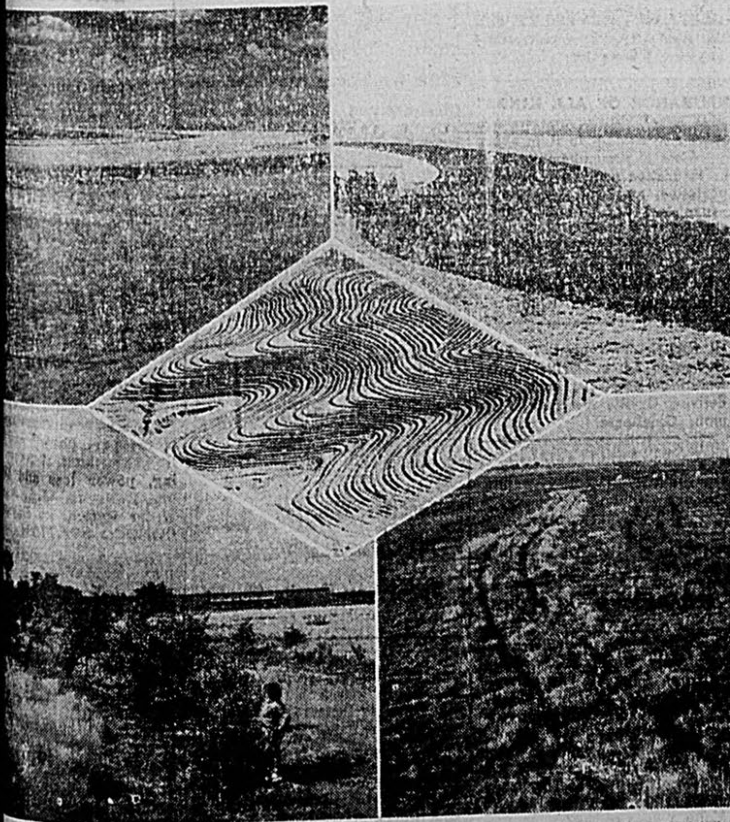

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Leave The Woodpile Higher Than You Found It

If I am informed right, Texas law permits administrators of trusts to receive 5 per cent of the amount of the trust fund, plus 5 per cent of the income and the same amount of the expenditure of both the principal and the income. The value of the trust is that the trustee has discretionary powers, whereas the insurance policy settlement is the while contract through that method. Some persons may complain that the trust fund fees charged by the bank are high and reduce the estate, but you must remember that the administrator must be paid for the time and thought devoted to this work.

Money left at 3 1/2 per cent interest with an insurance company piles up. Below are given what certain amounts of money will pay out at \$100.00 a month at 3 1/2 per cent interest, both principal and interest being exhausted at the ends of these periods:

Principal	Years	Total
\$ 5,520.00	5	\$ 6,000.00
10,168.00	10	12,000.00
17,377.00	20	24,000.00
20,121.00	25	30,000.00
22,487.00	30	36,000.00

Note how the \$5,520.00 adds \$480.00 interest during the five year period; also how \$2,800 additional money pay out \$6,000.00 more in the increase from 20 to 25 years in payments, and \$2,300 more adds \$6,000 additional in the 25 to 30 year bracket.

You editors know that I have devoted a lifetime to newspaper work, so anything I write regarding investments, banking and insurance should not be termed any effort to get any personal business, as I am not a broker, banker or insurance salesman.

As insurance has become such an outstanding business in our national life, it may be well to discuss certain phases of this far-sweeping business. "Insurance is a device for repairing some serious injury, at a moderate charge by bringing together a multitude of people, who agree that if a certain loss falls on one of them all shall unite in repairing that loss."

To collect on fire insurance you must have a fire loss. For theft insurance on your car, someone must steal it for you to collect. But in life insurance, it is different, for there is always a maturity date, which comes about through death, endowment, disability, refusal of neglect to pay premiums, choice of paid up or extended insurance, or through case surrender value.

Insurance is based on the law of averages pertaining to life. Chas. Cabbage 125 years ago wrote: "Nothing is more proverbially uncertain than the duration of human life, when the maxim is applied to an individual, but there are few things less subject to fluctuation than the average duration of life in a multitude of individuals." As I mentioned before, if you take 100,000 boys age 10, there will be 749 to die the first year, but there is nothing so uncertain as who will be the individuals to die.

You may be interested in how important life insurance is regarded in this nation. For instance in 1937, claims paid out were \$2,854,000,000; the five year total \$15,159,000,000. The 1937 claims were divided as follows: Death, \$1,093,000,000; matured endowments, and annuities, \$330,731,000; disability claims and accidental death benefits, \$144,968,000; payments for premium savings (dividends to policy holders) and for cash surrender values, \$1,285,000,000. Note that the living policy holders today are receiving more insurance money than the deceased policy holders' beneficiaries.

Total insurance in force in the United States Dec. 31, 1937, was \$117,000,000,000, an increase of \$14,000,000,000 since Dec. 31, 1933. Admitted assets were \$28,417,000,000. Insurance was divided as follows: Ordinary \$83,

000,000,000; group \$13,000,000; industrial, \$20,600,000,000. Total premium income was around \$4,000,000,000. Thus, the American people are paying a good per cent of the national income to the insurance firms. In 10 years the insurance people distributed \$28,519,000,000 to policy holders and beneficiaries. The average policy in the United States for 65,000,000 policy holders is about \$1,725.00, a sum far too low to provide much security for 130,000,000 people.

Life insurance payments in Texas as for 1937 were \$68,800,000 for the tenth place in the nation. Texas is 5th in population and payments per capita were only \$11.24. Payments in Texas included: Houston, \$4,616,000; Dallas, \$4,545,000; San Antonio, \$3,316,000; Amarillo, \$733,000; Wichita Falls, \$720,000.

The 1938-1939 Spectator magazine of Prominent Patrons of Life Insurance Number lists 17,000 persons who did not object to publications of their names and who own more than \$50,000 of life insurance. There were 217 persons carrying more than \$1,000,000 in insurance; the highest being Pierre S. Dupont, Wilmington Del., with \$7,000,000 of life insurance. There were seven newspaper publishers. Texas had four with these amounts: J. M. West, Houston, \$1,480,000; Clarence E. Linz, Dallas, \$1,236,000; W. L. Clayton, Houston, \$2,000,000; Jesse H. Jones, Houston, \$1,025,000.

The per capita insurance written in Texas was \$128.17 in 1937. The per capita income in Texas was \$380.00 and the percentage of per capita paid for life insurance to per capita income in 1937 was 2.4 per cent. Per capita insurance in force was only \$502.50 rank as to per capita in force, 34. Per capita expense for new cars in 1937, \$21.86; amusements, \$4.00. Texas per capita premiums paid for life insurance in 1937 was only \$13.02.

It is not my purpose to attempt to change your life habits but rather to call your attention to some things regarding living and security. If you spend 20 cents a day foolishly, as I do, you throw away \$73.00 a year. That amount probably would pay an ordinary life insurance premium for \$3,000,000 or around \$6,000 in term insurance.

I have a Small new car. It costs me \$27.00 a month to own (not operate) the car, including \$22.50 depreciation, \$1 license, and \$3.50 fire theft and public liability insurance—that takes no consideration of interest on investment. I don't intend to get rid of the auto and buy a horse, quit smoking or visit the soda fountains, but I urge you to realize the potential buying power of your expenditures and try to get your money's worth.

They tell the story about a horse pulling a street car up a steep hill in Denver. At the top of the hill, they loaded the horse on a platform and coasted down hill. The lesson is: A man should pay attention to his savings, so that the savings can carry him. If a man makes the savings in cash, his business, good investments, real estate or insurance, it may be possible to coast down the downhill of life, and take life easier just as the Denver horse did.

I was for nearly 20 years a friend of the late Dr. J. E. Nunn, founder of the Amarillo Daily News, who died in his 87th year in the spring of 1938. He said to me 2 or 3 years ago: "I believe my son or daughter would take care of me if it were necessary, but it is a great satisfaction for an old man to know that he can pay his own way."

"There is no wealth but life," wrote John Ruskin. And so, we must make the distinction between spending and saving. Generally, it is said that a person had better spend up to 30 years of age, if he can spend wisely for improvement

provided he sets aside a reasonable reserve for unemployment and accidents. After that age, then the thought should be toward saving for old age. Money should be the means to an end, not the objective of endeavor, as it is said thrift is only wise spending.

"And there was a foolish man that built his house upon the sand and the rain descended, and beat upon the house and it fell; and great was the fall of it." For fear that some of the editors may not have heard those words since their boyhood days, they are from the seventh chapter of Matthew.

We may stray far far away from the subject, "Leave the Woodpile Higher Than You Found It." But we come into this world and many reach manhood. We start out with a woodpile which usually includes good health, the education which our parents can give us of we can earn; ideals of morality and religion as taught largely by our parents.

We are on our own 20,30,40, or 50 years. It is interesting to check up. Have we added to the woodpile by being a blessing to our family and society? Have we burned up the woodpile and left nothing to show for our lives? Most of us are young enough to still make a choice.

And now for the other side of the verse just quoted: "And there was a man who built his house upon a rock. And the rains came and beat upon the house and it fell not; for it was founded upon a rock."
