Spearman Lynx boys are in the contest fighting for a victory, despite the hard luck jinx that has been with them since opening the season. Two weeks ago the team entertained Canadian holding the score to a tie in the first half. This was despite the fact that two of the best players were injured before the game and practically demoralized the play. Substitutes entering the game were not familiar with the signals or play in the game with Canadian, and those who know football state that Spearman's defense was out-

standing under the hard luck conditions. The situation will be a bit different this Friday. Coach Platt was compelled to drop one of the injured men from his team but has been drilling a competent substitute the past two weeks and states that he will have a team on the field that will work together. Spearman citizens interested in football are making plans to offer assistance to the local school. While it looks rather difficult to produce the winning team of the region this year, it is believed that a wide-spread support of the team will bring some upsets in the hardest schedule that a Spearman team has ever faced. Panhandle, Perryton, White Deer and Phillips have been

building up their so called region winners for the past four years. The pace will be terrific. Four teams that represent perhaps the best organization that competing schools have ever produced are scheduled to run rough shod over the Spearman Lynx organization this year—but as we remember the situation there has been such talk in the past and visitors woke up to find the old fighting spirit that left the Lynx team in an honorable position at the end of the season. History will repeat itself. In the meantime talk among football fans in Spearman call for a plan starting practice in the grade schools. Perhaps a 6 man team can be organized and begin training players early for replace-

ing the teams as they graduate. This is the system used in many towns as small as Spearman. White Deer and Panhandle have B teams that start in the grade school. The schedules are light and the practice supervised by school officials not necessarily regular coaches prepare the boys for real football training when they enter high school. The competition becomes more emphatic under such conditions and the turn-out for football is encouraging. Over at Panhandle we learned that 32 men turned out this year for the regular team and nearly as many reported for duty in the grade school organization. At Follett where they work a similar organization all but two boys in the high school turned

out for football this year. The Follett team is a light team, but they are making a real record so far this season. Forty-two high school boys are suited out each day at Follett. Spearman football fans are determined to encourage the boys for future teams, and are working hand in hand with the school officials to encourage the present team for the remainder of their tough schedule. It is quite discouraging to a coach to have only 14 boys turn

out for football, and more than half that number for play the first year they have ever tried. However, Coach Platt declares he has some real talent in the Spearman organization, he is impressed with the spirit of the players who have come out for a try in the face of discouraging odds. Platt and Supt. Finley hope to see as many as 35 boys in suits before the present season closes.

Part Of Fair Exhibit At Equity Exchange

County agent Joe Hatton has moved a portion of the Hansford county fair exhibit to the Spearman Equity Exchange building. Mr. Hatton spent two days last month with the General Mills company of Amarillo, determining the best variety of wheat raised in Hansford county for milling purposes. Four varieties were milled into flour and baked into bread. Tests showed the following results: Tenmarque proved to be one of the best available major varieties in Hansford county. After the wheat had been milled and baked into bread it retained its fluffy light condition under a long fermentation process. The official figures show that a loaf of 780 cc in size was secured both from a short and long fermentation period of dough.

Turkey Red was also rated as one of the best milling varieties produced in this county. Records show a loaf size of 800 cc on short fermentation time and a loaf of 780 cc on long fermentation period.

Blackhull rated as having good milling qualities only when dough is used quickly, as it deteriorates rapidly on long fermentations. On short fermentations the loaf was 830 cc in size, but was only 610 cc when dough was held for a long time.

Cheifkin, beardless variety proved practically worthless for milling into baking flour. The low record established by this variety was 530 cc in size of loaf on a short fermentation, with a loss of 30 cc after a longer period. The bread never rises to a fluffy light condition, but comes out of the bake oven a hard soggy loaf.

All persons interested are invited to view the exhibit covering this exhibit which is housed at the present time at the Spearman Equity Exchange building. Milling companies over the Panhandle are anxious for producers to learn of the cooperation they can give in producing favorable varieties of wheat. So much dissatisfaction is found with the chiefkin variety that it is already carrying a penalty in price in some areas. Should producers of this district continue to increase the planting of this variety the place that Hansford county enjoys as a producer of high quality wheat will be seriously impaired.

Todate Weather Record Driest In History

According to the weather chart of Hansford county covering rainfall and moisture for the past 58 years, the present drought period for Sept. will make a record for all time if no moisture falls before Oct. 1st. The nearest to the present record was back in 1890 when only .05 in. of moisture was recorded. To date F. W. Brandt weather observer has recorded .04 inches moisture. The average Sept. moisture since F. W. Brandt has recorded the weather for the U. S. Government amounts to 1.82 inches.

Cold Wave Strikes

While California is sweltering under the hottest weather for many years, Spearmanites dug out jackets and coats Tuesday morning when the official temperature dropped to 42 degrees. This year is a direct contrast to last year's weather. Up to Sept. 8th last year the average rainfall for the county counting the 8 in. of moisture in the Morse area was better than 5 in. Spearman recorded 3.78 inches rainfall for September, and U. S. Weather Observer F. W. Brandt stated that the county reached an all time record for moisture for the month of Sept. The weather was warm and pleasant and during the entire month the lowest temperature last year was 53 degrees. Last year the first cold weather to match the present cold spell came October 19th when the temperature dropped to 31 degrees, below freezing.

Crop Deadline Close-by

With 2,528 applications for 1940 wheat crop insurance received from 69 Texas counties, the State Agricultural Conservation Committee here has issued a final warning on application deadlines for insurance.

For the 38 counties in the Panhandle area, everything North and West of King county final date to apply for crop insurance is Sept. 30; for the rest of the state the deadline is Oct. 15.

The committee pointed out that farmers who want insurance on their 1940 crops must apply before seeding their wheat and that premiums are payable either in bushels of wheat in the form of warehouse receipt or the equivalent in cash, when the application is filed.

W. L. MEEK SAYS GAS RATES HERE MAY BE CUT

W. L. Meek, manager of the Spearman Gas Co. of this city believes the ruling of the 53rd. district court in sustaining a state railroad commission order reducing the rate for natural gas for Perryton, Higgins, Canadian, Farnsworth, Booker, and Waka will automatically apply to Spearman. If Mr. Meek is right in his surmise, the rates of Spearman will be lowered at least 3 cents per 100 cubic feet. The present rate in Spearman is 30c per 1000 cubic feet, and lowering of the rate to 27c, would give Spearman customers a 3c reduction.

The Public Service Corporation of Texas furnishes the Spearman Gas Co. with natural gas. If the Corporation abides with the railroad commission's ruling they will likely lower rates over the system to conform with the adjoining cities.

RED CROSS DRIVE ORGANIZED

Bruce Sheets will head the American Red Cross drive to open Armistice Day, it was decided at a meeting of the Red Cross executive board held in Spearman Monday afternoon. Liaison representative Ralph O. Von Thurn, instructed the local organization in plans for the 1939 drive.

Von Thurn complimented the Hansford chapter of the Red Cross for the excellent record made for many years. He revealed that Hansford county jumped from 82nd place in

1937 to 28th place in 1939. It was just a coincidence that the chapter turned the figures around in the rating. Considering the fact that there are 252 counties in the State of Texas, and that this state ranks high in the national standing, this advance is rather outstanding. The increase in membership will call for a larger quota for this year and make it more outstanding for this county to hold its record. Chairman Bruce Sheets declares he will "keep what we got or get a better rating."

Siler Faulkner Accident Victim Near Spearman

PAMPA—Siler Faulkner, Sr., long-time Gray County chairman of the Democratic Party and a prominent citizen of Pampa, was killed and his son-in-law, Gene Green, was severely injured in a head on automobile collision 18 miles northwest of Spearman Friday.

The car Faulkner was driving crashed into one driven by H. A. Hassaway of Liberal, Kansas, on an unpaved county road. The three men were found lying unconscious beside their flaming cars by Tom and Frank Allen, who quickly drove them into Spearman for treatment.

Later an ambulance took Faulkner to a Borger Hospital where Faulkner died about 6:30 o'clock. He suffered a fractured skull, a broken leg, and internal injuries. Green who is suffering from a broken collarbone, three deep cuts, and severe shock, remains in the Borger hospital.

Hassaway was less injured, receiving cuts, and bruises, on the face, legs, and body, he was removed by ambulance to Liberal. Faulkner who was 69 years old came to Gray county in 1889, settling near Lefors. He was the first county clerk of Gray county, having been elected to office in 1902 when the county was organized. He held that position till 1910. From 1912 to 1916 he served as Gray County judge. He moved to Pampa in 1926.

For more than 30 years he was chairman of the Democratic party in Gray County, and was a member of the school board for over 25 years. He was in the abstract business.

Surviving are his wife; a son, Siler Faulkner, Jr. and a daughter, Mrs. Gene Green all of Pampa.

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


