

THIS WILL INTEREST THE FARMERS

Here are same Texas livestock facts, that ave an important bearing on the subject of our future farm program. Texas imports \$25,500,000 worth of pork and pork products annually.

The United States has a shortage of 12,-

The United States has a shortage of 12, 000,000 beef cattle, and we are slaughtering more beef animals than we are producing.

Texas ships 500,000 lambs annually to other States for feeding, receiving an average of about 11 cents per pound. These lambs average from 55 to 60 pounds each, which beings to the producer from \$2,025,000. which brings to the producer from \$3,025,000 to \$3,300,000, according to weight. Northern feeders take these lambs and finish them. When marketed they weigh from 80 to 90 pounds, and sell for around 14 cents a pound. Northern feeders receive approximately from \$5,600,000 to \$6,300,000 exclusive of the feetilizer, which is worth in excess of \$1 per ertilizer which is worth in excess of \$1 per

fertilizer which is worth in excess of \$1 per lamb during the ninety days of feeding. The Northern feeder makes a market for his edstuffs, receiving from \$2,575,000 to \$2,000,000, labor of feeding not taken into account. The labor, however, is taken care of by the value of the fertilizer secured.

Texas, in ordinary years, ships 1,000,000 head of eattle to Northern feed lots, where they provide a market for Northern-grown feedstuffs. There is no market for feedstuffs in Texas except through livestock.

Swift & Company and other meat packing companies are feeding, hundreds of high-class baby beeves in Texas to supply the consumers' demand for quality meat. These companies have to purchase all the feeds consumed and hire men to do the feeding. They would much rather the farmers of Texas to supply trade.

But it happens that in the year 1928 we have incidents that almost exactly parallel that one described by Mark Twain.

In New York the other day, at 7 a. m., one Louis Weinberg stepped from a sedan to a busy sidewalk and spoke to one Joseph Noe, lottering by a building. "Morning, Joe," he said; and Joe replied, "Morning Louie." Then each man jerked out a revolver and emptied it at the other.

Both men fell, badly wounded. Weinberg's friends pulled him back into the sedan and drove rapidly away; Noe was taken into a nearby hotel for first aid. In a short time the street had resumed its tranquility.

That affair is strikingly similar to Mark Twain's experience. But it does not, for some reason, strike us as picturesque. Mark Twain's gunmen seemed breezy, colorful, al-most admirable; New York's are the reverse.

why should that be? Perhaps it is because the old Nevada guumen were the logical outgrowth of the free and easy times on the frontier, while the modern gunmen are the perverted exceptions to a rule of peace and order. In the old west a man could pack and use a six-shooter without being a criminal; today that does not hold good. We admire the colorful westerners good. POULTRYING PAYS BIG DIVIDENDS

The time when the farm poultry flock was a "pin money" pastime for the farmer's wife is gone. The farmer who does not make his chickens contribute liberally to his yearly profit is overlooking one of his surest sources of income, in the opinion of authorities in- MOM'M' POP terested in bettering farm conditions.

The whole secret of bigger profits from farm poultry is contained in three simple things—better stock, more hens and better methods. It is just about as easy to handle several hundred hens as it is a few. Good layers eat no more feed than low producers, while the former return a good profit for the care they get.

Farm bureaus and state agricultural experiment stations have been stressing the need of better farm flocks for several years

need of better farm flocks for several years past. Now comes the hatcheryman himself, joining the battle to eliminate the "scrubs" from the farms of the country by pledging himself to improve quality of his chicks.

Leading hatcheries recently united under the slogan "Hatchery Chicks for Greater Profits," promising fair dealing, cooperation with the farmer in raising the chicks purchased, and better quality stock to increase the profits from the farmer's flock.
