TRANSVAAL FARMERS RAISE CATTLE ONLY TO BUY WIVES

Native South African farmers raise cattle principally for the purpose of buying wives while the white settlers are left to bring the fertile fields of the Transvali into their own as a world farming region, according to J. C. Neethling, who has arrived in America to study agriculture in the leading universities.

C. Neething, who has arrived in the fleading universities. Despite this native handicap, says (Neething in Farm & Fireside, the is productiveness of South Africa is in-creasing annauly and it is a favor-able position for export since many of its crops can be sent abroad in off seasons in other countries. "The natives," he added, "prefer to devote themselves to loafing and hunting as soon as they can get into a position wherethey can buy wives, which cost ten or twelve head of cat-the each. When a wife is thus pur-chased, she immediately assumes the burden of family labor and the hus-band is relieved of toil so long as his wife remains able bodied. When the first wife has earned enough cat-the to buy a second wife, the husband as still more time to rest. The negro workmen are alloted a patch of about ten acres in addition to eight dollars a month, and upon these areas they grow corn from which they make a drink called kaff beer, con-taining about five per cent alcohol. 





HOWE FOR CRITICIZING LINDY Amarillo, Texas, Aug. 1.—Gene A. Howe, editor and publisher of the Amarillo Globe-News, Wednesday tendered an apology to Col. Chas. A. Lindbergh in his column, "The Tact-less Texan," for remarks criticizing the flying Colonel when he visited Amarillo several weeks ago. Lind-berg was an Amarillo visitor for half an hour in the morning.
