In proof that Christ must suffer Paul would use such pas-sages as Iss. 52:13-53:12, and in proof that he must rise from the dead he would use such passages as Ps. 16:10. Without the resurrection, in-deed, the preaching of the cross would be a proclamation merely of death and despair." It was the res-urrection that transformed the cruci-thion into glorious victory. In his let-ter to the Romans, written from Cor-inth (Rom. 16:21), Paul refers to a Jason who is a "kinsman," perhaps this same man, who in that case was a Jew.

v. 6. "Crying, These that have turned the world upside down are come hither also." This is high praise, especially as coming from the ene-mies of Christianity. The religion of Jesus must already have obtained a formidable influence in the Roman Empire when this could be said of it. The people of Thessalonica had heard of its triumphs. Its coming had been heralded from afar. It was known to be on its conquering way over the world. 
