





In determining whether any given industry is desired in the community it is best to find first satisfactory answers to the following questions:

"Are the men back of it interested in developing the future possibilities of the business or rather in selling stock? Has their experience made them familiar with the conditions in the trade in which they plan tions in the trade in which they plan to enter, or are they unaware of the problems they will have to meet? Is the business one that can succeed on small capital outlay or will it run into competition with General Mo-tors or the United States Steel Cor-poration, back of which there are millions of dollars of financial backing? Is such an industry naturally suited to the community? Answers to these questions will serve as a good guide for the course

the community should take in any situation.

Ordinarily it is not wise to bring ew industries into a community by offering bonuses or by taking large stock subscriptions. But intelligent and careful analysis will tell every individual and the citizens of every community when it is safe to dis-regard this rule.
