The First Tilt Under New Law

Immediately after the petition asking for a county seat election under the provisions of the newly enacted legislation was presented to Judge King and filed with County Clerk Jess Womble, a restraining order and plea for an injunction was the county. This cause came up for hearing before district judge W. R. Ewing at Miami on Wednesday, July 6. A large crowd of Hansford county folks representing both sides of the controversy, journeyed to Miami yesterday to hear the decision of the court at first hand, on this matter. The plaintiffs, those who do not favor holding a county seat election at this time, were represented by Fischer & Fischer of Amarillo, and the defendants, those who favor removal of the county seat to Spearman, were represented by Hoover & Hoover of Canadian. The arguments were begun at about 1:30 p. m. and continued two hours. The judge's decision was in favor of the defendants, the court's order in the case being as follows:



Now Is the Time to "Cork Up" Moisture For Wheat

"The amount of stored-up subsoil moisture in wheat ground, at sowing time, has more to do with the next crop than anything else," says H. M. Bainer, Director, of Southwestern Wheat Improvement Association. He goes on and says, "Right now, a year ahead of the 1928 crop, may look like a long time in advance to begin work for another wheat crop, but much of the soil of the Southwest is soaked and part of this moisture can be retained in the subsoil, for the next crop, providing the ground can be worked without delay.

In sections where wheat was more or less a failure, on account of dry weather, there are thousands of fields growing nothing but weeds. These fields carry an extra supply of deep moisture and will make good wheat weeds before they draw out all the moisture. While the weeds are drink ing the moisture, they are also using the plant food. No time should be lost in getting over these fields quick ly with a disk, to be followed, by the of July, with a plow or lister, being sure to keep down all weeds, there-after. A method of this kind is eqsummer fallowing and will practically insure a crop.

For best results, stubble fields hould be disked immediately after the binder, header or combine, this will kill the weeds, save the moisture and leave the soil in a good condi-tion to plow or list at an early date thereafter. FLYERS SAVE LIVES

Science may yet set at naught the old similie "Like looking for a needle in a haystack." It recently came near doing it when a small tube of radium was found buried under refuse at the Fiorence, Ala., city dump.

The container, holding about \$4, disappeared from the Coffee Hospital in Florence. It was suspected that it had been accidentally carried away in the hospital garbage. Acting upon this supposition, the insur-ance company which had insured the stuff for \$3,500 employed a college professor to test the garbage dump with a device known as an electroscope. This instrument contains substances delicately susceptible to emanations from radium.

After two or three ways of unsuccessful exploration under adverse weather conditions, a clear day provided the opportunity for a decisive test. The electroscope responded with chemical reactions which led to the location of the radium tube under four feet of rubbish.

The insurance company was saved a substantial sum, even after paying for the search, and the costly radium, of which there is but a very limited quantity in the world, was saved for the use of humanity.

While there is nothing strange about the proceeding to those who understand chemical properties of the substances concerned, to the uninitiated it looked very much like a miracle. In one sense it was a miracle, but only another of the miracles which modern science performs every day of our lives.
