Hansford county is wet again, and farmers, stockment and town folks are happy. Rain began falling in practically all parts of the county last Saturday night, and by daylight Sunday morning it was a case of water everywhere." The heaviest downpour is reported out in the Grand Plains community, where a three-inch rain fell. The lakes are full of water out there and the entire country is thoroughly soaked. At Spearman two and one-tenth inches fell. In other parts of the county, only about an inch fell, but all sections report rain. Old wheat growers claim it is not too late to be of great help to some of the wheat. The late wheat will fill out better and the yield in many instances, will be a great surprise, say some of the farmers. The farmers may now proceed with their row crop planting and preparing the land for another crop. It is pointed out that the tremendously large yield of last year was due largely to the fact that farmers had summer-fallowed their land. Owing to the short crop this year, and the present fine season in the ground, there will be much summer-fallowed land for the 1928 crop, and another big yield may reasonably be expected. 


