Under the statutes, the filling up of any drainage ditches along the highways or graded roads, is con-sidered an obstruction of the public highways, and persons guilty of ob-struction of public highways are subject to a heavy fine. It is therefore ordered by the Commissioners Court, that the coun-ty judge see to it, that the law pro-hibiting the filling up of the ditches along any graded roads of Hansford county be inforced. It is further ordered by the Com-missioners court, that the general public be notified the driving over the graded roads and bridges of Hansford county, with heavy Trac-tors or Engines with lugs on the wheels, is a great detriment to the higways, and that a continuance of this practice is positively forbidden. # HIGH PROTEIN IN WHEAT DESIRABLE

"The percentage and quality of protein is having more and more effect on the market price of Wheat," says H. M. Bainer, director of The Southwest Wheat Improve-ment Association. Continuing he says, "Millers and grain dealers are paying a good, liberal premium for high protein wheat especially when they know that the protein is of good quality. The wide margin in price often paid at the same mar-ket on the same day for different lots of wheat of the same grade is almost always due to the difference in protein.

almost always due to the difference in protein. "The country grain buyer cannot determine the protein content in wheat; the work is too intricate and special chemical equipment is neces-sary. The only way the wheat grow-er or grain buyer can determine the percentage of protein is by send-ing a small, composite sample to the State Grain Laboratory or to a cereal chemist for analysis. Pro-tein may run as low as 8 per cent and as high as 18 per cent, but 12 per cent is a good, high average. 

### GRASSHOPPER FACTS

R. R. Reppert, Entomologist. By this time the damage from grasshoppers is diminishing, and by the end of July it will hardly be the end noticeable.

the end of July it will hardly be noticeable. To reassure the farmers, the fol-lowing facts are given: After becoming mature about the end of June, the hoppers during August and September lay their eggs in solid soil, usually in sod land of pastures, along fence rows, or in the grass along creeks. One famale will lay about 200 eggs. These pass through the winter and hatch in the spring, especially following a warm rain. They continue to hatch over a period of four to six weeks, but after those overwintering eggs hatch, no more young grasshoppers will appear until the following spring. Thus there is but one gen-eration of grasshoppers a year, and after the spring hatching is com-pleted, the farmer need not be ap-pres the same season. DAMAGE UNLIKELY IN 1925



PROPOSED AMENDMENT TO CONSTITUTION

Relating to Granting of Confederate

Pensions Proposing an amendment to Section

of the State of Texas to provide that the Legislature may grant pensions to Confederate soldiers, pensions to Confederate soldiers, sations and their widows, who have been citizens of Texas since prior to January 1, 1910, provid-ing that all soldiers, sations, and their widows eligible under the provisions hereof snall be entitled to be placed upon the rolls and participate in the pension fund created hereunder; levying a tax of seven (\$.07) cents on the one hundred (\$100.00) dollar valua-tion of property in this State for the payment of such pension, pro-viding that the Legislature may reduce the rate of pension for reduce the rate of pension for such purposes, fixing a time for the election to be held on such amendment and making an ap-propriation to pay the expenses

thereof. Be it resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas: Section 1. Section 51 of Article 3 of the Constitution of the State of Texas shall be amended so as to hereafter read as follows:

Section 51. The Legislature shall have no power to make any grant or authorize the making of any grant of public money to any individual, association of individuals, munici-pal or other corporations whatso-ever, provided, however, the Legis-lature may grant aid to indigents or disabled Confederate soldiers and sailors, who came to Texas prior to January 1, 1010, and to their wid-ows, in indigent circumstances and who have been bona fide residents of this State since January 1, 1010, and who were married to such sol-diers or sailors prior to January 1, 1910, and to indigent and disabled soldiers who under the special laws Section 51. 




