TEACH CHILDREN FIRE PREVENTION

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The National Board of Fire Un-derwriters in conjunction with the National Board of Education has pre-pared a booklet entitled Safeguard-ing the Home Against Fire. This is a fire prevention manual for the school children of America. Eight hundred and thirty thousand copies of this textbook here there for here of this textbook have thus far been printed and distributed. In picture and text it places before a growing child the dangers that surround on every side as a result of carelessness with fire. The book should be in the hands of every school child in Amer-ica, and should form the basis of a regular school course from the third to the eighth grades at least in pub-lic schools.

The mere fact that the annual per capita fire loss in the United States for every man, woman and child is \$2.10 compared with 49c in France, 326 in England, 286 in Germany, 256 in Italy and Austria, 156 in Switzerland and 11c in Holland is sufficient evidence that the teaching of fire prevention should start with with of fire prevention should start with the child and become a recognized course of study in this nation.
